

Hearsay Interview by StuArt with David Van Leeuwen to raise awareness and funding for his projects helping monasteries in Myamar.

Hearsay: Tell us a bit about yourself:

David My name is David Van Leeuwen. Van Leeuwen means "from lions, and I'm also a Leo born in the year of the Dragon. Dragon and two Leos. That's me.

Hearsay: You taught at the school for a long time. David: Yes, I taught in the Bolinas School metal shop: lost wax casting, jewelry fabrication, metal sculpture. I taught at the school from 1972-1979 and from 1988-2014.

Hearsay: How did you get interested in Myamar? David: I think it was meeting U Thant, the General Secretary of the United Nations when I was singing in the SF Boys Chorus. That was the moment that Burma (now Myamar) became of interest.

First went to Burma, when it was still called Burma, in 1984. They only gave 7 day visas and there was heavy military control, but it was the most wonderful 7 days of my life.

Went back in 1995 for 10 days, the next year for 20 days and the next for 30. In 1997 I had wooden reproductions of traditional Myamar designs made and I shipped 10 big wood carvings back via ocean cargo. I made rubber molds from the wood carvings and then cast them in lightweight concrete.

For 3 days I sold the concrete copies at the Bolinas Christmas Fair and I made \$1500, which was very encouraging. Five days after the fair ended I flew back to Myamar to buy more wooden carvings, 20 this time, from which I made latex molds and concrete castings.

In 1999 I applied for a grant from the Open Society to teach mold making at a monastery school in Yangon. Part of that grant funded a videocam and 5 gallons of latex rubber.

That year I became a Myamar Buddhist monk. My focus is on helping monasteries and nunneries that serve displaced children in Myamar. Some of the things that we've accomplished include:

- water holding tanks and wells
- toilet building
- hand washing stations
- scabies & ringworm prevention
- hiring of teachers
- purchasing lap top computers
- hiring computer teacher to teach MS Word, Powerpoint and video editing
- purchasing a sandal press
- hiring a teacher to teach sandal making

- purchasing fabric and making curtains to help cool classrooms
- purchasing fruits & vegetables to supple, ment the kids nutrition

*Hearsay:* What's in store for this year *David:* Planning to return on October 2 to the monastery where I have a room in a school for 700 children (boys and girls)

I'll hire a teacher to continue computer instruction, and I'll hire other vocational teachers to teach sandal making, woodworking, art, and electronics repair.

Hearsay: What can we do to help?

*David:* All projects are funded by donations. For more information go to the Sharing Merits website at sharingmerits.org.







Minutes from the July 25, 2016 Bolinas Fire Protection District Board Meeting

Pres. Bass called the regular meeting of the Bolinas Fire Protection District to order at 7:00PM. Vice Pres. Chiera, Dir. Shaw, Dir. Gade and Dir. Kimball were present. Also present: Chief Brown. Admin Assistant Brown was absent. MSC Kimball/Shaw (unan) to approve the agenda.

#### CHIEF'S REPORT Mera

Chief Brown plans to attend the regular MERA meeting on Wednesday July 27th. The agenda includes reports on the Strategic Plan Implementation, two Executive Board Appointments, and Marin County Office of Education and other non-MERA member use of the

#### Prevention

Chief Brown reported that Capt. Krakauer and FF walker have been working to clear every hydrant in town for better accessibility. They, simultaneously, have been noting road conditions in regards to over-growth of vegetation and road surfaces. A BCPUD employee has also been assigned to survey all roads regarding encroachments that pose a problem for water district infrastructure and emergency vehicle access. Issues that concern the fire department include width of roadways, height of vegetation, and encroachment of vegetation along the edges of road. Once all the surveying is complete, the BCPUD and the BFPD will meet to determine next steps to address the issues. Chief Brown and Assistant Chief Marcotte have identified which roads on the Mesa are major access/egress. roads, roads which serve multiple blocks and which ones are considered neighborhood roads serving less residences.

# No update.

Training

Training continues on Wildland suppression including mobile attack and structure defense. The Volunteers are continuing to use Target Solutions for EMT training, mores recently taking a class on Geriatric Emergencies.

#### Volunteers

Paul Krohn, a potential volunteer, will not be joining the department due to a shortage of housing options in town.

Chef Brown reported that the driver seat in U219 was suffering extreme failure due Capt. Krakauer researched several options for repair. The truck was taken to a shop in Novato for repair. E265 was serviced at Diego Truck Repair for its annual safety inspection. The mechanic there found the exhaust brake, an additional braking system for large vehicles, to be frozen and completely out of service. The repair cost \$1,000 in addition to the regular servicing. Chief Brown reviewed that the District donated an engine to a small fire department in Northern California back in 2011. She was recently contacted by a representative of Cal Fire and told that the vehicle was never registered or insured due to FMC still being listed on the title as the lien holder. The engine was paid off in 1994, FMC has been out of business for many years and cannot be contacted for signature.. Chief Brown has been working with the DMV to correct the situation. In order to rectify the situation, the District will need to obtain a Surety Bond, in order to hold the DMV harmless, from the District's insurance company. Once the DMV has the bond as well as a request for new title, and the new owner information, they should be able to issue a new title for the vehicle which can be turned over to CalFire.

#### Disaster Council

Beth Carusillo will be moving on from the position of the Bolinas Disaster Coordinator. She has graciously agreed to take her time and help find a replacement. A young woman in town by the name of Cadance Lynum has expressed interest in the job and has been highly recommended. Chief Brown will meet with Beth and Cadance regarding the position. A "test" tent, cot and blanket intended to be used for the Field Hospital overflow during a disaster were ordered and received. Beth and Chief Brown have set up the tent and tested out placements of cots for maximum usage. They worked very well, additional tents, cots and blankets to care for 15 patients have been ordered.

Beth plans to contact Richard Dillman regarding a large scale radio drill at the end of the summer which will include the Stinson Beach and Muir Beach Disaster Councils.

#### Resource Recovery

Chief Brown attended the scheduled meeting on June 27th. GM Blackman was absent on vacation. Mike Aitken, Chief Stevens, Stinson Beach, and Sarah Sanders were in attendance. Discussion centered on the concerns of the RR site meeting the newly required set-backs from the creek. Another meeting will be scheduled after GM Blackman returns.

#### Building and Grounds

Chief Brown met with Steven Siegal, Executive Director of the Coastal Health Alliance regarding the insertion of a sliding glass window at the front desk of the Bolinas Clinic. She reviewed the area and plans with Steven and conferred with Capt. Pete Smith. They concurred that the window would have little structural impact on the building and provide the

employees with the privacy they are seeking. Chief Brown will inform the CHA that the window can be installed.

General Operations/Administration

The District has received two regular, annual Public Records Requests. One requested information on purchases in the last quarter and the other was from Transparent California requesting information about compensation. Both were completed.

The fire suppression system and all fire extinguishers at the station were serviced by Fire King.

The Hurst Tools, or also referred to as "Jaws of Life", were also serviced.
Chief Brown attended the newly formed Parking and Traffic Committee. The committee plans to revive the Bolinas Parking Plan made several years ago by a previous Parking and Traffic Committee. The original plan met with some preliminary resistance from the Coastal Commission and was never approved. The new Committee plans to continue to refine the plan and work to get it approved by the County as well as State agencies: Chief Brown's focus at the meetings is on emergency access and egress issues. She plans to attend the meetings when she can but not serve as a committee member. The July 4th community celebration was relatively smooth with eight calls for service, all medical, except for a dumpster fire at the end of Wharf Road on the morning of July 5th. Chief Brown thank every fire fighter who curtailed their celebration to help out. She also thanked every volunteer who spent time preparing for the event by placing "no parking" signs, rebar, and caution tape around town. She also thanked all those who manned the parking lots and traffic control points. She acknowledged that the labor was intensive and she very much appreciated everyone's' efforts.

#### Surfers' Overlook Repair/Terrace Avenue

The Save Surfers' Overlook Committee held a meeting on July 12th to discuss the next steps the committee should take towards Phase 2 of the project and how to best use any remaining funding from Phase 1. It was determined to schedule another meeting in the near future for better attendance by committee members and to contact the Bolinas Community Center regarding the Surfers' Overlook Fund.

FF Joe Walker has successfully filled the seasonal fire fighter position. Capt. George Krakauer has been both flexible and professional in his new position as a full time fire fighter and is doing an excellent job overall.

GENERAL BUSINESS

Action Item #1: Consider Grand Jury Report: Marin's Hidden Human Sex Trafficking Challenge: It's happening In Our Backyard Chief Brown reviewed the Grand Jury report that details the prevalence of human sex trafficking in Marin County. In summary, the report discussed how human sex trafficking goes mostly unrecognized, is under reported and rarely intervened upon. Typically, law enforcement, medical and fire departments and EMS professionals have received ineffective training, sporadic

training, or no training at all. The report suggested that training should be developed and implemented in Marin County School Districts to educate students, parents and teachers. The Grand Jury also determined that the current public outreach campaign is insufficient and should be addressed by the Board of Supervisors.

Chief Brown added that the BFPD personnel and volunteers have received little or no training on the recognition of human trafficking and resources that are available for victims.

The Board was asked to respond to. Findings 1-13 and Recommendation 5 in the report. After some discussion, the Board found that the format for the requested response to Findings 1-13 challenging as the majority of the findings were directed either towards schools or law enforcement rather than fire departments. More pertinent, the fire district is being asked to either agree or disagree with findings for which the data or analysis is not provided or referenced and, therefore, the Board was unable to complete the form as requested. The Board however, enthusiastically supported Recommendation 5 and will be implementing that recommendation. Recommendation 5: Marin County fire departments should ensure that all EMS personnel are trained in recognizing human trafficking and how to report it, and incorporate this in their annual training

The BFPD will research available trainings and materials in Marin and will ensure that all First Responder personnel receive the training and materials on an annual basis.

Chief Brown will write a letter in response to the Grand Jury outlining the District's response as described above which Dir. Kimball will review before sending. MSC, Kimball/Shaw (unan) to approve response letter written by Chief Brown to the Grand Jury Report: Marin's Hidden Human Sex Trafficking Challenge: It's Happening In Our Backyard incorporating Dir. Kimball's recommendations and review
