

Bolinas artist Judy Molyneux and the Outsiders have been huge influences in each other's lives and art for decades By Vicki Larson

VEN AS A MEMBER of a group of plein-air artists who playfully call themselves the Outsiders, Judy Molyneux knows she's the real outsider.

First, she lives in Bolinas and all the others live in the East Bay.

Second, Bolinas has some serious

weather.

"We all really enjoy each other's company. We goof off, and we all love to paint ... and we all have families and relationships and kids and grandkids, so there's a lot that we share," says Molyneux, who runs the Bolinas Gallery and landed the Bay Model show. "When I think about who I'm close to, what friends I've made in this world, the Outsiders are really high on my list."

It's the art that brought them together; it's the camaraderie and - as colorpersonalities ful as their landscapes

that kept it going.
"We seem to be cut
out of the same cloth bohemians, out of our heads, full of pluck, and just enjoy being together,' says Turner, who lives in Benicia.

While the official beginning of the group may be fuzzy, the event that brought Molyneux and Turner together is not.

Molyneux was looking for artists to participate in "The Bay Area Seen," a show she was organiz-ing at San Francisco's Hall of Flowers in 1985. She contacted Terry St. John, then the Oakland Museum curator, and on his advice, she asked two artists to submit slides of their work — Turner, a then-recent plein-air convert, and Pam Glover, the only female member of the first-generation of Outsiders, plein-air art-ists who had based themselves on the Society of Six, a celebrated and rambunctious group that formed in 1917.

"The day that the show was all coming together, it was crazy, and in walks

this really handsome guy, this big tall guy, kind of like California brusque but fun-loving, and that was Jerry," she says, laughing. "So I immediately fell in love with him. I thought he was fantastic, and I really liked his work."

Through Turner, Mo lyneux was introduced to numerous artists, includ-ing the ones who later decided to reinvigorate the idea of forming a plein-air group with a name and a plan. Turner

name and a plan. Turner insisted Molyneux join them, although she was somewhat leery of the name they'd chosen.

"I said, 'You know that the term the Outsiders is a term that's used to cover psychotic painters and painters that are beyond the fringe," she says, laughing. "But that kind of covers us in a kind of covers us in a way.

But only with nightfall Cataclysm spent Does Bobo return to repose As Brighton Beach reggae And light of lunar orb Suffuse lapping Pacific waves








PLANTS FOR THE COASTAL CHMATE



The K-9 Sports Center and Training Field at Ocean Song Retreat in Bolinas is located on over an acre of completely fenced grounds. It was begun by Creta Pullen who was searching for trainers and places she could take herself and her dogs for training, two small terriers that Creta learned quickly needed activities to keep them out of mischief. "I had to travel to the Marin Humane Society in Novato or enlist the aid of private trainers—most whom were unwilling to drive out to W. Marin." In 2009, the opportunity presented itself to offer classes in Dog Agility. "I enlisted my friend Liza Buckner, a champion trainer in Dog Sports, to teach Agility Classes. I thought it might be really fun for the people in W. Marin to have a chance to investigate this form of play with their dogs, whether they went on to compete or not." The idea turned out to be a good one. So, in 2010, The K-9 Sports Center and Training Field was born with all new competition grade Agility equipment being purchased for the field. Celeste Barker, a trainer with the Marin Humane Society, took over teaching Agility, also adding classes in Obedience and Behavioral issues. "I've enlisted a few other trainers, now," says Ms. Pullen, "all of whom have specific areas in which they excel. I match a clients' needs with a specific trainer. The trainer and I work with the clients for the betterment of their four-legged friend. I enjoy coming up with new areas of interest for people to participate in activities with their dogs. Dogs are like children-loving attention and wanting to please—left on their own, they find things to accupy themselves which isn't always for the best."

Something new this year is **Dog and Puppy Play Day** on Wednesdays which is either a ½ hour or hour session of Supervised Play on the field which incorporates some Obedience and Behavior training together with Dog Socialization. It's being hosted by Kathleen Call, who works at both the Sonoma and Marin Humane Societies as a Behavioral and Obedience consultant. Creta, with her Mini Schnauzer Mason, has become an enthusiast of **Canine Nosework**—a fast growing International Dog Competition, as well as the first step in training for Search and Rescue. She says, "I'll be bringing qualified instructors to our field to offer this as a class and to use our field and surrounding areas in W. Marin as a situation for practice." 

Heard It at the Hardware

RECIPE. Take one measure of Annie Crotts, add glorious music, one down-home parade, and dozens of cute kids, fold in equal parts flags and bunting, stir with a victorious women's tug-o-war team, grill up hundreds of burgers and dogs, mix thoroughly and bake for 8 hours at 75 degrees for a perfect 4th of July. The hardworking Briones Lions Club, under the leadership of outgoing President Mike Aitken, VP Matt Lewis, and Treasurer Max Brimhall, organized another terrific celebration along with their stalwart crew of Lions Club volunteers. The whole day was a big success, mellow and easy. The Lions Club raises money on the 4th to provide eyeglasses to deserving folks in West Marin. During the rest of the year, they work tirelessly behind-the-scenes, finding ways to help those in need. Incoming President Bill Barton, VP Tom Dibblee, Secretary Bill Hamilton and Treasurer John Washington have huge paws to fill. ARCANE TOOL OF THE DAY: A BILLHOOK is

a traditional tool used for cutting small woody shrubs and branches. The hooked blade is made from carbon steel and typically measures seven to nine inches and fixed to a wooden handle. It is used in much the same way a machete is, for hedging and snedding (stripping side shoots from a branch) and is popular in French and Italian vineyards for pruning grape branches. Examples of Billhooks survive from the Bronze Age, found in wreckages in the Aegean Sea. The French knife company Opinel makes knives in this traditional shape, great for cutting vegetables and flowers in

your garden.

THERE OUGHT TO BE A LAW. Wait. There is. It's called the Helmet Law. It's a good law: it's a great idea to follow it. On July 4th, as the country celebrated its independence, two adult bicycle riders crashed while cruising down Terrace Avenue without helmets. Did they see pretty private fireworks in their heads? Was it worth risking their personal independence? Fire Chief Anita Brown says, "We see lots of bike accidents in town. Cyclists on the highway are pretty good about wearing helmets, and the kids have gotten better. It's usually the casual adult rider just popping down to the market or over to a friend's when something goes wrong within a few blocks. It doesn't matter

whose fault it is. It could be a car passing too closely, it could be the bicyclist swerving to avoid an animal, it could be a bump in the road. If it's

your head, it just doesn't matter whose fault it is."

MID-CENTURY MODERN. That's me. I'm a survivor from the era of Eichler sub-divisions, Edsels, and Eames' chairs. Classic designs that somehow look better with age -- but age doesn't wear as well on the mid-century human. Aching knees, weak lower back, hair that's not as lush as it once was, and a growing fascination with medical issues, mine as well as everyone else's. As a kid, I treasured my scrapes, falling off my bike, a horse, or out of a tree. In fifth grade, I became a celebrity of sorts, following an eye operation that left the whites of my eyes blood red for a few weeks, which in turn, inspired my choice of costume for All Saint's This was our pious version of the pagan holiday of Halloween. One picked out a saint, interpreted what he or she would wear, and paraded around the school yard, hoping to win a prize for the best costume. There were always lots of Marys, Christophers, Josephs and Bernadettes, but that year, I selected St. Lucy, the patron saint of eyes. Lucy had evidently gouged her own eyes out for the greater good of mankind. I bought a couple of rubber eyes from the Five and Dime, placed them on a tray in a bed of ketchup and was surprised when the nuns kicked me out of the contest for being sacrilegious. I didn't win my very own *Lives of the Saints* book that year but remain grateful to the nuns for kick-starting a life-long love of reading about people who do strange things and a great fondness for those times in the middle of the last century






