

George Winston A Solo Piano Concert

George Winston returns to the Dance Palace on Saturday,

September 5, a brilliant Grammy Award winning pianist with over 15 albums to his name, George Winston brings his stunning brand of solo piano back to Point Reyes. Enjoy a night of beautiful music as George plays classics spanning his 42 year

George Winston grew up mainly in Montana, and also spent his later formative years in Mississippi and Florida. During this time, his favorite music was instrumental rock and instrumental R&B, including Floyd Cramer, the Ventures, Booker T & The MG's, Jimmy Smith, and many more. Inspired by R&B, jazz, Blues and rock (especially the Doors), George began playing organ in 1967. In 1971 he switched to the acoustic piano after hearing recordings from the 1920s and the 1930s by the legendary stride pianists Thomas "Fats" Waller and the late Teddy Wilson. In addition to working on stride piano, he also at this time came up with this own style of melodic instrumental music on solo piano, called folk piano. In 1972, he recorded his first solo piano album, BALLADS AND BLUES 1972, for the late guitarist John Fahey's Takoma abel.

George is presently concentrating mainly on live performances, and most of the time he is touring playing solo piano concerts (the Summer Show or the Winter Show), solo guitar concerts, solo harmonica concerts, and solo piano dances (with R&B and slow dance songs). He is also studying the playing of the great New Orleans pianists Henry Butler, James Booker, Professor Longhair, Dr. John, and Jon Cleary, and he is also working on interpreting pieces on solo piano by his favorite composers, including Vince Guaraldi, Professor Longhair, the Doors, Frank Zappa, Randy Newman, Sam Cooke, Curtis Mayfield, Laura Nyro, Al Kooper, Dr. John, Henry Butler, James Booker, Jon Cleary, Ralph Towner, Arthur Lee, Milt Jackson, John Hartford, Oliver Schroer, Taj Mahal, Philip Aaberg, and others, to play at concerts, and at his solo piano dances.

Some Good News About Family Planning, and Some Bad News

The U.S. has one of the highest rates of teenage pregnancy in the developed world, with more than 600,000 teens becoming pregnant each year. Recent efforts to make contraception available, accessible and cost-free have made progress. A program launched by Washington University School of Medicine in St. Louis, Contraceptive CHOICE, enrolled over 1400 girls ages 14-19 who were sexually active, and followed them from 2007-2011. Teens were told about all methods of family planning, and instructed that long-acting reversible methods were the most effective. These methods were contraceptive implants, chosen most often by younger teens, and IUDs, preferred by teens ages 17-19. The program was free of charge. Findings were that the teenage pregnancy rate among girls in the study was 34/1000 teens, compared to 159/1000 teens nationally. The abortion rate of girls in the study was 9.7/1000 teens, compared to 41.5/1000 nationally.

Despite the success of the CHOICE program, there is hesitancy on the part of some parents and family planning providers, who fear that greater access to more effective contraception will encourage young people to have sex. Similar fears exist with respect to sex education in schools. Many studies have shown that this is not true. Other fears are based on the belief that long acting contraception such as JUDs and hormonal implants will cause infertility, which is also not shown to be the case. In the current political climate in the US, finding federal funding for family planning will be difficult. Private foundations funded the St Louis project. However, since contraception is provided free of charge in Obamacare, regional efforts to prevent teenage pregnancy are underway.

Legal Abortion in Latin America
Cuba, Puerto Rico and Guyana allow abortion upon request. Many
Caribbean countries have liberal policies. Since 2008, first trimester abortions have been legal in Mexico City, where they are provided free of charge at public health centers and

hospitals. Abortions are also available for a fee from private clinics. However, some Mexican states still have very restrictive laws and have jailed women for seeking or obtaining abortions. According to the United Nations, more than 500,000 Mexican women seek illegal abortions every year, with more than 2000 dying from unsafe procedures. Poverty and difficulty in getting to Mexico City plays a role in this situation. Uruguay legalized abortion in 2012. Prior to legalization, the punishment for having an abortion was 3-12 months in prison, while performing an abortion could lead to 6-24 months in prison. The new law, passed in 2012, legalizes abortion within the first 12 weeks, provided it is discussed with a panel of social workers and doctors, who will advise the woman on risks. The woman must then wait 5 days to ponder her options, and the last word is hers. The procedure is paid for by the country's universal health care. Colombia has also made abortion legal under certain circumstances - rape, incest, mental health of the woman, and serious fetal malformations, but the procedure is very difficult to obtain and most women still go the illegal route in that country.

Currently, in the U.S., many states are passing or planning to pass laws restricting access to abortion. Planned Parenthood is under attack for accepting money for the costs of providing fetal tissue to universities for stem cell research, and may completely lose its funding from Congress. This makes up about 40% of its yearly income. It should be noted that federal funding for Planned Parenthood is not for abortion care but for contraception, and testing for sexually transmitted diseases and breast and cervical cancer. What will happen as a result of this is the subject for another article. Look for a substantial increase in the use of misoprostol for do-it-yourself abortions. While this method is much safer than the coat-hanger abortions of the past, it is a tragic and infuriating development in the land of the free.

Bolinas couple keeps the love between dogs and their owners

When Cheryl and Damiano Ruggiero realized that some in Bolinas struggled to afford food and medicine for their dogs, they informally stepped in to help. But it didn't remain informal for long; soon enough, Cheryl was hunting for donations for Love Dogs for Life, her nonprofit and pet cause.

The organization comes to the rescue of owners in financial straits by paying for expensive veterinary bills or pet food. It focuses on West Marin and helps throughout the county, though eventually Cheryl hopes it will go statewide.

"Our mission is keeping families and pets together forever," said Cheryl, who herself has a pack of frenetic, curly-haired dogs. (Her black schnauzer mix, Luigi, graces the nonprofit's logo.)

Love Dogs is a big undertaking for Cheryl, who has worked as a civil rights and employment lawyer for 25 years and divides her time between Bolinas and her Los Angeles office.

The nonprofit has expanded from its humble beginning in 2009, when she sent last-minute emails and started GoFundMe campaigns for immediate surgeries. Even last year, it only raised \$2,500. Yet this past Valentine's Day weekend, Love Dogs pulled in \$12,000 at its first fundraiser at Judy

Molyneux's Bolinas art gallery. In total, the nonprofit has raised \$16,000 in 2015.

The organization has enlisted the help of two local veterinarians to stretch their funds. Mary Whitney at the Point Reyes Animal Hospital offers services at a discounted rate when the organization fronts the cost, and Rob Erteman at the Stinson Beach Animal Clinic is involved, too. And

at one Bolinas store, Uniquities, Barbara MacDonald sells the organization food at a 30 percent discount.

Still, allocating funding can become tricky; Love Dogs cannot meet the needs of every pet owner. It is likely to be confronted with the classic choice between helping either one very needy animal or many more in less dire situations. "We might have to say we have too many other dogs and cats to help," Cheryl explained. "I hope I don't have to be in that position."

Yet some sources of extra funding can impose cumbersome constraints. She's wary, for instance, of grants that prohibit operations on pets over a certain age. In real life, she said, there are almost always exceptions. She reviews written applications individually, preferring to make the tough choices herself for now. She envisions Love Dogs will have a board of directors some day, so that a group makes tough spending decisions.

Love Dogs has helped animals in other ways. As landlords, Cheryl and Damiano know how difficult it is to find a rental that allows pets. Insurance policies can include blanket prohibitions on stereotyped breeds. Love Dogs is prepared to help pet owners convince landlords to let them keep their animals, perhaps by footing a security deposit. The organization has also rescued four dogs. The first now called Pippin, recovered in a crib in Cheryl's office after a long trip from Sequoia National Forest.

The main focus, though, remains on helping people keep their pets. "The average person in our society, even in Marin, is struggling," Cheryl said. Love Dogs keeps animals out of shelters and with their families, and perhaps importantly, Cheryl mused, provides pet owners with "peace of mind."





Keep Conserving Water

The article below is from this month's edition of the Association of California Water Agencies newsletter. Clearly, long-range weather prediction is still a sketchy science.

Don Smith, BCPUD Board

El Niño No Drought Buster

Amid increasing reports that a strong El Niño is likely to hit California this winter, Michael Anderson, California's state climatologist, issued a statement Aug. 13 cautioning that El Niño is far from certain this winter, and even if it does arrive, it likely will not bring enough needed snow and water to Northern California.

"California cannot count on potential El Niño conditions to halt or reverse drought conditions," Anderson said in a prepared statement. "Historical weather data shows us that at best, there is a 50/50 chance of having a wetter winter. Unfortunately, due to shifting climate patterns, we cannot even be that sure."

According to the statement from Anderson, past years with similar forecasts of El Niño conditions provide little guidance as to what California might expect this winter. Of the seven years since 1950 with similar El Niño signals — the 1958, 1966, 1973, 1983, 1988, 1992, and 1998 — three were wet years, one was average and three were dry.


