The following procedure has not been certified or recommended by the recognized American medical community, nor has it been espoused or tested by the publishers of this personally tested and found to be a reliable method of disposing of insect bites. This material describing the methodology is being provided at personal expense and cost free.

I am an 82 year male Caucasian and have lived with a mosquito threat for more than 25 years every night. The mosquito's breeding habitat was about one quarter of a mile from where I dwelt. The following is the first procedure:

Find the area of the bite, have a container that you can boil water in which will stay very hot for at least a few minutes, boiling is the best. Use a tablespoon or teaspoon and submerge the bowl end of the spoon until thoroughly heated, then holding the cool end of the spoon just out of the boiling water, gently pat the raised and/or red area of the insect bite, pat it lightly until you can, or are able to withstand the pain incurred by the hot spoon. It isn't necessary to burn yourself or raise a blister. Pay careful attention to the exact placement of the spoon, try to focus on the area and it will be less painful; much less if you do this rather than having someone else do it.

I have used this method many hundreds of times over 20 years: it is my carefully monitored conclusion that the microorganisms that the insect carries into the bitten zone do not survive the intense heat. It is better done sooner than later. Be gentle with this procedure, but firm as well.

It is conceivable that diseases such as malaria, dengue fever and yellow fever may succumb to this procedure. I am not suggesting that a virus may, but that too is conceivable. There is also perhaps the possibility that the material recovered from the insect wound after swelling is no longer obvious, that that material possesses potential as a vaccine as in smallpox vaccination history, since the moment of intrusion by "bite" or other means, alerts the autonomic system that carries the lymph and antitoxin to the compromised area. It is important, vitally so, that immediate application of this procedure be employed, for once the infection circulates beyond the original site, this procedure would be ineffectual. As some individuals are more or less able to endure pain the "moment" will be indeterminate. Certainly minutes count, and a deeper and or longer application can produce positive results; but that is an individual decision that can only be determined in that moment, a difficult circumstance. Let us hope that you, from this present material proceed and develop a new and effective method of treatment beyond onset and surface. The procedure works.

**Words for a Time of Troubles**

60 years ago, on December 1st, 1955, the course of history was changed when Rosa Parks refused to give up her bus seat for a white passenger and was subsequently arrested. For the next year, until racial segregation was deemed unconstitutional by the federal courts, a boycott of the public transport system, headed by Martin Luther King, took place. On December 19th of 1956, the eve of a historic victory for those opposed to such segregation, King prepared a list of guidelines for those soon to be re-boarding the buses.

Integrated Bus Suggestions

This is a historic week because segregation on buses has now been declared unconstitutional. Within a few days the Supreme Court Mandate will reach Montgomery and you will be re-boarding integrated buses. This places upon us all a tremendous responsibility of maintaining, in face of what could be some unpleasantness, a calm and loving dignity befitting good citizens and members of our Race. If there is violence in word or deed it must not be our people who commit it.

For your help and convenience the following suggestions are made. Will you read, study and memorize them so that our non-violent determination may not be endangered. First, some general suggestions:

- 1 Not all white people are opposed to integrated buses. Accept goodwill on the part of many.
- 2 The whole bus is now for the use of all people. Take a vacant seat.
- 3 Pray for guidance and commit yourself to complete non-violence in word and action as you enter the bus.
- 4 Demonstrate the calm dignity of our Montgomery people in your actions.
- 5 In all things observe ordinary rules of courtesy and good behavior.
- 6 Remember that this is not a victory for Negroes alone, but for all Montgomery and the South. Do not boast! Do not brag!
- 7 Be quiet but friendly; proud, but not arrogant; joyous, but not boistrous.
- 8 Be loving enough to absorb evil and understanding enough to turn an enemy into a friend.

Now for some specific suggestions:

- 1 The bus driver is in charge of the bus and has been instructed to obey the law. Assume that he will cooperate in helping you occupy any vacant seat.
- 2 Do not deliberately sit by a white person, unless there is no other seat.
- 3 In sitting down by a person, white or colored, say "May I" or "Pardon me"

as you sit. This is a common courtesy.

4 If cursed, do not curse back. If pushed, do not push back. If struck, do not strike back, but evidence love and goodwill at all times.

5 In case of an incident, talk as little as possible, and always in a quiet tone. Do not get up from your seat! Report all serious incidents to the bus driver.

6 For the first few days try to get on the bus with a friend in whose non-violence you have confidence. You can uphold one another by a glance or a prayer.

7 If another person is being molested, do not arise to go to his defense, but pray for the oppressor and use moral and spiritual force to carry on the struggle for justice.

8 According to your own ability and personality, do not be afraid to experiment with new and creative techniques for achieving reconciliation and social change.

9 If you feel you cannot take it, walk for another week or two. We have confidence in our people. GOD BLESS YOU ALL.

WHAT HAPPENED THIS WEEK

6/13/16 Monday Morning Recap from Jenniepeiffer

Well, I did say there would be no recaps for three weeks, but make that two. Leaving for vacation today, but had a couple of thoughts to pass on before leaving.

Wanted to say, while still reeling from news about that horrifying mass murder in Orlando early yesterday morning, with 50 dead and over 50 in hospital, that while some may say "guns don't kill people", I would reply that without an automatic weapon in hand at that bar in Orlando Saturday night, there wouldn't be 100 people shot and those 50 that died and their families don't care about the semantics of weather the guns did the killing or the person with the gun did the killing. There is absolutely NO reason to have automatic or semi-automatic weapons out in the general marketplace. My heartfelt sympathy goes out to the families and friends of those loved ones lost to them.

Responding to comments that our school is experiencing Math Fright Flight, I would say closer examination is necessary. Our students are right on target. An in depth report at Tuesday's School Board meeting informed the public that: between 2011 and 2015, 10 of 50 graduates went to private high schools with selective requirements that these students met, including math; of the 40 in Tam High, 34 placed at grade level or higher, 5 were placed in modified math classes mandated for their individualized education plans for special needs; 29 out of 40 have either completed or are on track to complete courses necessary for UC & CSU Universities. Of the ten 2015 Bolinas-Stinson graduates, there were 0 students that started in below grade level math, 2 students are in special needs modified math classes, 5 students are in grade level math (Algebra 1), and 3 students are enrolled in above grade level math.

The 8<sup>th</sup> graders graduating this week, have all tested grade level or higher except one student in special needs class. More information on this can be found on our school website. Our students do math every day in multiply ways and the negative comments on their school's math program does not help them build confidence, and as is well documented, confidence helps competence and competence builds confidence, and so it goes. As I have said before, it is best to nix the negative (it helps nothing) and promote the positive.

Sending out a very big thank you to Dave Cook and the staff of the Coast Café, along with John Glavis, for Monday's Community "páy-what-you-can" dinner. It is a lovely evolving tradition of every other Monday night at the Coast. It's served family style, and the time spent standing in line to move through the buffet gives a great opportunity to visit with friends. Back in 2 weeks, JP

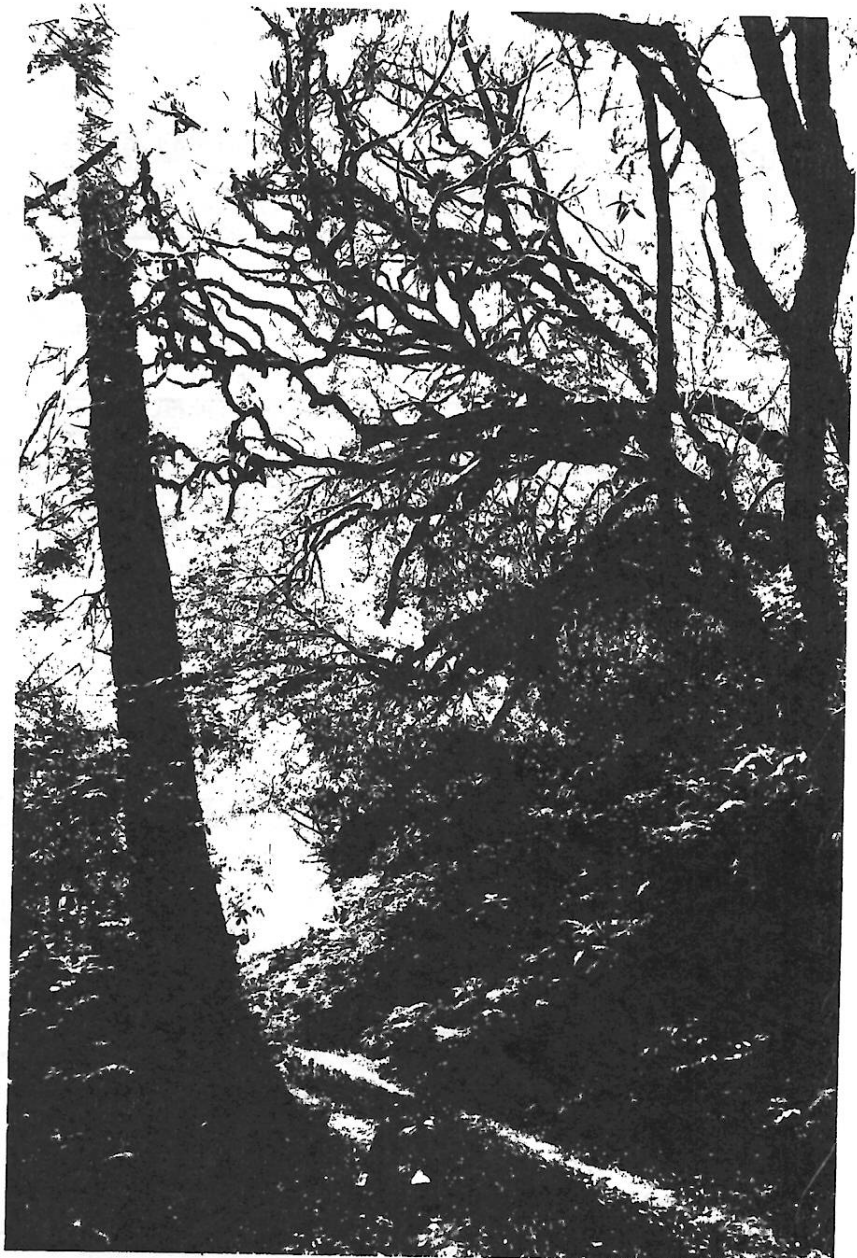

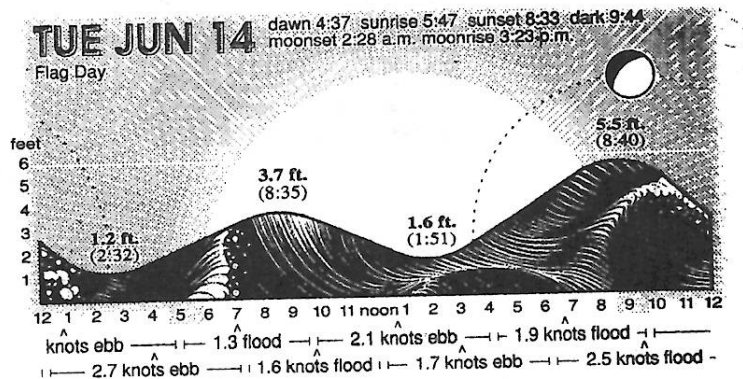
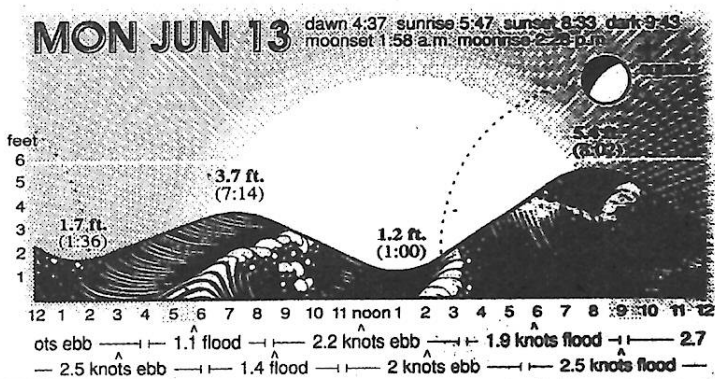

### 14 June

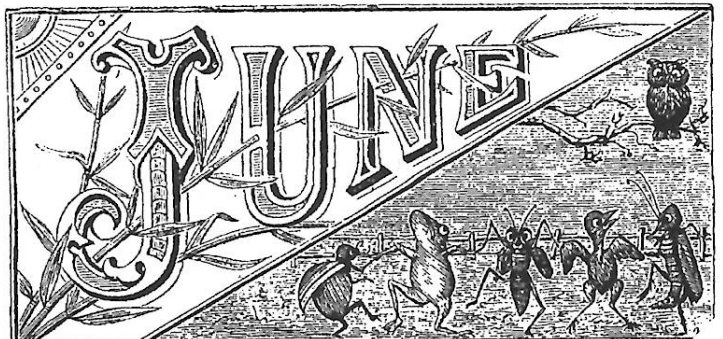
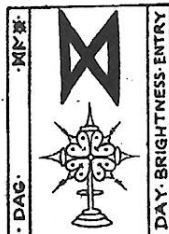
Vidar/St. Vitus/St. Dogmael/Runic half-month of Dag commences
