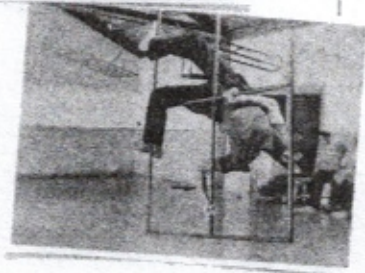
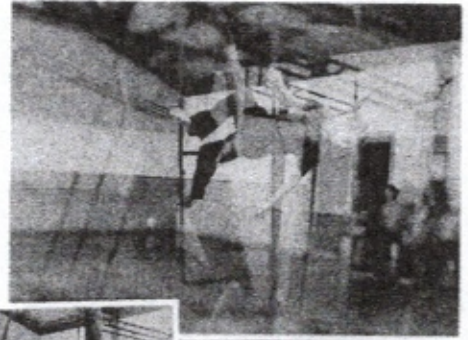

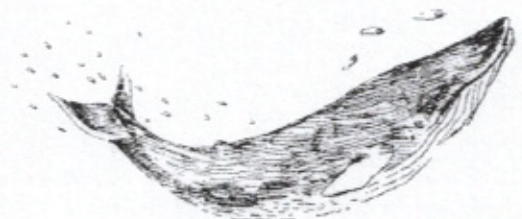

### Who is Dr. Bennet Omalu?

You are doubtless aware of the serious unrest occurring in Sacramento following an independent autopsy performed on 22 year old Stephon Clark. The autopsy showed that Clark, who was in this grandmother's back yard, carrying a cell phone, was shot eight times in the back by police officers. You may not know the remarkable story and credentials of the man who performed this autopsy, Dr. Bennet Omalu

Omalu was born in Nigeria in 1968, the 6<sup>th</sup> of 7 siblings. He entered school at 3 and went to Medical School at 16. After doing 3 years of medical service in Nigeria, he became disillusioned with the politics of his country and looked for further training in the U.S. He completed a fellowship in epidemiology at the University of Washington, and then went to work at the Columbia University Harlem Hospital Center in New York, completing residency training in anatomic and clinical pathology. In Pittsburgh he completed fellowships in pathology and neuropathology, gained a Master of Public Health degree in epidemiology and an MBA at Carnegie Mellon University. Omalu became the chief medical examiner in San Joaquin County, California from 2007 to 2017. He resigned after accusing the county's sheriff of repeatedly interfering with death investigations in order to protect police officers who had killed suspects. Currently he is a Professor at the UC Davis Department of Medical Pathology and Laboratory Medicine.

Omalu became interested in chronic traumatic encephalopathy (CTE) after doing an autopsy on the Pittsburgh Steeler Mike Webster in in 2002. He found 'tau protein' in the brain - that affects mood, emotions and executive functions. These findings had previously been seen

in boxers. He published his findings in the journal *Neurosurgery* in 2005. The National Football League called unsuccessfully for the article's retraction. Omalu published similar findings on at least 5 other NFL players who died in their 30's and 40's. He also discovered CTE in the brains of military veterans. In 2016 the National Football League testified before Congress that they did believe in a link between football and CTE.

A book entitled *Concussion*, by Jeanne Marie Laskas, was published in 2015. It was made into a riveting movie, *Concussion*, with Will Smith playing the part of Omalu. Omalu has written several books - his latest is *Truth Doesn't Have a Side: My Alarming Discovery about the Dangers of Contact Sports*. He defines contact sports as football, ice hockey, mixed martial arts, boxing, wrestling and rugby. Non-contact sports include swimming, tennis, track and field, volleyball, basketball, table tennis and badminton. Steer your children into these.

The name Omalu is a shortened version of the family name Onyemalukwube, which means "He who knows, speaks". Dr. Omalu became a U.S. citizen in 2015; fortunately before Trump's restrictions on nonwhite immigrants. He received the Distinguished Service Award from the American Medical Association in 2016 - its highest honor.

The take home messages for readers of this column - Protect your brain and your children's brains from repeated blows to the head. Even 'headers' in soccer are dangerous. The brain is what makes you - you. Keep it safe. ### Nature Notebook By Loretta Farley

April, named by the Romans from the Latin words "to open," perhaps alluding to a time of blooming, brings a set of somewhat overlapping meteor showers. In the next week, the Lyrid meteor showers will be active, from April 16 to 25. They may be seen in the late-night eastern skies, where the constellation Lyra, the Lyre, will rise by 11 p.m. The Eta Aquarids may be seen beginning April 19 all the way through May 28. The Etas are seen mostly before dawn in the eastern sky and are thought to be remnants of Comet Halley.

Whales and wildflowers are easy reminders of spring, but a more subtle shift in seasonal patterns is the presence of "by-the-winds-sailors," or *Velella Velella*, on park beaches. These masses of oval bluish and clear hydroid colonies are piled up in the tideline, looking like bits of crumpled cellophane. Normally, blown by the wind on the open nearshore waters as the spring winds change direction, they are pushed onto beaches and stranded. The blue portions are tentacles that hang in the water to extract food, which is mostly plankton. You might see gulls picking through the piles for snacks.

Fortunately, last year at his surprise 70<sup>th</sup> birthday party at the Community Center, Steve got to hear the many ways the town appreciated him. We will miss him. I miss seeing this sometimes gruff, but always good hearted man walking up Terrace with groceries, or with his wheelbarrow of digging tools -- usually wearing his yellow headphones connecting

him with a conservative base out there somewhere, a good example of how differing philosophies don't need to get in the way of being good neighbors. Thanks Julie Augustyn, for hosting this lovely event.

Saturday was all about art, with some impressive openings downtown. The Museum is showing work of three long time Coastal Marin artists. ### Bolinas wye no more in lagoon restoration plan

The county parks department is moving forward with plans to remove the shortcut road at the Bolinas wye and restore wetlands there to address roadway flooding, projected sea-level rise and habitat degradation. Meanwhile, the department says it will postpone finalizing two later phases of the project, citing high costs, the challenges of coordinating with landowner agencies and possible conflicts with existing ecological and cultural resources. Last week, the Board of Supervisors gave a green light to press ahead with the first phase of the North End Wetland Enhancement and Sea Level Rise Adaptation Project, which has been in the works since 2014. "Taken alone, phase 1 is financially feasible, has independent utility, requires the least amount of disruption to the environment and the community, and would result in the immediate benefits to the community upon completion," the parks department's report states. County planner Veronica Pearson said there were three alternatives in the conceptual design report for the second and third phases, but that the first phase is identical in all the options, simplifying matters. She also said the majority of the lands involved in the first step are owned by the county itself, while the other phases include other areas of the Wilkins Gulch Creek and Lewis Gulch Creek watersheds that are managed by the National Park Service. In particular, the second phase would alter the nearby Wilkins Ranch, which the park service protects as a "cultural landscape" due to its historic use as a working ranch. The first phase will take out the stretch of road connecting Highway 1 and the Olema-Bolinas Road and reconfigure their intersection. It will also include strategies to improve the hydrologic processes and connectivity of the Bolinas Lagoon and enhance fish passage in Lewis Gulch Creek, which floods the roads in rainy months. (The creek was redirected to run on the west side of Highway 1 and the Olema-Bolinas Road when the roads were built, though historically it ran to the east and directly into the lagoon.) The department may also upgrade a culvert under the highway, raise a small stretch of the Olema-Bolinas Road and add a bridge and a new culvert there so stream water can flow underneath it into the lagoon. The estimated design and environmental review costs will be \$500,000; the open space district has applied for a Proposition 1 grant from the California Coastal Conservancy for around half of that, with the remaining likely coming in part from Measure A funds. Construction, which Ms. Pearson said may start as early as 2021, could cost between \$5 million and \$10 million, which the staff report states will be covered with Prop 1 funds, federal grants and "any future statewide park bonds that become available."

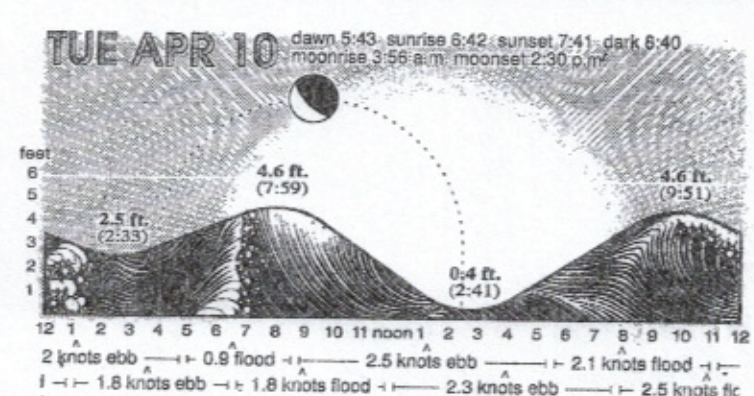
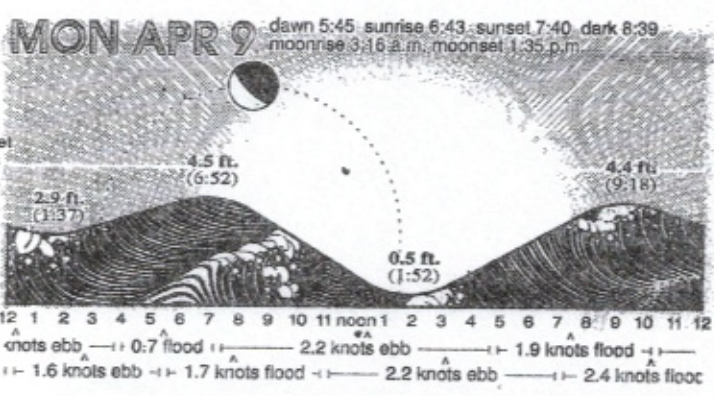

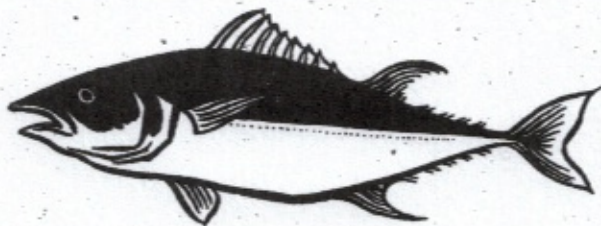
