FirstEverFoodFestival

The FirstEver Bolinas Food Festival is happening on Saturday from 10am until 5pm.

The Community Center Board had a retreat last Saturday with Carol Friedman. At the beginning of the class we all sang the mission statement song together while Carol demonstrated the dance steps to the tune. Carol teaches dance and leads spontaneous flash mobs in dance. Besides being a non profit consultant (after building the Dance Palace in Pt Reyes for the past 30 years.)

"Non profits like to put on events," she told us. "But events don't make money. It costs \$1.30 to make each dollar."

The Food Festival is a case in point. I'm amazed at the tremendous amount of time and energy that's been poured into the event. Even El Prezidente has had to bust his ass a number of times.

I realized that I had a food related fortune wheel. I've been working on a seasonal healing/eating wheel based on the work of Dr. Elson Haas. The wheel combines his work with Cartesian astrology and the I-Ching. It's brand new and highly experimental. I'll bring it to the Festival and you can help me figure out how to use it.

Albert talked me into doing a painting for the Festival, as if I needed another project. "Let's paint psychedelic pictures of the park," he said. I agreed. The dancing woman from the Food Festival poster fit in well. Then I added the dancing couple from the Labor Day t-shirt. Oh and the dancing elephant from Labor Day. It was fun to put in Richard Brautigan.

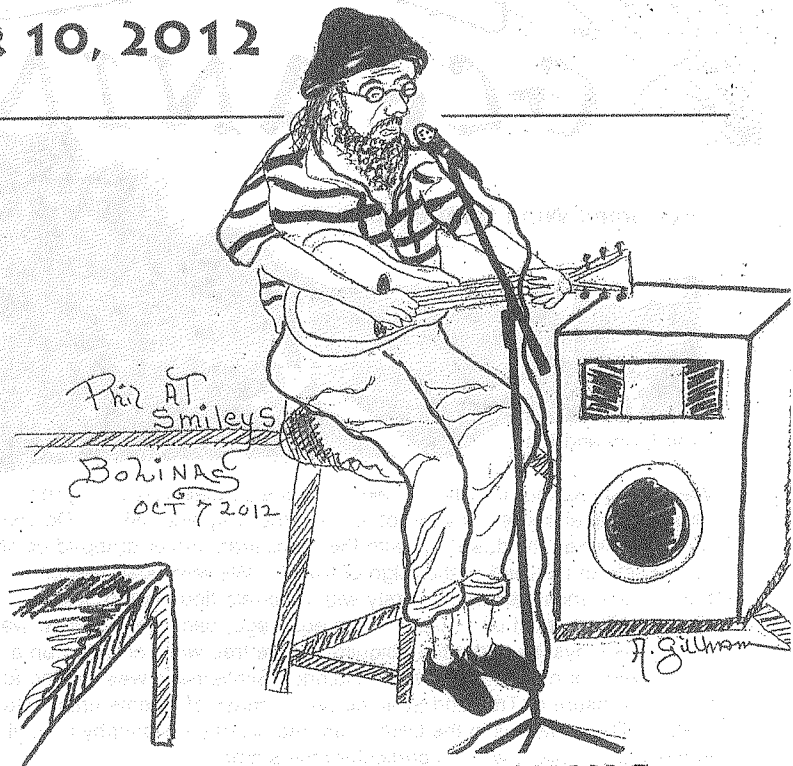
Adding faces and detail to the painting was laborious and I realized I would no be able to finish it by Festival time.

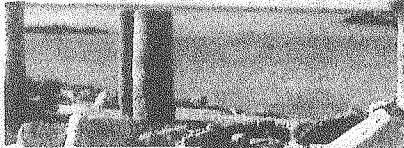

Perfumed Wind from Greece



Dear Mom and Mag,

We were on Kos for only two weeks, but time passes very slowly in Greece. We all looked at each other the other day and asked, "Do you remember when the dusty bus with the recalcitrant driver dropped us off by the side of the road at the edge of town?" We were lost, beaten, hungry, and most-assuredly thirsty with a certain floundering "idiots abroad" allure about us. Surely it was eons ago, back when Homer was writing the Odyssey under the ubiquitous olive tree while chewing on a thyme twig...or maybe it was when Heinrich Schliemann was looking for the lost treasure of Troy and treading on the mask of Agamemnon. No matter. The answer is in the DNA, a shared history, philosophy humming in the veins, a place with no particular time stamp.

The morning begins with soft winds bending around the olive trees, catching the side of our studio and moaning in epic proportions. However, the wind is merely a sheep in designer wolf clothing. If you step outside, you ask yourself, "What is all the fuss about?" Apparently, the studio is designed like some kind of Jai-alai racket. It scoops the wind in its shutters and gutters and secret top knots and "whooo whooo whoos" like a sound track for Wuthering Heights or even Moby Dick. The racket propels the wind into the studio with the appropriate sound effects and zings it around to give us a thrill, to make us believe that the sea is high and a hurricane is just around the corner. In reality, the wind is merely puffing...gently puffing on an ocarina or some such ancient instrument. The cats greet me and could care less that my flimsy nightgown is falling off my shoulders. They purr and purr and ask for a dish of milk, a crumb of feta, an anchovy, some sesame covered bread, a potato chip, anything! The sun oozes through the olive trees, the grape vines, the bougainvillea: amber, old amber, ancient amber, blood orange, salmon pink, blinding paper white! A lone motor scooter winds its way up to the ancient village of Kefalos. A dog offers a listless bark, the rooster announces something important, over and over again. The air smells of yeast and cinnamon, coffee, moist earth and iodine.

The beaches are littered with jet black and ox blood red stones. These are stones from the volcanoes of the past. The volcano of the present chuffs along sending out a warm stream of water to heat the sea water near a place called Thermae. We sat in the sulfuric waters and grew red as western lobsters and cured all ills such as warts. I collect bags and baskets of pebbles to build ephemeral mosaics on our terrace just under the window. Like barbarians, the cats leap on the stones and bat at them, sending them skittering across the marble tiles. "Daryl," I cry, "leave my stones alone!" He stares at me with his jaundiced eye and taunts me. Ancient Greek feline pet fluff ball with a stripe-y tail descended from the Tom of Zeus who owns the very air I breathe.

The ground is littered with the lips and handles of ancient temple offerings that once held fragrant oils and healing balms. A church bell rings. The day begins.

We share it all. A walk in the sacred park.

grows deeper and wilder, edged with pine boughs and wet boulders, pawprints of bobcat and bear, until

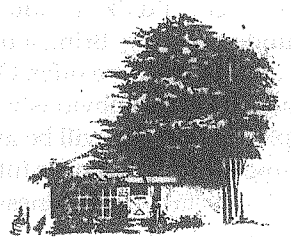
deep in the forest you shuffle up some tree, you rip the bark,

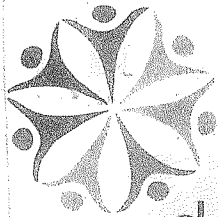

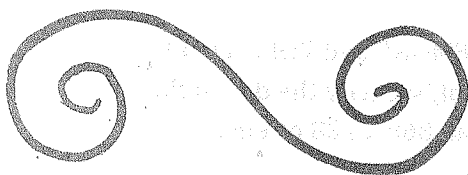

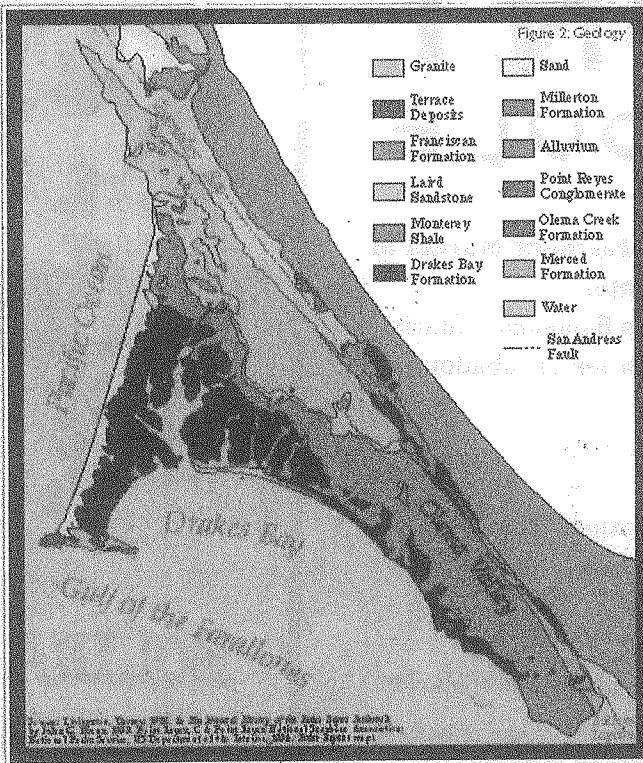

Island in Time



For about 5 years I've been obsessed with the idea of walking around the entire Pt. Reyes Peninsula. It's really an island, in that the San Andreas Fault runs along its eastern side, from Tomales bay down to the Bolinas Lagoon. In 13 million years, geologists say, it will separate along the fault (since this piece of land is moving slowly north).

I live at the southern end (bottom right here) and the idea was to go on foot from my home and circle the island. I figured it would take a week, with a backpack. My alternate goal was to get to the Pt. Reyes lighthouse, which is the leftmost piece of land

shown on this map.

Before leaving I took a surfboard and stashed it at the end of Limantour beach, the rightmost thin yellow strip on the map, so I could get across the mouth of Drake's Estero, the inland body of water shown (surrounded by red) here.

Long story short, I didn't make the circumambulation, but in 4 days I did get to the lighthouse, ready to drop from exhaustion (or more likely dehydration), but thrilled to have made it that far.

I started out at sunrise and walked down to the beach. Went as far as I could along beach, then cut up a cliff to a fire road that goes north along the coast. There's a large watershed just past Pelican Lake and some spectacular falls on the beach. However getting down the steep arroyo to the beach was sketchy to say the least. When it came time to get back up to the road, I thought I might not be able to make it up this very steep section with my pack. Luckily, a couple of young guys were on the beach and helped me. Kindness of strangers once again. I hiked until about six that night, so with breaks, I was probably on the road for 10 hours. My pack weighed about 32 pounds, and it seemed to be going okay.

Got a great sleep the first night by a creek, then the next day walked along the shore to Limantour beach. The wind was blowing about 30 MPH in the wrong direction, and I felt I just wasn't going to make across the quarter-mile or so of water on the surfboard with the extra weight of the pack. Decided to wait for the morning and had about the worst night of my life sleeping out in the open, semi-sheltered behind a sand dune, wind blowing, sleeping bag getting progressively wetter through the night.

The next morning the wind was still blowing and I gave up on crossing the water. Walked 2 miles back to the beach parking lot, dried out my sleeping bag, ate a freeze-dried dinner for 2 1/2 people, then took a network of trails which went around the estero and led out to the paved road going out to the lighthouse. Found an abandoned building and some trees and spent the night in my tent.

Had to walk along the paved road (a drag) to get to the lighthouse, and I started to feel really tired. In retrospect, I was dehydrated. I decided to scrap the idea for the circumambulation. It was just too far, and I was too tired. Made it to the lighthouse, which is spectacular, called home, and my son Evan picked me up around 4PM.

There were some great things about this trip:

- Being on foot, with food and shelter on my back, a sense of independence
- Getting away from electricity and email
- 4 days to think, with no distractions
- An ultimate workout.

There were some dumb things about this trip:

- Going too fast and too far; I can't help it but I seem unable to walk slowly.
- Not being up to speed on backpacking and gear
- Too much weight. I'd like to get it down to 20 pounds for extended hiking.
- Thinking I could make it across the estero mouth with a heavy pack on a surfboard

Bolinas's Measure E would fund Mesa Park

Bolinas landowners will vote Nov. 6 on whether to tax themselves \$49 per parcel per year for the next four years to maintain Mesa Park, the oldest and largest of the community's two parks with a soccer field, a baseball diamond, a basketball court, a skate park and a children's area.

Measure E designates a tax of \$49 per year per improved parcel of land in Bolinas to maintain and operate the park at 110 Mesa Road. "Improved parcels" are pieces of land with buildings on them, usually homes. A similar tax of \$45 per year for this purpose was in place for the preceding four years and expired this year.

"The park is a free facility that attracts people across the population of Bolinas," said Jane Mickelson, one of five members of the Mesa Park Board, which oversees the park. "We have a local soccer club that has been around for more than 25 years, with guys and gals of all ages, and youth soccer and youth baseball. The skate park attracts preteens, and Mesa Park is also used for special events." One such event was a walk-a-thon to raise money for the Bolinas Children's Center, Mickelson said.

The fee would cover the park's annual budget, a meager \$32,487 a year, which goes for the Pacific Gas and Electric bill, insurance, general manager, equipment maintenance, fuel and other costs. Because this year's budget is up slightly thanks to increased fuel and materials costs, the new parcel tax is \$4 a year higher than the previous tax.

"Little kids can't play in a playground safely if there is no ground cover. It's shredded soft bark, and every year we have to put another topping on it," Mickelson said. "If a little one falls off a swing or comes down a slide too hard, you want a cushioned landing place." Also, the soccer field needs re-grading, the board member said.

The income generated by Measure E would go only to Mesa Park, Mickelson said. The community's other park is funded by donations, and a proposed swimming pool that has yet to be built would be supported by user fees. A two-thirds majority of the voters must vote in favor of the measure for it to pass.

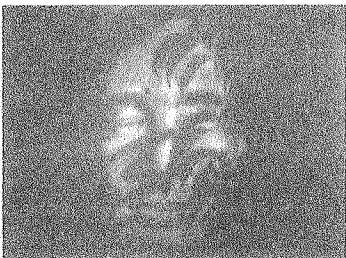

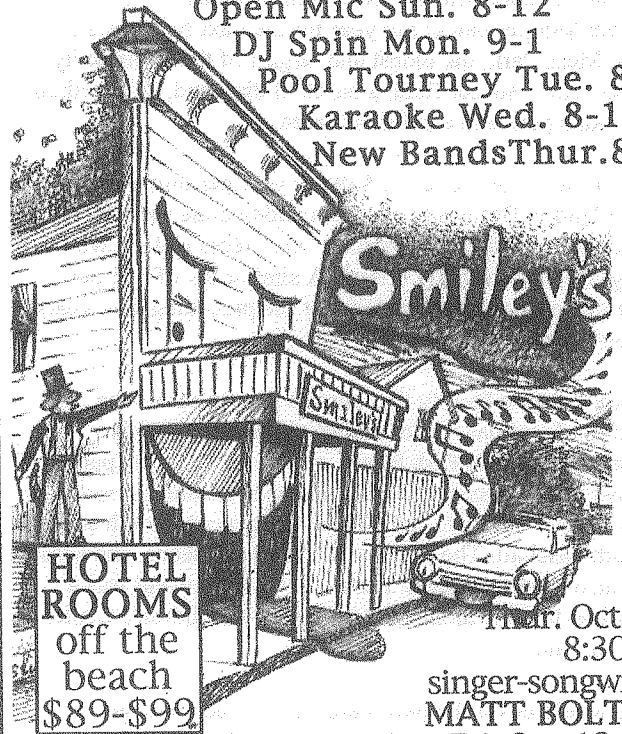
