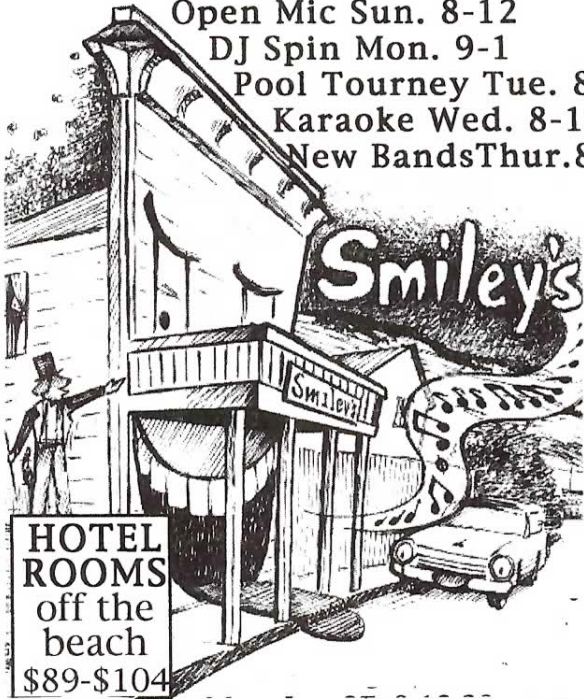

Go to Health: Ginger

Ginger has been used in Asian, Indian and Arabic cooking and as a medicine for at least 4000 years! In herbal medicine it has been used to treat stomach upset, colic, diarrhea, nausea, motion sickness, arthritis, respiratory illness, headaches, and painful menstrual periods. In the 21st century, ginger is being studied at various universities for these and other health conditions. Here are some recent findings.

*Asthma has become more prevalent in recent years; the reasons for this increase are being debated and are obviously complex. Air pollution may be a factor. Asthma is characterized by a tightening of the bronchial tubes that carry air in and out of the lungs. Medicines called bronchodilators are common types of asthma medicines; they work by relaxing the smooth muscles that line the airways. Researchers at Columbia University have found that components of ginger can work with bronchodilators to relax the airways. Compounds in ginger affect an enzyme in the lungs that prevents smooth muscle relaxation. Researchers plan to determine whether aerosol delivery of ginger compounds may have a therapeutic potential in relieving asthma. People with asthma should not abandon their inhalers at this point, but drinking ginger tea might be helpful. (Also – vitamin D deficiency is common in people with asthma. Talk to your doctor or NP about supplemental D if your level is below 30-40 ng/ml.)

*Muscle pain – researchers at the University of Georgia studied oral ginger in a randomized group of volunteers given arm exercises with heavy weights designed to cause muscle pain the following days. Subjects pretreated with ginger capsules had a 25% decrease in muscle pain on subsequent days. This should be of interest to many people who exercise in gyms, on the soccer fields or engage in any sport that causes muscle soreness.

*Nausea from chemotherapy – Ginger has long been used for nausea in pregnancy and is considered safe and somewhat effective. Researchers at the University of Rochester Medical Center found that giving ginger supplements 3 days before chemotherapy treatment and 3 days after – along with prescription medicines for nausea – reduced nausea

levels by 40% compared to patients just receiving prescription medicines for nausea.

*Colon inflammation: researchers at the University of Michigan looked at the ability of ginger supplements to reduce colon inflammation and thereby possibly act as a colon cancer prevention agent. After 28 days of ginger use, subjects had statistically significant reductions in most markers for colonic inflammation, compared to subjects taking a placebo. This is important, as colon cancer is the third most common cancer among men and women in the US.

*How to use more ginger- Buy ginger root, cut a thumbnail size piece and dice it small, then add it to stir-fries and vegetable dishes. Grate ginger into many dishes, including rice and quinoa, and in baked goods. Buy ginger tea bags, or make your own ginger tea. If you feel a little nauseated from eating too much, ginger tea will really help. Researchers at Chang Gung University in Taiwan have shown that ginger accelerates the emptying of the stomach.

February arrived Saturday with a much appreciated, beautiful rain soaker - such a great way to start the month. Weather forecasts are suggesting we might get some more next weekend, which would take us out of the scary place. Maybe it's okay to risk putting in a spring garden.

The weekend was a lively one, with a Saturday night fabulous feast of fresh crab, potatoes, salad from local greens and beets, a delicious cabbage slaw, and artisan bread & butter at the Community Center 2nd Annual Crab Feast. The desserts were locally made, some gluten free, with cakes sold whole and shared by all at the table, a nice way to offer up sweets without requiring everyone to negotiate exiting the long, crowded tables and making way to a central place, requiring a stand in a long line. It was such a good idea, was fun, and worked out really well. The evening was planned and food prepared by the expert co-operative efforts of local caterers/party planners extraordinaire (power women Lia, Becca, Heidi's, June, Tanya, and a large cast of others) There was a live auction of art, services, and events, facilitated by Mark Buell, assisted by the evening's M.C. Adrienne Pfeiffer. Stinson artist, Tess Felix Greene, created an outrageous hanging sculpture of sea drift items discovered along the shore, which was one of the night's most hotly contested items, and brought in one of the highest bids of the night. Excellent music was performed by our own High Tide Blues. The event was a fundraiser for the Bolinas Community Center Kitchen project to bring our food prep area up to code and comply with County health and safety requirements for a community professional kitchen.

Through the generosity of so many community members, this event may have brought us within reach of what was still needed. There were ways to participate (servers, set up and clean up crews did an awesome job) other than the \$45 a ticket meal price, which was very reasonable, considering the all-you-can-eat delicious meal, so no one needed to feel left out of this exceptional community event.

Hudson Hill stumped us

Dear Editor,

After reading your Jan. 16 article, "Bolinas Stumped Ansel Adams," I could not help but think perhaps Hudson Hill had stumped many. The details may seem irrelevant to some, but out of respect to those people and places mentioned and unmentioned, I would like to offer some clarification.

I have reason to doubt that Ansel Adams took this photo from Horseshoe Hill Road in 1932. It is much more likely that it was taken around 1939, from what was then known as Hudson Hill Road. In addition, the article may lead readers to believe that the Mattos family were the original settlers of this area. There is much indication that many generations of local Miwok lived here. The land was also part of the vast Briones Rancho, then owned by Hudson. The turn of the century saw a wave of Azorean immigrants and their descendants arriving in the area. Manuel and Rose Mattos developed their dairy here in the early 1900s. This was more than 30 years after the 1880 History of Marin County described detailed accounts of early settlement in the area.

The Mattos family ran a dairy here for many years. Later in her life, Madeline Mattos Balzan returned to her childhood home and was the last of her family to reside here.

The Mattos Dairy is often incorrectly referred to as the Balzan Ranch or Dairy. Madeline's husband, Steve Balzan was a Bolinas farmer who turned to dairying after getting married in the 1940s. Though Steve ran dairies in Bolinas and over the hill, I have been told that he never milked a cow at the Mattos Dairy. I'm sure young Madeline milked her share, likely before and after school.

Warren Hellman purchased the property from the family, but Madeline continued to live here for many years. When Hellman passed away, he left the property to three individuals. The ranch is currently owned by Horse Trainer and Quantum Biofeedback Specialist, Gabrielle Mann, who leases a portion of it, including the hay barn, to Mann Family Farm.

We strive to respect those hard-working people who came before us, those who sustained and were sustained by this working landscape, who created a rich and diverse agricultural heritage. Thanks, Ansel Adams, for providing this image, which speaks for itself for all to enjoy. Thanks, Uri Korn, for discovering this photo, bringing it home and sharing the magic.

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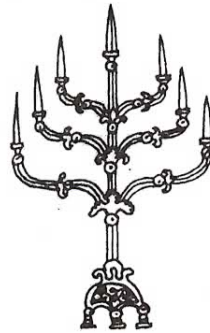
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2 February

Juno Februa/Candlemas/Wives' Feast Day/Groundhog Day



Festival of Juno Februa, the presiding goddess of the month, and Candlemas, the purification of the Virgin. The weather on this day is said to mark the progress of winter:

*If Candlemas Day be fair and bright,
Winter will have another flight;
If on Candlemas Day be shower and rain,
Winter is gone, and will not come again.*

Also,

*If the sun shines bright on Candlemas Day,
The half of the winter's not yet away.*

These sayings agree with those about Groundhog Day that link the length of winter to whether or not the groundhog sees his shadow on this day. An old northern English name of Candlemas is the Wives' Feast Day.

3 February

St Blasius

St Blasius or Blaise was one of the Fourteen Holy Helpers and is invoked in the case of sick cattle. The blessing of St Blaise for sufferers from throat disease is held to be most efficacious if performed on his patronal day. Above is a knot of protection.



4 February

King Frost Day

On this day in 1814, a fair was held in London in honor of King Frost on the river Thames, which was completely frozen over. The celebration of King Frost Day died out during World War I.

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
