Counting curves on Highway 1

The State Highway Commission's engineering staff half a century ago proposed straightening Highway 1 between Olema and Highway 101 at Richardson Bay. For awhile, West Marin residents were divided over the proposal. Many residents worried that the character of West Marin would change if it were connected to East Marin and San Francisco by a high-speed highway. On the other hand, many members of the business community reasoned they would get more customers if West Marin were accessible to more people.

To demonstrate the need for a straighter and presumably safer highway, two men, Frank Mver and Lee Sefton, 52 years ago this January counted all the curves on Highway 1 between Point Reves Station and Highway 101. As was reported at the time in The Baywood Press (the original name of The Point Reyes Light), there are 520 curves in that 30-mile stretch, and "33 of these are blind, sharp

Here is the Highway 1 survey carried out by Myer and Sefton, whom the newspaper referred to as a "citizens curve-counting committee":

Point Reyes Station to Olema — 2 miles, 21 curves. Olema to Bolinas — 10 miles. 115 curves. Bolinas to Stinson Beach — 5 miles, 81 curves. Stinson Beach to Muir Beach - 6 miles. 166 curves. Muir Beach to Tam Junction — 6 miles, 132 curves. Tam Junction to Highway 101 — 1 mile, 5 carves.

This abundance of curves prompted a sardonic comment from Baywood Press publisher Don DeWolfe: "Makes us wonder what the motive is behind opposition to the improvement of this wonderful road '

Despite its support from members of the business community, most West Marin residents — and finally the Marin County Board of Supervisors — came to oppose straightening Highway 1, and the state abandoned the proposal. In retrospect, most of us are glad it did.



It's open season on kale

Dear Editor,


Last week, the Light reported the good news that the Gulf of the Farallones and Cordell Bank national marine sanctuaries may be enlarged by as much as 2,771 square miles. The headline, "NOAA will expand marine sanctuaries," jumped the gun and was more a prediction than reporting. As the formal Federal Register notice explains, "no decision has been made yet regarding this possible action." But it's a pretty good bet that there will be expanded sanctuary boundaries at the end of the process in a year or two.

It might be good to clear up another item in the Light's story-the sentence that reads, "Restrictions on harvesting kale, brought by the Pacific Fishery Management Council, which works to protect marine species along the coast, also are imposed within the sanctuary." There are no legal restrictions on harvesting kale in the sanctuary. (But on the practical side, conditions for growing kale in the sanctuary are generally considered to be sub-optimal.)

Seven years ago, the Pacific Fishery Management Council banned commercial krill fishing, which may be what the Light's reporter had in mind. That federal regulation, however, applies everywhere on the coast, whether inside or outside our federal marine sanctuaries. And in the case of krill, the feds were just playing catch-up with California. In 2000, California became the first jurisdiction in the United States to ban fishing for this important food for salmon, whales, seabirds and many other ocean creatures.

But it's always open season on kale.

Lunatic fringe dominating gun debate

A lone gunman opened fire today in (San Francisco, Aurora, Columbine, Virginia Tech, Tucson ... Connecticut) and shot ____ innocent people, killing ___ people and wounding __ more. Politicians offered sympathy; but no solutions. Survivors were left to grieve without hope of change that might prevent more such tragedies.

hat's the sad scenario with each new mass shooting. But beyond the headlines lies an ongoing national epidemic of tragedy: Thirty people are murdered via guns on an average day. Accidental shootings claim many more. Inevitable — or preventable?

The answer depends on whom you ask. The American Academy of Pediatrics offers advice to parents who have guns such as "Keep your guns locked

away, unloaded, warn your kids about them." But the National Rifle Association has attacked such guidelines as anti-American and a threat to gun rights. The gun lobby doesn't stop there. Florida passed a law that would have made it a crime for doctors to talk about guns with patients. Thankfully, this ridiculous law was overturned.

Here in San Francisco, the NRA challenged local ordinances that required guns be safely stored in homes, trigger locks and a ban on the possession of "particularly dangerous ammunition" with "no sporting purpose." A judge rejected this challenge, but the NRA has vowed to keep fighting what it construes as a "war" on gun ownership.

This seems a dominant mentality in the NRA, which favors discredited arguments about guns deterring crime. Its motto is no compromise, one of its board members has labeled federal firearms authorities "a jack-booted group of fascists." Even politicos known to favor more gun control are afraid to cross the gun lobby.

Perhaps this latest slaughter will embolden our president and other politicians. My late father, a lifelong hunter and gun owner, quit the NRA when he saw them become "the crazies." Majorities of gun owners favor better gun control policies such as mandated gun safety courses, background checks and waiting periods for gun purchases, and bans at places such as campuses.— as well as assault-weapons bans. But until the fanatic, paranoid wing of the gun debate is marginalized, we are likely to be stuck with tragedies such as we have just seen.


