
BOLINAS IS OUR LIVING ROOM




KENT ISLAND RESTORATION PROJECT







HAPPY LABOR DAY

FROM THE STATE OF THE UNION ADDRESS

Abraham Lincoln (December 3, 1861)

It is not needed nor fitting here that a general argument should be made in favor of popular institutions, but there is one point, with its connections, not so hackneyed as most others, to which I ask a brief attention. It is the effort to place capital on an equal footing with, if not above, labor in the structure of government. It is assumed that labor is available only in connection with capital; that nobody labors unless somebody else, owning capital, somehow by the use of it induces him to labor. This assumed, it is next considered whether it is best that capital shall hire laborers, and thus induce them to work by their own consent, or buy them and drive them to it without their consent. Having proceeded so far, it is naturally concluded that all laborers are either hired laborers or what we call slaves. And further, it is assumed that whoever is once a hired laborer is fixed in that condition for life.


Now there is no such relation between capital and labor as assumed, nor is there any such thing as a free man being fixed for life in the condition of a hired laborer. Both these assumptions are false, and all inferences from them are groundless.

Labor is prior to and independent of capital. Capital is only the fruit of labor, and could never have existed if labor had not first existed. Labor is the superior of capital, and deserves much the higher consideration. Capital has its rights, which are as worthy of protection as any other rights. Nor is it denied that there is, and probably always will be, a relation between labor and capital producing mutual benefits. The error is in assuming that the whole labor of community exists within that relation. A few men own capital, and that few avoid labor themselves, and with their capital hire or buy another few to labor for them. A large majority belong to neither class--neither work for others nor have others working for them. In most of the Southern States a majority of the whole people of all colors are neither slaves nor masters, while in the Northern a large majority are neither hirers nor hired. Men, with their families--wives, sons, and daughters--work for themselves on their farms, in their houses, and in their shops, taking the whole product to themselves, and asking no favors of capital on the one hand nor of hired laborers or slaves on the other. It is not forgotten that a considerable number of persons mingle their own labor with capital; that is, they labor with their own hands and also buy or hire others to labor for them; but this is only a mixed and not a distinct class. No principle stated is disturbed by the existence of this mixed class.


Again, as has already been said, there is not of necessity

any such thing as the free hired laborer being fixed to that condition for life. Many independent men everywhere in these States a few years back in their lives were hired laborers. The prudent, penniless beginner in the world labors for wages awhile, saves a surplus with which to buy tools or land for himself, then labors on his own account another while, and at length hires another new beginner to help him. This is the just and generous and prosperous system which opens the way to all, gives hope to all, and consequent energy and progress and improvement of condition to all. No men living are more worthy to be trusted than those who toil up from poverty; none less inclined to take or touch aught which they have not honestly earned. Let them beware of surrendering a political power which they already possess, and which if surrendered will surely be used to close the door of advancement against such as they and to fix new disabilities and burdens upon them till all of liberty shall

Pres. Buchanan called the regular meeting of the Bolinas Fire Protection District to order at 7:35PM. Dir. Smith, Dir. Kimball and Dir. O'Donnell were present. Also present: Chief Brown, Secretary Brown and Jenny Pfieffer. Vice Pres. Kilkenny was absent MSC, Kimball/Smith (unan with one absence) to approve the agenda.

CHIEF'S REPORT

MERA

Chief Brown reported that the MERA meeting held on June 20th proceeded as predicted: the new governance committee was accepted unanimously. There has been some discussion regarding the nomination of Tiburon Fire Chief Richard Pierce to represent the fire departments which Chief Brown strongly supports. Pres. Buchanan asked if IPUD Manager Scott McMorrow was our representative on the executive committee. Chief Brown clarified that Scott serves on the temporary governance committee, not on the executive committee. Dir. Kimball asked who is now in charge of MERA after Farhad Mansourian has retired. Chief Brown answered that Marc Revere, Novato FPD Chief is now the President, Matthew Hymel, Marin County Administrator the Vice President, and Craig Tackaberry, DPW replaced Farhad for MERA operations

Prevention

Chief Brown reported that the BCPUD is moving the high pressure water main away from Surfer's Overlook. The project will take at least two months to complete and will involve closing Terrace during the working hours at Surfer's Overlook. The top of Terrace will remain open.

Chief Brown reported that Wildland training continues on Tuesday night drills. Capt. Martinelli instructed training on July 17th. He reviewed terminology, fire behavior and safety. Chief Brown remarked that there have been daily fires of late in the greater northern California region due to dry and windy conditions.

Apparatus

Equipment for the new U231 has been received. Hopefully, the vehicle will be complete by July 23rd due to Ian Johnson's help with proper equipment acquisition and installation. U219 is presently getting an annual maintenance service including new back brakes and tires. The cost will be approximately \$3,500. Dir. Kimball asked when U219 is due for replacement. Chief Brown answered that there are 8 years left on its 20 year operation schedule

Chief Brown reported that the old U231 may not be fit for resale. She plans to have Cheda's Garage in Point Reyes Station evaluate the Unit. If it is determined to be too problematic for resale, she plans to use it for extrication OUL SOUP



Disaster Council

Chief Brown reported that she will be collecting and delivering all DC radios to Richard Dillman on August 23rd for reprogramming with a new frequency load. She is in the process of collecting them from all of the Area Coordinators Dir. Kimball commended Richard Dillman for his knowledge and expertise but emphasized the need for an alternate back-up in the case of his absence. Chief Brown concurred and has consulted with Inverness Fire Chief Fox regarding the

The next West Marin Disaster Counsel meeting is scheduled for August 23. Chief Brown met with representatives from the Marin County Office of Emergency Services and with Tsunami experts from CalEMA regarding appropriate Tsunami signage in Bolinas. Signs will be installed around town informing residents and visitors of the Tsunami Zone and evacuation routes.

General Operations

Chief Brown thanked the Personnel and Finance Committees for their time spent in recent weeks to discuss budget issues. She is grateful for the experience, knowledge and spirit of cooperativeness that the committee members bring to the table.

Chief Brown reported that Capt. Smith recently taught a CPR class to the Bolinas Stinson Summer Camp counselors. She reported that groups of campers are scheduled to come to the fire station to learn about safety and enjoy the fire engines. The first group who attended were lots of fun.

Chief Brown reported that even though Volunteers ran six calls in a 24-hour period over July $4^{\rm th}$, it was a relatively smooth event. She commended Matt Lewis for his excellent preparatory work to make sure parking signage was in place, managing vehicle check points and

volunteers. She reiterated that this level of management of a public event is imperative for public safety. She met with the new president of the Lion's Club, Bill Barton, as well as Matt Lewis to review what has worked and what is absolutely necessary for the next July 4th.

Pres. Buchanan asked if the Dept. is allowed to follow up after fire calls to check in on patient's medical conditions. Chief Brown answered that due to HIPPA and privacy laws, information is no longer made available regarding patient outcomes.

Surfer's Overlook

Dir. Kimball reported that the County signed the MOU (Memorandum of Understanding) between the BCPUD and the County of Marin regarding phase two of a Geotechnical Assessment of Terrace Avenue at Surfer's Overlook in Bolinas. The proposal was approved from Sanders & Associates Geostructural engineers ("SAGE").

An inquiry of subsurface conditions needs to be completed in order to plan for a full bluff stabilization. Test borings into the substrate are planned to be completed before the BCPUD moves water lines along Terrace Avenue. The drillings are scheduled for September 24th. Earnest Klock at Marin County is kindly trying to get the permit fees waived for the drilling.

Chief Brown added that a Marin County Fire Chief Association meeting is scheduled for August at the station. Thirty people are expected and lunch will be served by Suki Ferrari.

The number of fire calls doubled from 12 to 24 during the month of June.

Maintenance Agreement - CHA See Action Item #1.

GENERAL BUSINESS

Action Item #1: Review and accept amendment to Commercial Lease with Coastal Health Alliance.

Chief Brown remarked that Lease was first drafted in 2007. Since then, there has been enough time to realize the needs for maintenance of the common areas including the parking lot, landscaping, sidewalks, propane tank, sewer lines and generator. Dir. Kimball helped Chief Brown to figure out an agreement regarding the shared costs of paying off the CREBS Bonds for the solar equipment and system installed at both sites. In the future (thirteen years) when the bonds are paid off, both parties will craft a new agreement for how to proceed. Chief Brown thanked Dir. Kimball for all of his time and effort spent on the agreement. Pres. Buchanan thanked both Chief

Brown and Dir. Kimball for their excellent work. Dir. Kimball added that procedures outlined in the Lease agreement are already being followed such as tracking solar and energy use by both agencies.

MSC, O'Donnell/Kimball (unan with one absence) to review and accept Commercial Lease with CHA.

Action Item #2: Approve Preliminary Budget for FY12/13.

Chief Brown reviewed the Draft Budget with the Board and answered questions about specific items in the budget including possible COLA raises, vacation pay outs, CalPERS costs, and reduced income due to property merges. All extra funds will be transferred to the Vehicle Replacement Fund which will act as a buffer against unforseen costs or unexpected loss of income. Raising the basic fire tax, which has not been raised since 1990, is another option for increasing revenues if needed.

Dir. Kimball thanked Chief Brown for her good work on the budget.

If approved, the budget will go out for public review from July 30 to Aug 3, 2012, and then will be adopted at the August Board meeting after a public hearing.

MSC, Kimball/Smith (unan with one absence) to approve Preliminary Budget for FY12/13.

Discussion: Emergency only access and egress alternatives to closure of Terrace Avenue and Overlook Road.

No update.

Discussion: Verizon request to add microwave dish to existing Crown Castle tower located on Fire District property. No response as of yet heard from Verizon.

CONSENT CALENDAR

MSC, O'Donnell/Smith(unan with one absence) to approve the Consent Calendar including the Minutes from the June 25, 2012 regular meeting and the warrant lists from June 20 – July 17, 2012. The financial reports for June 2012 including the account balances have yet to be received from the County of Marin and therefore could not be approved.

PUBLIC EXPRESSION

Jenny Pfieffer asked Chief Brown if she had contacted the County regarding inspection requirements for solar installations. Chief Brown responded that she is not qualified to do building inspections on behalf of the County. She inspects for fire codes and safety, not for electrical or engineering codes. Dir. Kimball suggested contacting Sup. Steve Kinsey or his associates to find out if County inspectors of solar installations will only inspect solar equipment and turn a "blind eye" to other non-related potential unpermitted structures, etc in order to promote residential solar installations. Jenny also expressed concern about the locked door in the rear room of the post office. She is concerned about public safety in the case of someone needing to exit the rear door in an emergency which is now permanently locked. Chief Brown said she would investigate the possibility of installing panic hardware on the rear door which can be opened from the inside but remains locked from the outside. The hardware is expensive. Greg Welch was mentioned as the owner of the building.

Kimball acknowledged the Boards service to the Volunteers with continued support. He recognizes that the Volunteer Dept offers an opportunity to the young people in the

community for training and advancement in fire service

Pres. Buchanan thanked Jenny Pfieffer and acknowledged her as a long standing faithful servant to the community.
