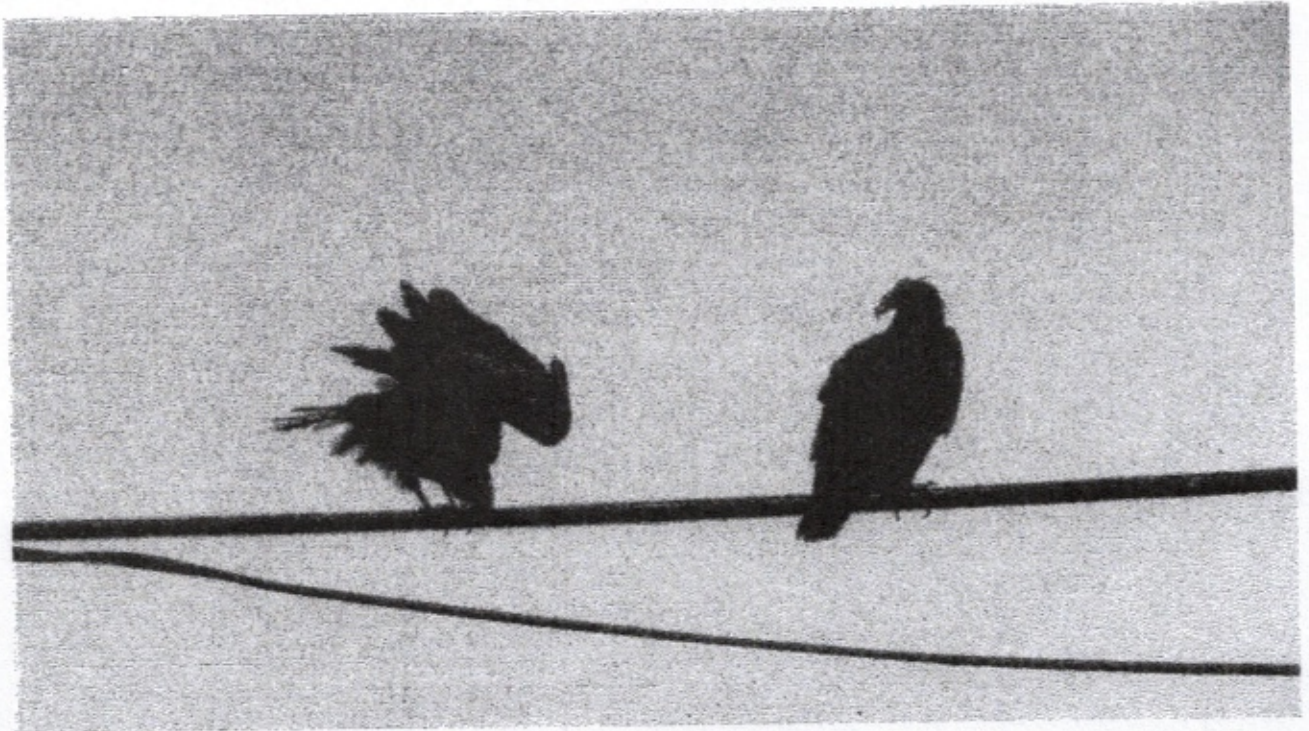

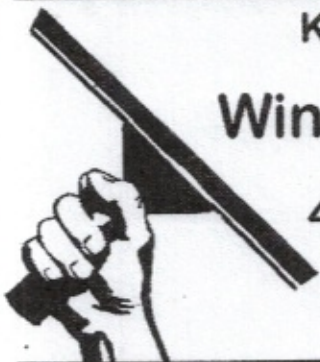

Dear Supervisor Rodoni,

Please vote against the Coastal Commission LCP update being presented to you April 24. You know I support environmental protection, but the language regarding agriculture is not going to help the environment. It will only undermine the well balanced agricultural innovations necessary to keep our farms and ranches alive...and will result in failing farms and the loss of sustainable diversified food production that we will be needing more and more in the near future.

Our Marin farms and ranches are increasingly rare in the big agricultural picture. They provide human food as well as wildlife habitat and open space corridors. Many ranchers and farmers are working with MALT and/or the Resource Conservation District to restore and protect riparian corridors. Loss of these farming practices will be an environmental set back that we cannot afford to allow.

My experiences on the Marin County Planning Commission and the California State Reclamation Board, as well as a riparian systems consultant for 20 years, taught me that diversified, well managed agriculture and biological diversity and protection CAN and WILL successfully co-exist.

Please vote NO and rally your fellow supervisors to do likewise. Reject the Coastal Commission language regarding agriculture in the LCP update.

Gun Violence and School Shootings

If you think you are hearing more about gun violence and school shootings, you are right. According to our Bolinas Assembly man, Marc Levine, every day in the U.S. almost 300 people are shot in murders, assaults, suicides, suicide attempts and unintentional shootings, and almost 90 people die as a result of gun violence. According to a new study from Clemson University in South Carolina, more people have died or been injured in mass school shootings in the US in the past 18 years than in the entire 20th century. This finding was published in the *Journal of Child and Family Studies*.

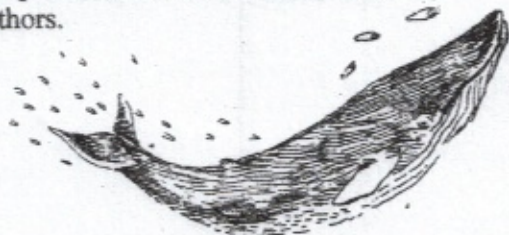
The recent killing of 17 people at Marjory Stoneman Douglas High School in Florida is not an isolated occurrence, but part of a deadly epidemic that needs to be addressed. During the 20th century, mass school shootings killed 55 people and injured 260 others at schools especially in America's Western region. Most of the 25 shooters involved were white males who acted alone, and only nine were diagnosed as suffering from mental illnesses at the time. Sixty percent of shooters were between 11 and 18 years old.

Since the start of the 21st century there have already been 13 incidents involving lone shooters; they have killed 66 people and injured 81 others. "In less than 18 years, we have already seen more deaths related to school shootings than in the whole 20th century. One alarming trend is that the overwhelming majority of 21st-century shooters were adolescents, suggesting that it is now easier for them to access guns, and that they more frequently suffer from mental health issues or limited conflict resolution skills.

The authors explain that such violence can be mitigated through deliberate and sensible policy and legislative actions. These include expanded background checks of potential gun owners, and a ban on assault weapons.

Mental health issues among adolescent students and adults should also be addressed more thoroughly. School personnel should also implement tiered models of support and school-based mental health services to support students' social, emotional, and behavioral well-being in order to prevent school violence.

Preventative efforts not only require policy and legislative action but increased and targeted funding across federal, state, local and private sectors,, according to the authors.



Our Assembly person, Marc Levine, our State Senator Mike McGuire and our national Congressman Jared Huffman and Senators Diane Feinstein and Kamala Harris are all actively in favor of gun control. WHAT HAPPENED

4-23-18 Monday Morning Recap
Week in Review from Jennié Pfeiffer

The week ended with a beautiful couple of days, allowing all the weekend Earth Day activities to proceed in sunny springtime weather. Saturday's athletic events at Mesa Park accommodated maximum kid and adult participation: little league games on the baseball field, and an adult Co-ed soccer league game on the beautiful grassy soccer field. After decades of playing soccer on dirt in the summer, dust in the fall, mud in the winter, and clumps of wiregrass in the spring, it is so lovely to have a green playing field. The Mesa Park Board continues to work to keep the Mesa and Downtown parks beautiful and available for full use - so many thanks to those volunteers.

Also on Saturday, there was a Spring Fling Uptown Block Party, with open house activities put on by the combined efforts of La Sirena Bo-Tique intriguing gift store; Bo Vida Café with their yummy salads and smoothies; Amanda Ross Skin Care, showing some beautiful new painting by Mary Siedman; and 11 Wine Bar and Bistro with Los Padres music playing in their outdoor eating area. It was a delightful spilling of patrons door to door and out into the street. The gas station has not gotten its spring face on yet. I would love to see some of our notorious graffiti artists putting their hands to beautiful work on that blank utility plywood that has been surrounding the gas tanks for months while waiting for enough dry weather to do repairs. It just cries out for some artists to make it beautiful.

Sunday, there were more sports and some birthday celebrants at the Mesa fields, more Earth Day activities in town at the Community Center and in Stinson at the North end of the Park, and a long late sunset, so delightful to see after so many rainy short winter days.

Midweek there were some meetings: a Wednesday Utility District meeting that I was not able to get to because of a family birthday; and Tuesday's monthly School Board of Trustees meeting, held at the Stinson Primary Campus this time. That means little children's size chairs - pretty torturously tiny after over 6 hours of Board meeting seating time. There was a large turnout, 20 or so people in attendance, which is way more than the two or three we usually draw. It was a long agenda, partly because it's spring and all the items that get pushed to subsequent meetings start stacking up on each other, and partly because of some student expression of discontent with the adults' handling of school issues that affect them. I always love hearing from students because that's why we all do what we do at the school, so to me those are the most important voices to address the Board. We for sure need to step up and listen. Our staff is dedicated to giving students the tools to read, write, and speak their minds, so when they show us that they can use those tools, we flat need to listen and appreciate the good job that's been done. I am eager to hear more from them.

Some of the Board action at the meeting included the approval for the hire of John Glavis as the Garden Consultant for our outdoor science lab, funding for continuation of our excellent Jump Start Program for Kindergarten Readiness, another year of our outstanding Summer School Program, and Election Consolidation for next fall's Trustee elections.
