UPDATE ON THE TERRACE AVENUE WATER MAIN RELOCATION PROJECT – OCTOBER 5, 2012

To the Bolinas Community:

The BCPUD Board of Directors at a special meeting on October 3, 2012 awarded a contract for the Terrace Avenue Water Main Relocation Project to W.R. Forde Associates. The contractor plans to commence the project next week (i.e., during the week of October 8th) and we hope the project will be completed prior to the onset of the rainy season. The project involves abandoning our water main on Surfer's Overlook (as it is threatened by bluff erosion) and installing a new water main on Terrace and Park Avenues between the stairs and Brighton Avenue.

As is always the case with water distribution system improvement projects, there will be inconveniences to us all in the form of traffic delays and parking restrictions. In particular, there will be traffic delays on Terrace Avenue at Surfer's Overlook and into downtown via Park Avenue. We would be very grateful if residents would avoid Terrace and Park Avenues during the project and use the Mesa Road/Overlook Road access to and from the Mesa.

We will do our best to minimize inconveniences to you and we thank you in advance for your cooperation while we complete this important improvement project to ensure the reliability of water service for our community.




The Free Box Follies is Nov. 17th.

Called the the patriarch of the anti-Globalization movement by *The New York Times*, Jerry Mander was founder and is a distinguished fellow of the International Forum on Globalization. He also spent 15 years in the advertising business as president of Freeman, Mander & Gossage, including producing the famous Sierra Club campaigns of the 1960s that saved the Grand Canyon.

In his new book, *The Capitalism Papers: Fatal Flaws of an Obsolete System*, Jerry researches, discusses, and exposes the momentous and unsolvable environmental and social problem of capitalism—in the vein of his bestseller, *Four Arguments for the Elimination of Television*. Mander argues that capitalism is no longer a viable system and that capitalism, utterly dependent on never-ending economic growth, is an impossible absurdity on a finite planet with limited resources.

The following is from the Joint Powers Agreement that set up Mesa Park in 1985. Please note the requirements of a **yearly audit**, and that their financial records **must** be available to the general public.

- 12. There shall be strict accountability of all funds and a report of all receipts and disbursements of Agency. The commission shall cause annual audits of the accounts and records of Agency to be prepared and the fiscal year shall be as the Commission shall establish. Records of the establishment and maintenance of all necessary funds and accounts shall be open to inspection at all reasonable times by each of the designees of District, School and the general public.
- 13. Agency may require that officers or persons who have charge of, handle, or have any access to any property of Agency may be required to file an official bond with Agency in such a manner as may be established by the commission. The premium on any such bond or bonds shall be an appropriate expense of the Agency. Any payment to the Treasurer required in the operation of Agency as provided in this Agreement shall be an appropriate charge against Agency.

WHO IS MT. EERIE?

Mt. Eerie is the current incarnation of enigmatic, sound wizard, nature philosopher, neo-beat, radical feminist, Pacific Northwest Shredder/legend Phil Elverum. I first became aware of his music in the late 90s in Santa Cruz when he came through town regularly performing in basements and on the beach in/as his old band the Microphones.

For the past 10 plus years I've witnessed Phil crank out an amazing body of work, from self-recorded albums, to photo books, to goofy comics. He makes consistently mesmerizing bold work outside any particular genre and does so with an unaffected sense of humor that is rare in most artists.

Even the notoriously snarky supposed authority on contemporary music, Pitchfork.com raved that "(Phil's) specialty (is) reconciling extreme orders of magnitude, casting mountains and planets and stars as items hanging from a baby's mobile." These folks also described his legendary album, "The Glow Pt. 2" as "unpredictable, volatile, vibrant, terrifying, and comforting."

Anyways, Mt. Eerie is coming to Bolinas tomorrow, Sat. 10/6. Mickey and Bronwen have been kind enough to open up their farm stand at Gospel Flat to host a rare intimate performance. Mt. Eerie is traveling with my dear friend Carolyn's excellent band "Bouquet" who will also play a set of 60s inflected harmonizing folk tunes.



FOUD-FEST by SERITA LEWIS

Sometimes it takes leaving to really come home. Absence and loss to appreciate what remains or returns. There's something in human nature (mine, at least) that so often benefits from contrast.

For me this philosophy is embodied in the evolution of my relationship with food. I grew up in an abundant cradle of grassroots agriculture, blissfully unaware of how very lucky I was. As a child, my elementary school overlooked rows of organic lettuce, beets and pumpkins. Miles of berry bushes in summer, apple trees and plums. A walk through downtown would see the local fisherman hauling in the days' catch; crab, salmon, halibut, tuna. Even foraging came naturally- nasturtium, wild spinach and miner's lettuce- I'm not sure how I knew what to eat, but I did. In the far fuzzy reaches of time, some one, somewhere taught me well.

And when I moved across the country to spend a brisk decade in a really big, loud city... I never forgot. Though it was not an obvious part of the culture there, I soon realized how important a hands-on relationship with food was to me. So I built a rooftop planter box and joined a CSA, started running a soup kitchen and taught myself to preserve foods at home. I baked bread. Found an underground connection to raw milk for homemade cheese. I made friends with a community of people who wanted both the bustle and the barnyard. I worked hard as a young adult to achieve some semblance of the things that were intrinsic and fundamental in childhood.

Eventually I missed real dirt under my fingernails air too much, so a decade later I returned home to Bolinas, full circle and so ready! What had taken great effort to connect with, create and maintain in a metropolis, were built-in and so happening in West Marin. Both experiences valuable, beautiful extremes in the spectrum of life's experience. However it happens, food is love...

Food. Community. Love. Three things so natural, so good together, that in my mind they hardly exist apart from one another. All of the things that I'd taken for granted are now daily reason to marvel, to stand in awe at how lucky I am to have

grown up here, and to be able to return. There are incredible people doing incredible things with food every day, in every way. And so we want to celebrate... The bounty of our abundance, the ingenuity and creativity and joy of food in our little paradise, the people making magic by growing and preparing sustainable and lifesustaining foods. We are *thrilled* to introduce the first annual Bolinas Food Festival, an idea hatched just a few short months ago and made possible by an all-star crew of foodophiles. The beauty of this project to me lies in it's duality; meant both to showcase and celebrate the wealth of our local West Marin food culture, the event also benefits the Community Kitchen Project, aimed at improving/renovating the Bolinas Community Centers' kitchen. Our goal is to create a sustainable certified kitchen space available for use by generations of foodies to come.




