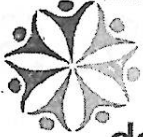

CALAMUS

The most revealing of Walt Whitman's poetry is arguably that chapter from the Leaves of Grass.

The LGBT community and particularly gay artists have long been inspired and comforted by this 19th century poet, whose positive imagery and joy of the love of one's fellow comrade is secretly shared from generation to generation.

It seems rare or even absurd to equate sexuality with classic music, (not a stretch for the unfortunate disco era), and yet the 20th century's American gay composers seem to "go there" with a harmonic sensuality that can be felt by all.

As our straight brothers composed "modern music," dissonance including 12 tone music, gay composers were creating beautifully sounding harmonies and using romantic texts in songs.

For those who remember the prejudices of the 20th century, along with Afro-Americans, gay folks took a lot of shit from society. Gay composers also took a lot of criticism in that their realm of beauty was often deemed not modern enough. A question arises for classical buffs and other music lovers, "Which music do you love to listen to now?" For an extreme contrast, do people in general love to listen to 20th century German composers like Webern, Berg, Henze and Schoenberg or the American gay composers like Bernstein, Britten, Barber, Copland, Menotti or Sondheim?

(I had wanted to avoid the embarrassment of trying to name great American composers of note. Thank goodness for Steve Reich and John Adams who brought back beautiful tonality, the latter who just celebrated his 70th birthday with the San Francisco Symphony last week.)

Looking at the gay B's and others in this extra light, may bring more meaning in the songs that will be played this Friday, February 24th at 7 p.m. at Mary Magdalene Church at the foot of Horseshoe Hill.

Among the songs to be included are: Benjamin Britten's magical settings of folk songs, gorgeous harmonies of Samuel Barber's songs, some posthumously published recently and rarely heard songs of Leonard Bernstein.

I have 9.72" for February and 34.45 for the season, 8/1/16—2/20/17.

Dick Bass, Alder/Grove, reports 8.62" to date for February and 34.79" for the season, 8/1/16—2/20/17. He notes that last February was 1.26". Dick also reports that last season, 8/1/2015—7/30/2016, was 26.78". We are 7.67" over last year with at least two more months of possible rain.

I record the amount for the previous 24 hours. I take my readings around 9 AM. Each reading is for the day and night before; so today's reading of 1.03 was for Sunday all day and night. Most computer recorders track midnight to midnight. The rain season is 8/1/16 to 7/30/2017. This is the standard for recording rainfall.

Also, I collect with a rain gauge that is in two parts, the large vessel holds and collects the overflow of a tube that holds 1 inch of rain and is graduated in 1/100 of an inch. Electronic gauges use a tilting seesaw mechanism that measures in 1/100"

Location also plays a role. The gauge should be in the open, away from trees and buildings that influence the rain. Also, some areas in Bolinas just get more rain than others.

WHAT HAPPENED THIS WEEK
 2/20/17 MONDAY MORNING RECAP MEMO
 Week in Review from Jennie Pfeiffer

It was another week of storms and slides and trees down. I know I started this column the same way last week, but here we are again, even more so. Seems there was a bit of a pause in the rain for the memorial sendoff for Myan Baker.

I intend for this to be a quick update (I never really know until I come to the end) because it is a holiday and I am in the middle of two weeks of birthday celebration. I like to celebrate a week before and the week after the actual day, which was yesterday, because that's how birth usually goes - a week to prepare for the delivery and then a week after to take time to recover and assess the new situation and plan for what happens next. Since I am born at the same time so many former presidents were, I get the added advantage of having my birthday followed by a holiday. This year, I was also lucky enough to have an outstanding event happen on my birthday, a night of music last night at the Mann Family Farm. The Lo Watters, (Ethan Okamura, Steve Trivelpiece, Jason Loeks), had an exceptional set that was followed by a Grammy winning duo: Rob Ickes, voted best dobro guitar player 16 times, and Trey Hensley, acoustic speed guitar. They had a blue grass/country, set that threw in some R&R, R&B and a little Grateful Dead. So a big thanks to the Mann Family for helping me celebrate in such a big, happy way with so many of my townies, family, and friends.

There was a School Board meeting Tuesday night. Minutes will be forthcoming, but some items covered include: passage of a resolution declaring Bolinas-Stinson Union School District a Sanctuary Safe Zone School for all students; a report on the excellent social/emotional training staff is doing in preparation for working with students on school climate (there will be a workshop for parents on this February 28 at the Bolinas Campus); and some good news on enrollment with projections for a robust 18 incoming kindergarteners next year, and the inclusion of fourteen 4-year-olds, which would bring us back up to a little over 100 - up from the 85 student low of this year. The Math update is that each grade has a daily discrete math grade level course in the Math lab, and Middle school has moved from 3 days a week to daily. Testing of our 8th graders indicates they are all where they need to be or beyond. Homework is moving more toward suggested additional outside work rather than mandatory. Overall, the school continues to progress in a positive way, as we look at facility needs and staff assignments for next school year. We are definitely a SMARTER SCHOOL: Science; Math; Artistic expression (dance, drama, music, visual arts); Reading/writing; Tools and Technology; Experiential learning (extended field study trips & eco-environmental science); Research & development; Social/emotional guidance; Civic engagement/citizenship; Health & fitness/wellness/P.E.; Outdoor science/garden lab; Occupational training - O.T. ; and Language (foreign and domestic. Looking good. jp

Today in Weather & Climate: California flood emergency edition (Monday, February 20th)

Hi all,

This is an urgent and important message, so I'll keep it short. If you're in a hurry, please read and retweet this message.

If you have family or friends in northern or central California—please get in touch with them on Monday morning, or sooner. The seriousness of the potential flood that is inbound on Monday and Tuesday cannot be overstated.

I just got off the phone with a NWS meteorologist at the Sacramento office, Bill Rasch, and he said they are increasingly concerned about the potential for the incoming atmospheric river to cause substantial or even historic flooding with little immediate notice. They are urging people to prepare to evacuate with less than 15 minutes warning, and expecting flooding in places that haven't flooded in "many years." As far as the this sort of dire wording, they have tentative plans to "take it up a notch" tomorrow—this is the real deal, a situation that likely hasn't hit California in decades, or maybe much longer.



PREPARE NOW
Intense rain & strong winds Monday (2/20/17)

Reality Check:

- NorCal has been inundated with heavy precipitation since early January.
- Our entire region has saturated soils & flooded areas with another strong storm on the way early next week.
- We could see flooding in areas that haven't flooded in a long time and there will be additional stress on levees, rivers, creeks & streams.
- We are advising all residents in interior NorCal to be prepared for flooding and possible evacuations.

How to prepare:

Gather important items, medications & documents in a "go bag" in case you need to evacuate quickly. Don't forget to plan for you pets, too. Make sure your vehicles have a full tank of gas. Monitor Caltrans and your local authorities for road closures & evacuations. Follow NWS Sacramento on Facebook & Twitter for real time storm impacts

Here's what is causing so much concern: If the atmospheric river stalls, there could be up to a foot of rain in a span of about 36 hours over places that are already flooding—that's a rainfall intensity that isn't expected more than once a century, or even more rare. At risk is the vast network of levees and dams and diversions that literally make modern California what it is, and protect hundreds of thousands of people. If this system is compromised, the scale of disaster would be among the worst in U.S. history. A dire 2011 New York Times magazine piece outlines the scenario. It's not pretty.

The implications of this flood would be huge: If the levee system is breached, Sacramento could have 30ft of flooding, and much of the state's water delivery system could be paralyzed by an influx of saltwater, including much of southern California. Two-thirds of people in the state could lose fresh water. That's not to mention the potential loss of life. Of course, this is not a given based on the latest weather forecast—but the fact that it can't be ruled out should cause everyone in the region to pay close attention.

This is something that should be wall-to-wall national coverage, but I haven't seen circulated much so far. Please help get the word out.

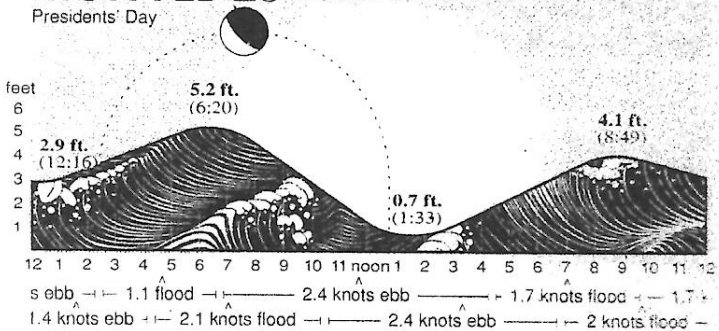

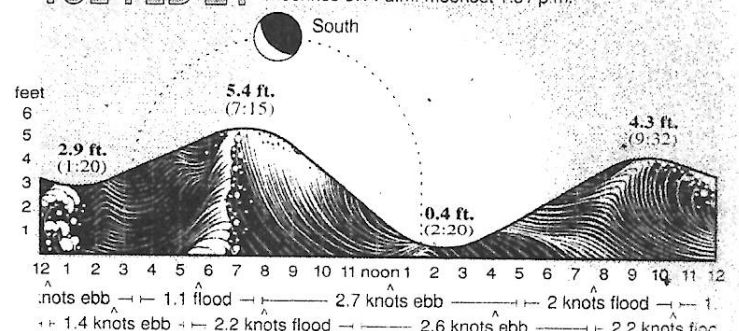

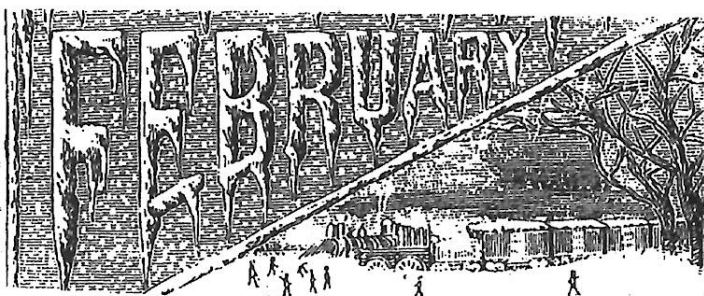
