








Kinsey Wins

Incumbents Steve Kinsey and Katie Rice were elected to new terms on the Marin County Board of Supervisors Tuesday.

Both Kinsey, seeking his fifth term in office, and Rice, seeking her first term after appointment to the post last year, trounced their opponents.

Kinsey, celebrating his election triumph with supporters at the Marin Resource Recovery Center, overwhelmed Corte Madera Councilwoman Diane Furst with about 62 percent of the vote. With 29 of 32 precincts reporting 91 percent of the vote, Kinsey tallied 4,381 votes and Furst, 2,691 in late returns.

Rice, a longtime aide to the late Supervisor Hal Brown, drew 7,445 votes, winning 68 percent of the vote with all precincts reporting to easily avert

"Clearly, the voters recognize the value of experience and leadership," said Kinsey, whose \$155,000 campaign fund was three times larger than Furst's. "I am excited to be able to represent the entire district, from the bay to the ocean," the 59-year-old Kinsey added.

Kinsey's sprawling 4th District, a tract bigger than all four other supervisorial districts combined, flows from the Pacific coast to northwestern Novato, loops into San Rafael's Canal area and weaves back to pick up Corte Madera, Homestead Valley and part of Larkspur.


As late returns indicated she was trailing, Furst called the result disappointing despite the "good experience" of the campaign trail. "Campaigning is always difficult, but I think we had a good dialogue," she said. "I think it's important for elected officials to be challenged."

Furst, waving a Sierra Club endorsement and portraying Kinsey as an old-boy, closed-door business booster, campaigned on an "open government" plank, contending it was time for a change. She offered a thinner resume than Kinsey, but mounted an energetic campaign, boosting the environment and saying the need for "responsive, transparent government" was paramount.

Kinsey, pointing to a record of achievement that includes service on agencies including the state Coastal Commission, indicated it was no time for another rookie to join the five-member county board, which faced unprecedented change the past year following the deaths of Charles McGlashan and Hal Brown that left four women in charge for the first time.

Kinsey called himself a problem solver who "finds solutions that work for people" and said the key issue was downsizing the bureaucracy and curbing costs through efficiencies including restructuring pension benefits.

BOLINAS ON TAP? By Jeff Manson

I was perched up on the little mesa the other day, watching the blue and tan swirl of an outgoing tide and chatting with my friend Molly Marcotulli about many different things; California history, Bolinas lagoon, globalization, collective consciousness expressed by & reflected in our natural surroundings- you know, the usual. The conversation eventually came around to PLASTIC & I got bummed out, remembering how much plastic is still in our lives. We here in West Marin consider ourselves pretty savvy when it comes to environmental issues & maybe it feels passé to keep harping on this issue. However, considering that every piece of plastic ever made is still here with us today, it seems right to open this tired dialog again. Do you remember that:

Every year we manufacture enough plastic film to shrink-wrap the state of Texas?

About 90% of the floating marine litter is plastic?

8% of the world's oil is used for plastic production

Americans use 2.5 million plastic bottles every HOUR?.

Plastic in the ocean breaks down into such small segments that pieces of plastic from a one liter bottle could end up on every mile of beach throughout the world?

Bottled water costs as much as \$10 per gallon compared to less than a penny per gallon for tap waters?

Making bottles to meet Americans' demand for bottled water required the equivalent of more than 17 million barrels of oil in 2010, enough fuel for more than 1 million United States cars for a year, and generated more than 2.5 million tons of carbon dioxide?

It is hard to un-entwine ourselves from plastic, but one place to start might be to quit drinking water from plastic bottles. Could Bolinas become a Plastic-Bottle-Free town? Wouldn't that be a cool gesture? We have some of the best tap water around, yet there is no decent drinking fountain downtown. Our two grocery stores sell dozens of plastic bottles of water each day, mostly to tourists. Lets start thinking about alternatives- a filtered water dispenser somewhere perhaps? 

# White man's arrival doomed W. Marin Miwol

Point Reyes Light, January 24, 1985

Ancient Miwok Indian culture began to die 200 years ago, when the Mission San Francisco de Asis was formed in what is now San Francisco.

"Our best estimate is that 2,000 to 3,000 Coast Miwok lived in Southern

Sonoma and Marin County before 1776," says Miwok researcher Don Thieler, "and 35 years later, 90 percent of them were dead."

Thieler and Sylvia Thalman are cofounders of the Miwok Archaelogical Preserve of Marin (MAPOM) in Novato. In Thalman's words, "The Coast Miwok never recovered from the incursions of disease and the Spanish mission influence." She calls the period "the Bosinping of the and" 'the beginning of the end."

MAPOM research compiled by Thalman and others in the book "Kule Loklo and the Coast Miwok Indians' further tells how the Indians met their

demise in the white man's world:
"In 1835, under the Mexican government, the missions were removed from religious control," writes Thalman. "The lands and stock of the missions were supposed to be returned to the Indians, but the economic ambitions of the new owners of the huge land grants thwarted such an outcome."
In 1835, local Indians were gypped

out of their land in what late historian Jack Mason called "The Nicasio Swindle."

VANESSA FOUND THIS OLD "What actually happened is about as lurid," Mason wrote. "In order to gain title to Nicasio, it was first necessary to CLIPPING FROM THE POINT establish title in the Indians' name, REYES LIGHT IN THE BACK OF

"Nicasio saw the mission Indian in his. death agony," wrote Mason in "The Solemn Land." "Here Vallejo and his nephew Alvarado plotted one of the shabbiest land heists in California history.

Mason tells how then-Governor Jose Figeroa told Indians from the San

Rafael mission to pick their new homelands, and they chose Nicasio. Vallejo was put in charge of setting aside 80,000 acres of valley land and providing them with horses, cattle and sheep.

Because the Indians had never received written title to the land, they became worried it might be taken away from them. The chiefs appealed to Alvarado to "take consideration that we are poor and we have large families so that you may...help and protect us.'

Alvarado skirted the issue, telling them they could contact Vallejo if they were "disturbed."

Angry and convinced they had been cheated, the Indian chiefs stormed into San Rafael-and threatened to lay siege

on the pueblo.

Vallejo manuevered for time, and to mollify the Indians he issued three cattle and one horse to each one. Then, on Oct. 13, 1840, he gave them written conveyance to "Tinicasia" in southern Nicasio Valley, where they were living anyway.

Mason then wrote:

"In 1843 Alvarado made his move for the rest of Nicasio. There is a story to which Stephen Richardson alludes that the Indian chiefs were lured to San Francisco, drugged with whiskey and enveigled out of the land.

something Vallejo had been careful not to do."

Mason continued that, on Dec. 27, 1843, Vallejo made an appeal to Mexican Governor Manual Micheltorena to grant the Indians title to their lands so they could "live reunited." Vallejo Vallejo wanted to deliver the title to the Indians personally.

On Oct. 14, 1844, the Indians were handed title to Nicasio by Vallejo, and the next day, in the town of Sonoma, they unknowingly signed their land

away.

Under the title's terms and conditions the Indians "transferred forever to Don Juan B. Alvarado all the lands known as 'Nicasio'.

Cruel as the treatement of Miwoks was by Mexican authorities, it got even worse after California became independent and then a state.

Between 1850 and 1855, the California State Legislature passed three laws which legalized the slavery of the California Indians.

The first law denied Indians the right to testify in court.

The second said that any white man could haul an Indian into court and have him declared vagrant. The Indian could then be auctioned off as a laborer to the highest bidder, with whom he would remain as a slave for up to four months.

All that the Indian was entitled to at this time was his keep.

The third law said that any adult Indian or child could be bound over by a white man. The term "slavery" was avoided in these laws because California was a free soil state.
