MESA PARK BOARD MEETING February 10, 2014 7:00 PM Bolinas Firehouse

Call to Order: 7:07 PM

Members present: Dylan Squires, Jane Mickelson, Bryan

Lee, Patricia Hickey

Others: Angela Vernon, Jutta Hahne, Vic Amoroso, Erica McCray, Carol Johnson, Angela Calpestri

Community Expression: Erica McCrea, possibility of using MP as temporary location for pre-school site; Carol Johnson request to leave training tire in MP. Erica wants to know if one of the picnic tables from downtown park could be brought to MP for parties & picnics, or if a new one could be bought. [Angela] Those picnic tables are not that expensive. You could buy one for the park. Charles got the ones downtown. [Dylan] We should get at least one right away. We have enough in the account. [Bryan] We should get two. [Dylan] I'll contact the makers and see what it costs. [Erica] About the status of the up-grade for the playground. [Dylan] Go ahead with the work plan; I've gotten your budget. [Bryan] We budgeted for the wood framing/surround. It would be nice if it could be donated. In the interest of time we should go ahead and get the wood, clear out the old wood & nails. [Erica] The school portable is going in another direction, so I'll let you know next month what the status is. [Patricia] Did we put money in the budget for repairing the bleachers? [Angie C.] There's been a switch of the better bleachers at the old ball field over to the LL field. Some of the boards are okay but they're still going to need to be replaced. [Patricia] Get an estimate for replacing. That's a liability situation. [Angie C] We can get two estimates: replace all, or re-use the least damaged ones from the old field. We got the infield mix just before the rain. It's down, and needs to dry out. We need a harrow to finish the top. The mound: we didn't order mound mix because we didn't have enough workers to build the mound and we don't have any kids at the level to use the mound yet. But we want to share the field with teams that do use one, so it would be good option to get a portable one. I might be able to get a used one over the hill. A new one is about \$900. [Dylan] Maybe the Love field family might have a used one. I can talk with them about it. [Angie] I'll find out what the cost of mound mix & labor to build a mound will be. At the last LL meeting there was discussion about getting dirt for the outfield. Our kids are getting older and will be hitting to the outfield; it's a safety factor to have the dirt outfield. It's kind of loamy, sandy dirt. I'll find out more about it. [Dylan] We have discontinued the Alhambra water jugs until we can get a handle on how it's being supervised. [Carol] I have a request to temporarily keep a tractor tire at the park to use for training to climb Mt. Ranier. I have the means to bring it here, but don't know where to put it. I'd need to keep it there for 6 weeks. [Bryan] I think by the green storage shed] [Patricia] It would need to be secured when not in use, to keep it from being tampered with. You could lock it to the fence beyond the skate park, by the old bleachers. [Dylan] As long as it gets taken away at the end of your training. [Jutta] I want to talk about the cob oven. I was involved with the construction, and want to get it finished so it can be used. [Bryan] What else needs to be done to make it usable? [Dylan] The work table in back needs to be completed. We've had vandalism issues down there, and have decided not to install a sink. We need someone to step up and take responsibility for that. It can't just be left open all the time. The workbench is going to be finished; it's in the plans. Ask Roger about the project. [Jutta] I'll get this going in March.

Downtown Park:

Up-dates on DT park. [Dylan] I went on a walkthrough with Roger a couple of weeks ago. It looked clean. There weren't food stuffs, and the garbage had been picked up. The bathrooms need a steam-cleaning. [Angela V.] We should get a little steam cleaner. [Dylan] The water retention system is filling up. Eventually we'd like to hook the toilets into that. They hit water at 10', but went to 20'. They put in some gravel and hooked everything around to the back of the bathrooms into a cistern. It's going to pay for itself in 2 years, and eventually the only BPUD water will be for drinking. There'll be a solar pump that will move to the water to the cistern. The land behind is now a part of the park. Discuss funding for additional parkland design. Action Item: vote on funding [does not apply yet.] [Patricia] I've been in contact with Gina Brady at the County Council. She's working with the Sheriff's dept. We can adopt the 9 ordinances, and the CC is working with us for the written wording, and infractions would be a ticket. By next meeting we should have the copy. [Angela] Haven't done much maintenance this month, but in March the lawn will need a lot of redoing. There are a lot of dead areas. I'd like to install some topsoil and re-seed. We have a drainage problem. Major run-off. Some of the drainage pipes are above the soil so the water goes around instead of down into the pipes. They're too high and need to be cut lower. The soil would be about \$3-\$4 hundred for a thin layer. [Patricia] Arn needs a cart and a place to store it. [[Angela] There's a shed, but it needs to be cleaned out. [Dylan] We need to have Arn come to the meeting so we can discuss this with him. [Dylan] We also need to write out his job description and re-draw his contract and payment. [Patricia] We've had a request from Lions Club to put a memorial bench in the park in memory of John Nassrah. [Patricia] I suggest that we incorporate a memorial bench for John Nassrah into the DT park. [Bryan] I move that we allow the Lyons Club to add a bench in the DT park in memory of John Nassrah. [Dylan] I second. All Aye.

Maintenance Report: Lia at BCC wants to know about engineered ground/chips for small area behind BCC. Can they piggy-back on the chips for the playground? What is the cost? They don't need much.

Irrigation Report: [Bryan] We got our hearing on March 27th for Coastal Permit. Still nothing from the state. I've been meeting with landscape contractors, walking the field, finalizing concept for getting the water up here. Then we'll plan re-grading the soccer field. We're tying in to the old pipes. They'll need to be tested to make sure they're good.

Treasurer's Report: There should be enough for the playground project and the bleacher repairs. We received funding from Measure A (the Marin county sales tax for special districts). There hasn't been much maintenance charge because of weather. We're slightly under budget for DT park. Some of the Measure A funds should be allocated to DT park maintenance. It has to be spent during the fiscal year, not set aside for future expenses. Would like permission to close DT park savings account, it's \$20 month fee to keep it open, and we could put it into the regular, active account to save fees.

Up-date on election status: Final payment of election expenses to the county has been paid; we have the option to synch to Assessor Records if necessary. Jane met with Mathilda Leow for tutorial on parcel taxes. We've had three requests for the senior opt out.

BCPUD REVISED FARM LEASE-

For the past 8 months or so the BCPUD Sewer Ponds Land Committee has been working with the Murches to modify their farm lease of parcels located in the areas of the Sun Festival Site and below.

The members of this committee are: Jack Siedman-Board president, Vic Amoroso-Board Member, Jennifer Blackman- BCPUD General Manager. Community members- Tish Brown, Janine Aroyan, Ken Masterton, Jody Angel, Genie McNaughton.

There are inherent challenges in farming the upper sites due to access and slope issues. Along with this, the revised lease aims to preserve the public's long standing use and enjoyment of the trials which intersect the parcels. We have engaged the assistance of Jeff Creque, former Bolinas resident and Land Management Consultant to offer his advice which has been very helpful.

At the last BCPUD meeting I requested a period of public input to give people a chance to visit the site and read the draft lease. My hope is that the public will take an interest and see that all parties have compromised to allow a setting that respects both farming and public use aspects.

This is not about being against or for organic farming. We all support the hard work of the farmers. To me, this is about respecting how the farm and the public's experience integrate to enhance both. This is also about the BCPUD now being the stewards of a farming project in their jurisdiction and getting the tools to address the situations that arise.

WHAT HAPPENED MONDAY MORNING WEEKLY REVIEW 3/17/14 WRAP AND RECAP from Jenniepfeiffer

It was an inspiring gathering of thousands of people in Sacramento Saturday to speak out in opposition to Hydraulic Fracturing. It was a major Big Frack Attack. Mark Butler and I carpooled up together and were happy to join Howard Dillon, who had been on a full Marin Charter bus, one of the 24 or so buses from all over the state, some from as far away as San Diego to the south, and many communities to the north. It was a gathering to voice concerns about the potential danger of a process that drills wells down and sideways deep in the earth into shale deposits, takes clean water, ads toxic chemicals, (many undisclosed "proprietary" additives), and pumps it into fractured shale to force gas out and up to the surface. This is not a theoretical proposal. This is happening in California, has been happening for many years as well in Pennsylvania, Texas and other states. Many people think this is a miracle answer to our energy problems and that it is perfectly safe. Mostly, those are people who stand to make money, some of them very much money, by using this process and then selling this gas to Asian countries. There are also very many people who think this is an extremely dangerous procedure. Maybe it works in some places, or maybe the dangers have yet to come to pass, but the things I have read about it cause me great concern.

There were many very articulate people who were speaking out Saturday in Sacramento about the dangers of this process. Representatives of most all of the first nation tribes of California voiced concerns regarding threat to sacred water.

Concerned scientists were represented as well, speaking to the dangers of earth destabilization and potential earthquakes that could bring this toxic soup to the surface, as well as the additional concerns regarding emissions from the continued use of this gas and the impact of that on global warming.

There was an eloquent spokeswoman from the nurses union who talked about the patients nurses see who live in the areas where Fracking is taking place, patients who have serious health issues related to the chemicals used in this process. These nurses are asked to sign papers saying they are not allowed to divulge what the toxins are that are requiring treatment.

There were people speaking who said they couldn't be in their yards, much less grow anything, because the land around their homes has been so poisoned.

My thinking is this: every issue has two sides, and in this case, the strongest proponents are the ones who stand to gain in a very large way financially. The major opponents are those that have been damaged in some way, or feel duly threatened by this practice either due to toxic chemicals or seismic calamity. Furthermore, our Governor has declared that California is experiencing a water emergency so critical that households are asked to limit water use by shortening showers, minimizing flushes, not watering gardens, etc.; farmers don't have water for food crops, and fish hatcheries don't have water to ensure a healthy fish supply, yet the dubious business of fracking, which pollutes millions of gallons of clean water that can't be reclaimed or recycled, has not been questioned. How does this make any sense? This is not sustainable. This is why I travelled to Sacramento to add my voice to those calling for a moratorium on Hydraulic Fracturing.

Town events of note this week included the annual Bolinas Community Center membership meeting and delicious potluck dinner Saturday evening, with Board elections and "thank you" awards for the excellent volunteer work done on behalf of the community. Big kudos goes to Lia Sabbatini, manager, and Randi Arnold, marketing director, for their enthusiasm, good humor, competence, and diligence.

Also, I would like to congratulate Heidi Sandvoll on her 'Coming into Being' by way of large art; large in size, quantity, quality, and vision - so tastefully and artistically exhibited at the Mann Family Farm on Horseshoe Hill. All best, jp


