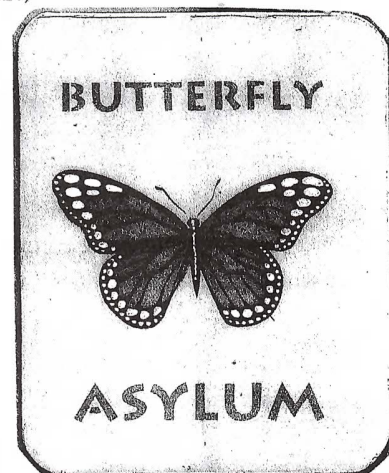
Jan Broek and Dale Polissar read their poetry at the Bolinas Gallery on Thursday.

SAN FRANCISCO) – Thursday, January 24, 2013 –Veteran assistance group Farmer Veteran Coalition (FVC), has been awarded a \$105,000 grant from The San Francisco Foundation specifically for Veteran placement on organic farms in Marin County. The award to Farmer Veteran Coalition reflects the ongoing commitment of The San Francisco Foundation to support the health and well-being of Veterans in the Bay Area.

Four Veterans will receive paid internships with food and farm businesses in Marin County. This experience provides job skills and offers employment opportunities for returning U.S. soldiers. At the same time, the project helps participants heal from the trauma of war by working with the land and growing food. Army Veteran Mike Walgrave is the first intern for the Marin Veteran Project. He has been placed at Warren Weber's Star Route Farms, the oldest certified organic row crop farm in California, and Mr. Walgrave plans on becoming an organic farmer after completing the internship.

Organic Consultant and the Executive Producer of the national radio show "An Organic Conversation", Helgeca Hellberg (formerly the Executive Director of Marin Organic) directs the project and serves as mentor for Mr. Walgrave.

"This is an unprecedented opportunity – Veterans can tend to the land, be surrounded by life, contribute in the production of organic food, learn job skills, and become a part of the West Marin community. It is healing for the Veterans, for the land, and for us as eaters. What a beautiful way to take care of and re-integrate our Veterans," says Hellberg.

"The young men and women that FVC serves – many of them Veterans of the wars in Iraq and Afghanistan – are driven by a sense of purpose and a profound desire to nurture, whether it is with plants or animals. Sustainable agriculture gives them both," adds Michael O'Gorman, Founder and Executive Director FVC. "The San Francisco Foundation brings together donors and nonprofits to serve populations most in need. There is a growing number of veterans in the Bay Area looking for jobs – and many of them seek a new start through careers in farming, agriculture, and food production," says Francesca Vietor, Environment Program Officer at The San Francisco Foundation. "Fortunately, this region is a hub for organic, sustainable, rich agriculture, and this is an emerging area of interest at The San Francisco Foundation. We are pleased to partner with The Marin Farmer Veteran project and showcase this wonderful example of how to strengthen the environment while we strengthen our communities."

Minutes from the December 17, 2012 Bolinas Fire Protection District Board Meeting

Pres. Buchanan called the regular meeting of the Bolinas Fire Protection District to order at 7:30PM. Dir. Kimball, Dir. Smith, Dir. O'Donnell and Director Chiera were present. Also present: Chief Brown, Secretary Brown, Don Smith and John Glavis.

MSC, O'Donnell/Chiera (unan) to approve the agenda.

CHIEF'S REPORT NERA

Chief Brown reported that she was unable to attend the NERA Member Orientation scheduled for Nov. 29 due to storm weather and staffing issues. She did attend the regular NERA meeting on Dec. 12th. Topics discussed included the Auditor's Report for FY11/12 on Operations and Activities, Strategic Plan Implementation and the 2012 Executive Officer Work Plan. The next meeting is scheduled for Jan. 16, 2013. All member agencies are being asked to provide a link to NERA Online. Ian Johnson will assist Chief Brown to complete the request.

Prevention

West Marin communities that have Tsunami Hazard Zones will be receiving Tsunami signage through Marin County Office of Emergency Services and CalEMA at no charge. Chief Brown trimmed down the number of signs to appropriately fit into the Bolinas downtown community. OES will help to coordinate installation with the Department of Public Works. She will be conducting a public outreach effort introducing residents to the signs and explaining their importance. Information will also be posted in the Hearsay News.

Training

Training will resume on January 8th.

Apparatus

U219 developed a leak from the water pump. It was taken out of service and driven to Novato for repair. U231 was in service as U219 for several days. While U219 was in service, the mechanic discovered a leak in the manifold gasket which needed repair in order to pass a smog test. All repairs were completed successfully and U219 is now back in service.

Disaster Council

Chief Brown reported that CERT (Community Emergency Response Training) is scheduled for January 19 and 26, 2013. She encouraged everyone to attend. The training costs \$45 and scholarships are available. Beth Carusillo, the new Disaster Council Coordinator, has been meeting with Dir. Kimball who has generously been volunteering to orient her to the new position. Chief Brown thanked him for his time and energy spent with Beth. Beth plans to take online classes to familiarize herself with standard terminology and the Incident Command System. She and Chief Brown will meet early in the New Year to outline priorities for moving forward. One priority will be to coordinate shelter agreements with the Bolinas Community Center, the BCPUD, Commonweal and the school in the case of an emergency.

General Operations

Chief Brown relayed that the Volunteers extend their deepest thanks for the holiday dinner and for all the support the Board extends to them throughout the year. Dir. O'Donnell and Pres. Buchanan expressed gratitude to Chief Brown for recognizing each volunteer at the dinner and for seeing them standing before everyone to be identified for their good works and years spent in service.

Maintenance Agreement – CHA

Chief Brown reported that the Letter of Agreement between the CHA and the BFPD defining the cap on the Common Area Maintenance funds is currently being reviewed by Nancy Dombrowski of CHA. Once she approves the draft, it will be presented to each

Board. She thanked Pres. Buchanan for reviewing the document. The Board reviewed the amount of the cap and decided on a total of \$60,000, \$30,000 from each agency. If the amount proves insufficient in the future, the Board can revisit the decision and alter the amounts as needed.

There were 250 calls in 2012 so far, 50 more than last year.

Pres. Buchanan asked if there is critical incident stress debriefing/counseling available for Volunteers. Chief Brown answered that debriefing and counseling are always available for Volunteers after stressful calls.

GENERAL BUSINESS

Action Item #1: Election of new Board Officers: President and Vice President.

MSC, Kimball/Chiera (four ayes, one abstention) to nominate Phil Buchanan to continue as Board President.

MSC, Kimball/Chiera (four ayes, one abstention) to nominate Dir. Smith as Vice President.

Action Item #2: Form new Board committees: Finance and Budget, Personnel, Building and Grounds

MSC, Chiera/O'Donnell (unan) to continue the Finance Committee with Dir. Kimball, Vice Pres. Smith and Chief Brown.

MSC, Kimball/Smith (unan) to appoint Dir. Chiera to Personnel Committee with Pres. Buchanan and Chief Brown.

MSC, Smith/Kimball (unan) to appoint Dir. Chiera to Building and Grounds Committee with Dir. O'Donnell and Chief Brown.

Discussion: Dir. Kimball to review audit for FY11/12

Dir. Kimball reviewed the District finances and answered questions from the Board. Dir. Chiera asked if there is an annual bidding process for companies to perform the audit. Dir. Kimball explained that the District has a long history with the field workers who previously worked for Bunker and Co. They are solid in their performance and attention to detail over the many years of service to the District. Pres. Buchanan thanked Dir. Kimball for his efforts and financial knowledge.

Action Item #3: Action Item #4: Approve Verizon request to add microwave antenna to existing Crown Castle tower located on Fire District property.

Chief Brown reported that the District sent a letter to Laura Fazzini of Crown Castle detailing the Board's position of cooperation and commitment to working together for the best possible solution to adding antenna configurations. The letter requested a conference call with all parties involved including Don Smith and Verizon engineers and included an invitation to Angela Castellano, the Crown Castle District Manager, to the next regular December Board meeting.

Chief Brown reported that she received a Notice of Breach of Lease letter from Crown Castle in response to the letter. It stated that the District is in breach of the obligations of the Lease and is therefore required under law to approve the Verizon request to add a microwave antenna. The letter stated that Crown Castle will be forced to seek legal remedies under the Lease if the District denies the request. The Board discussed the events and concluded that they have done due diligence to the precautionary principle and towards cooperatively working together

towards the best possible solution for all parties.

MSC, Kimball/Smith (unan) to approve Verizon request to add microwave antenna to existing Crown Castle tower located on Fire District property.

Discussion: Emergency only access and egress alternatives to closure of Terrace Avenue and Overlook Road.

No update.

CONSENT CALENDAR

MSC, O'Donnell/Smith (unan) to approve the Consent Calendar including the Minutes from the November 26, 2012 regular meeting and the warrant lists from November 21 – December 11, 2012, and the financial reports for October 2012 including the account balances.

Dir. Kimball noted that the Vehicle Replacement Fund balance is \$473,000. The Vehicle Replacement Fund includes all monies left over after operating expenditures.

PUBLIC EXPRESSION

John Glavis explained that his interests are to first become informed regarding the microwave dish action item on the agenda and secondly, to inform the Board about the local development of innovative systems including a food system of indigenous nutritious foods such as quinoa to support the community both in emergencies and for general sustainability. He would like to link all of the Boards of the community including the Fire, BCPUD, and the Bolinas Community Center with youth groups and the Regenerative Design Institute at Commonweal to form a "sustainability innovation hub". He invited the Board to become involved in the project.

He also expressed concern regarding the Districts' dependence on income from cell towers. He encouraged the Board to consider long term income alternatives to proceeds from cell tower rentals.

Pres. Buchanan thanked John for coming to the meeting.

COMMITTEE REPORTS

Dir. Kimball announced that mostly due to interest rates rising, the feasibility of bond refinancing at this point is very low. Pres. Buchanan thanked him for his efforts.

BOARD MEMBER REPORT

None.

PERSONNEL MATTERS

None.

GOOD OF THE ORDER

Ed Chiera thanked the Volunteers for making our community a safer place and looks forward to meeting each and every one.

Chief Brown announced that she will be on vacation from January 3rd to January 14th. Asst. Chief Marcotte will be available as will Capt. Wall.

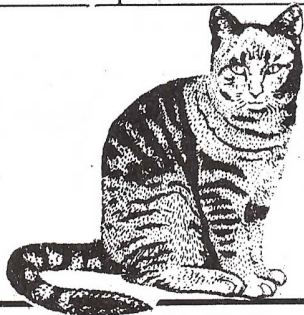

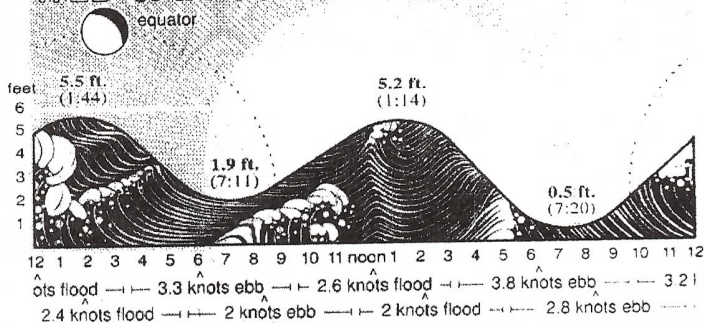

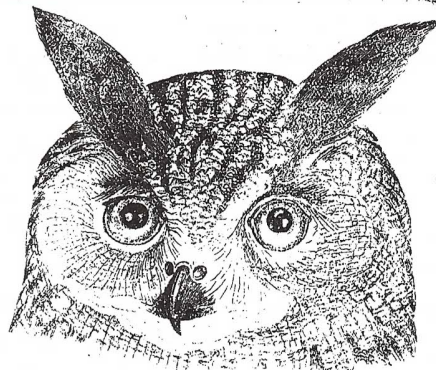
