



# LEWIE LIKOVER

Lewis Howard Likover (March 23, 1947 - July 6, 2017) died suddenly late Thursday at the age of 70. Lewie was born in Cleveland. Ohio to Edward and Belle Likover. A graduate of the University of Chicago, Lewie had an extensive early career in social work in Toronto, Canada and in many facilities in Northern California. Lewie partnered with his wife Dr. Bobbi Likover to manage her dental practice in Bolinas. In addition, he worked many years for the Bolinas Community Public Utility District, lately on special projects. Lewie served as a lieutenant for the Bolinas Volunteer Fire Department. A fiddle, guitar, and mandolin player, as well as a talented composer, Lewie brought joy to all who were fortunate enough to sing along and tap their feet to his melodies and harmonies. He played monthly with the Celtic band, Midnight on the Water at Smiley's Saloon. An avid chess player and talented in languages, Lewie was also an active birder and mushroom hunter in his beloved town of Bolinas. Lewie was a devoted and loving husband, father, brother, son and friend. He will be deeply missed by his wife Bobbi, sons Joshua and Kale, 97-year old mother Belle, brother Joe (Amy) Likover of San Rafael, sisters Terry (Hans) Moen, Rachel (Scott) Likover, and his many friends. · ways to combat all that sitting



# HERMAN BERLANDT 1922 to 2017

Bolinas Hearsay News

Herman was born in Chelm, Poland, the town made famous in yiddish literature. His father emigrated to the US years before he came back to get his family. When Herman was about seven years old, his mother, older brother and sister traveled to a north German port and boarded a ship to New York. Like most immigrants at the time they reached the Statue of Liberty in the foggy early morning. We shared this experience. They moved into an apartment in the city, his father was a very good baker and supported the family. His mother stayed at home and raised the children and ran the household. They spoke yiddish at home.

The family had a piano and Herman loved to play it, but his father had to sleep during the day and the piano was removed or even destroyed. Herman never forgot this. When he was 12 years old, his older brother took him to a Shostakovich concert in the New York symphony. Herman was deeply moved and his great love of music began. When he was about 16 years old Herman left his family and struck out on his own living in various situations.

Eventually he arrived in California and attended UC Berkeley where he soon met and married a young art student. They had two children Konstantin and Nicola. After a few years, Herman left and traveled the world, spending time in Europe and on a Kibbuz in Israel.

After his return, he married again, a Scottish woman who worked as a photography spotter and also on Public Radio. They separated after a few years.

In Florida he met and then married a young woman whom many of us knew as Oceana (later Gloria.) They came to Bolinas in the early 1970s with their little girl Spring. I still remember Spring running around at the end of Overlook during a circle ceremony Herman and Oceana had organized. And then there was "Piazza Oceana" at Burnt Park. Was it Labor Day?

Herman did not remember when his language shifted to English. At the end of his life, yiddish or German words came back to him, sometimes in stressful situations and it was lucky that I understood them.

Poetry was his second great love. Sometimes, in earlier years, when I was late for a meal he had already written a poem about it. Until his last days when he stepped outside and saw a beautiful flower or cloud he would succinctly describe it in a joyous exclamation.

For decades, Herman wrote poetry every day. He published many chap- books on different topics and carefully illustrated them with cut- out images he had gathered.

He started the National Poetry Association. For ten years, he put on poetry events in San Francisco which lasted for two weeks and ended with an

award ceremony honoring one of the major American poets. Among them were Robert Bly, Gary Snider, Lawrence Ferlinghetti and Maya Angelou.

He also published a poetry anthology of major poe called "Peace of Perish" with a foreword by Lawrence Ferlinghetti.

For many years, Herman ran poetry film workshops giving award screenings of the best poetry films from around the country.

As an editor, Herman published "Mother Earth News", a journal dedicated to poets from all over th

Each issue covered a different region of the world. Herman wrote to embassies and consulates from . different countries and asked them to invite their poets to submit poetry to his journal. Many did.

One dream Herman could never fulfill was the establishment of a National Poetry Museum in San Francisco. He had enthusiastic support from poets and politicians, but was misled by a funder who promised to donate the necessary means and then withdrew. Herman was very sad about this, but kept the dream of a center for poetry until the end of his life.

Except for his very last years, Herman shared about twenty years of his later life with his partner Verona a British actress whom many of us remember. One day they went to the Black and White Ball in San Francisco, dressed up using their flamboyant imagination and were chosen out of all the socialites to be portrayed in the San Francisco Chronicle.

I was very fortunate to spend the very last two years of his life with Herman. We had been friends throughout the years. About a decade ago, we collaborated on an Exhibit called "At the Brink of the World" at Judy's gallery with Herman's poems of Bolinas covering a whole wall and my photos surrounding them. The last two years were a blissful time. We would listen to the radio, talk, go for walks or to the Community Center where Herman could dance with joy. His little cabin was like a university filled with books and music. More than anything he loved me to read to him. Only once there was something even more wonderful: The moon was shining directly through his skylight. We had to stop and savor this moment.

Herman suddenly fell ill after Easter. We thought it was a virus and he would get better. Slowly we realized this might be the end. Nicola and Spring and their loved ones came from the isolated mountains of Northern California and from Italy. Nicola set up a tent right next to Herman's cabin.

Patrick was there. Dr. Anna came, even late at night, Hospice came, they are the most wonderful human beings.


Herman died on May 15, 2017. We were with him. He is survived by his two daughters, sadly, his son Konstantin died already years ago. Herman is also survived by several musical grandchildren and greatgrandchildren, nephews and nieces.


His memorial will be on July 16 at the Community Center, from 2 to 6pm. Please bring your stories, music and some food.


