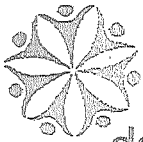

"Home" was a Blockbuster

Saturday evening at Commonweal, Joanna Haigood and Lisa Townsend's show about the meaning and aspects of Home thrilled a packed house with its conceptual creativity, wide variety of acts, and the impressive talent displayed by its many performers. Especially beautiful were the graceful, elaborate dance duets performed by young locals July Guzman and Maitrella Rodriguez, and by Helen Wicks and Alex Allan from Joanna's Zaccho Dance Theatre, portraying couples headed toward building a home together. In stark contrast, José Navarrete from Zaccho acted in silence a poignant portrayal of a forlorn migrant settling into a tiny room in a noisy city while missing family and music from his real home. And Shannon Gray's physically intense dance embodied to me a frantic and fraying search for decent but affordable living space. Interspersing all this, Peggy Honeywell (Claire Rojas) sang beautifully several songs about home, accompanied delicately by Piro Patton on bass.

Fourteen acts in all (!), it was a huge and elaborate production, yet it flowed seamlessly and naturally from one setting and mood to the next quite different one. Ken Adams managed to deliver excellent sound from performers, instrumental tracks, and effects alike in this challenging space, and all the sound and lighting cues were spot-on. Wayne Campbell safely hung performers from on high, and crafted sculpted metal props as well. Afterwards, the audience was further rewarded with a cornucopia of yummy snacks, spiced with hot jazz from Piro plus the Michaels Bello and Pinkham.

All of this was a key fundraiser and great publicity for the Bolinas Community Land Trust (BCLT), our local affordable-housing agency, whose staff and board went to great effort-planning and running the event. Big thanks to them and to all the performers and support staff it took to successfully pull off this spectacular production. It demonstrated yet again what a wealth of talent this little community holds and what amazing work it can accomplish. It gives me confidence that we can overcome our housing crisis too.
