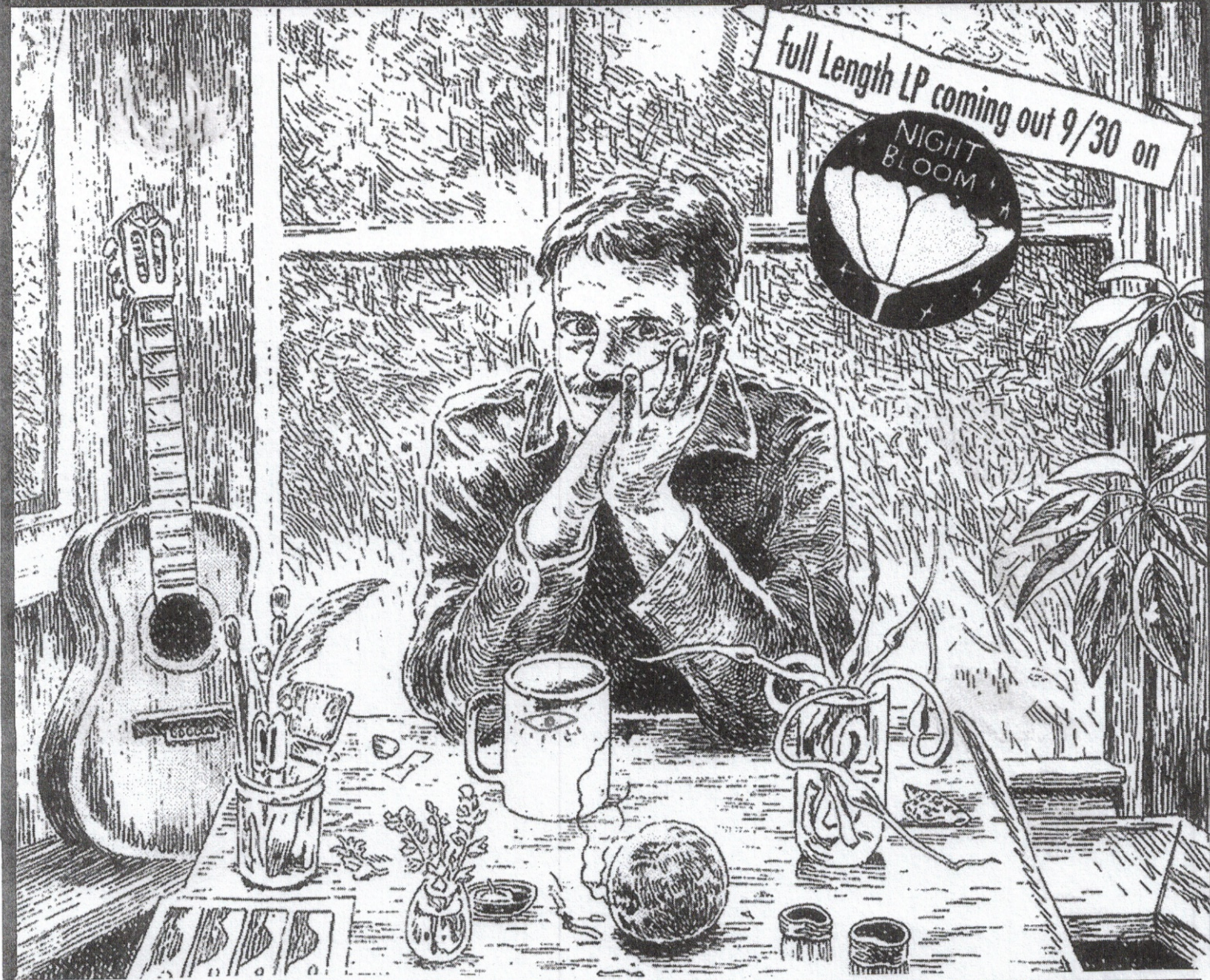


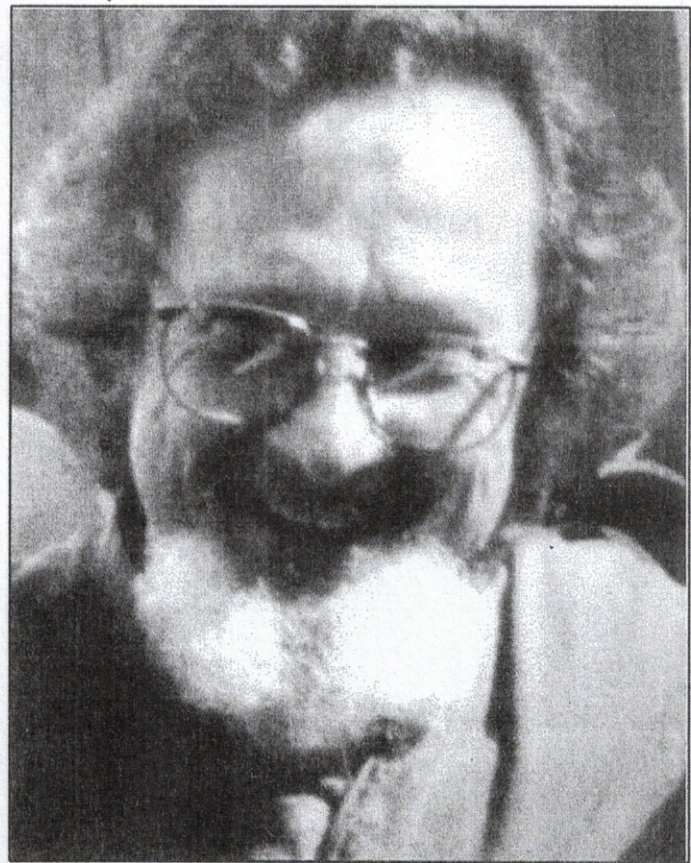

Terry Bell's Art on Display at Bolinas Museum
Saturday September 30

On Saturday, the day of the Terry's memorial, the museum will stay open until 6:00 so people leaving the memorial may come by to see Terry's extraordinary artwork.

This spring Bolinas Museum presented an exhibition of Terry Bell's art, April 8-June 11, 2017. The museum had invited Terry to have an exhibition many times. He finally accepted, with the help and friendship of Wayne Campbell as the curator. Few people had seen his art except friends who visited his small off-the-grid cabin had seen his art. The exhibition revealed to his community that Terry was an artist of wit and consummate talent. During the last weeks of his life, Terry heard the astonishment, admiration and appreciation for his art from his community.

Before he died, Terry directed that two of his artworks would be donated to the Bolinas Museum Permanent Collection – to be preserved and shared. This included a remarkable hand carved in wood and a drawing from his alphabet series- of a slug and a slot--created with thousands of pen dots. His daughter Megan Cory added the exquisitely carved juggler's face and hands that were exhibited with the hand.

These pieces are now on display in the Permanent Collection gallery of the museum. Regular museum hours are Friday 1-5, Saturday & Sunday 12-5. Admission to the museum's 5 galleries is always free.

Interview with Jeff Manson about "Wild Form"

Jeff Manson (songwriter and editor) is having an album release party this Sunday at the Community Center. Looking for some background on the album I emailed Jeff some questions. Here are his replies.

-StuArt

• Why did you choose the title of the album? does it reflect the arc of meaning of the album?

I first encountered the phrase "wild form" while working with my friend Judith at Lerner Seeds. It refers to certain types of un-cultivated plants, which have not been subject to the horticultural selection that most garden species have. Later on I read some thing where Kerouac talks about his "wild form" in terms of his spontaneous writing, going beyond the novel while still holding the work in some kind of aesthetic container. I thought, yes! The double concept works for what I'm after, an uncultivated, unadorned off the cuff, passionate kind of songwriting thats trying to get everything down, while staying composed.

• Did you write all the songs? Where do you find your inspiration coming from?

I wrote all the songs; many started as funny little rhymes, singing to my son Otis while walking around the Mesa with him strapped to my chest as an infant. We would walk and walk everyday and think about our town and its characters, and our particular history here and how all that relates to the wider world, a world which is getting more weird and fraught everyday.

I'm grappling with some heavy current events in there, standing rock, trump, extinction, social media, etc. but I'm trying to look at them from this particular vantage point of Bolinas. Also, I'm inspired by the people and animals and plants of this place, but I try to veil them so they can have a more universal meaning, using the small to grok the big.

As Otis gets older we both have started getting into Mother Goose; I love the way these characters can live in just a little stanza of an old nursery rhyme, little jack horner or Elsie marley or whoever, just perfectly inhabiting their story. so that's in there as well.

• Where did you record the songs? Did you mix it yourself? Do other musicians play on the album?

I mostly recorded the songs at home, and at other friends' homes here in Bolinas; I pieced it together wherever I could find a little quiet space; Mark's woodshop, Aubrey's back yard shed, in the kitchen of Charlie's rental during his final week of living there, with real-estate agents giving tours to freaked out looking potential buyers while we yelped shirtless and banged on drums...

One happy side effect of working in this piecemeal fashion is that the album has different sonic textures folded into it. And, since it wasn't recorded in a sterile studio environment, there are some nice moments of ambient sound of real life creeping through at the edges; listen closely and you'll hear Swainson's thrush in there, the pacific chorus frogs from the sewer ponds and even a snippet of a jam at a sun festival. I think in the end, "wild form" really sounds like what Bolinas feels like to me: what it might lack in fidelity, it makes up for with flavor and mojo...

I played most of the instruments except for the drums which were mostly done by Charlie Callahan, some bass by Ryan Hett and a ripping "anti-guitar solo" solo on Waves of Prayer that Alex Bleeker did. Oh and Van Waring, Kim Hett and Bronwen Murch Aka the gospel flatters sang some lovely harmonies to try and round out my rough singing style.

• I understand that you had some vinyl pressed.

Yes! I have always wanted to put my music on wax because it's the most classic format for rock 'n' roll music. This year, I started a little music label with my friends Alex Bleeker and Kacey Johansing, Night Bloom Records, and that gave me the impetus to make some records and get them out into the world.

• Sunday night's event: will you be playing alone or with the Coastal Scrubbers? Who are the other acts that you've invited to play?

I've got Danny Vitali, Charlie Callahan and Alex Bleeker backing me up. My dear buddy (and former Bolinas resident) Sean Hellfritsch will be opening the night with his musical project Cool Maritime, and then these awesome ladies from Oakland, B-Side Brujas will DJ a mix of oldies, Cumbria and reggae for a big dance party. Hope you can come!

Who is David Best?

David Best (born 1945) is an internationally renowned American sculptor. He is well known for building immense temples out of recycled wood sheets (discarded from making toys and other punch-outs) for the Burning Man festivals, where they are then burnt to the ground in a spectacle of light and heat

Best received a master's degree in sculpture from the San Francisco Art Institute, where he first took classes at the age of six. His commitment to public art seems rooted in 1960s-era idealism. His works — ceramic sculpture, collages and more — have been shown at the San Francisco Museum of Modern Art,[1] the Oakland Museum, the San Jose Museum of Art, di Rosa[2] and elsewhere

Best first began collaborating with others, 20 years ago, when he embarked upon a sideline: stripping down vehicles and giving them total sculptural makeovers, using recycled materials and found objects, often retrieved from dumps and dumpsters. Since then, he has created sculptures from the skeletons of 36 cars and two buses, and worked with more than 10,000 people

Best built his first Burning Man Temple in 2000, The Temple of the Mind. During construction it became a memorial to Michael Hefflin,[3] a member of the crew who died in a motorcycle accident just prior to the event, and as such became a sacred space for remembering others. In 2001, Burning Man helped fund the Temple projects and David, along with Jack Hays who was also responsible for the construction of the Temple of the Mind, built the much larger Temple of Tears. 2001 marked the beginning of a new and profound ritual for the tens of thousands of participants who attend Burning Man each year. After days of writing prayers on the structures, of affixing offerings from one's life such as pictures, paintings, etc., or of leaving the ashes of loved ones, etc. the Temple was burned on Sunday night

In 2002, Best returned with a new project: the Temple of Joy. In 2003, David departed from the wood temples and created the ornate paper Temple of Honor. In 2004, the Temple of Stars was a quarter mile long and almost 120' high. David took a break in 2005 and 2006 to work on personal projects, including the Hayes Green Temple in San Francisco. Returning in 2007, David, Tim Dawson and the temple crew built the Temple of Forgiveness. Best originally suggested he might create one more temple in 2010 or 2011, however the 2010 Temple of Flux and the 2011 Temple of Transition were designed and built by other artists. Best returned in 2012 to design and coordinate the building of the Temple of Juno. In 2014, Best and crew constructed the Temple of Grace. In 2015 Best took a crew overseas to build and burn the Temple at Derry/Londonderry in Northern Ireland. (2015)

Best has done other major temple projects in Derry/Londonderry in Northern Ireland, London's Burning festival, San Francisco, Detroit, and elsewhere.

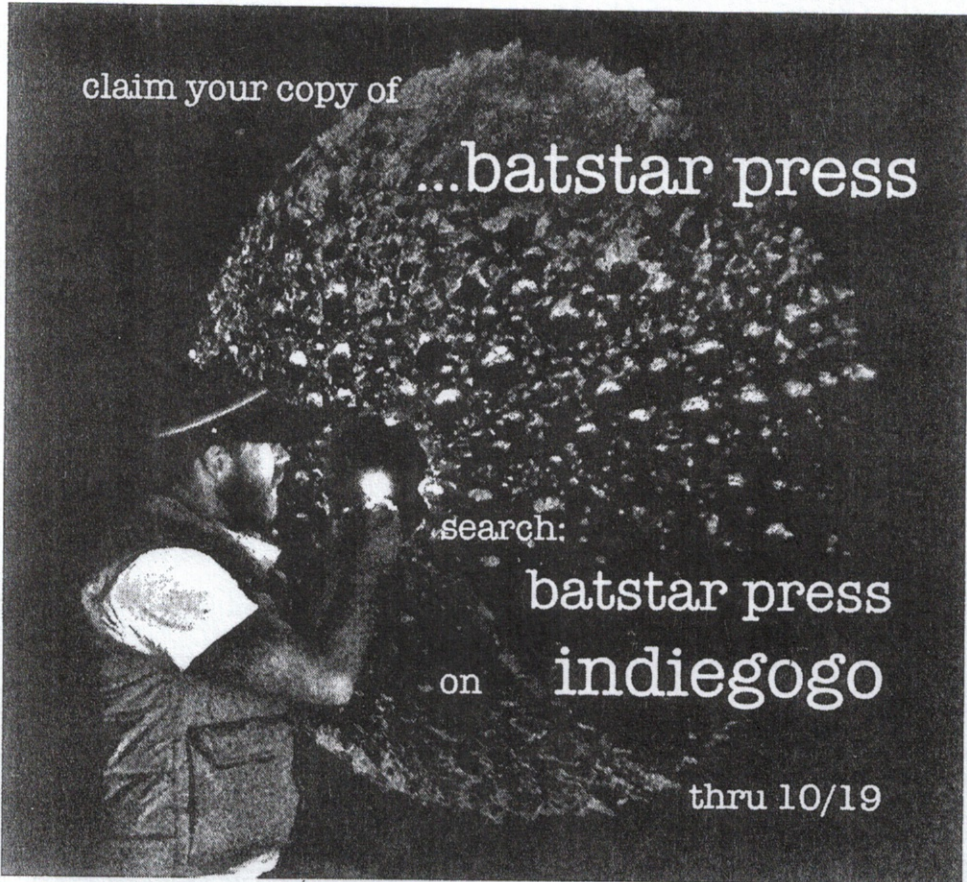

ANOTHER PERSPECTIVE ON OUR MILITARY

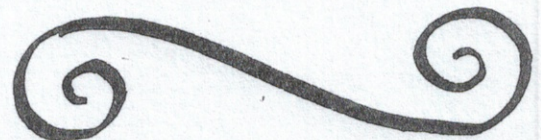

This disastrous bill strips the right to determine where microwave antennas are placed and streamlines the process.

ATT & Verizon want to install thousands of microwave emitting antennas along the sidewalks on street lights, traffic lights, etc. every 4 to 10 homes. It passed through the state legislature even though 47 of our 58 counties and over 300 California cities were adamantly opposed.

THE TELECOM "TAKE OVER" BILL

California Senate Bill 649 is the telecom "take over" bill that would hamstring local control over the rollout of ALL future wireless technology – with no requirements to prove safety of that technology. It strips local governments from regulating placement, size, nearness to homes, schools, hospitals and prevents them from collecting any fees for the telecom's unfettered permission to deploy their stuff. the telecom industry is introducing a similar bill in states across the country. And health organizations have grave concerns.

The bill has been passed by both houses of the CA legislature, despite the opposition of 230 cities and ¾ of the counties.

THE LAST RESORT to stop this bill is to ask the governor to veto it. The attached audio is a click radio advertisement that calls out the governor to refuse to sign the bill, which would kill it.

**Reducing Vegetation Along
Our Roadways**

The Bolinas Community Public Utility District and the Bolinas Fire Protection District are continuing efforts to reduce the overgrowth of vegetation by mowing along sections of the roadways of the gridded Mesa in order to provide needed access to BCPUD infrastructure and BFPD fire hydrants, enable drainage work and to reduce the extreme fire hazard presented by unmaintained vegetation growth.

As the fire department drives through the neighborhoods, we see areas of severe concern. Many roads are overgrown with so much brush that it is not possible to drive our fire engines through the roads. This means that, if a fire occurs, we will not be able to access the area and residents may not be able to evacuate. We must provide for resident and firefighter safety as much as possible: everyone needs a safe way in and out. Reducing the vegetation along the roadways is a critical step in providing for safer access for firefighters and safer evacuation for residents.

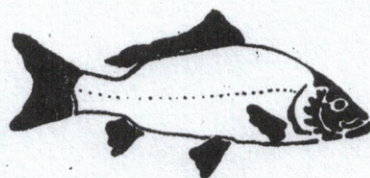

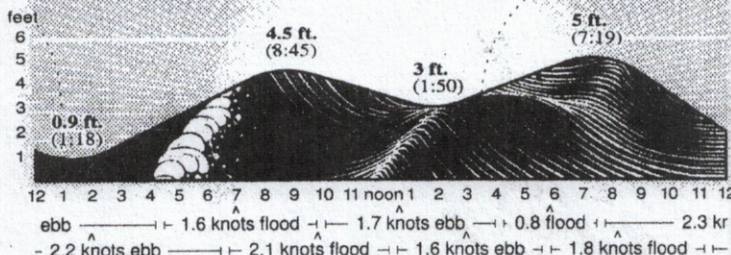

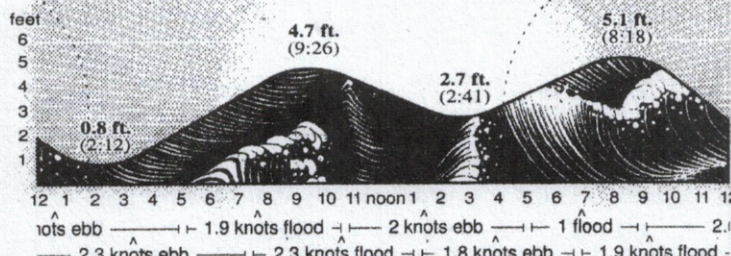
