

Go to Health: Update on Calcium

Recent reports of an increased risk of heart attack in people taking calcium supplements have been very confusing. For years we have been told to take calcium pills to supplement dietary sources of this mineral. Here's the evidence so far. Calcium is critical for building and maintaining strong bones and teeth; it also plays a role in muscle contraction, nerve transmission, blood clotting and blood vessel flexibility.

A recent study in the Archives of Internal Medicine looked at 39,000 older women in the Iowa Women's Health Study, and found a small decreased risk of death among women taking calcium supplements. This contrasts with two studies from the University of Auckland (British Medical Journal, 2010 and 2011) which looked at the U.S. Women's Health Initiative and found that calcium supplements, with and without vitamin D, modestly increased the risk of a heart attack. The data are difficult to interpret, and more studies and further analysis is needed. A Canadian journal said "if 100 patients take calcium supplements, less than 1 will have a fracture prevented, and less than 1 will develop a heart attack or stroke." A small increased risk of kidney stones has also been shown in people taking supplemental calcium, but not with dietary calcium.

The Institute of Medicine concluded in 2010 that adults should get 1000 mg a day of calcium, and post-menopausal women should get 1200 mg. An adequate calcium intake is especially important in pregnancy and breast feeding. Girls ages 9 – 18 often do not get enough calcium in their diets due to a preference for sodas, fake foods and dieting. Supplements of calcium, magnesium and vitamin D as chewable tablets may be beneficial for them, as this is a critical time for bone building.

I conclude that it is vitally important to get enough calcium from our diets, and to use supplemental vitamin D if needed to raise levels of D to 30 ng/ml or higher. Good dietary sources of calcium include low fat milk products (think unsweetened yogurt and cottage cheese and nonfat or 1% milk), green vegetables (especially broccoli, collards, kale & bok choy), almonds, Brazil nuts, sunflower seeds, sesame seeds and dried beans. Calcium fortified soy milk and


orange juice can help vegans get enough calcium. Some tofu is high in calcium; read labels to be sure. People with osteoporosis should talk to their doctor or nurse practitioner about the risks and benefits of supplemental calcium.

Studies of men have suggested that a high intake of calcium from dairy products may increase the risk of prostate cancer, but the evidence for this is inconsistent. Men can consider getting a maximum of dietary calcium from non-dairy sources of the mineral.

A 2006 study from the University of Pennsylvania showed that use of proton pump inhibitors (Nexium, Prilosec, Prevacid and others) to reduce acid reflux is associated with an increased risk of hip fracture in people over 50, probably due to decreased calcium absorption and other mechanisms. Longterm use of these medicines increases the risk. Short term use is often indicated, but many people stay on these antireflux drugs for years. These medicines can also increase the risk of pneumonia, vitamin B12 deficiency and low magnesium levels. There are other ways of dealing with acid reflux, including weight loss, avoiding trigger foods and high fat meals, eating frequent small meals, and sleeping in a Lazy-Boy chair or with a wedge pillow if the problem comes on at night.

BRIEF REPORT OF THE BLTAC MEETING 6/1/12

All members of the BLTAC were present for this VERY IMPORTANT MEETING. BLTAC Chairman Ed Ueber was advised by the county liaison James Raives that ITEM IV would not be an Action ITEM as published on the 6/1/12/ BLTAC AGENDA.

Note "ITEM IV: Reorganization of the BLTAC (Raives) (Action Item): Accept changes to the Bolinas Lagoon communications and advisory process and forward recommendations to the Board of Supervisors."

This change in the BLTAC AGENDA by the county is in violation of the BROWN ACT. The BROWN ACT is better know as the Sunshine Laws: Keeping our elected officials and everyone that works for them HONEST. The committee was to vote at the 6/1/12 BLTAC public meeting to accept or reject the proposed county Resolution. The results would then go forward as an advisory recommendation to the Board of Supervisors.

Noteworthy is the fact that Diane Furst attended this meeting and gave great encouragement to the BLTAC committee members to fight for their right to exist as an effective advisory to the Board of Supervisors. She is familiar with our existing Local Coastal Program Unit I and had read the current proposed county Resolution that further diminishes the advisory authority of the BLTAC.

Following public comment the Chair then took up the proposed county Resolution and requested of the committee an Item by Item comment to approve or disapprove each Item. Disapproved Items were rewritten. The BLTAC went forward with straw votes that would result in the return of the full authority of the BLTAC to function as an effective advisory to the Board. Ed Ueber requested James Raives to forward the intent of the BLTAC, as expressed in the straw votes, to the Board of Supervisors.

A May 6, 2008 Resolution was previously passed and adopted by the Board of Supervisors. This Resolution was requested by west Marin Supervisor Steve Kinsey. This Resolution stripped BLTAC of its full authority as an advisory committee to the Board of Supervisors. The county has controlled the Agenda and the Item discussion of the BLTAC, not the Chair of the BLTAC, since May 6, 2008. Look it up on the Internet County Website. Why nothing has happened at the BLTAC meetings for 3 years is because the county controls all discussion of any possible Action Item brought forward by either a member of the BLTAC or the interested public.

The May 6, 2008 Resolution was inconsistent with our Local Coastal Program Unit I. No Notice was given to either the State Lands Commission or the California Coastal Commission regarding this Action by the Board of Supervisors. LAGOON POLICIES and BLTAC duties are clearly written in the LCP (see previous Bolinas Hearsay article). Look it up in the LCP Unit I in the Bolinas Library.

I requested of James Raives that the county provide the draft minutes of the 6/1/12 meeting in 3 working days from 6/1/12 and will publish those minutes as draft minutes in the Bolinas Hearsay.

Cela O'Connor, Bolinas Resident and Community Activist. Right now I am representing the Bolinas Community of marine wildlife, in particular the coho and steelhead fish that have no voice and need representation because there is none at the county level even though we have an active Fish Net 4 © Program under the leadership of the west Marin Supervisor. The survival of these fish in the Bolinas Lagoon watershed need the restoration of the lagoon to go forward, not backward.


Tomorrow evening will be a School Board meeting where there will be a presentation of the Facilities Needs Committee recommendations. I've been attending many meetings on this issue and have been listening to all the various thoughtful comments. Here are some of my feelings on the proposal to obligate our district to pay for construction of a gymnasium, and I am looking forward to input on this at tomorrow's meeting. Location, location, location. The school already has a joint powers agreement with Mesa Park for recreation growth i.e. gym. We could work together to share cost of building and maintenance. Could also cooperate with the Land Trust to put a caretaker cottage at Mesa Park to caretake the gym and other facilities there. 3 organizations working together gives better access to grants/loans/other funding sources

Here are some benefits for locating gym at Mesa Park:

- 1. Space for full size indoor basketball court/teen center
- 2. Community disaster shelter
- 3. more access for day use by the two communities as well as evening and weekend use by teens.
- 4. Clustering of recreation facilities; skate park, pool, fields, gym/teen center

Here are problems I see in locating a gymnasium on Bolinas campus:

- 1. school bears full cost of construction and maintenance
- 2. cost of demolishing working buildings to make room to construct gym
- 3. cost of upkeep showers? who cleans them? Summer use conflict with programs in place? Teens and adult use is much harder on campus buildings, could impact playground safety?
- 4. Earthquake/tsunami/flooding potential (we have had flooding in the past), would make use as disaster shelter problematic. Gym floors buckle when wet.
- Gym is putting adults' desires more to the center than the educational needs of the students. Hope to see you there, Jennie Pfeiffer

Venus to make rare sun passage

Venus, the lovers' planet, will slowly cross the face of the sun Tuesday in a rare passage that no sky watcher now alive will ever see again.

Astronomers call the event a transit of Venus; it last occurred more than a century ago, and another won't be seen for 105 years.

Just as they did during the partial eclipse of the sun that enthralled throngs of viewers on May 20, amateur astronomers, observatories and Bay Area science museums will all have their special solar telescopes trained on the fabled planet as it makes its dark transit across the solar disc.

A day before the transit, on Monday, a very different astronomical event will be on display when the full moon will be partially eclipsed by the Earth's shadow. No telescopes will be needed for the partial eclipse, and if skies are clear it should be visible everywhere. The moon will appear low in the western sky from 3 to 5:07 a.m., and the eclipse will peak at 4:03 a.m.

For the Venus transit, astronomers warn

once again that looking at the sun directly or through unprotected binoculars can be dangerous; it requires special solar telescopes; indirect viewing through pinhole cameras or extremely strong sun filters to avoid blindness.

This transit begins Tuesday at 3:05 p.m. and ends at 9:49 p.m., although it can't be observed from the Bay Area after sunset a 14.9 p.m.

Transits come in pairs

Despite their rarity, transits of Venus regularly come in pairs about eight years apart. But the first of this current pair, in June 2004, was not visible here; it was seen over large parts of Asia, Africa and Europe. The next two transits won't occur until 2117 and 2125.

Venus last moved across the sun in 1874 and 1882. Astronomers back then used their transit observations to determine for the first time the distance between Earth and sun—important for navigation and for calculating the size of the solar system. They gave that Earth-sun distance as 92.7 million miles, although today it's a bit more accurate—roughly 92.956 million miles.

The transit of 1882 also enthralled residents of the Bay Area and the West Coast. "Residents of San Francisco were noticed yesterday with a piece of smoked glass to their eye, looking curiously at the sun," The Chronicle reported at the time. It was, the paper reported, "a grand and beautiful spectacle."

Transits of Venus are so rare that there have been only 53 in

the past 4,004 years. Babylonians, the ancient Chinese and the Aztecs and Maya all saw the planet, but none reported seeing a transit.

Influential astronomers

Galileo was the first to observe Venus through a telescope, but it was Johannes Kepler, the astronomer and mathematician, who first predicted a transit — the one of


A British amateur named Jeremiah Horrocks became the first to both predict and observe a transit — the one of

During the transits of 1761 and 1769, hundreds and then thousands of scientists and navigators on expeditions around the world used the occasion to refine old astronomical calculations as well as old maps. From the 1769 transit, for example, California was correctly relocated about 350 miles east from where older maps had placed it.

Crossing the sun


