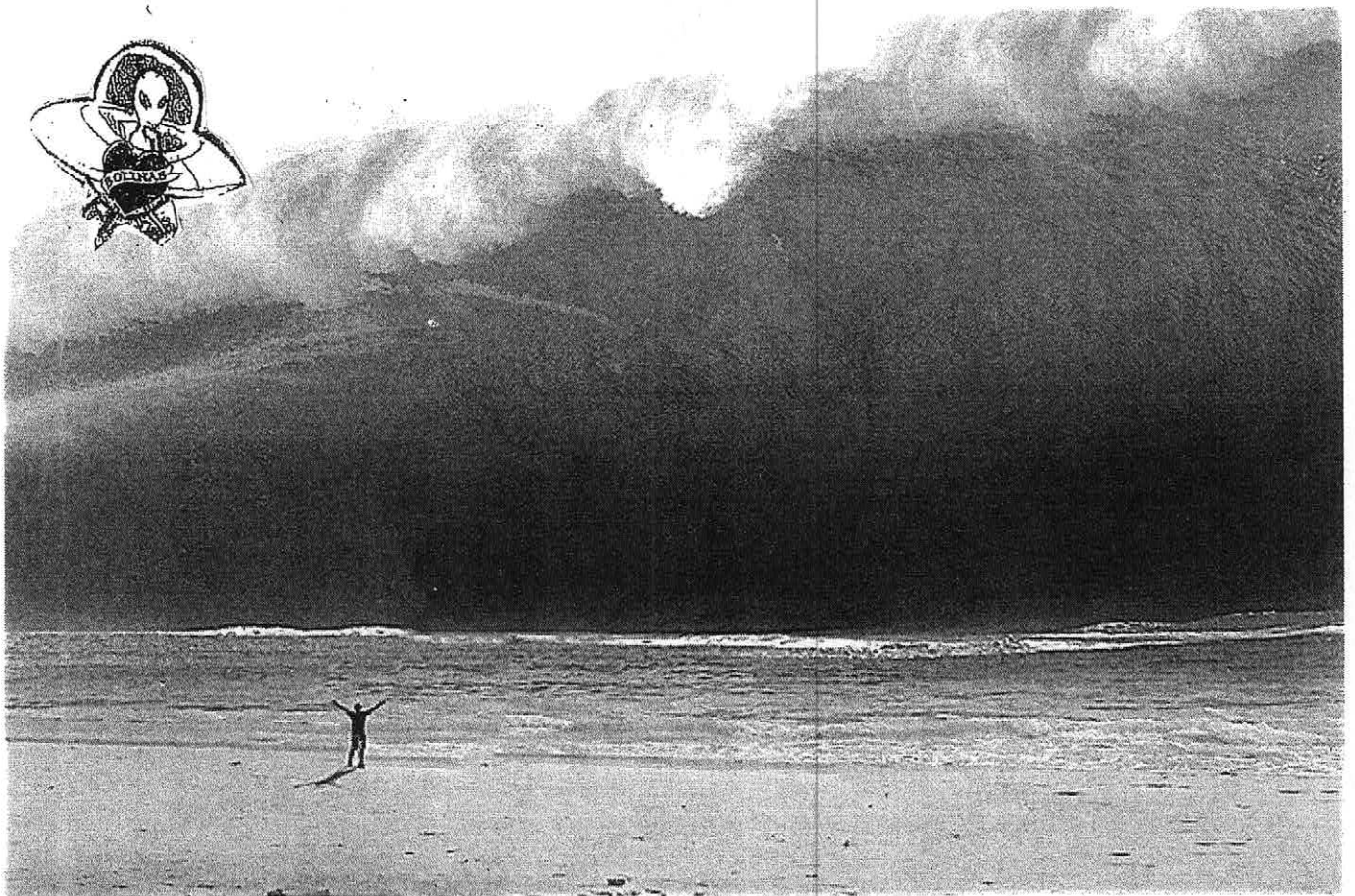

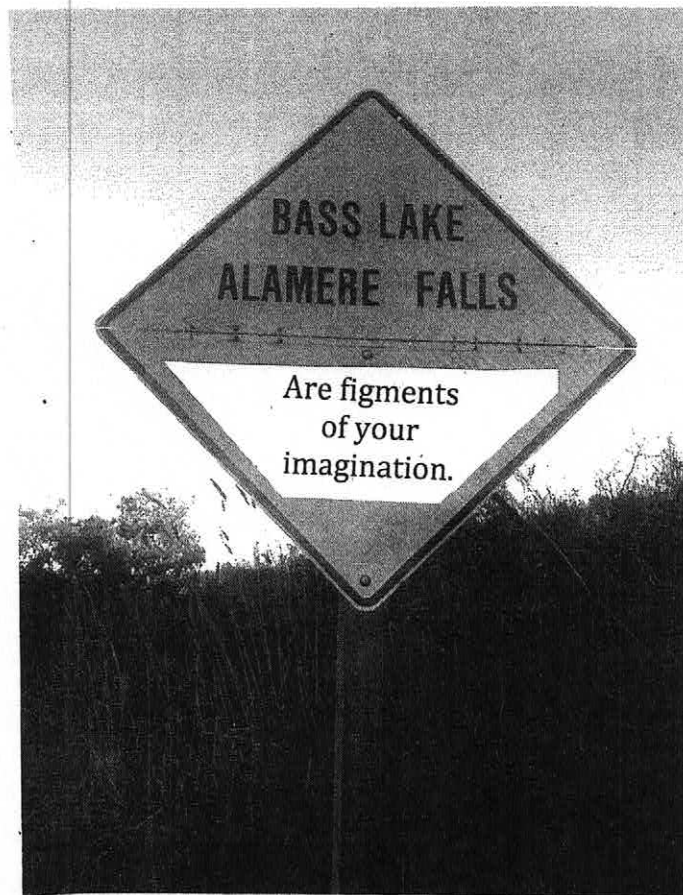

Marin IJ Editorial: COM on right track with Bolinas lab

Having an onsite marine laboratory should be a bragging right for any college. But College of Marin's Bolinas lab has been shuttered since 2006 and its fate left in limbo, although over the years college leadership has talked about selling the property.

Over the past decade, most of COM officials' deliberations have taken place miles from Bolinas, but they finally traveled over Mount Tamalpais to the beachfront town last week. There, at a community meeting moderated by Supervisor Dennis Rodoni, COM officials got a dose of the interest among Bolinas residents and COM faculty to keep the small Wharf Road lab as a community and classroom facility.

COM President David Wain Coon says the college is in talks about a long-term lease that would involve rebuilding the lab and creating a community meeting place. He says he's trying to achieve "a win-win all-around." That is a welcomed turnabout from previous talks where COM's focus has been unloading the property — and the bureaucratic albatross, a vacant public building that continues to be a financial liability. The fate of the lab, once used for COM classes and youth science programs, has been uncertain because it was damaged by a landslide in 1985 and the Field Act, a long-standing state seismic-safety regulation, forbids the college from spending bond money to repair it because it stands near two earthquake faults.

The property includes a two-story house, a water storage tank, a shed and a dock. The buildings and the dock were originally part of the U.S. Coast Guard field station that was opened in 1914 but was closed in 1955, declared surplus and deeded to COM in the early 1960s.

Other colleges have onsite marine labs. San Francisco State has the Romberg Center in Tiburon. UC Davis has an oceanfront marine lab at Bodega Bay. A consortium of seven CSU campuses run the marine lab in Moss Beach. For a community college to have a lab was a plum for

COM and its students.

Despite talk of selling off the property, there has also been a push that COM offer it to other Bay Area college institutions to continue the property's educational role. At Wednesday's meeting, COM heard from Bolinas residents and COM faculty that there is support for keeping the property a functioning education and community site. That includes the dock, the only public dock in Bolinas.

After years of off-and-on open- and closed-door deliberations, COM appears to be on the right track in coming up with a plan that makes community use of the property and will continue its educational legacy.

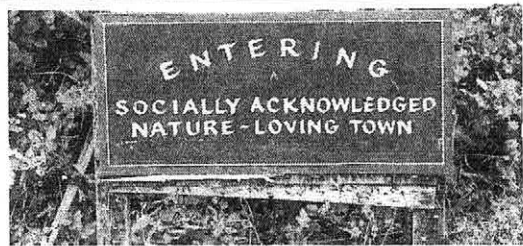



Bolinas tax maintains safe spaces

This November, Bolinas residents will vote on Measure F, a parcel tax that provides critical funding for Bolinas parks. Measure F seeks to renew the current tax at the same rate (no increase) for another four years. I am a member of the all-volunteer Firehouse Community Park Agency, also known as the Mesa Park board of directors. As the vote approaches, I want

to provide a brief history of our parks, highlight the facilities, including recent improvements, and review our current and historical funding situation for both long-time and newer voters. Bolinas is known for its natural beauty, proximity to the Point Reyes National Seashore and its small beach adjacent to its modest downtown. While Bolinas offers ample outdoor recreational space, the community historically lacked recreation areas for organized sporting activities. To remedy this community deficiency, in 1985 two public agencies operating in the village—the Bolinas-Stinson Union School

District and the Bolinas Community Public Utility District—exercised a joint powers agreement to create a new agency charged with providing community recreational opportunities. Thus the Firehouse Community Park Agency was created and set to work establishing and developing recreational facilities at Mesa Park. Since its formation, the Mesa Park board has directed the installment and maintenance of soccer, baseball and softball fields used as home fields by our children's soccer and baseball leagues. These are the only ball fields available to the community, other than a single small multipurpose field on the Bolinas School campus, which has restricted availability. Mesa Park also maintains two playgrounds, one over sand for toddlers and another over wood chips with swings, slides, a teeter-totter and other features to entertain older children. These playgrounds are the only such publicly available structures in town. Mesa Park is also home to a basketball court and the only skate park in West Marin. More recently, Mesa Park installed plumbed bathrooms and drinking fountains, the former replacing long-serving portable units. These improvements have fueled increased usage by community members. The park hosts children's birthday parties, community fundraisers and soccer and little league baseball games. Thanks to the generosity of a local philanthropist, we acquired the Down-

town Park (formerly called Burnt Park) in 2007. Downtown Park, designed and implemented by community members, is now a symbol of our community spirit. The park provides well-maintained green space for community gatherings as well as a publicly available cob oven for community baking, while maintaining open space in an increasingly occupied downtown area. Though Mesa Park was born out of the joint powers act of the utility and school districts, no mechanism was provided at its inception for funding this new entity. The parcel tax, which taxes each improved parcel in town \$49 annually, provides this crucial support. Our board will continue to work toward securing the county funds and federal block grants that have facilitated our large improvement projects, including installing the sports fields, building the bathrooms and upgrading the skate park and playgrounds. While we continue this work, we rely on the parcel tax to fund our insurance obligations and the basic services that maintain our lush playing fields, provide clean bathrooms and keep the play spaces safe. These sentiments are nothing new. There are just more of them being blatantly expressed because the perpetrators have been emboldened from the top, which makes it more egregious than ever.

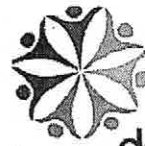
The FBI says that on COLLEGE and UNIVERSITY CAMPUSES "racist messages" and "black hate images" on are up from 524 in 2016 to over a million so far this year. And those are the reported ones. Most of the racist images occurred on large campuses because it's easier for the culprits to remain undiscovered. And on what are perceived as "liberal leaning" schools. Dartmouth, U of NH, BU, Wellesley, Penn, NYU, Pitt, GW, Sarah Lawrence, Cornell. So you are not alone at AU. Anti-Semitic incidents are on the rise as well, more likely on mid-western and southern campuses, up 39% since January of this year. Indiana State, Northwestern, Ohio State, U of Michigan. 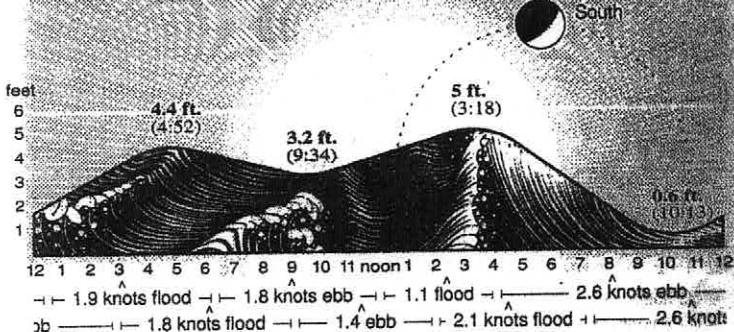

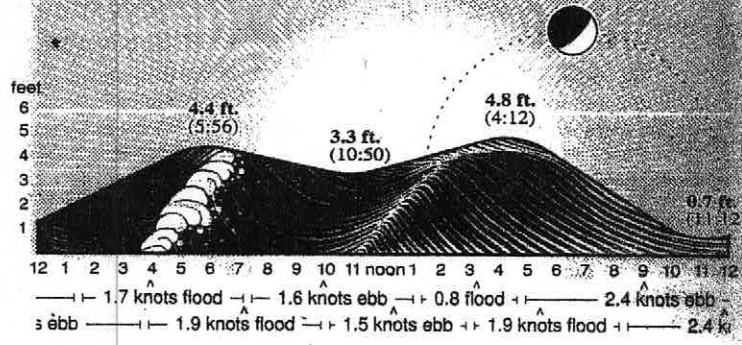
