
Bolinas-Stinson School would like to offer the film at no cost to families and community members and are encouraging parents to view this film with their children (ages 10 and up), tweens, and teens.

In the crowded field of 8 candidates wanting to replace Steve Kinsey as our District's voice on the County Board of Supervisors, two people stand out; so I'm hoping they'll be the two who make the cut for the likely November runoff election.



President's Report: Singing of the mission statement. Agenda approved, no April minutes to approve.




