

SOLICITING VOLUNTEERS FOR A RESEARCH PROJECT: COGNITIVE CONTROL OVER OUR DISABILITIES

Our physical limitations are experienced in a multitude of ways. Some people encounter them at birth, others as a result of accidents, and the phenomena is certainly widespread as we age. The limited or disabled individual may experience anger, weakness, sadness, shame, embarrassment, disappointment as a result of the disability. Since being disabled is upsetting, an individual seeks to find ways of minimizing the upset. I am investigating, in short confidential interviews, those cognitive (thinking) controls individuals use to tolerate and change their experience.

I am inviting you to participate in a research study to identify the ways you use thinking to minimize emotional upset when your body doesn't respond to your expectations.

The interview is expected to take less than an hour. There is no cost and no compensation for participating. Your identity will be kept anonymous. You may choose to stop participating at any time. 

True Stories (Take 2)

y husband who rarely goes to plays (unless I'm in them and he has to) never misses Stories and calls it "the entertainment in town. I stole the idea for True Stories from Spark in Santa Monica. It is a storytelling event once a month with a theme like "Blue" or "Mothers," for example. Seven "folks like you and me" read aloud a personal/true story 6 to 8 minutes long. My brother was reading a story for Spark about when we hijacked a plane to Oaxaca (true story!), and I was in LA and able to see the show. I was moved and inspired: honest, real, moving, funny, entertainment. No baloney, no hype, and no phoniness. I loved everything about it. The individual readers became one: raw, imperfect, and lovable humanity. And, though I might not relate to the specific details of people's stories, I could relate to the emotions and the human everytimes. to the emotions and the human experience. I even free refreshments loved the afterwards generous) and the chance to talk to readers and share stories. "I wanna do that in Baja!" I thought. So, I copied their rules (minus the theme--our town is too small to limit the stories) found a space and got 7 people courageous enough to tell a story, and did it. People, both readers, and audience loved it,

Last year, I decided to venture into Bolinas where we spend our summers (hurricane season in Baja). This was a bit harder for different reasons. People are busier, I am not well known enough to coerce people or call in favors, and people here don't like ANY rules. (And, believe me, rules are few: personal/true, 6 to 8 minutes when read aloud.) I cancelled the normally required rehearsal (people are too busy, plus no need for a mic here). Whitney, the hip, generous minister at St. Aidan's was open and game, so we did it. "Full steam ahead!" Carrie our librarian, Michael Rafferty, Neshama Franklin, and Rob Stewart are some of the locals who generously shared their hearts and lives. So, like a two year old who claps and cries out enthusiastically, "Again!" we are doing another one with some repeat readers (Neshama, Liz Vezzani, Rob), some newbies (Jane Mickelson, Kirk Kirkham), and some surprise guests. Please come and support your friends and neighbors, and keep telling your own stories to anyone who will listen. Who knows, you may be inspired to participate next year for *True Stories* (Take 3)! Reading will be at Saint Aidan's, Sept. 15th, 7pm. Free refreshments. \$5-\$10 suggested donation for show.

Community Expression

--Jennifer Blackman, BCPUD manager, asked about use of MP parking lot for equipment for Terrace Ave. water main repair project, anticipating mid-Oct. to mid-Dec.; and for Household Hazardous Waste collection day on Sept. 15i, supervised by the San Rafael fire department. Charles needs to consult with the winning contractor at a pre-construction meeting before the water main project begins. Board approved both uses.

--Lia Kourula, BCC general manager, requesting use of the Downtown Park for a Food Festival, October 13th 10 AM - 5 PM. Everyone in the park would have to have insurance to cover liability for food vending. section for kids, games. The vendors would have to take any of their own trash, and we'd org. clean up. [Jack S] I'd like to make a distinction between a non-profit fund-raiser for a local organization as opposed to regular open vending in the park. This board needs to make a distinction. [Lia] I'd love to get confirmation on this. It's only 2 months away. Is there a way to okay it now? [Roger] Don't do things on the grass or the pathways but on the roadways and driveway. There's room for vendors there. We are trying to protect the grass. There's a food pavilion area. We might be able to have a sink and water. We should do a walk-through. [Lia] We'll arrange a shuttle to bring folks from the parking lot at Mesa Park. We have confirmed a number of food vendors from the local area. [Patricia] Measure A is on the ballot in November for support of Marin county parks. We could also promote that at the festival.

Downtown Park - status

--Roger Peacock: policy for park use: update. We needed to see what the finances were and then implement more of the program for the park. We're working to develop a program to run the park. We can move forward as we learn what the needs are. Mowing will require a push mower to not damage the grass. We're creating the big picture for maintaining the park and allocating tasks. We may need to hire a manager. We have been discussing how to handle vending. [Bryan] The cost of the maintenance comes out of the DT park budget? [Roger] Yes. We've set aside enough for 2 years, based on current understanding of needs, but we'll know better what the budget needs are as the park is used and cleaned. [Vic] Do you have a storage area? [Jack] The committee recommends that we buy a storage shed, a weed-wacker, and a lawn mower. Supplies & hoses could be kept there. [Bryan] Please bring that budget to the next meeting. [Jack] It's important to have a use policy, and proper information signage. Discussion ensued about vending, community response to it, the possibility of issuing permits, and inleuding information on how to obtain them on the sign. Perhaps limit vending to non-profit corporations that are using the park for fund-raising. [Bryan] We need to come up with the appropriate policy language for next meeting. [Jenny] I am in favor of vending and that it's hasty to open the park by prohibiting the vending. We should try it and see how it goes, and handle the problems when they come up. [Vic] Perhaps a monthly flea market could be held. [Jack] We did talk about a monthly flea market/farmer's market. [Bryan] The BCC's food festival can be a good test of this. See how it works and the logistics. The policy would have to be that the board would have oversight.
