## Bolinas Community Center Board Meeting – August 18, 2012

**Directors and staff present:** Randi Arnold - Development Director, Chris Besenty, StuArt Chapman - President, June McAdams - Secretary, Jennie Pfeiffer, Lia Sabbatini - General Manager, Susie Stewart, Vanessa Waring, Steve Wrenn.

**Visitors:** Stacey Besenty, Kathleen O'Neill - Scribe

10:10 a.m. meeting called to order.

Minutes for the July meeting approved. Agenda amended.

**Sound & Light report:** Final look at the sample for the sound wall. Don Smith wants to start the project, and is willing to pay for the sound baffling on the library wall himself. A motion to let him start the project was made and passed.

**President's report:** StuArt brings up vendors in front of the building. Vendors must be a member of the Community Center, pay \$5 per day and not block the sidewalk. Also there is no vending during Library open hours as the Library finds it disruptive. There was discussion of using the Station side of the building for vending. A subcommittee was formed to look into ramifications and possibilities of expanded vending, and posting the policy. Randi will contact Anita to discuss with her.

**Treasurer's report:** Susan was not able to attend, but Stacy brought us the Budget vs. Actual report through August. We are doing better than the budget, but are down about \$3,000. We agreed it would be nice to see Actual Compared to Last Year - next meeting.

**Manager's report:** The tree that was leaning into the parking lot and tangling the electrical wires was removed. Lia asked if we might use the logs as plaza seats was offered and thought a good idea by all. A couple of new classes are coming up. Some interesting movies planned for Tues. nights.

Kitchen remodeling is moving forward with plans to raise money for the \$22,000 we need. Lia is working on a food event that would take place October 13. Lia has spoken with Mesa Park Board about using the park as well as the Community Center for a food and tasting event. Discussion of final Labor Day duties.

**Development Director's report:** The Library had proposed a 6% increase and we finally got a 35% increase. The rent for the next 3 years will be \$1,229.80 and the five years after that will be \$1,475.76. They are now paying \$901 a month. So they are going from \$.80 a square ft to \$1.10 for 3 years and then increases to \$1.35 for the following 5 years. Motion passed to accept offer. Fundraising with Carol Friedman set for Oct 6 at the fire house.

**Other business:** Discussion of the use of the handicapped parking place as part of a performance at the BCC. Not really a good idea. The Mural project asked us to be fiscal sponsor for them, motion passed.

Meeting adjourned at 12:00 pm

The weekend was so jammed, packed with things to do in town and in the greater Bay Area, I don't know how any more events could have been scheduled. Ned and I completely let go of Hardly Strictly Bluegrass. Not only have the number of attendees gotten so massive it's hard to see anything but heads bobbing, but getting from any of the 7 stages to another, takes so long there's a big chance of missing the desired attraction. I don't do so well with crowds, so standing shoulder to shoulder with the steaming masses is a frightening experience and leaves me focusing on not stumbling. Not that there would be enough room to actually fall down, but one might be dragged along to some unintended destination. Plus, the lineup of performers gets to be more and more "hardly" and less "strictly" Bluegrass or old timey. So this year, with news that the weekend was also Fleet Week, Blue Angels, two ballgames, sailing races, Castro Faire, several festivals, a political march across Golden Gate Bridge, and road work taking place on every road out of West Marin, staying away from San Francisco seemed the smarter option.

There was plenty going on out here as well. Friday night there was a film launch-dessert party at the Community Center showing two John Korty films, (one on Imogen Cunningham, and one on John Allair) and some clips from a video he is putting together on Arthur Okamura. The evening was a lovely way to solicit donations to complete the film, and was put together by John, Kitty Okamura, and Harriet Kossman. There were some yummy pot luck desserts, after which a short walk to Smiley's could finish the evening with a Piro Patton-Michael Pinkham- Taylor Cutcomb Jazz Jam Session.

Other excellent pot luck events (this being the delicious harvest pot luck season) made it necessary to wear expanding waistband clothing, because of all the seasonal foods, too delicious to pass by without tasting. Salmon is in abundance, so that was delightfully featured along with fall veggies and the last berries of the season.

Saturday's first potluck of the day for us was a Greg Shindell/Kindred Souls reunion, where it was so wonderful to see Mary Barror able to be out again, sitting in the sunshine listening to the uplifting music.

## Requiem for Bolinas Tradition?

Many years ago, the County attempted to force Bolinas to comply with their "over-the-hill" standards re: street-vending. I spear-headed a petition campaign and worked with Gary Giacomini to comply with the wishes of the community and "grandfather" in our long-standing tradition giving us the freedom to display arts, crafts, etc, without legal interference or harassment. Many of you assisted in this effort to remain an autonomous community.

What has changed with this picture? Now the "enemy" is within the gates. Now, we the people, face harassment from our neighbors who suddenly feel threatened by the occasional display of arts and crafts in the same location this type of activity has occurred in for years.

As I've mentioned before, this casual, spontaneous activity by myself and one other local woman, a few times over the

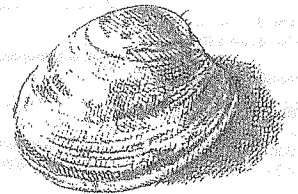
past couple months, is NOT a money-making proposition, or else others would have surely joined us, in the best season of the year for this type of endeavor. Where are the problems that a few are so certain will occur, if this tradition is allowed to continue? Why do these few wish to be so mean-spirited? What is it that they've seen over these 2 months that is agitating them, especially as they haven't even frequented the park when I've been there to see what goes on?

I have made so little \$ in this venue it doesn't make "sense" for me to make the effort, especially with the negative vibes I have to field from these few. I have been "occupying" the park out of principle; taking a stand against the forces that want to dismantle this right and freedom, and trample the wishes of the community. Other locals desire to have this option, and I stand for them.

I have "real" marketplaces to set up in the next several weeks and likely won't return to this spot until Spring; no one

else will likely be there either. Is this rash move by the Downtown Park Board which will force us to comply with County "standards", necessary at this time? There ARE some issues the Board should be dealing with, that I've seen in my long days "occupying", which have nothing to do with vending. They are unaware of them because they aren't there, and aren't willing to respond to my request to come by and talk with me, at the Park.

The Downtown Park "Committee" meets tonight, October 8. Let your voices be heard; if the Board continues to ignore the desire of the community to ensure this tradition isn't eliminated, you can respond later with our town motto of "don't tread on me!" Some have even spoken of lawsuits...yow! Thanks for your support. (flower sierra) (p.o. box 1001)
