

Burglary spree ends in arrest of Oakland man

A spree of burglaries in the last week across West Marin has left law enforcement trying to tie two unsolved incidents to a suspect arrested Monday in relation to a burglary at Diekmann's General Store in Tomles, authorities. said Tuesday.

Tyrone Brennen, 27, of Oakland, was arrested Monday night after a deputy patrolling the area saw him walking down the Tomales-Petaluma Road. He appeared "exhausted, tired, wet and muddy," Marin County Lieutenant Doug Pittman said.

He was booked on suspicion of burglarizing Diekmann's earlier that morning, and authorities suspect he is responsible for burglaries at Woodacre Country Market and Don's Bolinas Liquor Store. A "fruitful" search by investigators with the Sonoma and Marin County Sheriff's Offices for a white BMW driven by Mr. Brennen revealed incriminating evidence linking the suspect to other burglarized stores, Lt. Pittman said.

The burglar entered Diekmann's by carefully removing a pane of glass-a similar method of intruinvestigators noticed

at the Woodacre Market. There, it wasn't until sometime after the owner reported the theft of \$10,000 from a safe while opening the store on November 1 that he noticed a window pane was missing.

A day later, the owner of Don's Liquor reported \$5,000 missing from a hiding place below the cash register. The suspect entered through a hole cut in the wall at the rear of the store, shopkeeper Mam Stephen said.

A 20-hour pursuit of Mr. Brennen led to a ranch in Tomales, around which a coalition of Marin and Sonoma County Sheriff's Office officials, Novato and Mill Valley police, highway patrol, federal park rangers and Coast Guard police, which manned a helicopter, established a perimeter to try to flush out the suspect. The search was called off at around 5 p.m.

Eight charges of commercial burglary were filed this week by the Sonoma County District Attorney's Office against Mr. Brennen, whose episode of burglaries began in August. "We're happy that we got him," Lt. Pittman said. "He was a threat to the community." He added, referring to his law enforcement personnel: "Like the Giants, we seem to have a winwin-win going on right now."

Meanwhile, at West Marin Pharmacy in Point Reyes Station, where Marin deputies arrested an intruder late last week on charges of commercial burglary, owner Zsuzsanna Biran is seeking a new alarm system and surveillance cameras. Ms. Biran said this was the fourth time someone had broken into her business.

The suspect, Patrick Walsh, 29, of Greenbrae, was found with \$20,000 worth of prescription pain medication, including OxyContin, after deputies cornered him in the store Friday night. He is suspected of attempting to break in the morning before, when Ms. Biran discovered a damaged back door.


The Marin District Attorney's Office charged Mr. Walsh with one felony count of burglary and misdemeanors of possession of a burglary tool and resisting arrest.

Ms. Biran, who filed a report with the U.S. Drug Enforcement Administration that could lead to a temporary closure of the pharmacy as a result of the suspect tampering with medications, said she expected charges harsher than those imposed on suspects accused of burglarizing businesses that do not carry prescription medications.

"If you steal a loaf of bread, that's different than stealing OxyContin," Ms. Biran said. - Jacob Flannick

MOSTLY MEETINGS & MISCELLANY Monday Morning Recap & Week in Review 11/12/12 From Jenniepfeiffer

IT'S BEEN A BUSY WEEK. Tuesday's elections put Obama back in the Whitehouse, a record 20 women elected to the Senate (getting closer to equal representation, but still a good ways to go before getting to the 50% mark), which is still firmly in the control of the Democrats, and the House is still in Republican control, though seems they lost some seats. Hopefully, they can learn to negotiate. I personally am happy to report that ALL those lawmakers that made outrageous and ill informed/ignorant comments about women and rape and pregnancy, were voted out of office! To my way of thinking, that is as it should be. If a person is going to be making laws that so severely affect a woman's life, that lawmaker needs to become informed by checking in with women, and that should be the same for elders, the poor, minorities, mobility impaired, etc.

There are still votes being verified and counted on some measures, specifically measure E, the Mesa Park election. It got majority support, but needs 2/3 majority, which is still too close to call before all the absentee and provisional ballots are counted. There was a snafu with voting, in that a new "polling" place was established, that being the post office for mail in ballots. Many residents were notified that they would be needing to vote absentee, but they didn't receive their ballots, so they had to use a provisional ballot. That is the way one votes if not on the rolls when getting to the polls. It requires verification of registration before those votes are counted. There are usually under a dozen of those in Bolinas, but for this election, there were 40 - a record number. Because of the verification necessity, those ballots will not be posted until this Friday. That will be when we know the official outcome of measure E.

There were many wonderful community events this weekend, starting Friday night with the school sponsored Barn Dance. It was a great night, with chili or veggie soup choice dinner and desserts; scare crow auction; and prizes for best square dance outfits, which went to Marius Salone and his mom, Danielle, and to Mirta Guzman. Midnight on the Water played to accompany dinner, and a demonstration waltz performed by the middle school students. Then Evie Ladin, a square dance calling pro from the East Bay, got the dance sets going for real - turning chaos into some sort of version of order, to the tunes of the Clod Hoppers - a fun night.

Saturday started badly for our household, the morning greeting me with a toilet overflow, making me a bit nervous about what sort of a day it would be. I headed down to host the 2nd Saturday Sale, and immediately broke a light switch and spilled a box of tacks. Did manage to get set up, and with the addition of some great items from June McAdams and StuArt, we successfully sailed through the sale. Next month, the 2nd Sat. will be on the 4th Saturday because Holiday Winter Faire will be on the 2nd Sat, and the World Crafts Faire will be the next weekend, so we will be after that - the LAST CHANCE TO BUY HOLIDAY GIFTS - giving you lots of time to get your wares there.

The day ended much better that it started, as Saturday night was a FABULOUS night of music to benefit the recuperative needs of Mary Barror. It was wonderful to see her back out after her setback, and it was great to be reminded yet again how many fine musicians we have in town. 




