## Testing of Food for Roundup to Begin

The U.S. Food and Drug Administration (FDA), the nation's chief food safety regulator, plans to start testing certain foods for residues of the world's most widely used weed killer, Roundup (chemical name - glyphosate). The FDA move comes after the U.S Government Accountability Office (GAO) pushed for such an assessment, and rebuked the FDA for not disclosing its short-coming to the public. The issue is important because the world authority on cancer, the International Agency for Research on Cancer (IARC) of the World Health Organization (WHO) declared the herbicide glyphosate 'probably carcinogenic to humans' in its latest expert assessment.

FDA officials dubbed the issue 'sensitive' and declined to provide many details of the plans, but they do state that they are considering assignments for Fiscal Year 2016 to measure glyphosate in soybeans, corn, milk, and eggs, and other potential foods. Soybeans, sugar beets and corn are commonly sprayed with glyphosate, the most commonly used agricultural herbicide.

Explorations in Jazz - Charles Mingus

Charles Mingus, bandleader and composer, enigmatic prodigy and self-described 'underdog' stands tall, and leading his men from behind the shield of his mighty upright bass hurls barrages of brilliant flashes of incendiary *appassionato* at a certain ruling class - which has held this country in its grip of supremacy for some centuries. He is righteously mad at that world - and music is his way of evening the score.

Wild as a wolf he casually remarks upon inspecting the gaping hole in the wall of his apartment, just after blowing it open with his shotgun, "*Not bad for not aimin'.*"

But reminisces from two former wives - one of them his widow - who sit side by side and warmly recall their time with him, tell a tale of a greater depth, of a fierce but gentle soul at heart.

His inscrutable artistic profundity is fully punctuated when after his death a massive hand-written score for 30 instruments named '*Epitaph*' was discovered in a trunk at Sue Mingus' home. She then completely devoted herself to producing for to the stage, which did occur at the Alice Tully Hall in New York City, June 3 1989, with Gunther Schuller at the helm as conductor. Mingus' magnum opus, a concerto that lasted over two hours, was a side-project that ran throughout his life with never an expectation of seeing it performed - thus its title.

This documentary is a compelling sketch full of starkly contrasting sides of one man - a look at another national treasure that the nation never knew.

Private companies, academics, and consumer groups are also testing for glyphosate residues and have recently claimed to have detected such residues in honey, cereal, wheat flour, soy sauce, infant formula, breast milk and other substances.

Since over 90% of corn and soy grown in the US is genetically modified to accept the spraying of Roundup, most packaged food contains these GMO crops. Vermont recently passed a law, effective July 1st, 2016, to require labeling of foods containing GMO products. However, this law was opposed by the food industry and a majority of members of Congress. They countered with a bill, just signed into law by President Obama, which allowed food companies to use QR codes instead of words on the package. A QR code is an array of black and white squares that can be read by a smart phone, after the application is downloaded. Clearly this revision of the Vermont law will make it unlikely that most consumers will know whether there are genetically modified products - generally from corn, soy and sugars - in their packaged foods. For many people looking for transparency and the right to know, this is a very distressing happening. Stay tuned, I will write more about this topic in future columns.

In addition, adjacent to that playground are fields for soccer and baseball; across the basketball courts is a lively skateboard park, where younger kids can enjoy watching the older and very talented kids strut their stuff. At the downtown part, there is a boat for climbing, sand, grass for running, a pizza oven, etc. Of course, we also live near/on several beaches, nature trails, lakes, a lagoon and bays. Bringing bulldozers, of all shapes and forms, is no way to join this lovely community. Bolinas thrives on compassion, not unnecessary development. It would be beneficial if the energy backing the building of yet another park could instead be harnessed for the building of affordable housing.

## **Bolinas Rod & Boat Club 52<sup>nd</sup> Annual Fishing Derby August 12-14**

The annual Rod & Boat Club fishing derby starts Friday morning, August 12 at 7:00am and runs through Sunday, August 14 at 3:00pm. Eligible fish can be caught by boat or on the shore off Bolinas and Stinson Beach. Last year's Derby Winner caught a 30 pound salmon fishing from his peddle powered kayak! If you know a boat owner, ask if you can join them; if you don't, come by the Rod & Boat Club at 83 Wharf Road during the Derby, and the Derby registration volunteers will try to get you on a boat. They will try especially hard to accommodate children registered by a parent/guardian.

The entry fee for the Derby is \$20 for adults, \$15 for teens 12-18, and \$10 for children under 12. The entry fee includes a free Derby tee shirt, fishing tackle, and entry into a raffle for baseball tickets and fishing gear. You can register at the Bolinas Surf Shop at 52 Wharf Road or on the days of the event at the Rod & Boat Club. A trophy and fishing gear will be given for the heaviest fish overall and for the top three fish for women/girls in three age categories and for men/boys in three age categories. Fifteen "Nice Fish" awards will be given at the weigh-in to the 3-8 year old participants who reel in a fish of any size. The other awards will be given out at the Award Ceremony at 3:30pm on Sunday, August 14; and the Raffle will follow at about 4:00pm.

This year the raffle includes a first prize of a 12 person Suite at the Oakland Athletics baseball game against the Seattle Mariners at 1:05 PM, Sunday, September 11, 2016. The Suite is next to A's Owners Suite and comes with two reserved parking spaces. The second prize is a rod and reel set valued at \$150. Each Derby registrant, volunteer and sponsor is being given a ticket for the raffle. In addition tickets are being sold for \$5 each (10 for \$40) at the Bolinas Surf Shop, and they will be available at the Rod & Boat Club registration desk during the Derby.

The Derby this year is being sponsored by 51 club members and Bolinas/Stinson businesses. Donations from the sponsors and raffle tickets go toward the purchase of Derby trophies and fishing gear.

Salmon, halibut, ling cod and rock cod are being caught in good numbers this season, so it should be a good 52<sup>nd</sup> Annual Rod & Boat Club Fishing Derby. Join us!!

I read the recent essay in the hearsay that highlighted some of the diverse positions about whether a playground should or should not be constructed downtown, either in burnt park or by the tennis courts. I appreciated that the essay shed light on the diversity of opinions, but I did not agree with the premise that being for or against the playground correlated to being for or against a community where children can and should thrive.

As a child of Bolinas, and also as a father of a child that was raised in Bolinas, I agree that this is an amazing place for kids to establish a strong foundation of what it means to be connected to a real sense of community, where everyone knows everyone's name, and where one's inner spiritual and physical health can thrive from the raw natural beauty of the place, the presence of sea, the food of these rich soils. One might even make the argument that the kids of the town thrive even more because of the absence of manufactured artifacts, because the imagination is part of engaging with sand, sea, blackberries, treasures of living driftwood, a necklace of shells. There is an unlimited bounty of riches that exist in natural form.

This does not mean that I personally oppose the idea of a playground. When I was a toddler here I and my toddler pals had an absolute blast playing on the macrame structure at the BPUD. It was really cool and really memorable.

For what it is worth, my position is as follows:

I support moving forward with it IF the design phase is central to the discussion and IF the final design reflects the unique characteristic of the town. For example, let the local artists design it (with engineering support to ensure safety). If it had adequate visual character and is comprised of natural elements, maybe even invoking the history of shipwrecks along Duxbury Reef or some homage to the Miwoks or other historical dimension, I am all in.

If, on the other hand, the proposal is to build one of these modern play structures with big unsightly plastic slides and colored plastic cubes and other unattractive design features, I would strongly oppose it and say let's just let the natural landscape be the ongoing source of wonder.

I have seen a bunch of kids grew up in Bolinas and it is nothing short of remarkable how incredibly balanced and healthy they are/ become, and also how philosophically attuned they are to the higher ideals of giving back something positive to the world. Certainly this is part of the natural landscape's osmotic infusion.

So, to me, the central discussion is, once again, what humble gestures of stewardship can be offered, and in this case welcomed/accepted, that also help the whole community to continue to celebrate and thrive.
