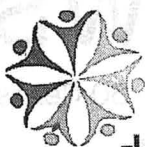

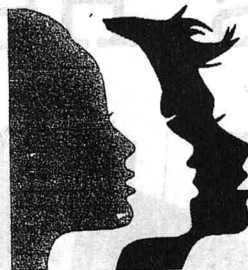

Dear Community Members:

Just a reminder about our precious pets There is a common misconception that dogs will be OK if left outside during the winter months. This simply is not true. All pets need adequate shelter and protection from the wind and cold temperatures. Both dogs and cats are safer and happier when kept indoors during cold weather. So, please don't leave your pets outdoors unattended during these very cold nights. Pets can quickly develop hypothermia and frostbite. Long-haired or thick-coated dogs tend to be more cold-tolerant, but are still at risk in cold weather. Short-haired pets feel the cold faster because they have less protection, and short-legged pets may become cold faster because their bellies and bodies are more likely to come into contact with the cold wet ground. Also, if your dog has a short coat or seems bothered by the cold weather, consider a sweater or dog coat. Outdoor ranch "working dogs" must have proper shelter, as well, including a completely enclosed house with a door flap and bottom floor with padding; consider a clean warm and waterproof coat each night.

1-16-17 Monday Morning Recap Week in Review

We are to a Martin Luther King, Jr. Holiday today, after a week that gave us a full Wolf Moon. It was so beautiful to be able to see the moon shining out in a clearing sky Thursday, after so many cloudy, stormy days. I "Googled" "Wolf Moon" and seems it is the January full moon when wolves do major howling. We don't have the wolves, but coyote howling abounds around. I did also hear, this full moon night, some tiny footsteps coming up the stairs to our attic bedroom. Then, with full moonlight shining on a small person standing quietly next to the bed, a barely audible whisper asked "can I have a sleepover with you, Shay?"

"Of course." How can I ever say "no" to such an exquisite moonlit sprite, this 4 year old daughter of my delightful son? I was looking forward to purchasing their CD at this CD release evening, but alas, the recordings were elsewhere and didn't make it to the event. I'm hearing there may be some at Kaleidoscope.

Saturday night was a Grateful Dead Night Fund Raiser for Zamora Moon at the Community Center. Pam Springer does an awesome job of organizing these fund raising events, along with Julie Augustyn and a force of local women, bakers, crafters, musicians, and Dead enthusiasts. This one was in support of the family of Pink Sabbath fiddler, Marisa Martinez, whose little daughter Zamora Moon, is struggling with a little known cancer that strikes children in a merciless way. There was a mini reunion of Pink Sabbath, with Marisa and Adrienne Pfeiffer, (who was celebrating her birthday), and Adrienne's brother Ben sitting in on bass. I always love hearing my offspring play music together, so I had a heart melting mom's moment seeing Ben and Adrienne playing there together. They were followed by a group of excellent musicians called the Grateful Dead Appreciation Society, who got the full house up dancing. It was a super family night, with good food, many excellent auction items to bid on and lots of loving support shown for this brave little girl and her family. What a town. So many open hearts.

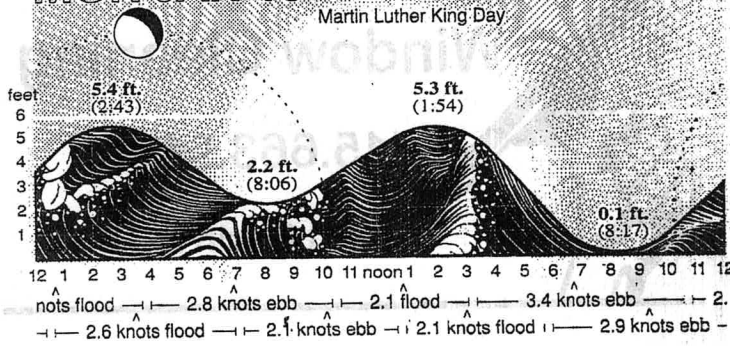

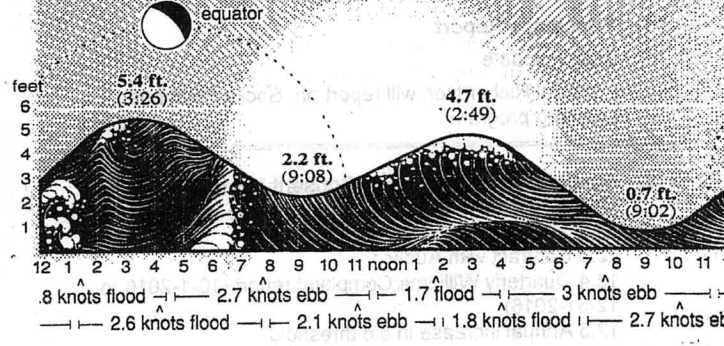
