Einstein's Demands

In 1914, theoretical physicist Albert Einstein's marriage to his wife of eleven years, Mileva Maric, whom he had met as a fellow student at Zurich Polytechnic, was fast deteriorating. Realizing there was no hope for their relationship on a romantic level, Einstein proposed that they remain together for the sake of their two young sons, Hans Albert and Eduard, but only if she agreed to the following list of conditions:

1. You will make sure that my clothes and laundry are kept in good order

2. that I will receive my three meals regularly *in my room*

3. that my bedroom and study are kept neat, and especially that my desk is left for *my use only*.

B. You will renounce all personal relations with me insofar as they are not completely necessary for social reasons. Specifically, you will forgo

1. my sitting at home with you
2. my going out or traveling with you

C. You will obey the following points in your relations with me:

1. you will not expect an intimacy from me, nor will you reproach me in any way
2. you will stop talking to me if I request it
3. you will leave my bedroom or study immediately without protest if I request it.

D. You will undertake not to belittle me in front of our children, either through words or behavior.

Mileva accepted the conditions, but to no avail. A few months later she left her husband in Berlin and moved with their two boys, back to Zurich. After living apart for five years they divorced in 1919. That same year, Einstein married his cousin Elsa Lowenthal. Maric would never remarry.

(It should be noted that Maric was the only woman among Einstein's fellow students at Zurich's Polytechnic and the second woman to finish a full program of study at the Department of Mathematics and Physics. She was brilliant - there is controversy about the amount she may have helped her husband in his writings. Maric and Einstein had a daughter Lieserl in 1902 - she died in 1903 before their marriage later that year.)

In 1922, Einstein received news that he had won the Nobel Prize in November. His divorce agreement promised her his Nobel Prize money. Under the terms of the agreement, the money was to be held in trust for their two boys, while she was able to draw on the interest.)

A Love List – Eero Saarinen – 1954

Finnish-American architect and industrial designer Eero Saarinen (1910-1961), responsible for iconic buildings, chairs and other designs, is perhaps most noted for the Gateway Arch in St. Louis, Missouri, the seemingly gravity defying steel archway, which is the largest of its kin on earth. In 1954, Saarinen married art critic Aline Bernstein Louchheim; soon after the wedding, he wrote her a list.

I – FIRST I RECOGNIZED THAT YOU WERE VERY CLEVER

II – THAT YOU WERE VERY HANSOME (sic)

III – THAT YOU WERE PERCEPTIVE

IV – THAT YOU WERE ENTHUSIASTIC

V – THAT YOU WERE GENEROUS

VI – THAT YOU WERE TERRIBLY WELL ORGANIZED

VIII – THAT YOU WERE FANTASTICALLY EFFICIENT

IX – THAT YOU DRESS VERY WELL

XIII – THAT YOU HAVE A MARVELOUS SENSE OF HUMOR

X – THAT YOU HAVE A VERY VERY BEAUTIFUL BODY

XI – THAT YOU ARE UNBELIEVABLY GENEROUS TO ME

XII – THAT THE MORE ONE DIGS FOR THE FOUNDATIONS THE MORE AND MORE ONE FINDS THE SOLIDEST OF GRANIT (sic) FOR YOU AND I TO BUILD A LIFE TOGETHER UPON (I KNOW THIS IS NOT A GOOD SENTENCE)

WHAT HAPPENED

3-12-18 Monday Morning Recap
Week in Review from Jennie Pfeiffer

SCHOOL NEWS: The week started with a Bolinas-Stinson Union School District Board of Trustees morning long meeting Monday to discuss facilities. We typically call such a morning long meeting a Board Retreat, but I am always reluctant to do that because to retreat would indicate there has been a treat of some sort and this is a second, or RE treat. That is not the case here, unless one is a big fan of long meetings where opinions are strong and consensus is difficult to reach. There were some pastries and coffee/tea provided, a nod to "treats."

Facilities planning for now and the future, is the piece of our Strategic Plan that we have still to examine in depth, or actually at all. This topic has remained a big blank on our Planning document, because it brings up so many issues that collide with other areas of our Strategic Plan: curriculum needs; class configuration (based only on an idea of what future demographics might be, which is a problematical proposition); and the desires of staff to make improvements on ways to provide better services to our students. One might logically think that the more versatile our campuses are, the better for curricula goals and fluctuations in our school population. But what does that look like? Hard to agree on that and the other items of consideration, such as what to do about a Quesada Building remodel, updates for classrooms, advancing technology demands, outdoor learning space, and a stern look at what global warming induced sea level rise might portend for campuses sitting in a tsunami zone alongside a lagoon. What to do about that weighs heavily on me.

There is a lot to consider, including the push for better performance space, updated kitchen, and perhaps a gym. I have not been shy to voice my opinions on the question of a gym. I am not in favor of building a gym at school. I feel if our two District communities are to be asked to pay for such a structure with a General Obligation Bond, (voted down last attempt), it should meet the needs of those communities: adequate size for adults as well; adequate parking; located where the majority of families live for ease of use outside of school hours; placed where there is already other recreational activity with room for a pool and perhaps caretaker housing as well; and on high ground for use as an adequate emergency evacuation site - with multi agency cooperation. Instead, I would like to see us use the money we have in capital improvement set-aside funds partly to improve classroom availability and kitchen/staff room improvements at the Stinson Campus, with the majority going for modest remodel of the Quesada for eating space, assembly/performance space, and space for rainy day P.E. activity use. We will be talking about this more and opinions are always welcome. Our next meeting is tomorrow night at the Bolinas Campus Library.

MATTRESS REPORT: That mattress and box springs that someone left out on Overlook Road a week or so ago is not looking better after being out in the last few rains. It's starting to mildew, so if no one picked it up when it was fresh and nice, I'm pretty sure no one is going to want it now, so maybe rethink that plan and haul it away.

DAYLIGHT SAVINGS: My only words on this craziness are a reminder that trying to save daylight is futile and is like cutting the bottom off a blanket and sewing it to the top, thinking that will give you a longer blanket. Press on Regardless. jp

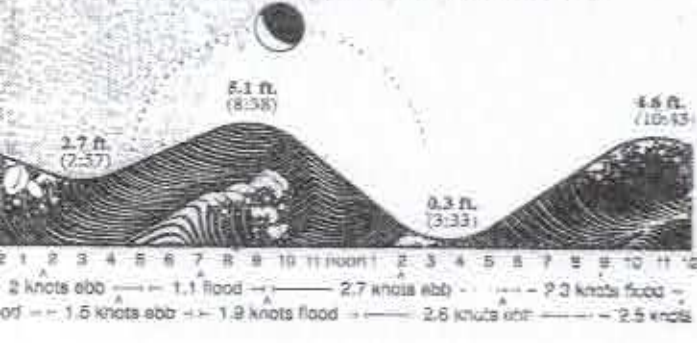

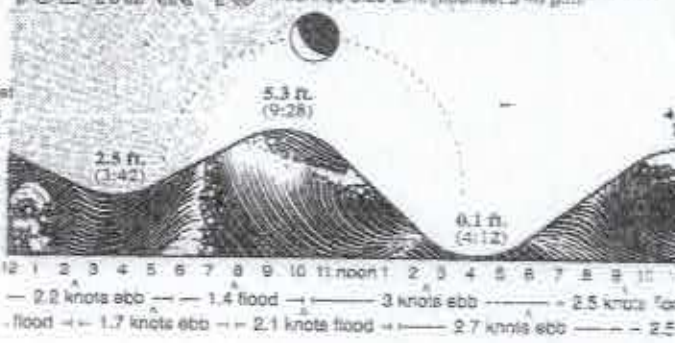
