

Nature Notebook By Loretta Farley

The autumnal equinox on Friday, Sept. 22 notes the calendar beginning of fall in the northern hemisphere. It is called "Mabon" in the Celtic calendar, and is a time to celebrate the harvest and to rest after the busy summer season. The coming full moon on Oct. 4 will be this year's "harvest moon," or the full moon closest to the fall equinox.

Bigleaf maples are turning color: they are brilliant gold among the deep evergreen coast redwoods of Samuel P. Taylor State Park along Sir Francis Drake Boulevard. Look closely at the crimson poison oak vines for fat clusters of white bernes that provide winter food to song birds. Plenty of green oak acoms are falling to the ground and drawing in black-tailed deer, which will feast on them.

Coveys of quall are also taking advantage of the end-of-summer bounty of seeds. Typically, quall pairs lay 12 to 15 eggs in a ground nest. They have an expandable pouch in their neck—called a crop—to store hard seeds, which are then processed through a muscular stomach area called a gizzard. If disturbed, they run quickly for shelter, storing food to digest later. A male quall usually perches like a sentry on a high branch or post above the feeding covey, ready to give an alert if a predator is spotted.

Some Ways to Stay Safe

Taking a lesson from the drastic situation in Puerto Rico and other islands devastated by recent hurricanes, here are some important steps we all should consider.

In case of an earthquake, fire or flood that shuts off power, have a solar flashlight. No batteries to run low. There are many models that you can find on-line. I have one called Waka Waka that is designed to be used in places where there is no electricity. Every time you buy one, another is donated to such an area of the world. You put the flashlight in the window each day to charge its solar panel. I use mine every night for walking in the dark or emergencies. The cost for a Waka Waka is \$30. There are other solar powered flashlights that are somewhat less expensive.

It's also important to have a radio to hear the news, and a way to charge your cell phone. There are several solar powered radios that also have a hand cranked system that allows you to charge your phone. On the website Emergency Essentials there is a radio called Kaito Black Voyager Pro that has emergency radio alerts, a solar panel, a hand crank and a USB outlet that powers cell phones. The cost is \$80. There are less expensive models on line elsewhere – be sure to check the cell phone charging capability.

You will need half a gallon of drinking water per person daily. We should all have at least a gallon a day per person for drinking and sanitation. Have enough for 5-7 days. If you have rain water stored in a barrel, do not take it off the top, but drain it from the bottom if possible. Filter it through a cotton bandana and then purify it with boiling for one minute or with a water purifier such as Potable Aqua or Aquamira.

Keep enough dried or canned food on hand for your family. I suggest the salt free organic canned beans sold at the People's store as well as the food your family really likes. Let's hope we don't need any of this. In a future column, I will interview our fire chief Anita Brown about how to stay safe in your house or car during an earthquake.
