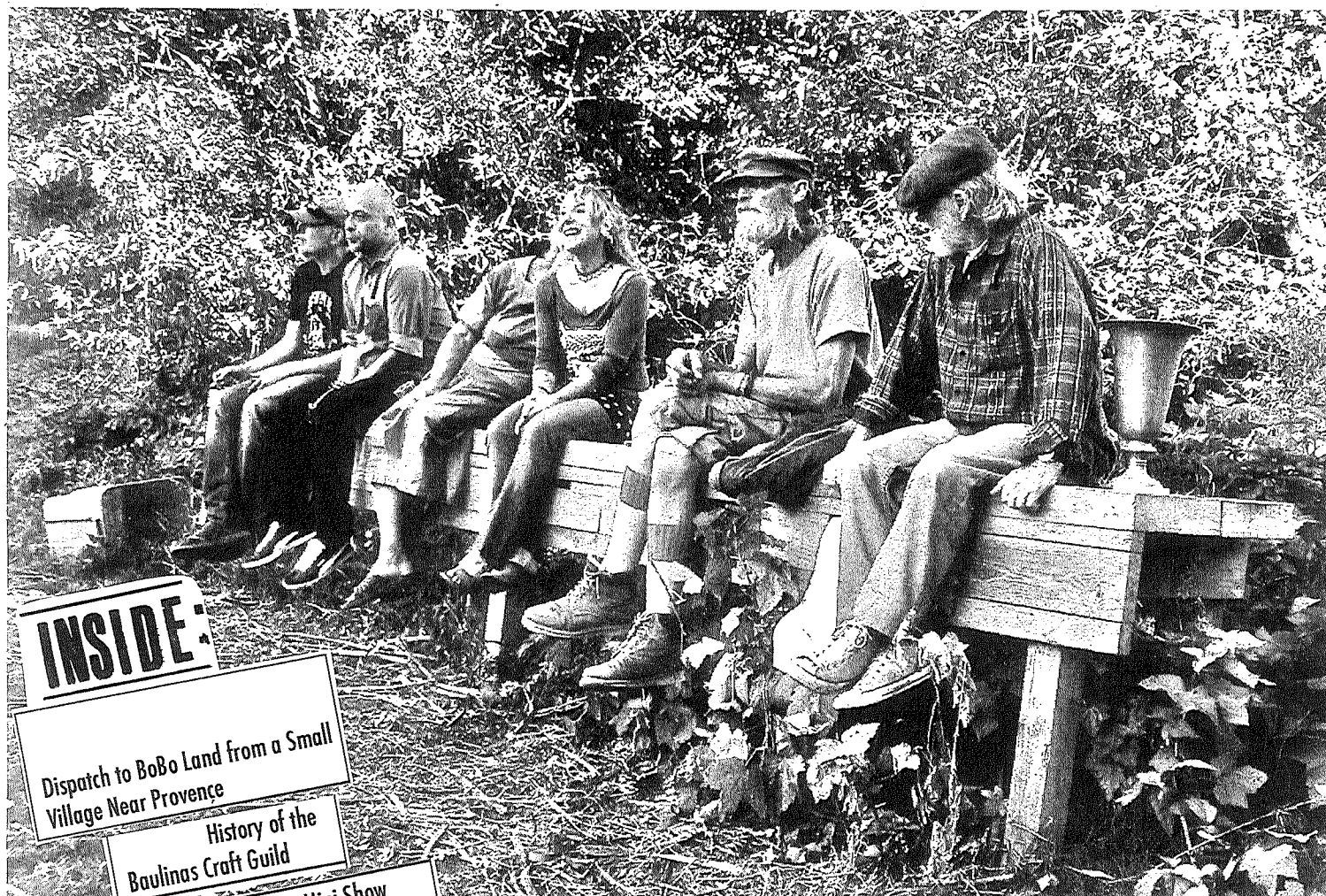

Expatriate Post: Dispatch to Boboland from a Small Town Near Provence – XIX

Those noble Mollusca have been schlooping hither and thither for as long as the planet can remember. At my house, they schloop mostly hither where they nibble to nubbins my beloved mint and pumpkin blossoms. As discreet as they are, I know it's "them" due to their telltale network of silvery highways. It is not my nature to destroy these brash slitherers. Instead, I send them on their way over the wall into the neighbor's yard. Monsieur E. doesn't mind because he is no longer living and consequently his garden is becoming a virtual Mediterranean gastropod Nirvana jungle.

Evidence of this little critter's greedy plant consumption dates back 500 million years. I find their amalgamated fossil selves up in the hills behind my village. Caught in the very act of chomping, their telltale whorls rise out of the limestone, specters from the early Cambrian period; garden pests from the get-go. Granted, *Homo heidelbergensis* left footprints in Italian volcanic ash 600,000 years ago, the relative upstarts, *Homo sapiens* and their male human Y chromosomes, only appeared 200,000 years ago.

Stating the obvious, those crafty snails had a massive jump on us; especially in the Ordovician period where they engaged in all kinds of cunning activity such as diversification. The one thing they neglected to concoct was unsavory flesh.

Evidence: there tends to be a proliferation of mollusk shells at prehistoric sites. Their shells litter the grottos and the general living area. Particularly Ostreidae, oysters, Calyptraea, Chinese hats, and Cornu aspersum, the common garden snail. It begs the question, "Did they eat them raw or did they sauté them up with a little wild garlic?"

Hands down, oysters were the preferred mollusk of prehistoric man, but snails came in at a close second. Able to survive in sea or fresh water, cold and hot weather, they required very little effort to harvest and provided an important source of protein. In the grottos of Gibraltar, Neandertals (their DNA differs from ours by a mere 0.12%) left further proof of snail consumption with the added condiment of rabbit. Tasty morsels, but seriously wily game requiring tools and skill.

Archaeologists claim that Neandertals went extinct 30,000 years ago. However, as I live in France, I have the opportunity to see many of them driving on the freeway. Living amongst them, I also have the occasion to witness their dietary habits. Not a lot has changed since the Mousterian stone tool culture period. However, the European Union has enabled them to have access to a wider range of foods. These are some of the things the indigenous peoples of France like to eat:

1. Boudin Noir - black pig blood sausage in gut casing. Particularly tasty with sautéed apples.
2. Tete de Veau – head of calf. Delectable with homemade mayonnaise and capers.
3. Ris de Veau – calf thymus gland. Delicious with a creamy morille mushroom sauce.
4. Oursins – sea urchin gonads (or as they say here – their sexual glands). My French friends insist they are delightful with a little buttered bread and lemon juice.

5. Escargot – snails in their variety of shapes and sizes, both land and sea. Traditionally served with butter, garlic and parsley.

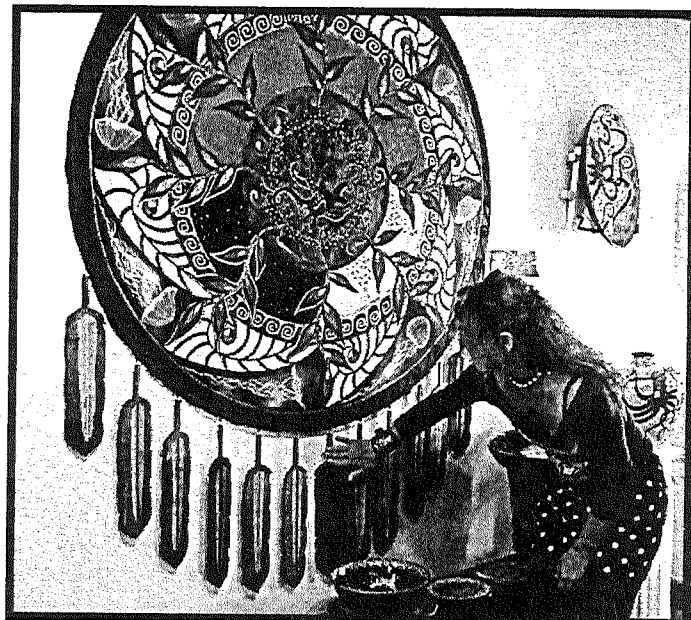
Growing up in Bolinas, we also had snails. Drove of them that descended on the Satsuma and fuchsia and my mother's prized petunias. I think their biggest colony proliferated under the agapanthus behind the little naked boy fountain. My mother used to toss them over the fence into the neighbors' yards. We never thought to eat them. We had a duck though, *Lord Love A Duck*, who was a snail aficionado. He also liked banana slugs, the most loathsome terrestrial gastropod in my book of loathsome things. I spent my childhood scraping their remains from the bottom of my feet, the result of running through the garden at night without shoes. Mr. Duck, on the other hand, saw great and wondrous gastronomic opportunity. With a lascivious quack, he'd give his bottom a mallard waggle and dive for the juicy, yellow, pulsating, slimy blob shaped like a banana. Then his beak would get all gummed up with gastropodic entrails. One look at that and you go off gastropods for the rest of your life. At least until your parents make you eat periwinkles from Duxberry reef. Marginally different with pretty little shells and a healthy portion of sourdough bread dipped in clarified butter. After the parents got into the Chablis, who noticed what I was eating? I liked plucking the little suckers from their shells and feeding them to whomever was sitting next to me like I was making a great sacrifice.

Hold the gastropods. Who needs those rubbery little feet? Just give me the wine, bread, some salted butter from Normandy, mushrooms sautéed in garlic, capers, parsley and olive oil and I'm good to go.

Hardly Strictly Mini Show!

Bolinas Museum's much loved holiday exhibition, *The Mini Show*, where sales benefit the museum and the artists, has a fun new name and a new format! The exhibition is now called the *Hardly Strictly Mini* (with the approval of the Hardly Strictly Blue Grass Festival folks of course) and as the title implies, this now biennial event will feature larger works in addition to traditional six-inch "minis"—a nice diversity for artists and collectors alike!

Artists will be chosen by lottery. Over the years the *Mini Show* grew into a special community event; bringing together invited local and Bay Area artists, drawing hundreds of visitors, and attracting new artists who would like to participate. So in the spirit of inclusiveness, this year 60 artists will be chosen in an equal-opportunity lottery, and a dozen or so more will be selected by a group of the museum's recent exhibition curators.

Artists who participated in the Mini Show since 2003 were automatically entered in the lottery, while new, actively working artists who would like to be considered for inclusion in the lottery may apply by email to

hsmini@bolinasmuseum.org with the following:

1) Three to five images of examples of recent work or the artist's website address, if there is one. 2) Artists resume and /or a brief artist's statement. 3) Complete contact information including mailing address, phone number, and email address. Local artists are encouraged to participate, though any artist with connection to Coastal Marin is welcome. More detailed instructions on how to participate in the lottery may be found by visiting the museum's Special Events page at bolinasmuseum.org.

August 21 is the deadline for new artists to submit their application. The lottery will be drawn on August 26 and winning lottery artists will be notified by August 31. Then, on November 21st the artists and the public will gather for the opening celebration of the museum's new exhibitions including, photography by Ilse Bing, local art by Chris Whitefield & Ruth Kneass and the Hardly Strictly Mini Show!

KNOW YOUR BO

In 1853, Gregorio Briones filed a claim with the U.S. Land Commission to establish his ownership of the land in Bolinas granted him by Mexico. The cost of litigation stripped him bare. Before the Legislature: "What is paid to lawyers before the land commission amounts to one-third the value of the estate. Another third is taken on appeal to the District Court ... still another third in the U.S. Supreme Court. What have we left?" He won his case in 1857. His lawyer, as part of his fee, got 500 choice acres on the Bolinas mesa.

Tom D'Onofrio, founder of Baulines Craft Guild

We are saddened by the passing of artist Tom D'Onofrio who contributed so much to the creative spirit of Bolinas. Among his many accomplishments was founding the Baulines Craftsman's Guild which touched thousands of lives. For those who don't know about the Guild history in Bolinas, it is worth a review.

Finely crafted work became a passion for Tom by age thirteen when he was mentored by skilled older wood workers in the Adirondack Mountains. His interest continued even while earning a doctorate in Psychology of Religion at U.C. Berkeley. He wrote a paper titled *Craftsmanship and the Quest for Self-Discovery* setting out a philosophy that would come to fruition in the guild.

In 1966 Tom met famous furniture maker Art Carpenter in Bolinas and hung around until Art agreed to teach him. Tom's ideas coalesced into the vision of an apprenticeship program—one apprentice to one master craftsman, learning by direct experience, everything from techniques to marketing. In 1972, Tom called a meeting of local crafts people and the Baulines Craft Guild was born. Its founding members were Art Carpenter, and John Baurer, fine furniture; Steve D'Accardo, photography; Alexandra Jacopetti, weaving; Roger Peacock, jewelry; Louis Seiler, bronze sculpture; Roy Stafford, house construction; Patrick Hollern, ceramics; David Van Duesen, leather work; Ben Van Meter, filmmaking; with Tom D'Onofrio as founder/administrator and John Borroughs as the attorney for procuring nonprofit status. The masters worked in a diverse array of mediums from filmmaking to constructing superb musical instruments. Very soon masters from other parts of Marin joined the guild as well.

By 1977 over 300 apprentices from all over the nation and Japan had participated. Public interest in things that were high quality, original and handmade locally was blossoming. The Guild's first exhibition on Carpenter's land was recognized in Newsweek magazine, the second exhibition drew 12,000 people. Tom as founder and administrator, helped establish the Guild's non-profit status, then stepped down to attend to his own wood sculpting.

Al Garvey and Art Carpenter guided the growing guild into a statewide organization that celebrated its 30th Anniversary in 2002 with an exhibition and reunion at the Bolinas Museum. Tom wrote, "Baulines Craft Guild grew in stature and size and achieved national recognition for its education programs. The Guild is composed of artisan/teachers who are among the most significant artists creating fine craft work in America today. Their works are represented in major museum collections such as the Smithsonian Institution, the

Museum of Fine Arts in Boston, the de Young Museum of San Francisco, the San Francisco Museum of Modern Art, the New York Museum of Modern Art and the Oakland Museum of California."

Over the years the Guild turned from an apprenticeship program to organizing and promoting fine craft artists. The rising costs of living and housing in the Bay Area made it difficult for students to support themselves during a full apprenticeship. Yet, through the guild many found their life careers, and all were enriched through their experience as teacher, apprentice or patron.

We join his family and friends in appreciating Tom D'Onofrio's contributions to our community and inspiring creativity in so many ways.
