

To The Bolinas Community:

On Wednesday morning, April 25, 2018 at approximately 9:38 a.m., we experienced a small spill from our sewer system in front of 45 Wharf Road due to a hole that formed in a ductile iron pipe underground at this location. BCPUD personnel were on site within approximately ten minutes and the spill was contained immediately; however, some of the discharge reached the nearby storm drain and may have entered the Bolinas Lagoon. Notifications therefore were made immediately to the California Emergency Management Agency and the Marin County Environmental Health Services Department. BCPUD staff collected water samples near the storm drain discharge to the Bolinas Lagoon, as well as upstream and downstream of the discharge location. We will update you as we obtain additional information.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank our very alert community members who were downtown on Wednesday morning and called us the moment they saw this spill begin. As a result, our staff was able to respond and take action to stop the spill and begin clean-up within ten minutes. Bolinas is an awesome community!!!



Stinson/Bolinas Community Fund Grant Application Deadline Coming Soon!



In anticipation of their forthcoming exhibition "Last Picnic," I put local artists Van Waring and Rob Moss Wilson in two different rooms, and interrogated them with the same five questions. Read on to see if their stories check out... -Jeff Manson

JM: What is the last picnic to you?

VW: End of the empire, the decadence, the false abundance, the bounty- even at the expense of others, trampling through our landscape...oh just the audacity to revel in it all as we spiral out.

RMW: Getting in the zone so deep at dinner parties with adults around at school on the weekend filling any gap and occupying a space most reserve for what they call boredom and entertaining myself with all the things getting pulled from the abyss.

What's your ideal scenario for making art?



Minutes from the March 26th 2018, Bolinas Fire Protection District Board Meeting

Pres. Kimball called the regular meeting of the Bolinas Fire Protection District to order at 7:00PM. Vice Pres. Chiera, Dir. Shaw, Dir. Gade and Dir. Martinelli were present. Also present: Chief Brown and Administrative Assistant Cadance Lynam.

MSC Shaw/Chiera (unan.) to approve the agenda.

CHIEF'S REPORT

Chief Brown attended the February 28th Governing Board meeting. Deputy Executive Officer Dave Jeffries reported that staff continues to work with Motorola on a number of issues including cutover planning, site audits and engineer ing. The FCC has approved licenses for the Next Gen radio frequencies. The first order for field equipment was made for agencies that had an immediate need for radios; staff is currently working on a second order to potentially take advantage of Motorola discounts. MERA is also working on promoting the filing period for the Low-Income Senior Homeowner Parcel Tax Exemption for the 2018 – 2019 tax year. Qualified seniors must apply each tax year. The Bolinas Fire Protection District will be helping spread information by posting on Nextdoor and in the Hearsay. Work is also continuing on site development and the CEQA process schedule.

Prevention

Chief Brown was unable to attend the March 11th Wildfire Symposium held in Pt. Reyes. However, there was a good turn out with one hundred and fifty people attending. The topics discussed were similar to previous meetings held in other areas. As part of the Bolinas Volunteer Firefighter Association's community prevention work, the Association provided five smoke detectors to a resident after a Fire and Life Safety inspection. The Association has a program that will provide detectors to anyone who cannot afford them.

Training

EMT training culminated in an all day skills testing to recertify all of our EMT's. On March 10th, Assistant Chief Marcotte and Firefighter Chris Deibel administered a test to the EMT's on eleven different skills. We are very appreciative to both Steve and Chris for taking the time to instruct our EMT's. Chief Brown taught at CPR class to two NPS employees on March 14th.

Volunteers

We have four new potential volunteers. Willie Norton turned eighteen and has handed in an application. Two BCPUD employees, Andrew Spalding and Stew Oakander, attended our last training. They are both interested in learning more about our operations, which was the inten-tion of the Shared Services Agreement worked out with the BCPUD over a year ago. Also, Luke

Arnold, who works at the hardware store, at tended the last training and is still interested in becoming a volunteer. Luke was attending drills at the end of last year but stopped once we stopped trainings for the year.

A portion of the Operations Working Group has begun meeting to discuss the schedule and costs associated with replacing U219. You may recall that our Vehicle Replacement spreadsheet had U219 being replaced in 2022. Chief Brown has been informing the Finance Committee that it will have to be replaced sooner due to frequent mechanical failures. We expect to replace the unit by the end of this calendar year. FF Pete Maendle and Captain George Krakauer have been researching shops that can complete the transfer of the utility box to a new chassis. Chief Brown will be updating the Board with details as they become available.

Disaster Council

Richard Dillman was able to reprogram most of our Area Coordinator's radios and also offered refresher training on the radios on the evening of March 13th. Only about half of our Area Coordinators were able to attend. Firefighter Godfrey will now be working to contact the remaining Area Coordinators to be sure their radios are updated. We will also be speaking with them about having a sufficient number of Neighborhood Liaisons. Since Syd and Dick Bass moved, Area 2 was in need of a new Area Coordinator. We are happy to report that Beth Carusillo has offered to fill that position. Chief Brown and Firefighter Godfrey met with Director Shaw to discuss Disaster Council operations. The board discussed possible options for emergency situations and agreed that the work that the Disaster Council is doing should be emphasized to the community.

General Operations/Administration

Chief Brown continues to participate on the TOT2 Advisory Committee. At the last meeting on March 23rd, a draft letter outlining frequently asked questions was reviewed. This letter will be sent to the West Marin Chamber of Commerce as several members oppose the measure. We hosted a West Marin Chief's meeting here on March 9th. Chiefs from all seven West Marin Departments attended. Topics discussed included the potential passage of the increase in the TOT and what each department would expend those funds on. Also discussed was the work being done in the County to address community wildfire preparedness, and the possible agreement between the NPS and Marin County Fire Department for the County to provide vegetation fire protection. Chief Brown attended the Marin County Chief's meeting on March 15th. A PG&E representative made a presentation on the work they are under taking with Cal Fire to improve fire preparedness and safety in communities. They are review ing the possibility of improving early notifications and the possibility of turning power off be fore or during an event. This issue was brought up by a resident at our November community meeting. Southern California apparently will shut power down in certain areas during wind and fire events. The representative said there are many considerations to be taken when considering turning off resident's electricity. He will keep the Chief's updated as the issue progres Chief Brown attended the last half of Sup. Rodoni's office hours held at the BCC on March 16th. Topics under discussion were the parking issues in Bolinas as well as people living in their vehicles, affordable housing, the need for an emergency roadway from the Mesa and speeding on Horseshoe Hill Rd.

Surfers' Overlook Repair/Terrace Avenue On March 15th, Jennifer Blackman, BCPUD, Sean Kennings, LAK Associates and Chief

Brown met with Sup. Rodoni. The intention of the meeting was to provide Sup. Rodoni with information regarding all of the work that has been done to preserve Terrace Avenue up to this point and the need to move forward with Phase II of the Surfer's Overlook repair. Sup. Rodoni was very supportive of the project. Sean and he believe we need to begin researching the permitting requirements for the next phase. Sup. Rodoni's

assistant is going to schedule a meeting with us as well as Tom Lai, Jack Liebster and Ernest Klock in order to discuss what the best approach to completing Phase II is.

One of the engine bay doors had a mechanical failure and cost \$4,000 to repair. We are finding that the majority of these costs are related to the high cost of labor and the travel time to Bolinas.

In the next year we'll be budgeting \$10,000 for Buildings and Grounds reserve rather than \$5,000.
