



Bo-Stin to offer preschool to 4 year olds

The Bolinas-Stinson Union School District is gearing up to offer a free 4-yearold preschool program next fall, an effort that will likely be completely funded by the district. Superintendent John Carroll said at Tuesday's board meeting that the district is planning to release notices in local media next week, to gauge interest and start accepting early enrollment applications. "It's a major project," Mr. Carroll said. The district has studied a preschool program in past years and incorporated it into its strategic plan. It's not cheap; the district estimates the program would cost about \$180,000 in its first year, including upstart costs as well as salary and benefits for a full-time credentialed teacher, at \$105,000, and an aide, at \$50,000. (Costs will likely go down in the second year, but then rise with salary increases.) The district could spend less money on an uncredentialed instructor with only a child development permit, but Mr. Carroll believes it would be better to have a credentialed teacher with more training. The district has investigated state and federal funding opportunities, but it probably wouldn't qualify for assistance, which is geared for areas with more lowincome students, or requires participation in a regional consortium that would curb local control of the program. "I think the bottom line is... if we open a preschool, it's in all likelihood going to be on our own dime," Mr. Carroll said. In a written report to the board, the district said it would fund the preschool by "spending into the reserve or by making reductions in other areas. Given the substantial reserve...the district would have years to make adjustments in spending without fear of impending insolvency." The preschool, only open to 4-year-olds, would likely be located at the Stinson campus, now home to kindergarten, first-grade and secondgrade students-raising questions about the impact to those classes. One teacher noted that the district recently ended a lease with another preschool, Stinson Beach Preschool, to give more space to the district. (Susan Tacherra, the director of the Montessori-based preschool, said at the meeting that she was "thrilled" and would happily "consult and work with you to move this along.") The district teacher also noted that an empty classroom used for breakout sessions was important given a multi-grade class there. "There will need to be plans that start long before next summer," she added. The board, which has convened committees in the past to study a preschool, debated the best way to solicit more input, including creating a new board committee. But some worried that would slow down the process and potentially repeat work, though all generally agreed that some mechanism for inputperhaps a community meeting or superintendent's committee, as well as ongoing board discussions-was important.

Birding packs available to library patrons

Spotting a red-shouldered hawk in the sky or a fuzzy whale's spout at Drakes Beach can be mesmerizing-but oftentimes wildlife is a little too far away to see clearly. Now you don't need to own a pair of binoculars to bring them up close: library cardholders can check out "family bird discovery packs" from the Point Reyes Library that include a children's backpack, a pair of binoculars and a bird identification booklet, thanks to a \$3,000 grant awarded by the Marin County Fish and Wildlife Commission to the nonprofit Tomales Bay Library Association. The idea for adding binoculars to the library's inventory originated in a trip that Bonny White, the library's West Marin branch manager, took to Mendocino. She was hoping to see migrating whales, but without binoculars to offer a better look-she hadn't brought any-whales and their spouts are often just distant specks. "I thought, 'I wish I could just borrow some," she said, a problem she suspected also strikes people in West Marin. Soon the Tomales Bay Library Association applied for and received enough funding to make 12 discovery sets, which can each be checked out for up to a week. They will initially all be checked out and returned to the Point Reyes Library, but eventually the plan is to spread them out along the coast: six in Point Reyes, two in Inverness, two in Bolinas and two in Stinson Beach. The packs are designed for kids and families. But, Ms. White added, "I want them to be checked out by anyone with a library card... I bought binoculars that are particularly good for kids, but anyone can use them." The idea of libraries stocking not just books but objects-of developing a "library of things"-is a relatively recent phenomenon and appears to be gaining steam. Sacramento's public library recently launched a library of things where cardholders can check out musical instruments, sewing machines, video games, board games, GoPros and more. Some other libraries have similar programs. The binoculars, Ms. White said, could serve as the first step in for the county stocking more objects. "I think it could be the beginning of the library of things for us," she said.




