

MONDAY MORNING WEEK IN REVIEW 12-19-11 JENNIEPFEIFFER-RILEY

IT WAS A WEEK OF THE FIRST HALF OF THE 12 DAYS OF SEASONAL HOLIDAY CELEBRATIONS with lots of meetings and greetings and shopping.

MONDAY MEETING REPORT:

Monday; Mesa Park had their monthly meeting with all directors in attendance: Charles Whitefield, Biran Lee, Geoff Guepel, Patricia Hickey and Jane Mickelson. There was a discussion of both the Downtown and up Mesa parks. After all those mountains of earth moved around over the past months, there was, strangely, a bit of a dirth of dirt needed downtown and at the Up Mesa soccer field overhaul. It seems to have been worked out using scrapings from the accumulated buildup on the parking lot at Mesa Park along with truckloads of material from Resource Recovery. The field is being shaped & hydroseeded, with drainage installed along each side, for a nicely renovated Mesa Park Socccer Field, compliments of the County in exchange for the use of the field as a dirt staging area.

Downtown Park work is moving forward with tree work, ground work, electrical and plumbing, all needed for bathroom installation. Redwood Engineering is doing the ground work, and the stone work will be done with recycled sculptural salvage from dismantled works in other areas. The construction is being done in stages, as per financing. Work is about 25% completed. Patricia Hickey is to be the organizer of a parks and open space committee that is working to put in place a plan for trash collection and maintenance - how that might be funded with help from the County. As she pointed out, we entertain visitors from everywhere, and we are left to clean up after them. We need help with that.

Tuesday was a Hearsay meeting, with a full agenda: updates on the ocal Zone Phone Directory have started and Jen will be in touch with Franis; the "What's Happening" Calendar items should cover single, one day or weekend events, with entrance fee/time included, checked by day's editor; we will try having an answering machine, with a message that says we don't take messages, but that gives our 9:00 - noon M,W,F open times. We now have an email address through Michael Rafferty, so messages can be left that way; editor stipends are to be adjusted for parity; staff reorganization will be June & Ned on Monday, June & StuArt/Steve on Wed., and Kathleen, Michael/Jeff on Friday, with Vanessa taking over the kids' corner now that Una has left Bolinas; minutes with be printed as available, but paper size will not increased for minutes; Ned will get new recycling can; and we will try out taking on printing jobs for locals to help cover cost of our printer/press.

The monthly school Trustees' Tuesday meeting was held on Thursday this week, due to conflicts. The minutes will be posted in the Hearsay as available, and the monthly meeting for January will be the very day we get back from holiday's so agenda will be short. We will be discussing our increased enrollment and the potential need for another classroom on the Stinson site. We are in conversation with the preschool as to options for accommodating all our children's needs, including our youngest.

The very difficult news for education in our state is that the Governor did pull the trigger on more cuts, and there will be ANOTHER cut, \$248 MILLION, about \$54 per student.

The school's 1st Interim Financial Report and Revisions passed, we approved a new Board Sexual Harassment Procedure Policy, and the Board selected Arianne Dar to be chair for another year, and Nate Siedman will be Clerk this year. Next regular meeting will be Tuesday January 3rd, 6:30 at Stinson Campus.

George Winston Piano virtuoso

George Winston grew up mainly in Montana, and also spent his later formative years in Mississippi and Florida. During this time, his favorite music was instrumental rock and instrumental R&B, including Floyd Cramer, the Ventures, Booker T & The MGs, Jimmy Smith, and many more. Inspired by R&B, jazz, blues, and rock (especially The Doors), Winston began playing the organ in 1967. In 1971

he switched to the acoustic plano after hearing recordings from the 1920s and the 1930s by the legendary stride pianists Thomas "Fats" Waller and the late Teddy Wilson. In addition to working on stride piano, he also at this time came up with this own style of melodic instrumental music on solo piano, called "folk piano." In 1972, he recorded his first solo piano album, "Ballads and Blues 1972", for the late guitarist John Fahey's Takoma label.

His latest solo piano release is "Love Will Come - The Music Of Vince Guaraldi, Vol. 2" (released 2/2/10), which features compositions by the late jazz pianist, including pieces from the Peanuts® TV specials.

Go to Health – Vitamin D Update & What is it about Ginger?

Research from the University of Leuven in Belgium showed that the size of breast cancers at diagnosis was related to vitamin D levels. In their 7 year study, women with higher levels of vitamin D had significantly smaller breast tumors than those with lower levels. Patients with deficient levels of vitamin D, below 30 ng/ml at diagnosis, had a significant risk of relapse after 3 years. Patients who were not deficient had a lower risk of relapse after 3 and 6 years. Researchers felt that the antiinflammatory effects of vitamin D is the likely explanation of the relationship between higher levels and tumor size, though more research is needed to clarify the mechanisms.

Studies on vitamin D and prostate cancer have not been as clear, but it is known that men born in sunny areas of the US are less likely to develop prostate cancer than those born in an area of low sun exposure. As you know, vitamin D is formed in the body from sun exposure on our skin. The sun exposure research is bolstered by studies showing a link between blood levels of vitamin D and prostate cancer. The long-running Physicians Health Study found that more than 2/3rds of men had inadequate levels of D in the winter and spring. Among men who developed prostate cancer, those with low levels of vitamin D were more likely to have an aggressive form of the disease.

The take-home lesson here – get a 25 OH vitamin D blood test and take a vitamin D3 supplement if needed – your blood level of 25 OH vitamin D should be higher than 40 ng/ml.

You will probably need to take a vitamin D supplement for the rest of your life. With this simple step, you can reduce inflammation, help to prevent cancer, boost your mood, ease muscle aches, build your bones, and reduce respiratory infections. If your skin is dark, if you are African American, you are absorbing less vitamin D from the sun, and you may have a lower blood level. Be sure to check it out.

Ginger: In last week's column, I discussed the recent lecture by Dr. Jeanne Wallace and chef Rebecca Katz at Commonweal. They described spices

and vegetables that can play a role in cancer prevention, by reducing inflammation and inhibiting cancer cell growth. Ginger is on their list. This amazing spice is used in recipes all over the world because of its flavor and its bite. Studies have shown that it is a natural remedy for motion sickness, morning sickness in pregnancy, and the nausea of chemotherapy. Pregnant women often get relief from ginger tea. However, they should not take more than I gram of ginger a day as a supplement or powder. As ginger seems to promote more rapid emptying of the stomach, it may be helpful with gastric reflux. Ginger may interact with warfarin, as it also has anti-coagulant properties. It can also lower blood sugar and blood pressure, so talk to your doctor about these possible interactions, especially if you take ginger as a supplement. In most cases, use ginger as a culinary spice

Dear readers: if you have a specially delicious way you use ginger in the kitchen, please give me a call at 868-0493. The same is true for cinnamon, clove and nutmeg, which I wrote about last week. I would like to publish your recipe in a future column for the benefit of all.






