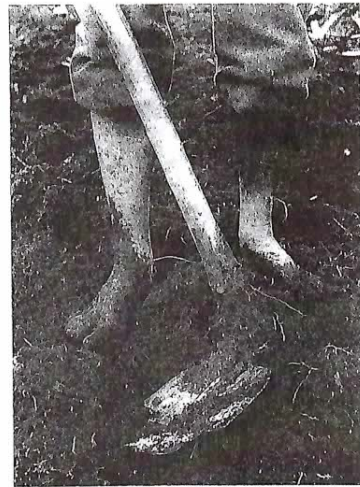
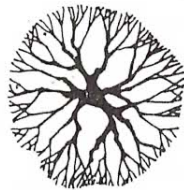

Note from the Editor:

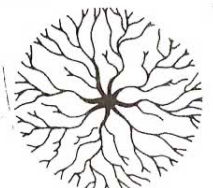
This season points to the ground, where I find myself digging. Digging with and without direction. Digging footpaths for raised beds where purple themed vegetables go in the ground. Digging in the mud. Digging little trenches to redirect the water that fills up our field with a pond over night. Digging a large hole in the wrong place. Digging in the rain. Filling in the trenches to smother the mosquito eggs, then digging them out again for the next big storm. I am digging with a future in mind, but the in-between parts seem overwhelming at times.

After the soil is ready, planting begins. Like magic spells, we try to transform abstract planning into visible results. It will always be a miracle when the first plant starts to pop up, whether it's placed in the ground by a wild energetic seven year old or an old experienced hand guiding the seed along. At the school garden I ask the kids to plant the seeds and whisper a wish to it. Then I ask them to pull weeds and with a clear mission they excitedly get to work. The tasks in the garden or on the farm give us a sense of duty and also a constant sense of wonderment.

Sometimes there is clear direction in this work, other times intuitive forces guide the way. When I think I've gotten it all under control, nature shows me I have a long way to go.

I feel like a beginner this spring but each swing of the shovel gives reality and experience. And when seasonal winds give way to confusion and loss of direction, cultivating gives groundedness. Curiosity keeps me going, and magic spells abound.

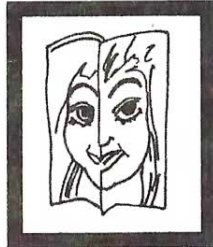

Message Found in a Bottle: The agile mind is pleased to find what it was not looking for, Lewis Hyde, Trickster Makes the World.

Allison Pebworth kicked off her *Infinite Possibilities* exhibition and tour with a two day show at the Farmstand on the Olema-Bolinas Road in Bolinas on April 14 and 15. The walls were hung with acrylic on canvas paintings in the style of the old medicine shows and circus banners. Her images reflect the difference between traditional American myths and the realities of slavery, treatment of Native Americans, warfare, etc. Visitors to the gallery were invited to fill out a questionnaire called Americanitis Opinion Survey regarding the mid-nineteenth century health condition that was associated with the American life style. Allison Pebworth's Beautiful Possibility tour will go to the Oglala Sioux Nation at Pine Ridge, South Dakota, other Indian Reservations and farming communities where she will set up her show and gather information for future paintings to be painted in her San Francisco studio after she returns.

John Bucklin shows plein air paintings at the Bolinas Gallery in his first solo exhibition. Despite the mudslide on

Panoramic Highway, his opening was successful. His wave paintings are especially strong due to his intimate knowledge of the ocean. He grew up surfing the waves in Stinson Beach where his family has a weekend home. After art studies in New York City and Florence, Italy, he returned to Stinson Beach and set up a studio. John Bucklin is a also a sculptor. For this show of 80 small paintings he cut and prepared wood panels and frames. There are two sculptures in the gallery, a carved and painted plaster bird and a most innovative scale to price the paintings by weight. It worked so well that the artist sold seventeen paintings at the opening. Bucklin's Bolinas Gallery solo exhibition runs March 31 to April 29. The artist is also showing at Brita Dorst's Stinson Beach Gallery in the Farmart exhibition opening on Saturday April 7.

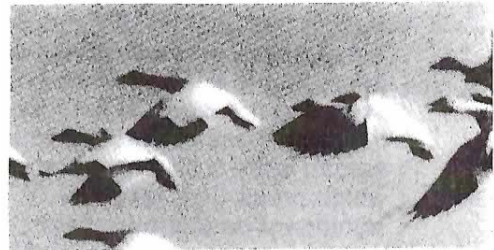

May 1 Opt-Out Deadline for 'smart' meters

Hi Bolinians,

Here's a letter from a friend in Mill Valley about her feelings around the 'smart' meter May 1 deadline for opting out if you're on PG&E's delay list.

We're concerned that if folks don't opt out now PG&E will rush to install 'smart' meters. Then they'll claim it would be too expensive to change them back (that happened in Maine) to analog meters when we argue at the California Public Utilities Commission (CPUC) for a community wide opt out for Marin and the other 55 local jurisdictions and counties that want it. Vermont now has a year of no fee opt out to watch what's happening before getting charged for this boondoggle. We have had a partial victory though, in getting to keep our analogs!

Dear Mr. Bragman

I am writing in regard to my objections and concerns relative to PG&E's Smartmeter Opt Out Plan.

First, opting out of a "program" of which I am not a part is a bewildering concept. PG&E did not alert, notify, inform, educate, or in any manner ask my permission to place a smartmeter upon my property. I have no smartmeter. Therefore, why would it be incumbent upon me to opt out?

Next, thousands of studies indicate that the radiation emitted is toxic and damaging to the human body. As I have worked in the medical field for many decades, I understand that when the human body is exposed to applications which predictably result in significant deleterious effects, or may result in same, one is entitled to receiving what is called "Informed Consent". There has been nothing remotely resembling this coming from PG&E. In fact it is just the opposite, which leads me to my next objection.

There has been a glaring absence of Public Education in regard to this technology on PG&E's

part. In fact something akin to a cover up seems in progress. I will only give a few examples of what I believe the public is entitled to hear: 1. Its pulsed radiation is even more pernicious than simple rf, leaving children and the elderly extremely vulnerable; 2. It pulses 10,000 to 200,000 times a day, 7 days a week; 3. It is a safety hazard; 4. It is an invasion of our basic right to privacy; 5. It leaves our security as a nation vulnerable to cyber-terrorism. It appears that PG&E is counting on the fact that many people do not realize they have a smartmeter, let alone understand what it is doing to them.

The idea of a program which ostensibly allows all customers to opt out, when it is likely that most customers know little or nothing about smartmeters, even whether they have one, appears to be a publicity sham.

Having to pay a fee to opt out and a monthly charge is nothing short of extortion. Recently, a high level PG&E executive stated that 170,000 certified letters were sent out to persons on the Delay List, but for some reason fewer have decided to opt out. He suggested that perhaps people did not want to pay the opt out fees, and I think he is partially correct. Some can't afford to do so. It is an unfair bullying tactic. Is health the domain of the rich?

As owners of multi-unit apartment buildings who insist upon smartmeter free communities, my husband and I were told by this high level executive that each apartment must opt out to the tune of \$75 and pay monthly fees of \$10. As each unit turns over, even though there is an analog in place, we were told that the new tenant must pay \$75 up front fee AGAIN! Imagine if the apartment turned over multiple times a year! This is patently unfair to the customer and a cash cow for PG&E. It was also suggested that we could write into the tenant's lease that in order to live in the building, they must opt out. Sounds like a sweet deal for PG&E and an attempt to enlist our help in their opt out program.

Whether all customers have the right to opt out at any time is something that PG&E has conveniently left unclear. I have been given different information dependant upon which PG&E person was talking. One told me that May 1 was the opt out deadline for everyone. Today, my husband was told that May 1 is for Delay List Customers. He was told that they may opt out after May 1, but it may be a little

more difficult. All other customers he was told can opt out into 2013. Why the discrimination?

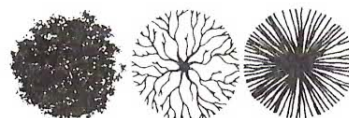
But is there really an opt out program at all? How am I really opting out when neighbors on either side of me have smartmeters within 45 feet of our home? As more and more people are becoming electro-sensitive, surrounded by a mesh network of pulsed radiation, they must flee their homes, involuntarily opting out of another program created by PG&E. **THE TOXIC HOMES PROGRAM.** This is inhumane, unjust, and not a democratic process.

The issue is hotly disputed. Many people have reported being adversely affected and others deny the evidence but at least **I know the analog is safe** and I'm not being part of a possibly harmful experiment!

Please check out the information on why it is a wise and healthful decision for you to opt-out of PGE's current scheme the "smart meter" at <http://eon3emfblog.net/?p=4509>. Read article and click on Wireless Meter Opt-Out Why and How to do it on the right. Note the letters from the County Health Dept. of Santa Cruz and the American Academy of Environmental Medicine.

After a judge ordered that the information be available on the amount of RF radiation pulses involved PG&E has admitted in legal filings with the CPUC that each smart meter pulses RF radiation spikes between 10,000 and 190,000 times per day - **every few seconds** - quite a different account of the radiation than PG&E had previously been reporting in the media. This is of concern for those of us who are electro-sensitive as I am.

To lighten up on the RF radiation frequencies is a good choice no matter what. Plus if you have a smart meter that affects your neighbors. Simply put, **less is more** in this case.

PLEASE JOIN US AND OPT-OUT OF THE SMART METER and help create a refuge from the mad rush of inundating us with wireless radiation!

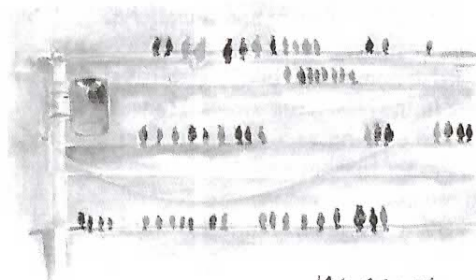



**Memorial Service Saturday
 for Howard N. Meyer**

Interviewing Howard N. Meyer was like stepping through an interesting garden door and finding yourself in the rotunda of a great library. At age 96 his mind was sharp and still engaged in his life passion for international justice and social/civil equality. Articulate and charming, he was an author including two Pulitzer Prize nominated books, published articles and many letters in the New York Times. He was a legal authority, social and civil rights historian, retired attorney and arbitrator, former Special Assistant to two U.S. Attorneys General and member of American Society of International Law. Meyer's writings on civil rights were published beside such great Black thinkers as James Baldwin and Roy Innis. And Martin Luther King wrote Meyer a letter of admiration. He celebrated the inauguration of our first Black President of the United States while on a plane traveling west toward Bolinas, to live near his two sons.

A New Yorker, born in Brooklyn, Meyer graduated from Columbia Law School in 1936, where he was editor of the law review. He shared an early law partnership with Bella Abzug at a time when few women practiced law. Three of his most notable books are still vibrantly readable and relevant to our contemporary understanding of law and politics. Pulitzer nominated: *The Amendment That Refused to Die: Equality and Justice Deferred: The History of the 14th Amendment* (1973), And as editor- of the writings of a great activist--*The Magnificent Activist: The Writings of Thomas Wentworth Higginson* (2000). Also his Pulitzer nominated--*World Court In Action* (2002).

In Bolinas, he found intellectual stimulus in the Proust reading group, events at the Bolinas Museum and Community Center. He lived in a cabin in the beautiful garden of his son and daughter-in-law Johnathon and Deborah Meyer, and was regularly visited by his son Franklin Meyer of Mill Valley. His daily companions were a devoted group of wonderful women caregivers with whom he shared a mutual appreciation.

This is sort of the swan song for the 8th grade students, but includes all the middle school students as well (in case you didn't know, that means 6,7,8 – we combined those classes a few years ago). As always, the kids will present a fabulous array of Song, Dance, Instrument, Skits, and Shakespeare... maybe even a few other things that I can't think of right now. The kids are practicing their little hearts out and gearing up for a fantastic evening.

Just so you know, the proceeds from the talent show go towards the end of year field trip to Ashland, Oregon for the 8th grade class.
