Programming Changes Unfold at KWMR, West Marin's Listener-Sponsored Community Radio Station

With much appreciation to West Marin for another successful KWMR pledge drive, this seems a good time to talk about a number of interesting programming changes that are unfolding at our

community radio station.

West Marin has a strong history of live theater production, so we are pleased to announce that in early May, KWMR will begin carrying radio drama from L.A. Theatre Works. For over 25 years, the mission of this non-profit media arts organization has been to preserve, produce, and disseminate classic and contemporary plays. Each two-hour program showcases a unique form of audio theater paired to innovative use of technology. The repertoire of more than 400 recorded plays is the largest library of its kind in the world. Titles by Arthur Miller, Oscar Wilde, and Sophocles rub shoulders with contemporary classics by David Mamet, Yasmina Reza, and Tom Stoppard. Join us for good, old-fashioned radio theater presented in a modern vein beginning next month at 9:30 pm on Thursdays.

Other changes in our programming lineup are already "on the air," notably on weekday mornings where As It Happens, the acclaimed daily news and public affairs program from the Canadian Broadcasting Corporation, has replaced Democracy Now. As It Happens airs Tuesday through Friday at 7 am and on Saturday at 5:30 am with the show broadcast the previous evening in Canada. On Monday at 7 am we present Day 6, a weekly roundup news program, also

from the CBC.

The popular West Marin Report returned last August, and its volunteer producer George Clyde has been recruiting a corps of volunteer reporters whose skills and voices enhance KWMR's coverage of local news. West Marin Report kicks off our locally-produced programming each weekday morning at 8 am with a 5-minute newscast. The program is repeated at other times, as noted on the complete program schedule you can access on our website, kwmr.org. You can also visit kwmr.org to listen to archived copies of all the recent West Marin Report broadcasts.

We also invite you to sign up at kwmr.org to receive a convenient email summary of each day's newscast that also contains a link to the archived version that you can play at any time. Most of KWMR's locally-produced shows are archived and can be accessed on the website

for 14 days following broadcast.

In a major addition to our public affairs programming, KWMR was the second station in the Bay Area to pick up Moyers & Company, the radio edition of renowned journalist Bill Moyers' return to the national airwaves. This new series of provocative discussions launched in January with three hour-long programs probing the causes of the economic divide in the country. We broadcast Moyers & Company every

Monday at 5 pm.

It should be of interest to KWMR's listeners to learn how we decide what to air and how we make changes to the programming lineup. A key part of the process is the programming committee, which includes representatives from staff, two community members-atlarge, two KWMR Board members, an Advisory Board member, and five programmers elected by their peers from our cadre of some 85 faithful volunteer programmers. As a community member, I am pleased to have this opportunity to provide this report.

The programming committee meets monthly for lively discussions on a wide range of programming matters. The committee evaluates current programming and provides feedback for local hosts, previews and critiques proposed new programs (both local and preproduced), and makes recommendations to program director Lyons Filmer and station manager Amanda

Eichstaedt.

For example, the decision to drop Democracy Now evolved over many months of discussion in the programming committee, resulting in a policy decision to phase out shows that are also available on other stations that serve our coverage area. In the case of Democracy Now, not only is it carried by KPFA, but they had moved it to the same 7 am timeslot KWMR had it on

KWMR is quite choosey about the non-local programs we carry. From 7 or 8 am to midnight, about three-quarters of KWMR's programming is produced locally by volunteers from the community. That leaves limited time for the pre-produced programs we select from other sources. Between roughly midnight and 7 am our automation computer, "Professor Kosmo," plays music selected by KWMR hosts, providing KWMR listeners with programming 24 hours a day.

In February, we launched a 2-hour jazz show (noon on Saturdays) hosted by a man whose name is familiar to many – Jim Bennett. This is Jim's very popular show, Forms and Feelings, that ran to much acclaim for many years on KPFA (where Jim was also well known as the Pacifica station's chief engineer and for a period as its interim general manager). Some of Jim's shows are pre-produced, but he broadcasts live from our very own KWMR studio in downtown Point Reyes Station on the first Saturday of each month (as well as appearing in person during pledge drives).

We are working hard on outreach to the Latino and the youth communities. In January we added Voces de Nuestro Mundo, a Spanish-language public affairs program (Fridays at noon). Friday also features the bilingual morning show, Barrio Vibes, Bilingual Storytime, and Nuestros Niños con la Doctora Marisol

Muñoz-Kiehne, PhD.

The station's staff is also engaging with the new Tomales Bay Youth Center ("The Lounge") for youth-related programming on-air and on our website, an effort that is attracting more than passing interest from sources

of grant funding.

A feature of each programming committee meeting is when we consider listener feedback that has come into the station. We urge you, our listeners, to let us know how you feel about programs you've heard, as well as about your reactions to changes in the programs and the schedule. Lia Sabbatini G.M. @ BCC What About 'smart' meter Opting Out Options?

Hi Friends,

Wondering what to do about your certified letter from PG&E about whether or not to choose a 'smart' meter or pay to keep an analog meter by May 1?

You have a few choices. There is no one size fits all solution. I'll only give you broad outlines here, but you can get more details at eon3EMFblog.net, StopSmartMeters.org, or EMFSafetyNetwork.org.

Of course we recommend you do NOT accept a 'smart' meter under any circumstances because of severe health risks, serious privacy invasion, endangering national security, fire safety risk, electronic interference, accuracy problems and higher bills. And be sure to talk to your neighbors about this too because their radiating meters can effect you adversely.

You can either: 1) opt out, keep your analog meter, (or have your 'smart' meter removed) and pay the extortionate fees (which compared to the risks and the increased billing for most 'smart' meters, is probably less in the long run) But you should mark 'paid under protest' on your check and keep a record. For legal protection, be on the alert not to sign away any of your rights in any meter agreement with PG&E.

- 2) You can say you refuse to opt out because you never opted in and protest the fees. If you still have your analog meter –lock up your analog meter, don't allow a PG&E installer onto your property and send them a certified letter saying you refuse to pay their still legally contested fees. You may need to stock up on candles for this option though, because PG&E may either force a 'smart' meter on you while you're not home or cut off your power. If thousands of people do this, however, it will be far more difficult for PG&E to get away with.
- 3) You can opt out by calling PG&E, but wait to pay your \$75 until you see what happens at the California Public Utilities Commission (CPUC.) PG&E gives you 3 months to pay the up front \$75 charge and there are ongoing legal challenges to these fees at the CPUC. EON has been representing ratepayers interests in Phase I, arguing for no cost opt out and to allow people to keep their analog meters rather than what PG&E first wanted which was a 'smart' meter with the radio turned off. But we proved that wouldn't solve the many problems. (You can read our arguments to the CPUC on our blog if you want all the nitty gritty details.)

We're now getting ready for the next phase. Phase Two of the CPUC proceeding has been ordered to happen, but hasn't been scheduled yet. In Phase Two Community Wide opt out and the true costs of opt outs are going to be thrashed out.

4) You can support our efforts to defend our right to a Community-Wide opt out. Marin County as well as Lake County and Santa Cruz County, among 50 other California cities and counties, have legally objected to forced installation of 'smart' meters.

Marin, Lake and Santa Cruz actually wrote ordinances calling for the community wide opt out.

As of now, only residences are being included in the opt out option. This problem, the radiating data collectors on utility poles and situations where folks and apartments have multiple meters, as well as the problem with being zapped by neighbors' meters, all make community wide refusal of this stupid wireless mesh network technology necessary.

The push back against this stupid plan is national and international. Recently another leading cyber security expert, David Chalk, has forcefully spoken out about the incredible security dangers of a wireless grid. He joins other highly informed sources including former CIA director James Woolsey, and the US Inspector General Gregory Friedman, who clearly state the hazards a wireless electricity grid poses to national security. They point out that it's too hackable and the electricity grid is a known target of cyber warfare. David Chalk says we'd be within three years of a total breakdown of the power grid.

One of my main worries about all this is that a more vulnerable power grid makes nuclear meltdowns at our already rickety nuclear reactors situated on earthquake faults and in tsunami zones, much more likely since they depend on external power sources to keep the cores and fuel pools cooled. It only takes a few hours with no electricity to cause a meltdown.

There's even more: the FBI has recently issued an alert re 'smart' meters because of potential hacking. A large utility in Puerto Rico lost hundreds of millions of dollars because a criminal racket provided 'reprogramming' services to residences and businesses to lower their bills.

So now, many more people, even in the electrical industry, are finally realizing the problems with the green- washed and over-hyped 'smart' grid and 'smart' meters. There are much better ways to modernize our electrical grid if Big Brother snooping, ultimate corporate control and quick profit aren't the driving motives.
