The Chronicle article gave the history of ownership of Smiley's from its founding in 1851 in Jugville. (Bolinas wasn't called Bolinas in 1851, it was called Jugville.) When I saw the long list of owners I knew I had enough material for a song.

Being a small town troubadour, I wanted to write a song about the 150th anniversary of my local saloon. I also thought it would be fun to use "sesquicentennial" in a song. So I took the information from the newspaper and rearranged it into a lyrical format. I added a chorus and voila! I had a song.

Smiley's Schooner Saloon

1851 in Jugville, down by the lagoon, Captain Isaac Morgan built himself one fine Schooner Saloon. Captain Morgan saw the gold rush in, 49ers' hungry schemes. Thirsty for the Captain's whiskey,

and for the California dream. 1868 the Sons of Temperance

made the Captain change his tune. He joined the Loyal Order of Rehabites,

but never closed the saloon 150 years* of history,

serving libations continuously, helping to ease human misery!

Smiley's Schooner Saloon. The 1906 San Francisco earthquake did not harm the saloon,

but all the local competition -

dumped! in the lagoon.

Business was good until Prohibition,

then they painted all the windows black.

In the front was a barbershop

the booze and the beer was in back.

Smiley Bianchini from Italy

bought the place in '58.

Added his name and a baitshop, called it

Smiley's Bar and Bait!

(chorus)

Vernon Bradley in the 70's,

owned the place with his mother Sue.

Her firm grip, ran a tight ship,

and made a decent pizza too.

Bob Glenn in the 80's,

restored, remodeled and renewed.

With all that brass and polish still it was

Smiley's Schooner Saloon!

Now the helm has passed to Don Deane,

publisher of the Coastal Post.

Smiley's is very accommodating -

a simple, but an elegant host.

One hundred and fifty years* is a milestone,

for an historic saloon -Happy Sesquicentennial! Smiley's Schooner Saloon!

Labor Day (Monday September 5th) is close upon us, and with it Bolinas's joyous celebration of community.





Dispatches to Boboland from a Small Town near France

What they eat a lot of in France is pate (actually pâté studded with accent marks and other savory tidbits). Wild Boar, Pheasant, Pigeon, Venison, Wild Hare, Partridge, the sky's the limit. Oh, the transcendent Country Style with pig cheeks and a little liver and all kinds of mysterious leftover bitty bits mixed with cognac to be eaten with little French gherkins called cornichons and literally mind-blowing mustard from Dijon. What those Frenchies do with odds and ends! Then, of course, you arrive at the door of heaven when presented with Foie Gras (Fat Liver), the gift from force-fed (gavage in French) ducks and geese. We will not dwell on the amount of corn those birds are obliged to eat in order to give us this buttery, perfumed, delicate morsel called Foie Gras. Besides, I do not want to enter into Animal Rights rhetoric. Where were all those activists anyway 4511 years ago when those scrappy Ancient Egyptians were fattening little birds in the same fashion?! I have as yet to see a single hieroglyph depicting the liberation of Nile fowl or hairless cats. But I digress.

Pate is essentially "poor food" raised to some uncanny level of the sublime. Go figure. People had to make do with what was handy in times of war. France has a 2000 year old history of being warred against: first those cunning Romans and then the big, furry hatted Teutons and the Cimbri and the Visigoths and the Goths and the Vandals and don't forget the Alans and the Suevis, just for starters! This was an impressive timeline within which to perfect "meatloaf" on the run, scrapple wrapped in herbs and bacon.

In addition to pate, there are a lot of dogs in France. Dogs like to live in apartments in Paris. They are given many rights. It would be nice to be a dog in France. For one, as a dog you can defecate anywhere you like. One must develop dog-droppings radar if one is to survive in France. There is some weird belief left over from the Middle Ages that stepping in dog waste is good luck (the word for dog feces in French is "ejections"). This conjures up unpleasant images: ejector seats from the cars of evil villains coupled with projectile emissions of a nasty nature.

Dogs are also allowed in restaurants. I have eaten with many dogs. However, I get to sit above the tablecloth. French dogs have French restaurant manners. They stay under the table where they are supplied bowls of water. On occasion, for their good behavior, they receive a treat from the chef in the form of, you guessed it, pate. Many dogs are larger than the apartments they live in.

Dogs figured heavily in our family history, as well. We had an odd little family tradition growing up in Bolinas. Whenever we headed for Point Reyes or other points north, we had only one option open to us and that was Shoreline Highway Road. This took us by the notable town known to everyone in our car as "Dogtown." All of the other citizens of Bolinas knew it as Dogtown, too, but for us it afforded the opportunity to yell out, "There's the old gas station!" Whoever said it first won. There was, to be sure, the shell of a once formidable gas station. When the sawmills closed in the 1870s, the town of Woodville changed its name to Dogtown. We always wondered about the name. No one ever gave us a clear answer, but it was assumed that there must have been plenty of dogs around to justify the name.

We also had dogs. Our family personally populated the state of California and parts of New Hampshire, Colorado and Oregon with half-breed Labradors and German Shepherds. We didn't need stuffed animals like other children. We had real, live, squirming puppies at any given moment. For the amount our family invested in Purina, we could have gotten our promiscuous bitches spayed many times over. Instead, we bought massive bags of Gravy Train and cans of meat that looked suspiciously, in retrospect, like pate, some that looked like dense Country pate and another from a fancy tin that very closely resembled Duck Galantine with bits of fragrant gelatin.

We loved our dogs; all four thousand of them. We loved them just like French people love their dogs. They slept under our covers keeping us warm in winter and we dressed them up in bandanas and sunglasses and they rode in our convertible just like Brigitte Bardot in the summertime. Although they couldn't go into Scowley's or Snarley's to dine with us on greasy hamburgers or Boston Baked Beans, they did indeed dine, albeit unwittingly, on a kind of New World pate up at the house on Terrace Avenue with their many children.


What we find are...surly guards and battlements of cyclone fences. Gates locked and double locked.



Opt-Out, Opt-In, or Ban: That's the 'Smart' Meter Question

Transparency... Kind-of - Our Fun at the CPUC

May 31. 20011 the World Health Organization's (WHO) International Agency for Research on Cancer (IARC) classified radiofrequency (RF) as a class 2B Carcinogen, along with lead, DDT, etc. Despite this, PG&E is insisting that it must install RF-emitting gas and electric meters onto homes and businesses. But one tribal council, 44 California counties, cities and local jurisdictions, including Bolinas, together representing millions of citizens, plus thousands who filed formal complaints, want no part of it. So the California Public Utility Commission (CPUC) forced PG&E to come up with an opt-out plan.

But in response, the only choices PG&E wants to give ratepayers is to have the wireless RF function turned off, for a hefty charge both upfront and monthly and/or have the meter installed some distance away from the residence for a hefty charge. In other words, PG&E wants to charge ratepayers plenty for not putting a class 2b carcinogen onto a customer's house. Extortion anyone?

Plus, neither option would address the massive radiation exposure from all the neighbor's mesh-networked signals. Nor does it remove the 'dirty electricity' generated by the 'smart' meter's switching mode power supply, which causes high frequency transients through power lines that are at least partially the cause of the sickness some people are experiencing in relation to recently installed wireless 'smart' meters. And neither option would address the serious privacy, security, safety and electronic interference issues.

EON is an official 'party' or 'intervenor' in the quasi legal proceeding deliberating this proposed opt out plan along with the EMF Safety Network, Marin County Association of Realtors, Marin County, Lake County, Fairfax and a number of other county and municipal governments and agencies and citizen organizations.

Being an intervenor in this case means you take the side of the public against the utility interests where they are asking the California Public Utility Commission (CPUC) to give them the authority to charge ratepayers for something or to establish policy.

At the most recent prehearing conference July 27, although a Channel 7 cameraman was taping intermittently, we were only given permission to tape the meeting after much haggling and showing the judge a copy of the California Bagley-Keene Open Meeting Act's language with the key sections highlighted. (Thanks to Barbara George, Women's Energy Matters)

The Bagley-Keene Open Meetings Act, Government Code Section 11120-11132 (section 11124.1-a) reads: "Any person attending an open and public meeting of the state body shall have the right to record the proceedings with an audio or video tape recorder or a still or motion picture camera in the absence of a reasonable finding by the state body that the recording cannot continue without noise, illumination, or obstruction of view that constitutes, or would constitute, a persistent disruption of the proceedings" [For the beautiful democratic language of the full act see our blog, eon3emfblog.net.]

In response to our objection, the judge then called a recess and conferred with a CPUC legal advisor, taking our hard copy of the act to deliberate. All the other utilities conferred with their own lawyers, asking us for the exact legal citations. They did not seem pleased at the prospect of having us record the entire meeting.

When the judge returned, she announced we were allowed to tape that meeting only. After that meeting, she ruled, we would not be able to tape, but they would have it webcast. We were told that, if they were ever unable to webcast, they would allow us to then tape again, otherwise not. By our reading, the Bagley-Keene Open Meeting Act does not state that webcasting by the state body cancels the right of participants to record the proceeding.

Unfortunately, before we were allowed to begin taping, we missed some really good comments from the intervenors.

Our video coverage of the second pre-hearing conference on PG&E's 'smart meter' optout proposal is a rare peek at a very contentious issue between the public and utilities. 


