Bolinas is For the Children

Tuesday's BPUD meeting featured a lively debate between neighbors of the downtown tennis court park and parents of young children seeking to add a playground to it. Some neighbors expressed concerns that a park would attract children, who would play, laugh and make noises as children do. Others wondered why we even need a children's park downtown.

"We've got less than 100 kids in the school," said one long-time Bolinas resident, "who is going to use a children's playground downtown?"

Another neighbor suggested to the parents of young children that they should just send their kids to Agate Beach to play. She didn't like the giant tree trunks and natural materials that the parents proposed. "Bolinas is not for play structures," she said. "I always bicycle everywhere," said one attendee, swatting aside one mother's concern that she had to drive her young children to Mesa Park or the school.

The parents were taken aback by the opposition. After all, who opposes a children's playground? Some were hurt that neighbors gathered a petition to oppose a children's playground rather than help the parents figure out a solution. They wondered, how could a community claim to be concerned about the falling population of children and oppose an effort to make Bolinas more child-friendly?

A few items were clear.

To make sure that Bolinas continues to be a place for children, we need to continue to invest in more resources for kids. Playgrounds attract children, create a space for community for parents, and tend to chase away public drinkers. Downtown needs a children's playground.

There was a consensus in the room that burnt park could be a perfect alternative to the tennis courts for a children's playground. Many parents expressed great frustration that the park was constructed without adequate play structures for young children. People who opposed the playground by the tennis courts said they'd fully support it in burnt park.

Residents around the tennis courts are overwhelmed by traffic, garbage and loitering. This seems to block their ability to consider adding a playground to the land behind the toilets and tennis courts.

Twice now, downtown residents have opposed the building of a children's playground downtown. First, when burnt park was built and now when a playground was proposed for the one county park downtown.

There's an old story about a farmer who refuses to leave his land as a nearby river floods. A friend comes by in a truck to take him to safety. The farmer refuses and says he's going to wait for God to save him. The water keeps rising and another friend comes by in a boat to save him. The farmer says he's going to wait for God to save him. Finally the Coast Guard arrives in a helicopter and tells him it's his last chance. He refuses. The water continues to rise and he drowns, wondering why he was left to die. He reaches heaven and asks God, "Why didn't you save me?" God says, "What do you mean? First I sent you a truck, then I sent you a boat and then I sent you a helicopter."

We should accept an offer of help from parents. We need more parents of young children in Bolinas. Let's encourage them, welcome them, and inspire them with ideas from the past. Long ago the macrame playground provided the children of Bolinas endless enjoyment. Let's see what a new generation of parents can bring.

Several kids will be collecting signatures for a kid's playground from 10-12 on Saturday and Sunday in burnt park. Stop by and encourage them.

**Whiffle Ball at the Stinson Beach Village Green
Elliott Kolker, aka, The Village Elliott; July 4, 2016**

Recently, while strolling past the Village Green, I stopped to watch a *Whiffle Ball* game such as was played weekly on Friday evenings a few years ago. * But, many of the usual suspects who sustained the games have either moved from town or had lifestyle changes that limited their participation. Though games have been played sporadically since, last week's was the first in years that, to me, captured the original feel and enthusiasm. It stirred deep childhood memories of when I played similar games. **

I think it would be great if the tradition could be revived and sustained. Although I am not volunteering to organize the games, I am more than willing to publicize and encourage them. Anyone interesting in playing, especially organizing them, please feel free to approach me to see what we can do.

*) As the game of *Whiffle Ball* evolved in Stinson Beach, it's played with a plastic *Whiffle* ball and plastic bat, on the well-lit basketball court, with games going as late as there are players. The nine innings games are modeled on slow-pitch softball; three outs per side, no leading off bases, and no stealing. But the ball is pitched overhand, with four balls, three strikes, no third strike foul out, with a trash can serving as home plate umpire; hitting it on the fly is a strike.

The bases are the corners of the half court of the town's basketball court closest to the highway. A runner may be "soaked" for an out. (Hit by thrown ball when runner is off base.) Base umpiring calls are "By Consensus." Sometimes teams are prearranged, but are usually picked from all who show up is there to play, with the number per team and their rosters fluid. Lineups are set with every teammate getting to bat before any one teammate has two. Not everyone need field, but the number that starts the inning stays set, though substitutions are allowed. The number of fielders each inning may vary.

**) While growing up in St Louis, Mo. I played several variations of baseball, one with a *Whiffle Ball*. Like *Whiffle Ball*, *Step Ball*, or *Stoopball*, *Cork Ball* or *Stickball*, and *Wall Ball* each lacked base-running.

Like in Stinson, we played *Whiffle Ball* with a thin plastic bat and a baseball-sized ball with slits on one half, giving it the aerodynamics to throw the old dipsy-doodle that's not so easy to control, or hit. I mostly played in my friend's fenced backyard using trees, furniture, etc. to determine fair/foul-hits/outs.

Stepball, as this game has been called in my hometown since established by 1930, or *Stoopball* as it is better known from being played on East Coast sidewalks, notably in New York, where "steps" are "stoops," is played by throwing a fuzz-less, pink Spaulding brand tennis ball, or "*Spauldeen*" against steps, to have it bounce back and played by fielders." My first fifteen years I lived in a house with a great set of steps in the backyard growing up. I spent hours on my own or with friends bouncing that ball. It's responsible for my surprising fielding ability, developing my hand-eye coordination, and quick soft hands. It also explains my relative inability to hit. (See: Below).

Wall Ball, was played by bouncing the ball off a wall instead of steps. My grade school had such a brick windowless wall, one story high, that ran the length of a large playground, plenty of room for fielders.

We also played *Cork Ball* there, pitching against the wall with five balls-two strikes, second strike-foul outs two outs and fielders beyond. We didn't use a traditional cork ball, like a mini-baseball, but either a *Spauldeen* or regular tennis ball, strike foul out. I didn't play this game very often. It was more like *Stickball*. *Stoopball's* local cousin, is played in the street, where the pitcher one-bounces the *Spauldeen* at the hitter, who swings with a sawed-off broomstick. Often these games featured base running.
