Some Surfers Bother Residents Of Bolinas

Surfing is a sport which is riding on the crest of a wave at Bolinas this year.

But the invasion of the beach by 200 or more young enthusiasts most weekends is posing a problem to many of the people who live there all year round.

Piles of litter, noise and sun-lovers too scantily dressed are some of the complaints from members of Bolinas Community Inc.

A committee formed by the community group will meet with members of the North Point Surfing Club and Melton Ferris, a county parks and recreation commissioner, later this month to smooth out difficulties.

James Dougan, vice president

of Bolinas Community Inc., said Saturday. "Surfers are, on the whole, well behaved as a group but as individuals, their enthusiasm sometimes runs away with them."

There has already been one meeting between the committee, the club and Ferris which Dougan reported a success.

"The first discussions took place on designating parts of the beach exclusively for surfers and other parts for swimmers and people who like picnics," he said.

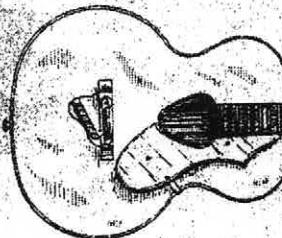
"We have no complaints against the North Point group. We find it is unaffiliated surfers who commit many of the minor violations," Dougan added.

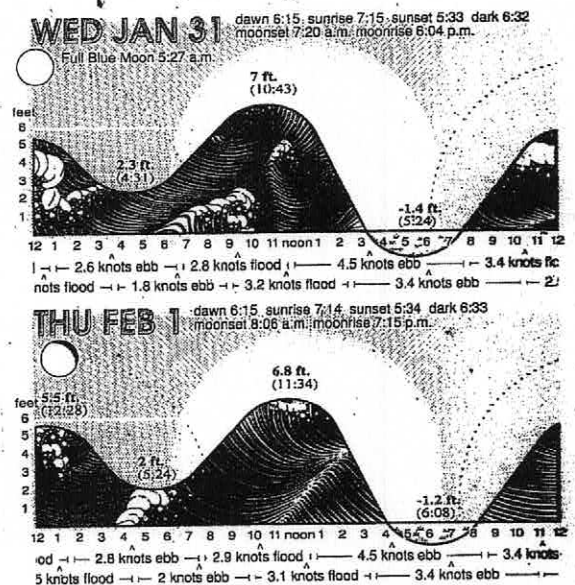

His classes will be coming to an end soon and he will be able to focus more consistently on Disaster Council work. A list of priorities was formulated that includes recruiting CERT participants, updating the data base, planning a DOC training and a town wide evacuation drill. Richard Dillman has upgraded the radio system. He and Ian Johnson will be replacing the DC antenna at the station in order to further improve the system.

Operations/Administration

The audit field work has been completed. The auditor has forwarded the draft financial statements for review. The Finance Committee will be meeting in early January to review the statements. Chief Brown has requested that Lisa Doran attend the regular January Board meeting in order to present the draft. Due to her schedule that evening, the meeting will start thirty minutes earlier, at 6:30 pm.

Chief Brown continues to attend the Vehicle Habitation Committee meetings. As Jennifer and Chief Brown updated at the November meeting, the BCPUD released the proposed recommendations for public

review and comment. The committee met on December 12th to discuss several comments that were received. After discussion, several edits were made to the recommendations. The most significant changes were adding a recommendation to implement an emergency long-term overnight parking program and simplifying the wording on the recommendation requesting the revision of applicable laws to allow a permanent space for homes on wheels. More of the discussion and recommendations are located on the BCPUD's website.

GENERAL BUSINESS

Discussion Fire District Priorities Regarding Encroachments on non-County Maintained Roads.

As was discussed at last month's meeting, the BCPUD staff completed the survey of all of the non-County maintained roads on the Mesa and detailed every encroachment into the public rights-of-ways. At that time, the BCPUD asked for input from the Fire District regarding our priorities and direction related to the encroachments. The Fire Districts main concern has always been sufficient road width for emergency access and egress. More and more, our attention has turned to the importance of clear roadways in the event of an emergency evacuation. Asst. Chief Marcotte and Chief Brown met to review and prioritize the roadways based upon the number of residents served and other means of egress, if any. Currently, there is a preliminary list of priority roads. Chief Brown then drafted a Road Standard in order to clarify the District's position and requirements to residents, however, the standard needs more review as Chief Brown believes we must require no less than a 20' road base as is required in the current California Fire Code. In past years, specifically 1996 when the Bolinas Mesa Traffic Plan was approved by the BCPUD, Neighborhood Access Roads were required to be 18' and Neighborhood Roads were to be 12'. Again, Chief Brown is concerned that we cannot require anything less than what the current California Fire Code requires. She will continue to research the details.

Discussion was had on how to involve the community in making sure our roads are as safe as possible.
