

Go to Health: Food Politics 2012

Marion Nestle, a professor in the Department of Nutrition, Food Studies and Public Health at New York University, writes a blog called Food Politics, where she recently summarized her thoughts on 2012. Since it is an election year, she thinks that political leaders will postpone taking action on food issues that threaten corporate interests. More people are needing food stamps, but since these benefits make up the largest portion of farm bill expenditures, they are a target for budget cutters. Attempts to intervene on the childhood obesity issue, by taxing unhealthy foods and drinks, restricting their marketing to children, and mandating bold front-of-package food labels will probably be blocked by the food industry. PepsiCo lobbied Congress in 2011 to oppose new guidelines restricting food marketing to children, food and beverage labeling, and childhood obesity. Numerous other food and broadcasting corporations have made donations to members of Congress with the intent of stopping restrictions on marketing unhealthy food to children.

There is still insufficient funding for food safety: the FDA currently inspects less than 2% of imported food shipments, and 5% of domestic production facilities.

On the positive side, Nestle predicts that the food movement will gather momentum, with more young people going into farming, more farmers markets, farm-to-school programs, and school meal initiatives. (We can see this locally, and it's so important for everyone. Thanks to the farmers!) Nestle also has hope for local efforts nationwide to make healthier food more available and affordable for all. Nestle has a new book, "Why Calories Count: From Science to Politics" coming out in April. I will report on that in a few months.

NOTICE TO SURFERS IN THE BOLINAS CHANNEL

Bolinas fishermen have to get through a very narrow slot when heading out the channel. Especially during big surf, when they have to "thread the needle' to avoid getting dumped by waves. They wait for the right moment and then have to go full speed through the wave zone. The problem is, surfers are usually sitting in that exact spot.

If a wave breaks in front of you surfers, you can push under, or, at worst, get tossed around a bit. If a wave breaks in front of a boat, a fisherman may lose his boat, motor, gear, and risks serious injury.

In December, a Bolinas fisherman turned over when surfers wouldn't get out of his way. He veered away from them, but a wave caught him. He was lucky enough to get thrown clear and not end up under the boat.

One of the fishermen told me last week that one of the surfers was screaming at him because he came too close. I told him that the surfers just don't understand what's going on in the channel, that they're by and large good guys, and that if they understand what's at stake, all they have to do is paddle out of the way when a boat heads in (or especially) out. Just takes a minute. Ocean courtesy.

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




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Stinson Beach Tide Times (at tide station closest to Stinson Beach surf break)




