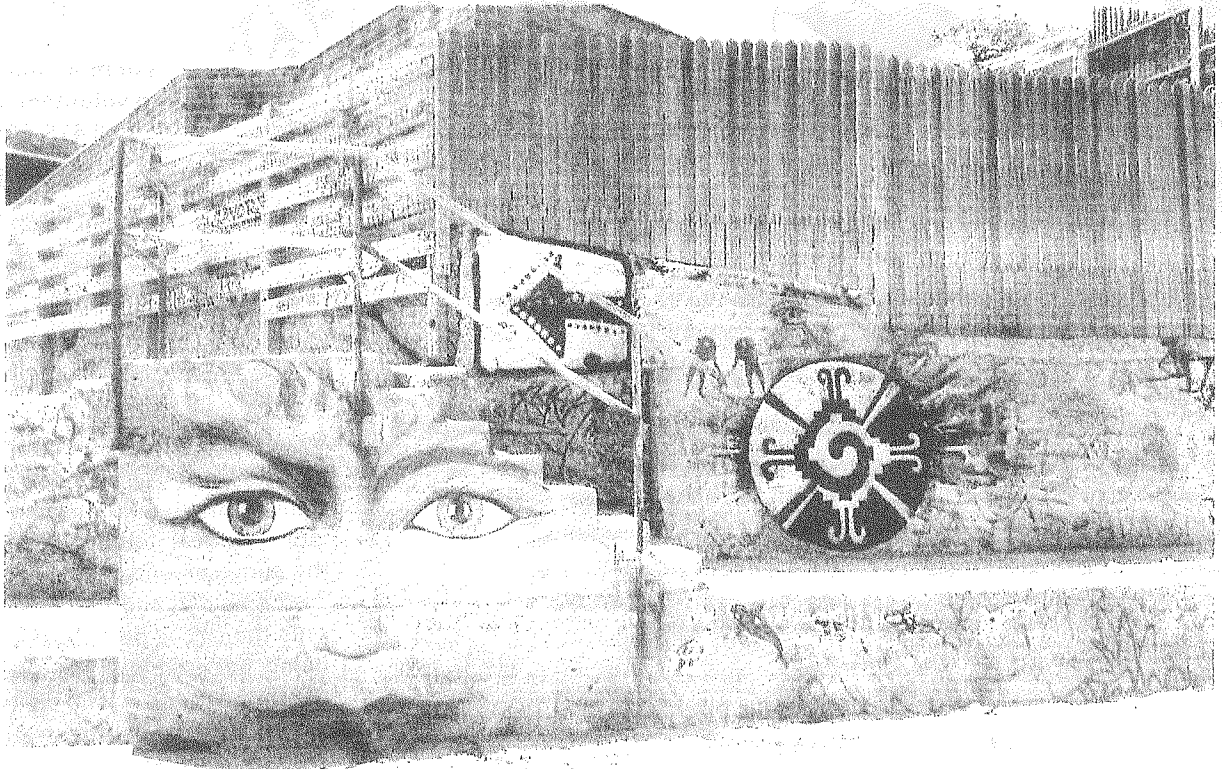

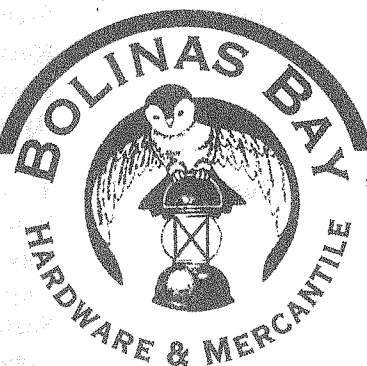

Go to Health: The Affordable Care Act, and what it means to you

In a dramatic and unexpected move, Supreme Court Chief Justice Roberts sided with liberal justices Breyer, Ginsberg, Kagan and Sotomayor to allow most of Obama's health care law to remain intact.

The mandate is a tax: The 'mandate' that everyone will need to buy insurance by 2014 stands under the taxing power of the US government. Anyone who refuses to buy insurance will be taxed \$95 in the first year, and subsequently more as time goes on, until it reaches \$695 or 2.5% of income, whichever is more. There will be subsidies for people who cannot afford insurance. Many uninsured people with pre-existing conditions will probably sign up quickly; if a substantial fraction of healthy young people also sign up this will enable insurance companies to charge less.

Those politically opposed to the Affordable Care Act (ACA) will advise the public not to purchase insurance under the plan, which could result in higher premiums for those who do. This dynamic has already started, and it will have a great influence on how the new law will work. Here's another way for healthy young people to think about insurance – their likelihood of having a heart attack and other chronic disease is low, so they can probably save money by just paying the tax. However, if they should have a serious accident (bus, car, motorcycle, extreme sport) or develop an unexpected illness, they may receive very expensive emergency hospital care, be ineligible for some important forms of treatment, and be burdened by large debts while trying to recover. Getting health insurance is a smart and prudent option.

New Medicaid provisions: New money is being offered to states under the ACA, to help enroll more people into Medicaid programs. If a state turns down the new ACA funding, it can still keep its current Federal Medicaid funds. Republican governors may want to turn down the new funds because of opposition to the ACA. However, hospitals and providers of care are going to pressure for acceptance of the greatly expanded funding in order to have more of their patients insured.

California is a state that will benefit from the new funding for Medicaid – currently there are 7 million uninsured people here, and this number of

uninsured is expected to fall by more than half by 2016 due to the new funds. There will be an increase in the number of people insured by Medi-Cal, and efforts by county and UC hospitals to improve their delivery of care. California plans to enroll more low-income seniors and people with disabilities into managed care. These plans must have a sufficient number of providers and be geographically near the patients. As this occurs, a big problem for California and other states will be to find enough primary care providers to care for more insured people.

Other provisions of the ACA: Coverage of children under 26 in their parents' insurance policies is already in force and is very popular. Starting in 2014, people with pre-existing conditions will be able to buy insurance. Insurance companies can't charge the sick more than the healthy, nor can they charge women more than men. Free wellness checkups will be part of all plans. Insurance companies will have to spend at least 80% of their revenue on medical care, which may limit their administrative costs and high executive salaries.

Insurance exchanges: By January 1st, 2014, states will need to have new marketplaces, called exchanges, where individuals and small businesses can go to buy coverage, after looking at a variety of competing plans, their costs and their policies. States will need to begin talking to a federal hub that's being created to help determine who is eligible for subsidies. By 10 days after the November election, states are supposed to report to the federal government on their readiness to set up the exchanges, and in 2013 get them ready. If a state does not comply, people can go to a federal 'fallback' exchange. To get a subsidy, you must buy your insurance through an exchange.

You may be happy to know that California is a leader among the states in working on having an exchange ready by late 2013.

The ACA is a start on the path towards healthcare for everyone. It is not as efficient as an expansion of Medicare for all, which would be like a single payer plan. It is extremely controversial, so I expect a lot of political fallout in coming months. Republicans vow to overturn the

Monday Morning Week in Review & Recap 7/2/12 from Jenniepeiffer

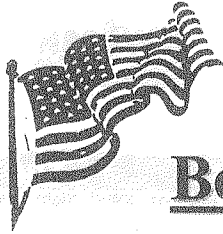
HERE WE ARE IN JULY, looking at yesterday's CANADA DAY celebrations in the rearview mirror already, and moving on toward our Bolinas style Independence Day events. It was a fine July first, with exciting European Cup soccer finals ending with a decisive Spanish 4-0 win over Italy, to the delight of some, but dismay and disappointment for the Italian expiates among us.

After watching such high quality soccer on TV, the turnout for Bolinas Soccer was high and the game was inspired, with Caitlin scoring a couple of beautiful goals for the light shirts, but ultimate domination on the field by the darks. After soccer, there was an opportunity to socialize with some of my favorite Canadian friends - good food, good music, and a beautiful round moon working its way toward full tomorrow afternoon in anticipation of a bright, moonlit 4th of July on Wed.

It's good to be back in town after a Chicago visit to my sister's for a family reunion. There was a large 50th birthday celebration for her daughter and son-in-law and many family members were on hand to consider in amazement the speed at which we now see having children who are turning 50 years old. I'm glad to say I am still a good decade away from that experience, but having a sister with offspring reaching the mid-century mark is unsettling enough. My best vacation story is that of all the cabbies in Chicago, we were picked up at O'Hare airport by a driver who regularly vacations in Bolinas. It is true that no matter how far you go, the Bolinas connection is out there, a surprise just waiting. Fortunately, we were on the shores of Lake Michigan in between heatwaves, so it was very pleasant to sit out in the back yard in the evening, playing music, watching fireflies - so magical.

We left Bolinas in a rush after the last School Board meeting of the school year; without an opportunity to report on the outcome of the Board decision regarding the possibility of putting a \$9million plus obligation bond measure on next November's ballot. The District had signed on with a company called Isom Advisors, a division of Urban Futures, Inc., to handle the particulars of this potential Bond measure. They conducted a phone survey (I have heard from many of you out there that you were not impressed by that survey) and the results were presented to the Board - 9 page, spiral bound, acetate covered document with colored pie charts and bar graphs - at June's regular meeting. Here are the conclusions: the majority of voters believe the District provides a quality education; half of the bond projects tested received over 55% voter support; support for the bond measure remained below voter approval threshold (51.9% with the "lean yes") after voters were given specific projects and costs; there was some tax rate sensitivity to all tax rates tested; Isom Advisors recommend that the District continues to assess the community for support of a local measure, but holds off on placing a bond measure on the November 2012 ballot, and looks toward 2014. The Board voted 4-1 in favor of taking this advice. I voted with the majority. The Board will continue to receive community input on this, as we work toward inclusive Universal Preschool in the District. As I sort through the comments I have received, I will write more about Community concerns and comments.

In other events of the week, Maitreya's Birthday Bash at the Community Center Friday night was delightful, especially the performances by participants of the young women's musical performance group organized by Sofi Rox and Sophia Rose. Quite wonderful - this is an amazing place to live. Jp

Notice of Board of Trustees Vacancy

There will be a vacancy on the Bolinas-Stinson Union School District Board of Trustees with the decision by Trustee Dar to not re-apply for a seat on the Board of Trustees.

Interested individuals may file a Declaration of Candidacy and a Ballot Designation Worksheet with the County of Marin between July 16, 2012 and August 10, 2012.

“If the number of candidates is equal to or less than the number of offices to be filled within a particular district, an election will not be held and the qualified person (s) shall be seated at the organizational meeting of the school district governing board.

If no person has filed for nomination, or is an insufficient number has filed for nomination, the governing board shall appoint any qualified person (s) at a meeting held prior to the day fixed for the election. Such appointees shall be seated at the organizational meeting of the school district governing board [Ed code §5328 and §5328.5”

FIRE SEASON? BUT IT WAS JUST RAINING!

How quickly we can go from gray, drizzly weather to the hot days of summer. Most everyone enjoys the days as they warm up but I worry. We have already experienced **2 RED FLAG WARNINGS** in June which is highly unprecedented. A Red Flag Warning is when several elements in our environment, including wind direction, temperature and vegetation dryness, are in perfect alignment for a severe fire. As the fire department tours the neighborhoods, we see areas of great concern. Many roads are overgrown with brush, which means, if a fire occurs, there is a strong chance we will not be able to access the area and you will have great difficulty evacuating if needed. We must provide for firefighter safety and sending an engine into an area with too much vegetation is like spraying a bon fire with a squirt gun.

We have great amounts of vegetation around our homes and encroaching upon our roads. A fire in this environment is extremely difficult to contain.

Do not be fooled by our gray, drippy days. Given a warm day or two with winds, Bolinas could potentially suffer a devastating fire. Look for us in the next few weeks as the fire department will be visiting neighborhoods to talk with residents.

Susan has compelling family reasons for her choice. She writes:

She has continued her involvement during her time at Commonweal, serving on the Director's Consumer Liaison Group and the Clinical Trials Advisory Council, both at the National Cancer Institute; the External Scientific Advisory Committee for the Duke Cancer Institute; and the Council for the California Breast Cancer Research Program. She carries our values back into the cancer research community.

Susan leaves Commonweal far stronger than it was when she arrived. I am pleased that Arlene Allsman will serve as Interim Managing Director. 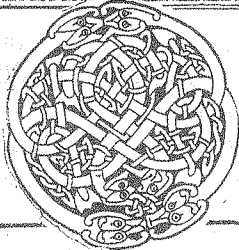
