WHAT HAPPENED

Monday Morning Recap
1-22-18 Week in Review from Jenniepfeiffer

Here we are already to the fourth week of the new year, which always seems to arrive so shockingly fast. I better quickly get the rest of my New Year greeting cards mailed.

Another startling realization is that it's been a year since the inauguration of what I call the bogus POTUS. No matter what one's party affiliation, one would be hard pressed to imagine a more un-presidential President. It was an inspiring boost, Saturday, to join the other 90 to 100 thousand people in San Francisco (and 100's and 100's of thousands in cities around the country and world), out in the street "Fired up, ready to go", reminding each other that we can do better than this as a country, and that our children deserve a future better than what is being presented to them from this administration It was all very moving. The women's movement is moving forward, is alive, vital, and ready to resist the disrespect that pours from the Whitehouse on a seemingly daily basis. Our planet, the people and the creatures living on it, cannot survive three more years of such wanton disregard for environmental science, such diplomatic disarray, and such disregard for rights of "life, liberty, and the pursuit of happiness." We ALL require kindness and respect, along with clean air to breathe, clean water to drink, healthy food, safe living quarters, and a free, quality education for every child of every ethnicity, color, gender (specific or non-specific), culture, and socio-economic happenstance. It is beyond belief that it is still necessary to articulate this. To the people in powerful positions that for some reason can't see beyond their own needy egos, I echo the sentiments of all those strong resister sisters in the street Saturday, (and the men who stood with them), and say "YOUR TIME IS UP!" The predators need to be impeached or voted out of office. Getting people registered to vote is priority #1.

This brings me to another event of the week: Wednesday's Joint Legislative Advisory Committee (JLAC), annual trip to Sacramento. JLAC is a countywide committee of superintendents and elected school board members advocating on behalf of public school children in Marin County. I took advantage of the opportunity to speak to policy advocates and lawmakers about the possibility of schools providing automatic voter registration as students turn 18. If they are registered as absentee voters, they would get their ballots mailed to them no matter where they might go to college or travel and it could set up a lifelong voting habit. I also brought up the need for greater District connection with home-schooled students and their families. This year's JLAC priorities included: Pension liabilities and the related increased school funding costs; special education; school construction and modernization funding bonds; and the need for charter school transparency legislation, requiring that the Brown Act, the Public Records Act, the Political Reform Act, and Government Codes apply to charter schools to hold them to high standards of governance.


This morning, our District Board of Trustees will be meeting to work on our Strategic Plan and I'm looking forward to some in depth conversation regarding the District/Home- school connection, among other things.

Added to these events of the past busy week, were several excellent art openings at the museum and the Farmstand, and some spaghetti BINGO Saturday night at the Community Center, where a raucous full house had fun and raised funds for our beloved Bolinas Children's Center. The good time was kept moving along apace by caller Nate Siedman, who was at one time an outstanding Children's Center attendee, then a parent of an attendee, and now has become president of our school district's Board of Trustees with a calling for calling, or something like that. 


- Spring blossoms are progressing—the plants got pretty confused during all that December sunshine, but now the acacias and camellias are out. Next up: plum blossoms!


