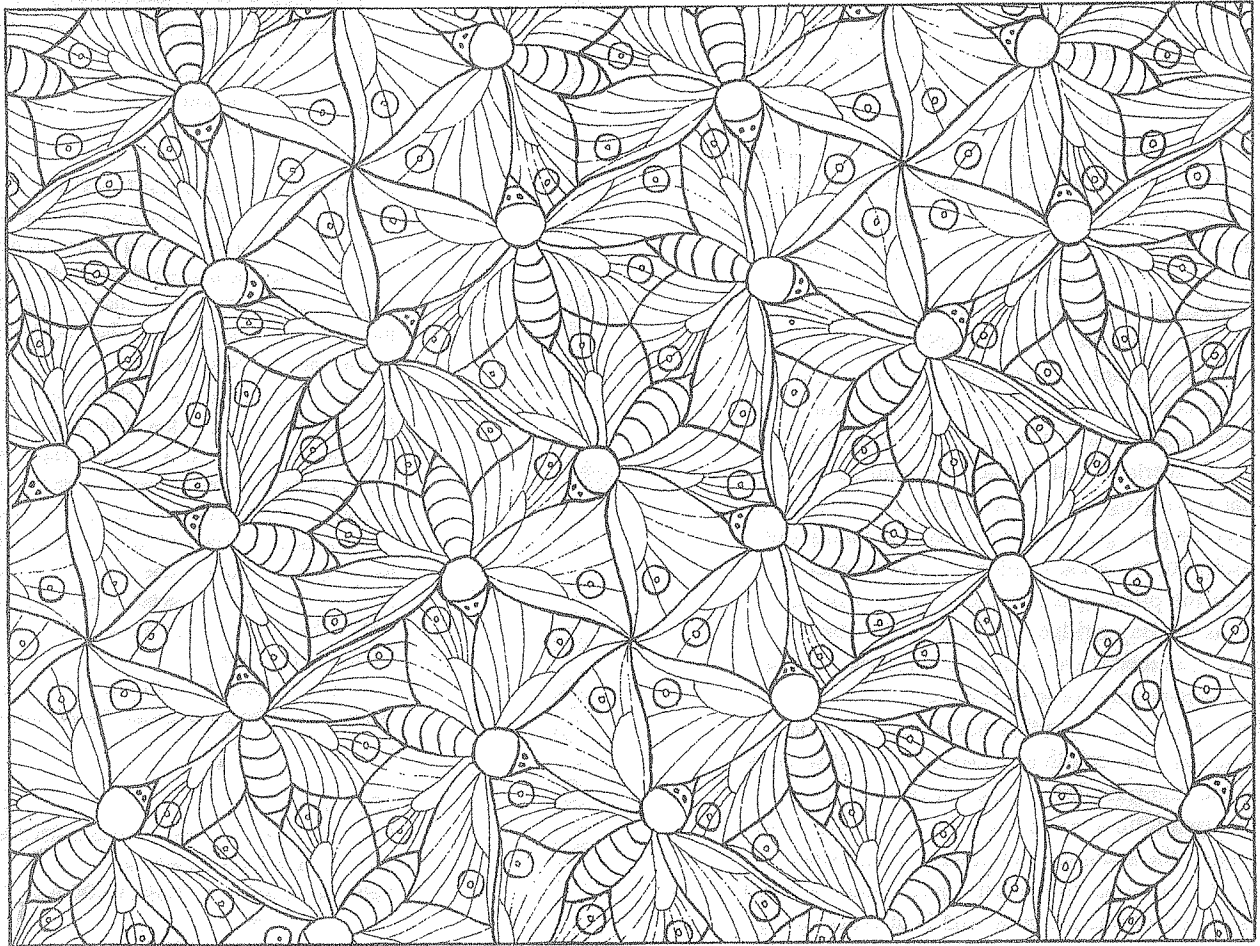

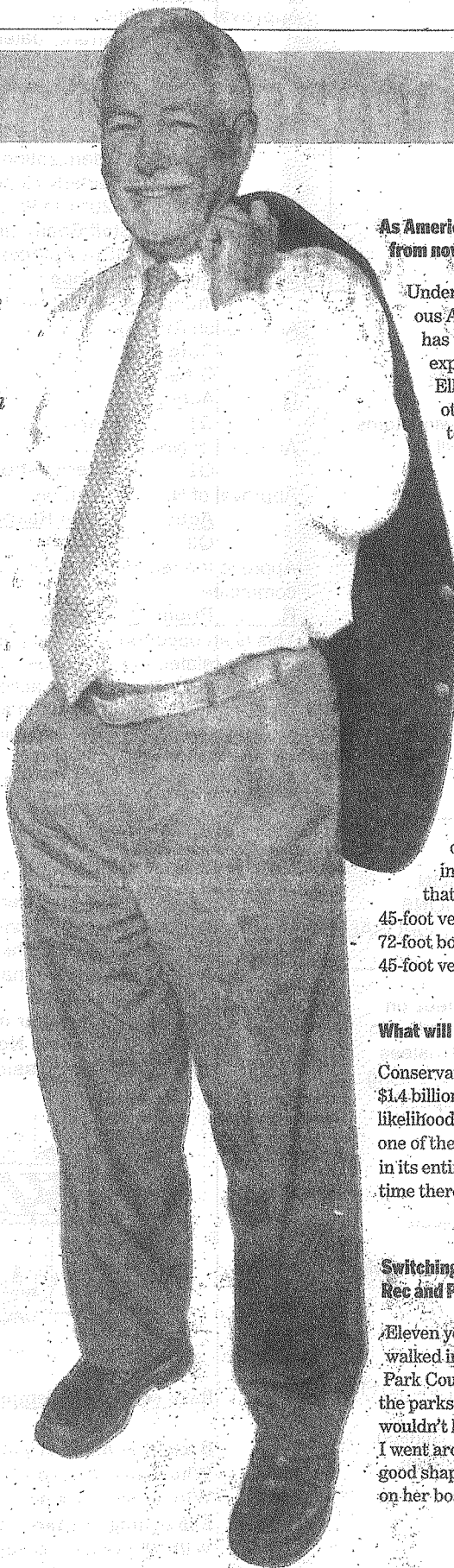

## THE INSIDE VIEW

### Mark Buell

*The primary organizer of the 2013 America's Cup in San Francisco — a boat race with the oldest active trophy in international sport — is also well-schooled in parks. He is the chairman of the board of the Golden Gate National Park Conservancy and a Recreation and Park Department commissioner.*



**As America's Cup Organizing Committee chair, what are your responsibilities from now until 2013?**

Under the agreement that was signed between Larry Ellison [winner of the previous America's Cup], the mayor and me, the America's Cup Organizing Committee has the responsibility to raise the money that The City would have otherwise expended to host the event, and to assist the Event Authority, which are the Ellison people, in introducing them to potential sponsors. There are a lot of other details in the agreement ... but the primary focus is to raise \$32 [million] to \$40 million and to help the Event Authority in securing sponsors.

**How are you planning to raise that kind of money?**

Right now, as in most large capital campaigns, we are in what we call the quiet phase. We're talking to major donors and we're talking to the Event Authority about revenue streams that could assist. I'm fairly confident that in the next six to eight weeks, we'll be able to demonstrate that we're well on our way to meeting our objective.

**When should locals start seeing changes?**

I call it the three-legged stool: One of the legs is raising this money. Another leg is the improvements to the piers that have to happen to accommodate the event. Ellison is going to be advancing the money to improve those piers to the tune of \$55 million. The boats themselves ... it's a big question. Ellison has picked catamarans; and they're the fastest boats on the water. There's very little professional experience racing catamarans in different environments. So what he's done is he's offered the eight teams that have signed up — including China for the first time and South Korea — 45-foot versions. The parameters of the design that Ellison has put forward is a 72-foot boat with a 120-foot mast ... it's a big boat. So to get sailors trained, Ellison has 45-foot versions made in New Zealand, and each team bought one.

**What will this do for The City?**

Conservatively, it's been estimated from an economic standpoint that it represents \$1.4 billion for the economy and 8,500 jobs. So it's huge. Frankly, there's a very good likelihood Ellison will win the race and keep the trophy here. So we'll do it again. But one of the most challenging things is that the race has never been seen from the shore in its entire history. This is the first time it will be seen from the shore and the first time there's ever been an event that involves the whole Bay Area.

**Switching gears a bit, was there an event from your past that prepared you for being Rec and Park commissioner?**

Eleven years ago, I was minding my own business when a woman named Isabel We walked into my office; I had never met her before. She chaired the Neighborhood Park Council and asked me if I would be the chair of the bond measure to pass for the parks. I thought it would take me no more than 15 minutes to get rid of her and wouldn't have to say yes. An hour later, I became chairman of the bond measure. So I went around town giving speeches about how important it was to keep our parks in good shape. Then, you could tell that my middle name was "easy" because I then was on her board of directors.

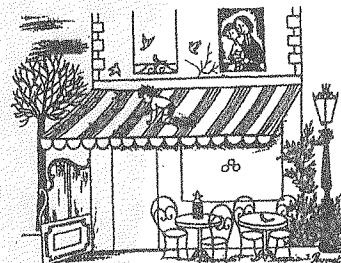

## Minutes for August 22, 2011 Bolinas Fire Protection District Board Meeting

Pres. Buchanan called the regular meeting of the Bolinas Fire Protection District to order at 7:30PM. Dir. Kimball, Dir. Smith and Dir. O'Donnell were present. Vice Pres. Kilkenny was absent. Also present: Chief Brown, Secretary Brown and Al Hettich.

MSC, O'Donnell/Smith (unan with one absence) to approve agenda.

### CHIEF'S REPORT

#### Mera

No update.

#### Prevention

BFPD/BCPUD Bolinas Road Access Update: Chief Brown reported that the BCPUD is moving forward with the Evergreen Road project. The Wildfire Hazard Notice door hangers have been completed and delivered to the fire department. These hangers will be distributed to high hazard properties and neighborhoods as needed. A brochure will be mailed to all residents and property owners regarding defensible space as soon as it is completed. Capt. Wall and Chief Brown met with Coast Guard representatives at the transmitter station on Mesa Road. They were given a tour of the facility, drafted response procedures and discussed potential training opportunities. She also advised them to place address numbers on their fence.

#### Grants

The District received an \$8,045 grant from the West Marin Emergency Services. Chief Brown plans to purchase high band portable radios with the funds.

#### Training

Chief Brown taught CPR to the Bolinas Stinson School staff on August 22<sup>nd</sup>. She reported that a modernization project was completed during the summer at the school which included the installation of a new fire detection system, new ADA accommodations and new carpeting.

Asst. Chief Marcotte taught the National Park Service staff the second day of the Haz Mat class on August 13<sup>th</sup>.

#### Disaster Council

Chief Brown attended the West Marin Disaster Council meeting in Point Reyes on August 11<sup>th</sup>. A major topic of concern was the upcoming America's Cup to be held in the San Francisco Bay in 2012 and 2013. The impact on coastal communities is an issue that will stay on the West Marin Disaster Council agenda. Coastal communities are expected to experience high tourist volumes.

#### Building & Grounds

#### General Operations/Administration

Surfers Overlook Repair/Terrace Avenue: Report to be given under General Business, Action Item #1.

Dir. O'Donnell requested that the Memorandum of Understanding between the BFPD and the Marin County Sheriff's Office regarding the administrative use of the station be reviewed by a lawyer. Discussion ensued regarding the necessity for review. After some discussion, Chief Brown agreed to contact Jennifer Vuillemet from County Counsel to review the M.O.U.

Pres. Buchanan inquired about a vehicle accident/fire he witnessed on the road side near the 13 curves area on Highway One. Chief Brown reported that the BFD responded to the accident and helped cut a "line" to prevent fire spread.

### GENERAL BUSINESS

Action Item #1: Accept Final Technical Report: Coastal Bluff Evaluation & Stabilization Alternatives Analysis, prepared by Sanders & Associates Geotechnical Engineers ("SAGE")  
Dir. Kimball reported that SAGE, the geotechnical firm hired to assess the repair at Surfer's Overlook, had their final report ready for the July BCPUD Board meeting. The report was accepted at the meeting. Sage included in their report a potential "in-kind" repair for the top of Surfer's Overlook for which the County could potentially issue a permit for without needing approval from the Coastal Commission. The longevity of the repair depends on the stabilization of the base of the bluff. Without concurrent repair at the bottom, which would require a Coastal Permit, the life of the repair at the top of the bluff might be as little as five years. With repairs made at the top and bottom, the lifespan of the "in-kind" stabilized bluff would be expected to be from fifteen to twenty years. After the acceptance of the report by the BFPD, GM Blackman of BCPUD plans to schedule a meeting with the Coastal Commission to pursue permitting options for the various repair alternatives included in the SAGE report. Possible financing for the repair was also discussed.

MSC, Smith/O'Donnell (unan with one absence) to accept final technical report: Coastal Bluff Evaluation & Stabilization Alternatives Analysis, Prepared by Sanders & Associates Geotechnical Engineers (SAGE).

Action Item #2: Approve check signers on the Bank of America Operating Checking Account

MSC, Smith/O'Donnell (unan with one absence) to approve all five BFPD Board members as signers on the Bank of America Operating Checking Account subject to the defunct names on the records being purged from the records.

Discussion: Emergency only access and egress alternatives to closure of Terrace Avenue and Overlook Road.

Chief Brown reported that she attended a meeting regarding the repair of the top of Terrace Avenue with representatives from BCPUD, the County and Mesa Park. She learned that the company plans to dig out 50,000 yards of cubic soil/rock from the slide and haul it to the soccer fields at Mesa Park for temporary storage. Concerns discussed included the hazards of moving trucks along Bolinas roadways, dust, and water usage. Use and or disposal of the remaining "extra" soil were also discussed. The start date for the project has been tentatively set for September 7<sup>th</sup> and the County hopes to have the Project complete within sixty days.

Chief Brown requested that the Discussion item regarding emergency only access be continued on the agenda. There were no objections.

Chief Brown added an item at this point in the meeting that was meant to be included under "Prevention" in the Chief's Report. She reported that the BCPUD has received monies for fire fuel reduction and is employing the North Bay Conservation Corp. to remove eucalyptus trees of a six inch width or smaller on BCPUD lands. Dir. Smith inquired as to why larger trees that are potentially more hazardous are not removed instead. Chief Brown answered that the County requires permits to remove larger trees.

Pres. Buchanan asked if any Board member present would like to volunteer to sit on the Resource Recovery Board. Dir. Kimball and Chief Brown reiterated the important function of Resource Recovery in local fuel reduction. All present were concerned about the sustainability of the project and acknowledged Mike Aitkin's years served volunteering as Project Manager. Pres. Buchanan suggested continuing the item on the next monthly agenda when all Board members are present. There were no objections.

### CONSENT CALENDAR

MSC, O'Donnell/Kimball (unan with one absence) to approve the Consent Calendar including the amended Minutes from the July 25, 2011 regular meeting, the warrant lists from July 21 - August 16, 2011, and the financial reports for June 2011 including account balances.

### BOARD MEMBER REPORT

Dir. Kimball reported that Don Smith had completed an analysis of the impact of AT&T's proposed antenna request. Dir. Kimball stated that Don has produced a three page technical analysis of the proposal, which he is just about ready to distribute to the community. The analysis shows that if the six new and existing antennas are configured and adjusted in order to change their mechanical and electronic angle, the emissions will be lower on ground level than those from the existing three antennas in the current configuration. The summation of all six antennas would be lower than one percent of the FCC standard. These findings were reviewed by engineers at AT&T who signed off on the report. Dir. Kimball has asked Don to create a graph of his results to present to the public. Pres. Buchanan noted that Don has done fantastic work on this project and was most appreciative. Dir. Kimball concurred.

Dir. Smith reported that he has been researching the health hazards of EMFs and has learned that the radiation at the base of a cell tower is one thousandth of what is emitted by a cell phone that is transmitting and held directly to the head or at close range. The Board noted the need to add an amendment to the AT&T contract to cap emissions at the firehouse site before signing off on the antenna request. The Board decided that further discussion of the topic should be continued at the next public Board meeting.

### GOOD OF THE ORDER

Chief Brown reported that Medical Capt. Vickisa Feinberg has retired from her position as Duty Officer. She reported that Capt. Feinberg has been serving the District as Duty Officer since 1985. Chief Brown invited the Board to a party on Tuesday night at the regular drill to honor her service. Dir. O'Donnell thanked Dir. Kimball for all his hard work on the AT&T application and with Don Smith. Pres. Buchanan stated that both Don Smith and Dir. Kimball deserve serious recognition for their efforts.

### ADJOURNMENT

MSC, O'Donnell/Kimball (unan with one absence) to adjourn the meeting at 9:00 PM.

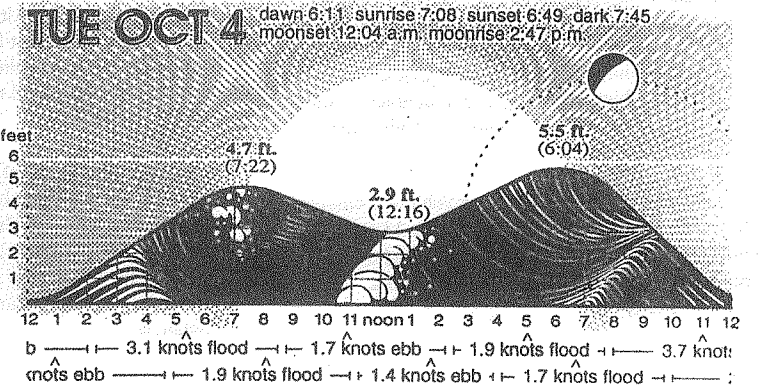
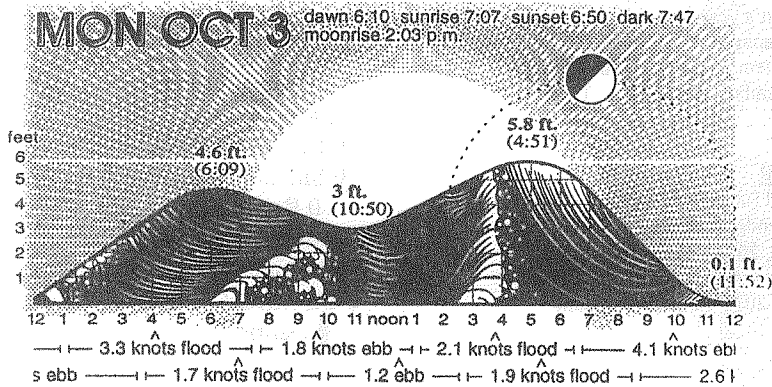

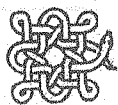
