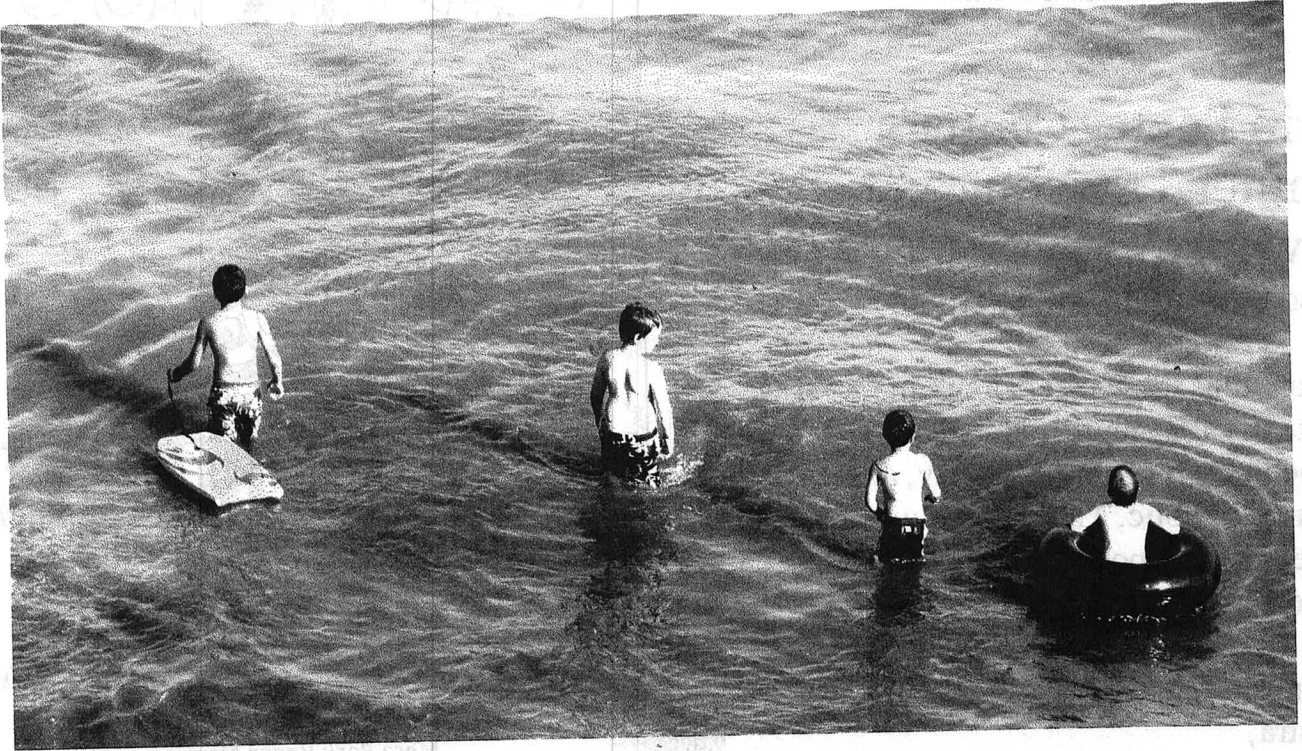

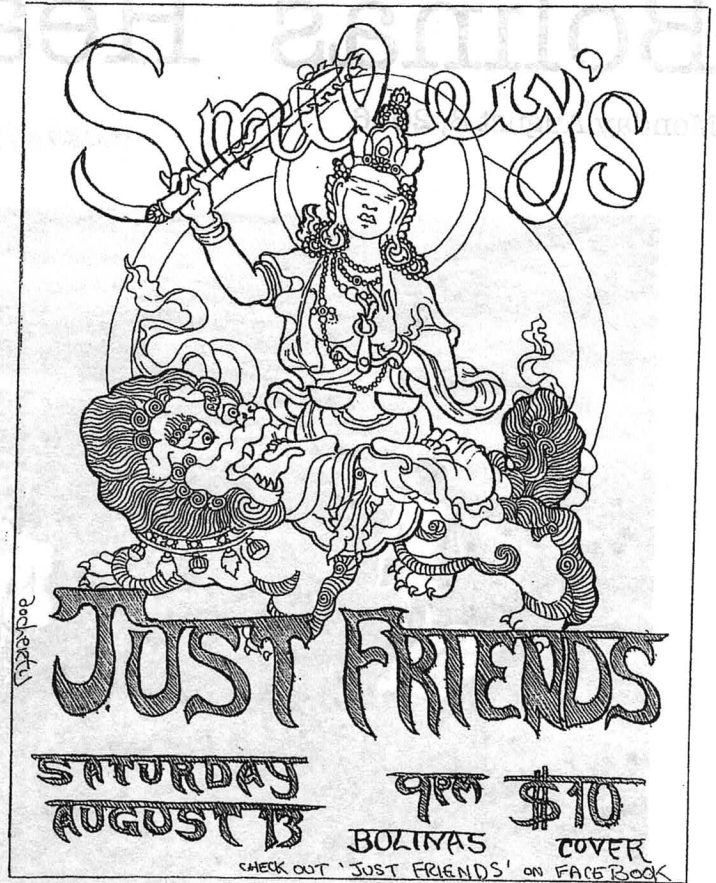

Marin Poetry Center was founded in 1981 by a dedicated group of Northern California poets as a non-profit organization designed to nurture an environment for the enjoyment of poetry and the spoken word.

Based at San Rafael's **Falkirk Cultural Center** (www.falkirkculturalcenter.org), we welcome new poets, established writers, as well as anyone interested in the art of the spoken word. MPC sponsors regular readings and workshops at Falkirk, many of which are co-sponsored by Poets & Writers. MPC also sponsors the annual Marin High School Poetry Contest, assigning poets to high school classrooms to encourage young poets. Another popular program is the annual Summer Traveling Show. From May through September over one hundred poets read at more than twenty venues in and around Marin County. In addition, MPC publishes outstanding poets in its annual Marin Poetry Center Anthology as well as in other special edition volumes from time to time.

**Explorations in Jazz – “
Lyricism”...**

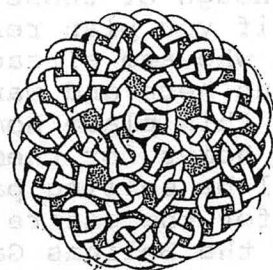
... not only by vocalists, but instrumental pieces that 'tell a story'. You might have heard somewhere of one jazzman saying to another, "You ain't sayin' nothin' man, you're just blowin' – *you got to tell a story!*" But how do you 'tell a story' without words? Well, that's what we're going to explore this time around by listening to some of the most lyrical music I know of, that in my estimation does just that. I'm queuing up pieces by Coltrane, Wayne Shorter, Miles Davis, Monk and others who, like Mingus and Joni Mitchell did with 'Goodbye Pork Pie Hat' – which we heard last week – are able to move the listener into deeply felt emotion, either by voice or by their instruments alone.

But I'll feature some vocalists too – to cap the evening off I'll play a version of Miles' 'Freddie Freeloader', (from the *Kind of Blue* album) by four singers: Bobby McFerrin, Al Jarreau, Jon Hendricks and George Benson who put to words – syllable for syllable! – all the intricate solos in that piece, stellar improvisations by Wynton Kelly, Miles Davis, John Coltrane and 'Cannonball' Adderley, to sing out the narrative of – *"this cat named Freddie, who was a bartender,"* – a bartender who had no qualms about cheating the till to satisfy the thirst of his friends, and of course himself! It's an astonishing achievement by the lyric-master Hendricks, (that took me four hours to transcribe from the recording, by the way) and I'll project his sheer poetry onto the screen as the song's playing. It's a great feel-good piece that'll send us all out singing! Come on down. have some Kava tea and dig it.

In 1970 I was living in the Mission district, as part of the great mid-60's hippy migration to San Francisco.

By that time I had met a good man and settled down. And by that time, the glamour of city life was wearing thin. I was longing to find a simpler, more country home for myself, and for my unborn child--yep, I was pregnant.

So after much searching we found an old funky farm house in Bolinas, and after an exhausting day we packed up, crammed our last remaining items --which included two young cats, one big dog, a complaining ten year old, and various and sundry "treasures" --into a small VW, and at midnight made the trip across the bridge, over the mountain, and rolled into Bolinas, our new home.

I'll never forget stepping out into the night. We were met with stillness and stars--no sirens, no beeps, no screeches. We shook the cacophonous dust of the city off our feet and stepped into serenity.

Soon after, my daughter, Freya, was born. I wanted to get back to my painting--so when a young girl from N.Y.C. knocked on my front door asking if she could move into our attached garage, I immediately said yes--"fix it up, watch my baby three hours a day, and you can live there for free".

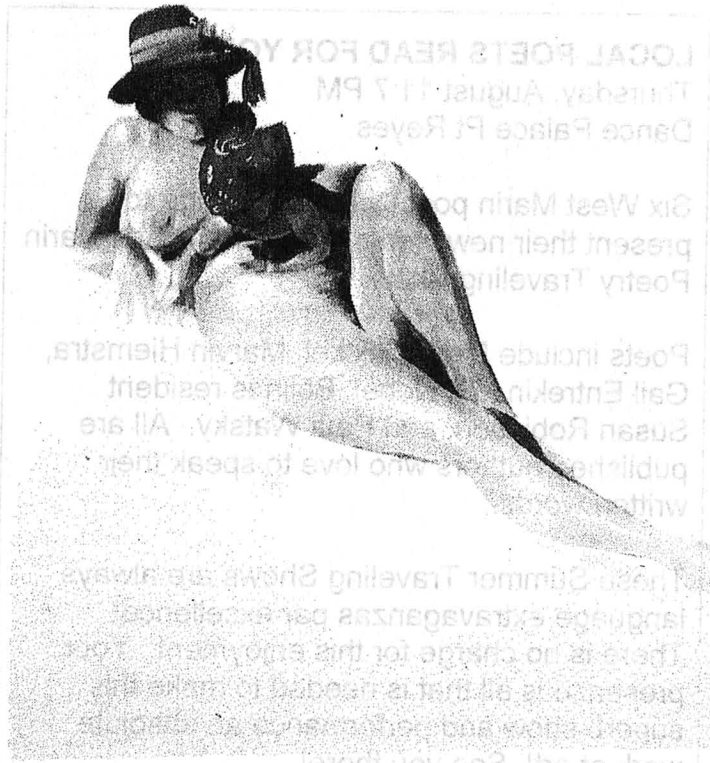
Some years later, that same daughter's boyfriend talked me into building a 10 X 12 (he ended up building two) so he could be close to his honey. His plan wss to move in--that didn't work out, but after the construction dust settled I found I had two shells to finish and two small places to rent.

So that's how I became a landlady.

I must admit I was tempted at a certain point, when money got low--as it seems to do--to transform my places into B & B's: with a little investment, some hard work, and, presto!, we'd be sitting on easy street. But I just couldn't do it. I had good people living in those small places, and they were part of my life and our community.

So today, 2016, I urge people to consider the option. Sure it's nice to make money, and I don't begrudge furnishing city-bound people a getaway in our lovely place--but we have enough of those. Consider, when and if you plan renovation, the folks who are already here, who grew up here and want to stay. They call this place home, let's help make homes for them.

"Mother and Child on Bolinas Beach"

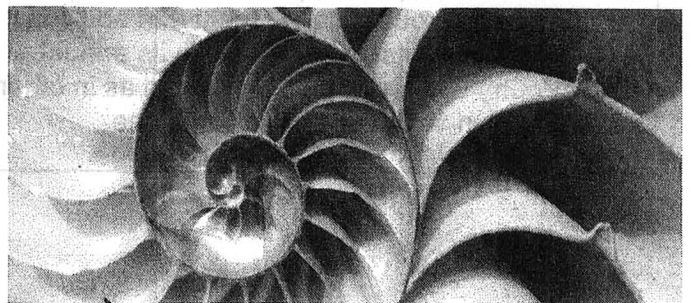

Rivals aren't on the same page on Pt. Reyes ranches

As lifelong environmentalists and supporters of agriculture in Marin, we were disappointed that in his July 26 column, Dick Spotswood stated that 4th District candidates Dennis Rodoni and Dominic Grossi both oppose the cattle-ranch lawsuit against the National Park Service, but he didn't clarify some of their differences.

Grossi spent over five years as president of the Marin County Farm Bureau, six years on the Marin Agricultural Land Trust board and has strongly championed the continuation of agriculture in the Point Reyes National Seashore. His support of our local food movement to provide fresh, healthy food to our Marin residents has been long term, as evidenced by his strong support of the Agriculture Institute of Marin and its project to build a permanent, year-round farmers market at the Civic Center in San Rafael.

On the other hand, Dennis

Rodoni's support of agriculture in the park has been tenuous. He has said so publicly, in an article he wrote for High Country News -- "Parks for the People -- not Profit." In his article, he criticized not only the Drakes Bay Oyster Co., but took U.S. Sen. Diane Feinstein to task for working to support the oyster farm's effort to extend its lease.

It doesn't take much to extend that view to include the seashore ranchers who also operate in the park trying to make a living and feed their families.

Rodoni's refund of a \$100 check from Huey Johnson, while showing sensible values, doesn't show support for the ranchers in the seashore, but rather it merely demonstrates that Dennis Rodoni is well aware that taking a contribution from someone known to oppose ranching in the park might reflect poorly on him.

Grossi, whose family have been ranchers for four generations, believes that the ranchers have nurtured their lands and protected the Marin landscape for over 150 years to the benefit

of the Point Reyes National Seashore, created only in the early 1960s.

Farmers and ranchers regard themselves as the original environmentalists.

Today, the survival of the ranches in the Point Reyes National Seashore is not only compatible with the park, but is essential to the survival of agriculture in Marin, including all the lands now protected by Marin Agricultural Land Trust easements.

Agriculture in the park accounts for about 18 percent of all of the agricultural production in Marin. Losing these ranches would be a devastating blow to all the service providers and the support infrastructure for all agricultural opera-

tions and related businesses in Marin.

Grossi strongly believes that the Board of Supervisors should stand with the ranchers, with local environmentalists and with the park service to ensure that sustainable ranching is protected in our parks into the future. Indeed, the current Board of Supervisors has further chosen to intervene in the lawsuit against the park as a strong demonstration of support for agriculture in the park and in Marin.

On the campaign trail earlier this year Dennis Rodoni was interviewed by Herb Kutchins on KWMR radio. When asked, "What role can the Board of Supervisors play in terms of this lawsuit?" his response was to

express opposition to the county's involvement in the lawsuit on behalf of ranching in the park.

Mr. Spotswood may be unaware of the public statements Mr. Rodoni has made regarding this issue. The issue is whether Rodoni and Grossi agree about the existence of agriculture in the park.

The fact that Rodoni returned a \$100 contribution to an opponent of agriculture in the park does not demonstrate the level of or reliability of commitment that Grossi has made to agriculture in the park and in Marin.

Grossi's commitment is unambiguous. The 4th District needs a supervisor who will make agriculture one of his greatest priorities as have both Gary Giacomini and Steve Kinsey for the past 44 years.

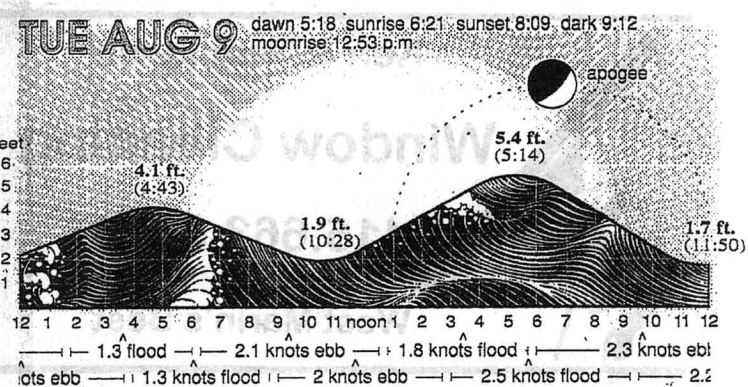
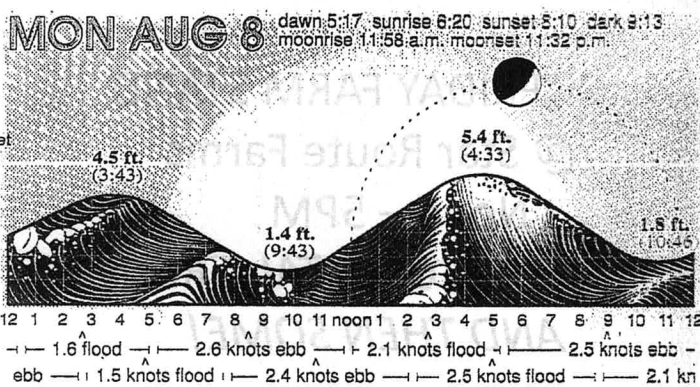

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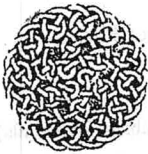
