

KEAN (as in pungent to the senses) GREENS

Maybe it's the recent rains, but all green things right now seem to be at their very greenest. And what a major treat to discover that Mickey's farm stand is selling mustard greens, one of my all-time favorites. So, in order to encourage others to cook and savor these tangy treats, I'm going to give you the recipe that--for our family--tops them all. This is a selfish act: the more people who eat local mustard greens, the more likely our local farmers will continue to plant them and I can keep on bringing them home.

Mustard Greens Bihari Style (adapted from Madhur Jaffrey)

2 lbs fresh mustard greens, washed and trimmed (remove heavy stalks)

1 tsp. finely grated fresh ginger

1-2 large cloves of garlic, mashed

1/2 tsp. finely minced hot green pepper (or substitute with a few drops of hot sauce)

1/2 tsp. salt

2 Tbsp. finely minced cilantro

2 Tbsp. mustard oil (or substitute equal amount of mild cooking oil mixed with 1/2 tsp. dry mustard)

Blanch the greens in boiling water over high heat for about 5-6 minutes until they are well wilted but still bright green. Drain and squeeze out as much water as possible.

Put greens in a food processor along with the remaining ingredients and blend into a thick and lustrous purée. Enjoy!





The solar show descends in calm salty sea A magnificent penumbral lunar show begins Paired with planet Mars in all its brilliance New drama unfolds each spectacular moment



Modified symphony takes over rhythms remain New instruments declare their space Some sharp and clear while others Mute each tone an element of note






So goes days wondrous pace till once again the solar show finds its place in oceans horizontal space Eastern sky glows so bright her smiling foe Night again finds its splendorous grace

Coastal Currents

I am forever expanding my interest in Oceans! One way for me to gain first hand knowledge is by serving as Conservation alternate on the Gulf of the Farallones National Marine Sanctuary (GFNMS), Sanctuary Advisory Council (SAC). Many are not aware that we have a water based "National Park" surrounding us. The GFNMS is one of fourteen marine sanctuaries in the United States and there are five on the west coast. Sanctuaries are selected for their rich marine environment. The GFNMS area is 1,300 square encircles the Farallon Islands encompasses Tomales Bay and Bolinas Lagoon.

The Advisory Council meets at a minimum of 4 times a year but more truthfully at least 6. I have been on the SAC since 2006 and have attended meetings up and down the coast from Bodega Bay to Half Moon Bay. SAC meetings are all day and loaded with fascinating topics and presentations by top researchers, biologists and habitat specialists. Most meetings are open to the public and have items to vote upon in order to help the Sanctuary Superintendent set policy There are scheduled public comment periods at each public meeting. Recent votes have concerned Maverick's surf contest, ocean vessel approach lanes to prevent whale strikes, great white shark protection and vessel management on Tomales Bay . All my time and attention is voluntary as are all my contributions to Sanctuary management. This little funded entity is energized by it's volunteers.

At one SAC meeting I was introduced to Marine Biologist Rebecca Johnson of California Academy of Sciences. Cal Academy was offering classes in Rocky Inter-tidal Habitats. I took the course and became a docent for our own Duxbury Reef. Part of my role at the reef is to take visitor counts, find out where people are from, answer questions and instruct in tidepool etiquette, such as to leave things as you find them. Because it is a marine protected area collecting is prohibited. Duxbury was really plundered for decades and is now in restoration

mode. It is a complex habitat with thousands of creatures dependent upon each other for survival under very extreme environmental conditions. From freezing in winter to chance of dehydration on sunny – windy days of summer most of these inter-tidal creatures are very adaptable. Their greatest threat to survival is while exposed is being trampled or mauled by humans. Some of the Turban Snails we see so many of at Duxbury have survived these extreme conditions for over 60 years, they show their age by becoming gray on top.

Another thing that GFNMS affiliation allows me is getting involved in really cool projects! member of the SAC I was asked to chair the Locally Preferred Bolinas Lagoon, committee. I learned a vast amount about the conditions that impact the Lagoon and what can be done to mitigate it's many ills. Our report was peer reviewed and voted upon by the SAC. I have also trapped and marked invasive green crabs in Seadrift Lagoon and am currently tracking Tsunami debris in the National Seashore for the NOAA Marine Debris Program. This Tsunami and Marine debris survey will be ongoing for two years and I will bring more information to you on a regular basis through this column Coastal Currents.

I am very proud of my affiliation with the Sanctuary. I am pleased to be doing my part to educate and inform others about the wonders of the Ocean environment. I hope to update locals on goings on in the Sanctuary and in the waters around us, including dates I will be at Duxbury Reef if you should want to come out and have an introduction.

One of they Bay Area's most respected curators, Robert Flynn Johnson, will discuss the work from his personal collection featured in *SLAPSTICK: Vintage Hollywood Cinema Photography*, currently on exhibit in the Bolinas Museum's photography gallery. Following his appreciation of the classic cinema, Johnson has developed his own extensive and diverse private collection of vintage cinema photography. Johnson will share insights on the great array of genres and nuances in collecting vintage photographs.

For over thirty years Robert Flynn Johnson held the position of Curator in Charge of the Auchenbach Foundation for Graphic Arts at the Palace of the Legion of Honor in San Francisco. He lectures regularly on a wide range of topics at museums and universities throughout the Unites States. I woke up at 6 am thinking about this so I had to write it up;

As they were counting the ballots last night I was out drilling with the Bolinas Volunteer Fire Department. Our Fire Chief was simulating emergencies at different addresses in Bolinas. The firefighters were in the engines "responding" to the calls. We had a terrible time trying to get through narrow overgrown roads, getting the rear view mirrors smacked back by overgrown brush and trees. We were paging through our map books and looking for street signs and signs on houses to direct us to the pretend emergency.

The dictionary says emergency "a serious, unexpected, and often dangerous situation requiring immediate action: your quick response in an emergency could be a lifesaver" example.

When someone is having a heart event, choking or injury, time is of the essence. It is also hard if a visitor is at your house and does not know the directions. It was actually a very dark night and amazing how few streets and houses are marked with a sign that reflects at night. There are places where you have to recite off the streets so you don't miss it and that really does slow the response down. Try keeping track of how many streets you have passed when the adrenaline is pumping and you are trying to think about all of things you must do when we get on scene! Fortunately, it was training but when you are in immediate need and we are trying to get to your house as quickly as possible, address numbers on your gate or house and a sign at your street saves a huge amount of time.

Do you wake up in the morning worrying about this? Cause, personally, if you do not have a clear sign, I think you should.


For this reason I held a the sign clinic at the Fire Safety Day at the Fire Department from 11 to 3 and made some great reflective signs with lots of people but there are so many places that need marking. Please, think about the emergency responders trying to find you. Help them help you.

I understand the utilities took down lots of the signs I made years ago including one of my favorites the Dog with wood.

I want to replace that sign and others. I would appreciate seeing signs and want to assure you that if it is the police you are worried about, they will find you if they want to.

I am hoping this will prompt action and keep people from taking signs down at the very least


