WHAT IS WRONG WITH THIS PICTURE ?

Last Sunday, April 17th, a Wonderful Concert was held by our town in Bo Park, with GREAT MUSIC by Greg Schindel, and his Musical Compadres. There was lots of good food as well as Spirited, DANCING, (95 year old Herman Berlandt was there, doing his usual JIG !). There was an ebullient sense of JOY shared by everyone there !!!

Two months ago we went to a Bo PARK Board Meeting, requesting the use of Bo Park, on April 17th, and we were ASSURED by the board that the NEW UNCOMFORTABLE CHAIN over the SERVICE ROAD would be UNLOCKED so that all the EQUIPMENT and SUPPLIES would be easily ACCESSIBLE to the Oven Pavilion (where the band was playing), by USE of UPPER SERVICE ROAD.

Unfortunately, such was NOT the CASE !!! I had had a long talk with the the President of the board about WHY the CHAIN was there in the first place, when this is OUR TOWN PARK and the SERVICE ROAD is there for OUR CONVENIENCE, in order to UNLOAD THINGS easily (as well as for EMERGENCY SITUATIONS i.e. AMBULANCE, FIRE TRUCK etc. !)

I was told that the dentist, Miguel Bustamante, had put the CHAIN over the SERVICE ROAD because he "did not like the traffic by the side of his office !!!" WHAT TRAFFIC? How about the TRAFFIC IN FRONT of his OFFICE ? I walk by his office & the Park, almost EVERY DAY and I have never seen ANY ABUSE of that ROAD !!!

So then I called Alethea Patton, the DESIGNER of OUR park and she told me that Miguel HAD NO LEGAL RIGHT to PUT THE CHAIN over the SERVICE ROAD !!! That he only had a "RIGHT OF WAY" to USE the Road himself, that the PARK OWNS the SERVICE ROAD, NOT Miguel !!! Nor do I remember any COMMUNITY GATHERING & DISCUSSION, VOTING on the PROS and CONS of ALLOWING the CHAIN to BE THERE, as is the USUAL PRACTICE, in OUR COMMUNITY !!! WE were told by the Board that the "chain would be UNLOCKED by 10:30 in the morning of April 17 and by Charlie by THREE phone call REMINDERS.

Magi & Mike showed up that morning having to CARRY THREE LARGE RUGS, two LONG TABLES, 35 CHAIRS, 2 BENCHES, UMBRELLAS, a SHADE AWNING, COOLERS, BOXES of FOOD, from in FRONT of the CHAIN, PARKED in the PEDESTRIAN WALK- WAY (NO PARKING DOWNTOWN !) I even called the FIREHOUSE to see IF THEY had an EMERGENCY KEY !!! The FIREMAN came down and tried ALL his keys with NO LUCK !!!

Thank God Magi & Mike STARTED EARLY !!! Enough said for NOW, but we are on the CASE !!!

AN AVAILABLE KEY NEEDED for the WEEKENDS, at the very LEAST i.e. at the CO-OP!!!

The BCPUD Directors did not disappoint last night. They held strong to the moratorium, refusing to raise the water limit of 1875 for excessive project on Overlook, stating the following: some people are unable to get any water, some have no limit because they have not applied for building permits, others have various limits depending on when and what, but just because you want more does not entitle you to get more {my paraphrasing}. Bravo to our Board!

They are very strongly against the Coastal Commission overstepping their authority (along with the other West Marin towns) and Jennifer, our BCPUD manager wrote a very strong letter before the meeting the on Tuesday.

And, there will be another parking committee. This will be the 4th one. I was on the 2nd one. Good Luck!

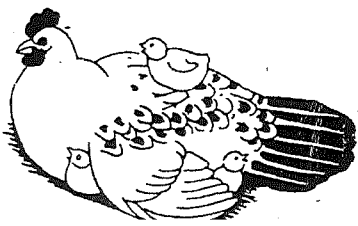

And they listened.

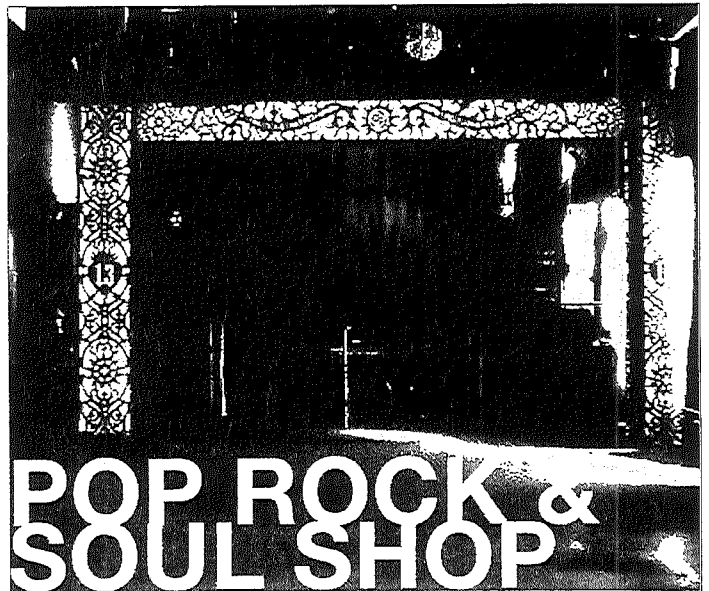

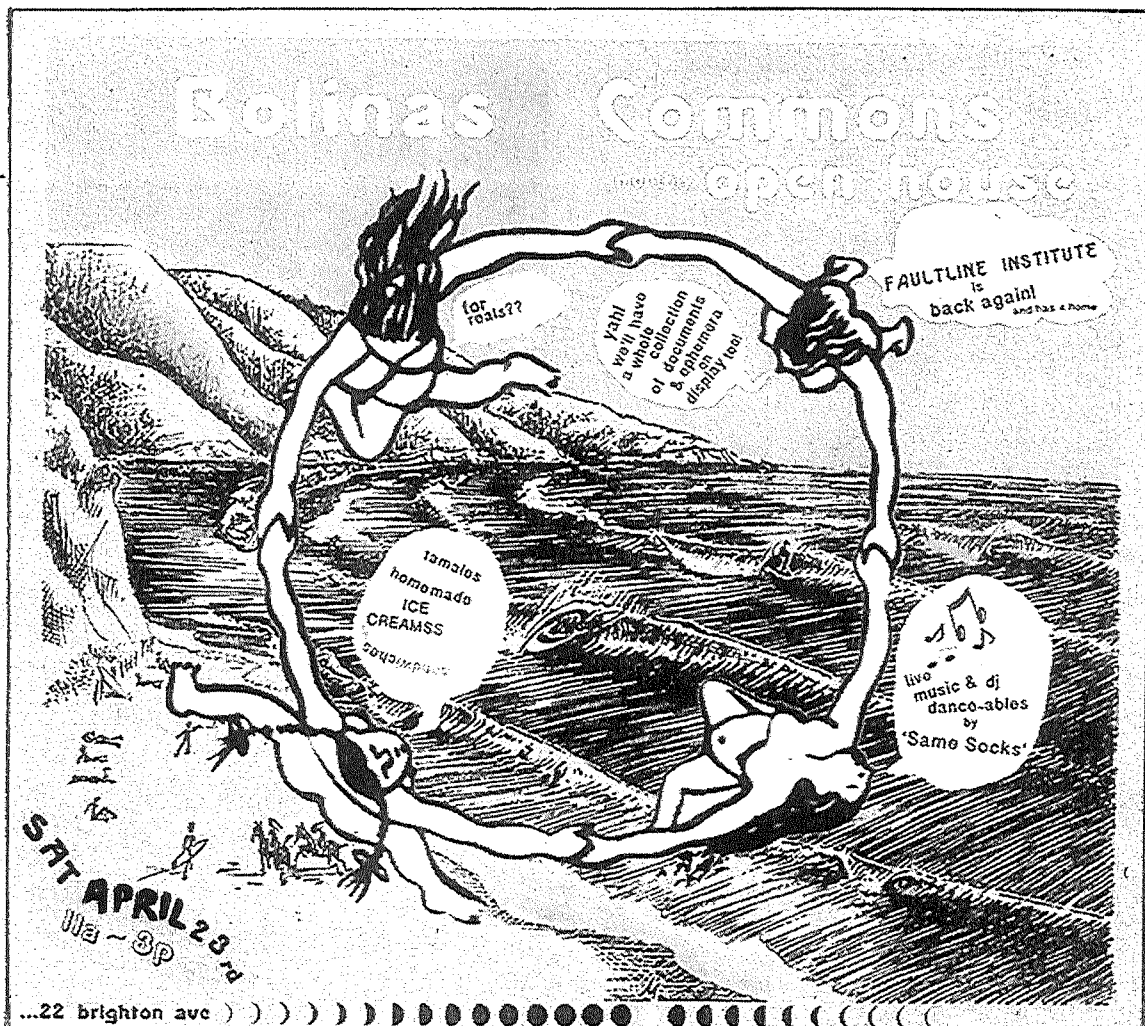

Trip report

Along with several residents of Bolinas, Stinson Beach, Inverness, Marshall and other coastal villages, I attended a hearing on proposed regulation changes in the local coastal zone.

The regulation that got the most attention was ocean size and its impacts. The ocean gets bigger when it warms up. It's doing both.

If you want to build or in some cases remodel your property (see the small print), you need to find a place where the ground will not wash away in 50 years.

There had been talk of setting the number to 100 years. Nobody knows. Some geologist said 100 years. By then, something more important than your beach house will be under water and you won't be able to get there anyway,

They noodled it out. They'll say allow for 3 feet of rise and check back in 10 years. Science doesn't know yet, and the geologist just guessed. It was nice to see recognition, as a science major, that science changes every day.

This means 3 feet of stilts if you're near the beach, or maybe 9 feet, depending on science and whether there will still be roads.

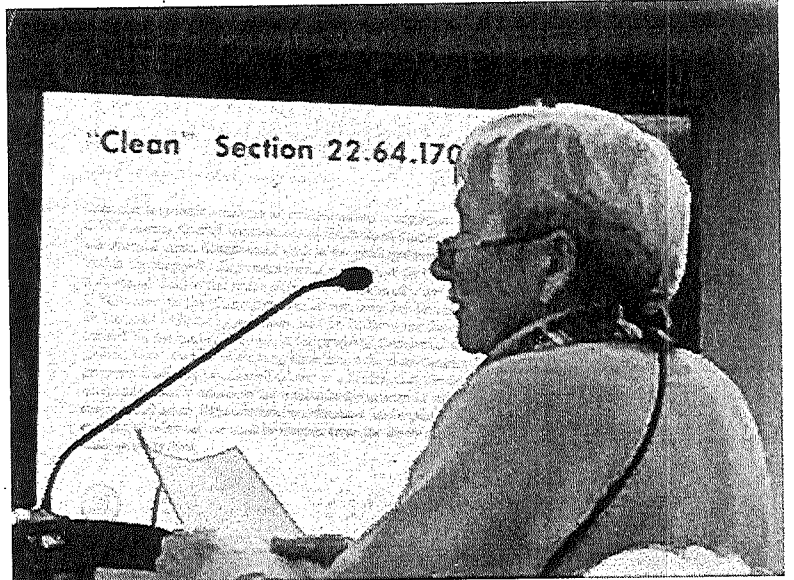
There was talk of using large tubs, like the design of the Transbay terminal, a bus depot in a giant bath tub. Language will be added to allow new ideas to protect coastal property without putting in defensive barriers (rock piles).

The topic that drew the most local comments was the regulation that encourages commercial development vs residential use in zoned commercial areas like Wharf Road. "All I need is three bathrooms, some ice and a beer supply, if that's what they want out here" said a woman who lives in the commercial stretch in Marshall.

One after another, local residents asked the county to address the issues of overcrowding and short term rental that overloads local resources and squeezes out local renters. Other than showing agreement with the locals the board does not seem interested in addressing the issue with the Coastal commission or fund the traffic controls, water use and waste removal that the locals suggest. There was talk of a short term rental regulation. It had been considered for the coastal zone but was tabled for action as part of a county wide measure that will be discussed this Fall.

One change got left off the presentation because the presenter was not present. This is a change in the definition of maintenance of a structure vs new construction. The new language treats as new construction any permit on a property with a prior history of remodeling that exceed a 10% threshold vs the property value. This test can be applied retroactively. It seems to be that could mean that periodic rehab projects (roof line changes) might require coastal commission approval, a lengthy expensive process. Seems to me this would increase the number of tall hedges and stealth remodels. Like the movie Brazil, but with termites.

Supervisor Kinsey in his motion asked that some 'de minimus' consideration be applied so the county does not have to keep a set of records on each parcel. I would like to see support for native hedges.

By the language proposed, changing the cladding of a building (cedar shingles in my case) would be treated as new construction, needing a coastal commission permit and a county permit, both expensive time delays as the termites dig in. If the ocean has eaten the yard, no rebuild permit.

Again Supervisor Kinsey pointed out that county and coastal commission inboxes are flooded with applications, so nobody is looking for more paperwork, but in a move that will be good for hedge planters they have only taken issue with the paperwork, not the intent to micro manage.

One speaker with a great deal of insight into the regulations and their impact warned about ceding local control to the coastal commission on issues that affect local character. Local residents, not the coastal commission, should set the character of the village. Jennie Pfeiffer made a great statement about maintaining local character, which in our case means there is no sign pointing from the highway to the town.

One speaker suggested that we accept the fact that we live in a place that can be damaged by overuse and regulate access like they do at Machu Picchu, thereby preserving the community and its culture.

At the end of the hearing, they called a vote and by 5-0 sent the proposed language to the coastal commission, who may accept or reject it, and when they do there will be another chance to have hearings on whether the

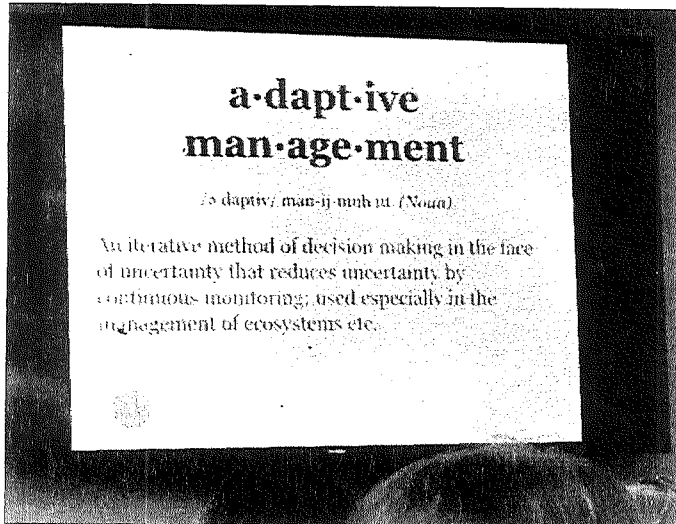

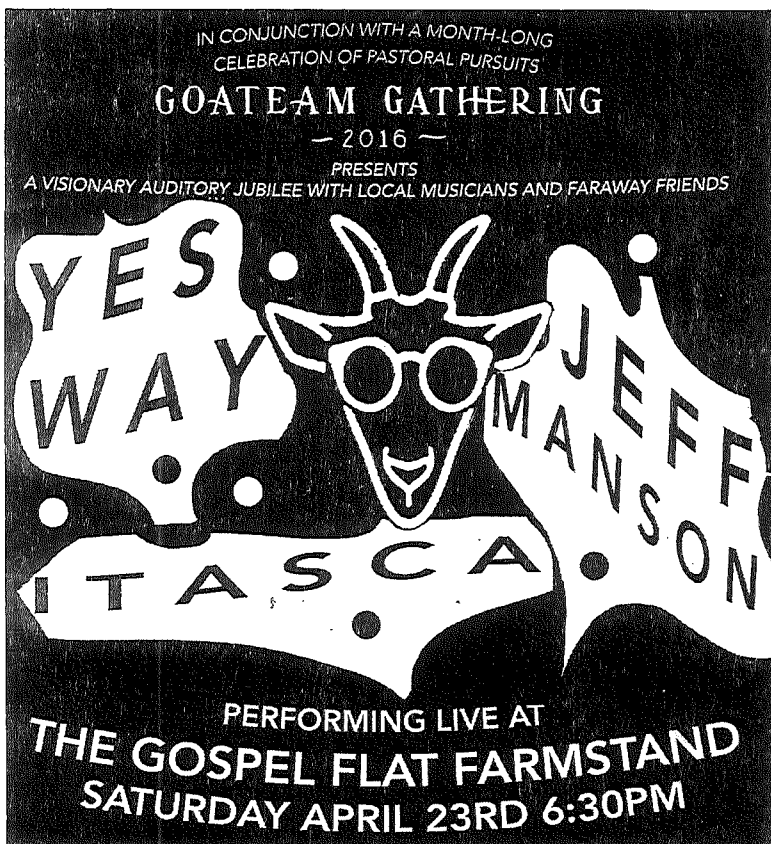
county agrees with what the coastal commission suggests in return.

These are being submitted one by one for consideration, so some of these could be adopted without further hearings.

This was an 8 year effort resolved in a 3 hour hearing, but the real issues remain: community self determination, commercialization of local villages, availability of long term rentals and long term sustainability given a rising ocean. The county manager describes the project approach:

The Point Reyes Birding and Nature Festival is a must see birding event sponsored by the Environmental Action Committee of West Marin! The Festival takes place at the height of spring migration within the Point Reyes National Seashore and surrounding areas featuring over 50 field events and indoor workshops. Participants will see migrating seabirds, waterfowl, resident and migrant land birds, raptors, alcids, and owls.
