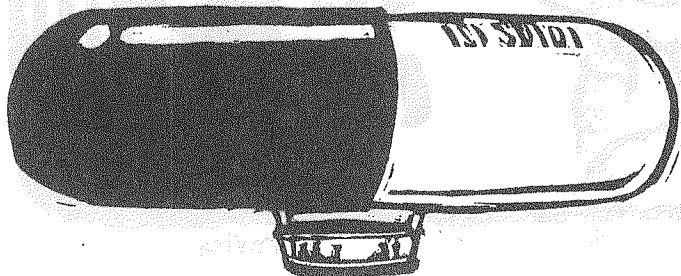

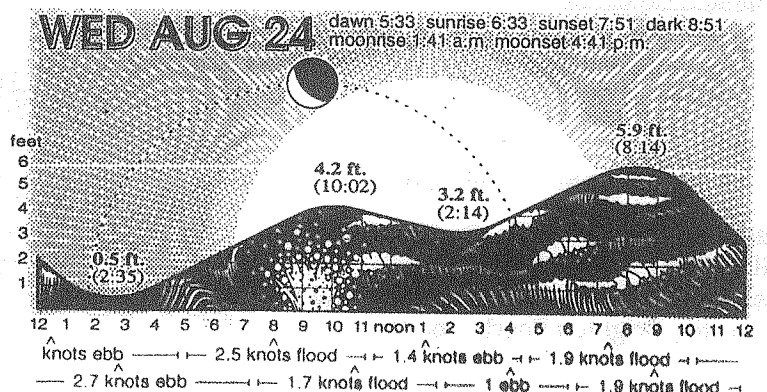

JENNIEPFRIFTER-RILEY RECAP

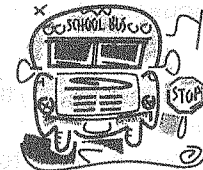
**THE BEAUTIFUL BLOSSOMING PINK "NAKED LADIES"**, lovely floral bugles on top of delicate single stalks, are back to make their annual appearance trumpeting students and staff back to school, another signal of the start of fall. It has taken me 5 years of retirement to be able to see those pink blossoms and enjoy how beautiful they are, without getting a panic attack about not being prepared to let summer vacation go and get projects ready for lively woodworkers returning to the woodshop - small children with sharp tools. I always loved it once I was back, but the anticipation was sometimes overwhelming, calling up the anxiety dreams/nightmares of being in the wrong room on the wrong day, with someone else's notes, sometimes with no clothes on, not being able to lift my heavy feet to get where I needed to go, etc. It's nice to be able to relax this time of year.

The "Heart Warming Report of the Week" might just turn into a regular item. This week it would be Anthony Stewart's new Homegrown Foundation nonprofit project that will have three dinner celebrations a year, acknowledging the accomplishments of the students who have grown up in the Bolinas-Stinson school communities and are now adults, having "utilized the resources of their upbringing to light up the world," as Anthony said in his Friday Hearsay article. The Saturday night event in the Community Center was delightful, with moving comments from a variety of health and safety workers, who were nurtured in our West Marin towns, and are now giving back to their communities in wonderful ways - firefighters, EMT's, health care workers, lifeguards, and park workers. It is a wonderful concept and I look forward to the next evening of celebration. Many thanks to Anthony for being so supportive of our maturing children and for the work that went into the follow-through of this great idea: the startup grant, and all the arrangements for this lovely dinner.

MEETINGS of the week included the first School Board meeting of the year on Tuesday, the monthly Water District meeting on Wednesday, Whitecaps on Thursday, and a Hearsay meeting on Sunday morning. Hearsay ad rates are in the process of "self adjusting" (I think that's the term I heard in reference to the "new economy") and will be published this week. Some will be a little more, but with discounts for longer ad runs. We're on a mission to stabilize our finances and this is one of the steps. More will be reported as it unfolds.

School is gearing up to start this week with new modernization modifications: ramps; railings, bathrooms, solar tubes, carpeting, etc. This is from govt. matching funds promised two years ago, just coming in this spring. Thanks to Kara Blake for overseeing things during vacation, and for Ben Lowrence for coordinating move-out and back. Summer school, with its 21 students in attendance, was held at the Firehouse due to the work. It all looks beautiful. Under the direction of kindergarten teacher Cathy Nichelini, Kathy Oakander and Kristen Noel coordinated the new Jump Start kindergarten program the past two weeks, which was an excellent way to get the little ones used to the campus, the bus, and each other, in an easy, fun way before the rush and tumble of all the bigger kids coming back. They will be starting with a shorter day, gradually easing into the full schedule with the 20% increase in school enrollment. It looks to be another exciting year.

BCPUD continues to work toward improved drainage, protecting our pipes and providing us with great water. There was a report of some seriously damaged, hollow, rotted trees that will need to come down very soon as autumn preparation for safe passage of our families on the way to town, school, and beyond. jp



Dear Community Members:

The first day of school is Wednesday, August 24. School is back in session! School commute times are between 7:15 and 4:40.

From Blake Levitt:

Hi Mary Beth,

Radiation from cell towers does hit the ground -- precisely where depends on tower height, what's on it, etc. The typical tower at 130-150' actually has maximum exposures at around 600' from the base of the tower at ground level. Exposures can be complicated by hilly terrain and the presence of metal -- roofs, piping, handrails, etc. where RF hotspots can be created. For distance/environmental exposures check out my Cell Towers book, chapters by Joel Rinebold and Mark Hutchins and Bill Curry.

This notion is something that telecoms like to espouse at the local level, saying the systems are line-of-sight. Well, yes but only when handing off calls that begin to fade when a caller is leaving a tower area. Other than that, they emit radiation all the time to the phone -- at ground level. That's how connections are made. This is one of their favorite deceptions, meant to quiet local opposition with false assurances.

Several days of burning will take place at Point Reyes National Seashore between August and November if weather conditions allow.

Highway One burns - 100 acres to create a strategic fuelbreak and control French broom in the Olema Valley

Limantour Road burn - 40 acres to create a strategic fuelbreak along Limantour Road

D-Ranch: Showy Indian Clover burn boxes - 1 acre or less in small plots burned in 1 meter x 1 meter metal boxes to compare the effects of fire, grazing and no treatment on an experimental plant population of a nearly extinct plant, recently reintroduced to Point Reyes

Bolinas-Stinson today announced its policy for providing free and reduced-price meals for children served under the National School Lunch Program and/or School Breakfast Program. The school and/or the central office has a copy of the policy, which may be reviewed by any interested party.

The household size and income criteria identified below will be used to determine eligibility for free, reduced-price, or full-price meal benefits. Children from households whose income is at or below the levels shown here are eligible for free or reduced-price meals. Children who receive Food Stamp (FS), California Work Opportunity and Responsibility to Kids (CalWORKS), Kinship Guardianship Assistance Payments (Kin-GAP), or Food Distribution Program on Indian Reservations (FDPIR) benefits are automatically eligible for free meals regardless of the income of the household in which they reside. Eligibility for a foster child is based on a separate application and solely on the amount of the child's "personal use" income.

Application forms are being distributed to all households with a letter informing them of the availability of free and reduced-price meals for enrolled children. Applications are also available at the principal's office in each school. To apply for free or reduced-price meal benefits, households must complete an application and return it to the school for processing. Applications may be submitted at any time during the school year. The information households provide on the application will be used to determine meal eligibility and may be verified at any time during the school year by school or program officials.

Requirements for school officials to determine eligibility for free and reduced-price benefits are as follows: For households receiving Food Stamp, CalWORKS, Kin-GAP, or FDPIR benefits - applications need only include the enrolled child(ren)'s name, Food Stamp, CalWORKS, Kin-GAP, or FDPIR case number, and the signature of an adult household member. For households who do not list a Food Stamp, CalWORKS, Kin-GAP, or FDPIR case number, the application must include the names of all household members, the amount and source of the income received by each household member, and the signature and corresponding Social Security number of an adult household member. If the household member who signs the application does not have a Social Security number, the household member must indicate on the application that a Social Security number is not available.

Under the provisions of the free and reduced-price meal policy, the determining official(s), as designated by the sponsor/agency, shall review applications and determine eligibility. Parents or guardians dissatisfied with the eligibility ruling may discuss the decision with the determining official on an informal basis. Parents may also make a formal request for an appeal/hearing of the decision and may do so orally or in writing with the sponsor/agency's hearing official. Parents or guardians should contact their child(ren)'s school(s) for specific information regarding the name of the determining official and/or hearing official for a specific school, agency, or district.

If a household member becomes unemployed or if the household size increases, the household should contact the school. Such changes may make the children of the household eligible for benefits if the household's income falls at or below the levels shown above.

Sponsor/agency that use direct certification should add the following paragraph to their public release:

Households that receive Food Stamp, CalWORKS, Kin-GAP, or FDPIR benefits may not have to complete an Application for Free or Reduced-Price Meals or Free Milk. School officials will determine eligibility for free meals based on documentation obtained directly from the Food Stamp, CalWORKS, Kin-GAP, or FDPIR office that a child is a member of a household currently receiving Food Stamp or FDPIR benefits or an assistance unit receiving CalWORKS or Kin-GAP benefits. School officials will notify households of their eligibility, but those who do not want their children to receive free meals must contact the school. Food Stamp, CalWORKS, Kin-GAP, and FDPIR households should complete an application if they are not notified of their eligibility.

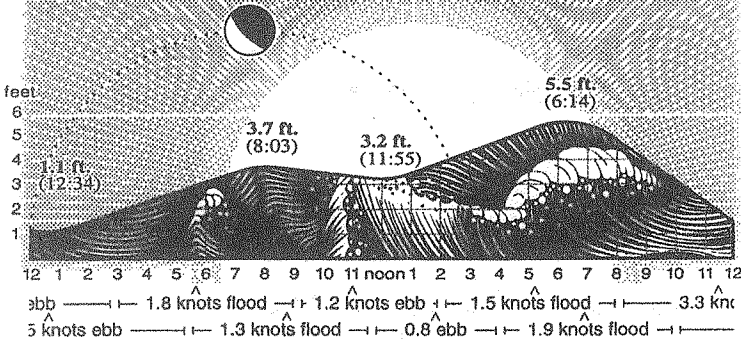

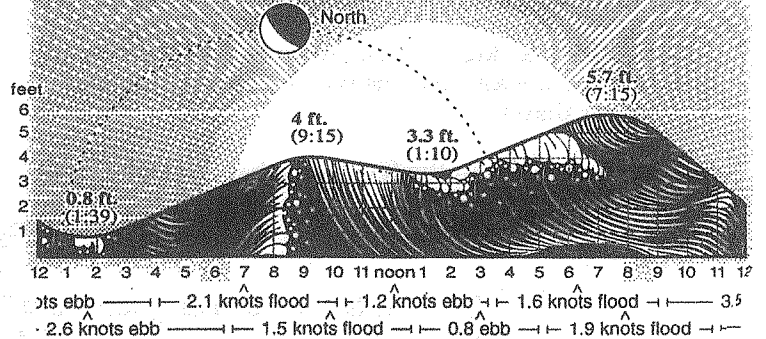
