### Molly Maguire interviews musician Cornelius Boots

Molly: Cornelius, I met you back in 2003 through my clarinet teacher Ben Goldberg. He recommended you as a bass clarinetist for my thesis concert at Mills College, and we have stayed in touch and collaborated since. My Bolinas friends most likely remember you from your bass clarinet quartet Edmund Welles, since you performed at the Bolinas Community Center several times, including for our Faure's Requiem concert where I arranged the mas terwork for the quartet. At some point, you decided to transition from your work as a clarinetist and saxophonist to refining your mastery of the shakuhachi. Can you talk about that decision, both when and why you made the leap? Also, tell us what is a shakuhachi!

Cornelius: Shakuhachi is just a stick of bamboo. Actually, it is an ancient musical instrument and breath meditation tool from Japanese Zen Buddhism with a deep history involving beggar monks, samurai spies and being outlawed (briefly) by the government--but structurally, compared to those Western woodwind instruments I used to be expert in, it is essentially a stick of bamboo. Thicker walled, root-end madake bamboo from Japan and held as a vertical flute, the shakuhachi has no moving parts, no materials added and noth ing structured to make the sound happen for you (like recorders and Native flutes/whistles do). There is a chunk removed from the top where your mouth is, the nodes removed from the otherwise-already-hollow bore, 5 finger holes, the roots are trimmed and that's basically it. The rest is up to the player. It is a slow, deep, ego-crushing and strangely rewarding activity.

So these elements of raw nature connection, deep cultural history, musical curiosity and ultimate woodwind challenge all conspired to take shakuhachi from the "hobby" status of a me as a professional woodwind performer-composer into the com-

plete focus of my personal and professional life. I discovered shakuhachi in 2001, and in 2015 (after 2 years of rebalancing myself by relocating out to West Marin from the East Bay) I made the full transition to 100% bamboo as a performer and teacher. I still compose for other instruments.

Molly: How many albums have you recorded for solo shakuhachi?

Cornelius: Four solo albums, starting in 2009. But these do involve various sizes of flutes, leaning heavily into the lower-pitched variants called Taimu that are made nearby by Ken LaCosse.

Molly: And where does one perform this instrument? I can imagine it doesn't work well in a bar type venue...

Cornelius: As you well know, this has been a challenge in-and-of-itself. To me, this instrument is uncommonly beautiful and dynamic, and because of its earthiness and naked real-ness, I am making it my mission to present it 100% acoustically, and showcase its full spectrum of expressiveness, which includes gritty, distorted, blustery sounds in addition to floaty, wistful, melodic and high-energy shapes.

So this whole approach requires a special consideration for context and venue. My ideal places tend to be community centers, schools, recital halls, galleries, churches and houses. I do not want to be on a stage or use a PA system, and I think that this personal, intimate, show-upanywhere approach can actually offer more new experiences than staying locked into the standard approach to gigs. I want to showcase three things: the voice of the bamboo, my own artistic prowess and the results of our symbiotic relationship.

Molly: Can you tell us about your latest album? What inspired you to do it, and how one purchases/listens to it?

Cornelius: Just last Saturday, April 7, the 2nd album in a trilogy called Shakuhachi Unleashed was released. This Volume II is called Bamboo Rising and the first one is called Holy Fluteand came out one year ago. These were both crowd-

funded and created in conjunction with local recording engineers and illustrators. The concept of this series is just like it sounds: unhooking this tremendously expressive musical instrument/voice from any constrictive preconceptions and merging its strengths with adventurous new repettoire.

As I said, my approach to instruments is animistic: what does this woodwind voice want to express? What kinds of songs and compositions support, exploit and channel this best? Of course, my own long musical history is involved in the process, but the bamboo knows that before it picked me to work with, so I have to go with that too. Evolving a traditional art form from another culture is not a difficult process with this method, it is very natural and second nature—if you've truly been selected or called by it—even though it involves long hours and sustained intention and attention. It is holistic and fulfilling if you approach it from within the art form itself. This is not easy to explain, but words like noetic and somatic might point towards what I am saying.

This has resulted in me creating about 70 new solo pieces for shakuhachi and its baritone brother Taimu. Many of these draw heavily on honkyoku--the classical Zen Buddhist repertoire of nature, chant, breath and meditation pieces--in addition to Black American roots music such as early blues and gospel. The true heart of all American music lies within those forms, and it is also the original wellspring-source of soul, funk, rock, and heavy metal, all of which are involved in this album, Bamboo Rising, and this growing new repertoire for shakuhachi.

This presently encompasses original compositions in the style I call hermit blues or bamboo gospel, as well as intricate arrangements of classic rock and metal: songs by Black Sabbath, Pink Floyd, Led Zeppelin, Danzig, Jethro Tull, Lamb of God, Roky Erickson, Iron Maiden and of course, Dio. This latest album has a strong Nature theme linking it to its classic repertoire from Japan that features many nature-centric pieces. And of course, living out here, that's the point isn't it? Live in nature where the elements remind you who's boss,

but still be able to go play a gig in the city if you have to. It is a better option for sanity in my not so humble opinion.

Molly: Do you have any upcoming concerts for us West Marin folks?

Cornelius: The concert this Saturday (my official album release for *Bamboo Rising*) is in San Francisco, but I think it will be worth the trip over the bridge.





It is happening, but incredibly slowly for some reason. Maybe I've just been too focused on writing and recording and releasing albums since arriving here in 2013 but...seriously, call me if you want to hear some big bamboo.

Molly: How does one stay in touch with what you do? What is your website or youtube channel?

The NEW corneliusboots.com was launched in November and I am very happy with what can be explored on there already, even though of course it is always "in process." There is lots of music and videos from recent and archived projects dating back into the early 90's. There is



Jane Mickelson decided to be a writer as soon as she could read and write. Addicted to story in all its permutations, she wangled jobs focused on books, reading, and writing from her teen-aged years on. Jane's short stories, reviews, essays, poems, and articles have appeared in numerous magazines, newspapers, and journals and been included in anthologies.

### What was your early reading experience like?

Here's an early memory: I'm riding in the car with "grownups." While passing a large roadside billboard, everyone but me begins to laugh and joke about the text. It's my first revelation that part of the world is closed to me. Fortunately, I've an older brother who gives in to my pleas to teach me to read; by kindergarten, I've already been initiated into what will become a life-long passion and, in adulthood, profession.

#### Were there favorite books you read in childhood?

Childhood tastes were primarily for fiction, especially what today is called Fantasy. I loved P. L. Travers' Mary Poppins series, with their references to mythological themes and characters (Travers a mythologist herself) and the Narnia books, of course, but also any story where children had magical adventures, such as the novels of E. Nesbitt, and in the 1950s, Edward Eager's Half Magic series. I read Tolkien only after his books were published in the U.S., but I'd already been enchanted by his poetry which appeared earlier in several anthologies. There was also a good series of biographies of prominent women, written for young readers, people such as Louisa May Alcott, Jane Adams, Amelia Earhart. Of course, I read and re-read The Secret Garden. A wonderful but lesser known British author, L. M. Boston wrote a hauntingly lovely series, The Children of Green Knowe, that I adored and later read to our kids.

### Do you like to read paper or eBooks? Audio books?

There are three ways I read: alone from a book; from audio books; reading aloud with my husband at bedtime, taking turns as narrator and listener. We began our nightly reading about 25 years ago, and most frequently choose novels, both new and classic. Currently, we're reading Eowyn Ivey's The Snow Child, a finalist for the 2013 Pulitzer Prize, based on an old Russian folktale but set in early 20th century Alaska. We've read memoirs and several histories, though avoid anything too distressing or gruesome (don't want to invoke nightmares!) It's a peaceful shared pleasure and a great way to end the day.

#### One book at a time? Several?

I've two separate piles of books. One on the bedside table, purely for entertainment; the other, in my office, that usually contains research for a current writing project, and for preparation to interview a guest on the radio program "Questing," over KWMR.

Right now, I'm reading Kelly Barnhill's Dreadful Young Ladies and Other Stories, and loving it. Her short stories are quirky, weird and otherworldly, and her novel The Girl Who Drank the Moon won the Newberry Award. While the latter is written for young adults, it's definitely worth a read by adults as well

I've also just finished listening to an audio version of Yaa Gyasi's novel Homegoing, a multi-generational tale of a family descended from a Ghanaian Yasanti woman. It begins in 1700s Africa and goes up through the later 20th century, alternating voices. It's well written and compellingly narrated. Audio books are a boon for insatiable readers; I listen to them whenever driving any distance, doing yard- or housework.

#### Do you have a favorite genre?

My childhood tastes have continued. Well-crafted fantasy tales still appeal. We seem to be living in a time when books in that genre, written for adults as well as kids (though many adult friends eagerly read the Harry Potter novels) are vastly popular: multi-volume series such as Game of Thrones, Outlander, Red Rising, Marie Brennan's Onxy Court (a personal favorite of mine), the Hunger Games, or anything by Neil Gaiman are proving that getting older doesn't mean we can't still play with and speculate about other possibilities.

Years ago I worked in a bookstore that carried only science fiction, fantasy, and mystery novels. We sold a pin-on button with the phrase: "Reality is for people who can't handle Science Fiction" [but I would include the word "Fantasy"].

As a mythologist, I'm also intrigued by how many fantasy authors are using characters from various pantheons and mythologies, not only for adult but for young readers as well. The Percy Jackson novels are best sellers for kids, have been made into movies, and are even generating spin-off nonfiction books about the Greek gods and goddesses. Neil Gaiman's novel American Gods has been made into a highly successful t.v. series. His main characters are goddesses/gods who came to North America along with the people who immigrated here over the millennia, bringing their faiths with

### Any thoughts on current books written in the fantasy genre?

There's a newer trend in fantasy that appeals to my love of folklore: novels that use old fairy or folktales as template. Noami Novik's Uprooted and Katherine Arden's The Bear and the Nightingale with its sequel, The Girl In the Tower, are based on Slavic traditional tales and are lyrically written, welltold novels for adult readers. I hope this trend continues.

While I'm enjoying many of the novels mentioned above, there's an aspect to these highly popular series that troubles me: so many of them are dystopian, set in a future portraying a damaged, sometimes even dying or destroyed, planet Earth. Often it is only the young characters--many in their teens-who can save the day, solve the problems, and help their who can save the day, solve the problems, and help their species survive, but all too frequently the outcome is achieved through violence: "might makes right" wins again. To me, this is an indication of the genuine fears and apprehensions for the future that the younger generations of our very real world are experiencing right now.

Are there any books that you return to or re-read?

There are some books that I'm glad I didn't read until well into adulthood. A while back I finally read George Elliot's *Middlemarch* and know that if it had entered my life earlier I wouldn't have had the eye/ear to fully appreciate the beauty and brilliance of her writing. A. S. Byatt's *Possession* remains a favorite, and is a novel I look forward to re-reading. Her capture of the style and cadence of Victorian poetry and prose is so accurate that she could be Elliot's heir.

I want to continue the rest of Proust's great opus. I was reading it to a good friend who could no longer read to himself. Halfway through the third volume, he died, and somehow I didn't have the heart to continue on my own, but have promised myself to return to it someday.

You've mentioned many works of fiction. What are some of the non-fiction books that you've read recently?

There are several non-fiction books that I've found fascinating and highly recommend. Rebecca Solnit's memoir The Faraway Nearby often moved me to tears, not only because of her writing quality, but also because it reflected so much of my own life experiences and interests. The World Without Us, by science writer Alan Weisman, and historian Charles C. Mann's 1491 followed by 1493, are not only page-turners, but also give us an idea of what our world was like and could be like in the future. Siddhartha Mukherjee's The Gene: An Intimate History describes the development of scientific understanding of DNA--fascinating. Andrea Wulf's The Invention of Nature is a must; part bio of the life and work of Alexander von Humboldt and part history of human interaction with the environment.

#### Why read?

For me, reading is a way to travel through time and space, and to gain intimate understanding of other peoples' lives. The emotional quality of reading intrigues me; why do we mourn the death of a fictional character, grow anxious or joyous over an invented situation in a plot? Reading allows me to step outside my own time and experience life through someone else's adventures. My deepest appreciation is reserved for authors who are highly adept at depicting both characters and story through unique and gifted writing.

I hear you've had past experiences working in the world of books. What were some of those?

Here are some favorite jobs over the years that focused on reading: 3 summers as a young "gypsy" librarian on a bookmobile; clerking at 3 very different book stores, beginning at age 17; 5 years as a "Reader's Service" librarian in a public library; 5 years as a radio book reviewer. As a writer, I've had the perfect excuse to read about concepts, eras, people, and places that intrigue me. Over 25 years as a voice actor, I experienced the delight of reading aloud to people whom I might never meet but to whom (I dearly hope!) my reading brought pleasure in the form of narrated audio books or by voicing media software.

And I must thank our children (and now grandchildren) for the immense joy of sharing with them books that brought so much into my life as a child.
