





ARE WE STILL HERE and DO WE REMEMBER

On the BCPUD Agenda Wednesday night, there is an Item about Leases in the Sewer and I have a few comments:

I have been on the committee evaluating a lease to grow food in the Sewer. This lease was agreed to by 4 board members (not Vic) two of which are no longer on the Board. No one involved seems to know that the State made it quite clear that the kind of farming allowed in or near the spray area (the top part) was food for animals. Absolutely not allowed was growing human food or having live animals. Some years hay was grown and harvested for a local cow, and one year oats were attempted for animal feed but the drought caused problems. At that point the farmer said there were not enough oats to harvest and could I tether a goat there for a few days to eat them. Absolutely not, was the answer. No animals, no human food there.

So, now we have some farmers wanting to grow "organic food" there, amongst other things, and no one except myself seems to remember this prohibition. It is counter intuitive, to say that least, that one would think it OK to grow human food on land that has been sprayed for 38 years with human waste and with much wind and flooding so there can be no assumption that there is not and could not be anything there unhealthy for humans or live animals.

This land was made to double as a wild bird sanctuary and recently a beautiful bench was placed nearby as a memorial for Peter Warshalll (who would be astounded by this proposal, were he still here.) Some other people who know the history, turn white at the thought and say, "No way." The lease agreement that our committee has been working on eliminating would allow growing food at the "May Day Festival" Site with locked gates around it.

The residents of the BCPUD District paid for this land many years ago after a hard fight to overthrow of the previous Water board. After meeting Peter, he invited me to the meetings and I became "hooked", attended most meetings and wrote up many of them as "Highlights". My home bordered the Sewer and I participated in many meetings w/ BCPUD and State to keep them from erecting a 10 ft. fence w/ barbed wire on top to keep people off the top Sewer Land. This facility filters the downtown sewage and then sprays it out on the land. The State agreed to allow the BCPUD to erect a much shorter fence and I maintained mine for years (I am astounded that some folks have taken down the fence- as if that is merely "Open Space" in the back.)

I might add, this "farming" operation could never be certified organic, nor is it at all safe. The farmers would pay all of \$100 per year and have the right to lock us off our land for 10 years minimum. There is no water source for this and the erosion potential on our sloping May Festival land is enormous. If you are concerned about this please try to come to the BCPUD Meeting. If the Board does not see the folly in this we may have to take up a petition to put it on the Ballot. See you there, I hope.





On mastering the art of the oneminute shower **BY TOM GOGOLA**

'm staying in a place in the remote coastal hinterlands of Bolinas, legendary for its semi-reclusive countercultural values and a village for whom thinking globally while acting locally isn't just a feel-good bumper sticker you see on a Volvo—it's a rite of passage for any would-be resident.

My new landlords gave one admonishment when I moved in: Do not waste water. There is a drought, and the water is getting more expensive by the minute.

They are monitoring residents' water use down to the gallon, and all of us who live in the compound have to scale back our usage next month by about five gallons.

To that end, I've mastered the art of the one-minute shower. There's not much to master: turn on the shower; get in the shower; soap yourself up; rinse yourself off; get out of the shower.

Do not rinse and repeat. Do not linger.
I've always been a guy whose daily shower stood as a kind of Zen retreat in microcosm. I would zone out with my head under the precious hot stream of water while singing that favorite shower song and attempting to get grounded for the day ahead. I have rinsed and repeated, repeatedly.

But despite the momentary mindfulness it provides, a luxuriously long, hot shower is utterly indefensible in these drought-afflicted times.

Every moment of shower-stall meditation wastes gallons of water that could and should be put to much better use by people whose livelihoods depend on water: the farmers who suffer and worry and take steps to maximize whatever scant flow is coming their way.

There's a saying I've always loved that says the key to a happy life lies in our ability to "dance between the raindrops"—but the drought has turned the raindrops proverb on its head.


The rain that arrived last week and over the weekend gave a critically needed reprieve to a bone-dry region—so go out and dance in the raindrops with your bottle of Dr. Bronner's if you really need to extend that shower with an extra rinse-and-repeat.

A more natural and responsible Zen bliss will ensue.

Typical of a good California rescue was the shipwreck of the Hanalei, a steam schooner that had been converted from the Hawaiian sugar trade to the California timber trade. During a winter storm in 1914, en route from Eureka to San Francisco with passengers, railroad ties, and wooden shingles, it ran aground on Duxbury Reef just off Bolinas. Over the next eighteen hours lifesavers in motor lifeboats, one of which capsized, and others on the beach who'd humped their equipment over Mount

Tamalpais after hauling it by truck from Sausalito, made repeated forays into the massive waves, including forming a human chain through the freezing surf and deadly debris when line guns failed to reach the ship, managing to rescue thirty-nine people but losing twenty-three others after the battered vessel disintegrated.





Lyme-bearing ticks widespread in Bay Area

Ticks bearing the bacterium that causes Lyme disease can be found in nearly every park and open space in the Bay Area.

And it gets worse; Ticks bearing a second, "Lyme-like" pathogen are also prevalent in Northern California.

Ticks bearing the bacterium that can lead to the debilitating disease—once thought to be restricted to the Northeast—were found in "nearly every [Bay Area] park" studied by a team of Stanford researchers, whose findings were released today.

Only about 2 percent of local ticks examined carried the bacterium that leads to Lyme disease, the researchers found — far less than the 35 percent rate found in ticks in the Northeast. But Lyme-carrying ticks were found in grassland as well as wooded areas in the parkand trail-rich Bay Area, according to the researchers.




New Stanford research says 2 percent of ticks in the Bay Area are Lyme carriers.

In addition to the bacterium that causes Lyme, researchers found a second bacterium in many of the same ticks: Borrelia miyamotoi.

Very little is known about that bacterium — first discovered last year — aside from it causing some Lyme-like symptoms, including headache and fatigue, researchers

About 300,000 new cases of Lyme disease were diagnosed in the United States last year, according to the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention.

We were loosely looking for a house in Bolinas for a couple of years, but I didn't want just any place;
I wanted one that felt right.

HRISTIAN STORM HAS surfed the waters off West Marin for the past 15 years, but the East Bay resident and cofounder of Turnitin, an online plagiarism detection and grading service, wasn't seriously looking to buy a sec-

ond home there until he and his wife, Sage, discovered an 1890s Victorian known as Captain Edward's Flats. "We were loosely looking for a house in Bolinas for a couple of years, but I didn't want just any place; I wanted one that felt right," Storm says. "This house has that quintessential East Coast beach house feel to it and was big enough to share with our family and friends."

And, it was also almost move-in ready. "The whole point was to enjoy the house and not have a huge project," he says. "This house has old bones but with modern updates that were done creatively and with good taste."

The stately single-family residence that had been, at one point, divided into two separate homes features a full kitchen, a living room, three bedrooms, a bathroom and laundry on each of its two floors.

Outside, the country garden is simple, with a rustic cottage nestled in the back. A local master gardener has been hired to fill the terraced beds with a mix of flowers, edible plants and fruit trees.

Storm says he and his wife appreciate Bolinas' diverse population "of musicians, poets, scientists, retired people and young children — who all have a good love for the town." With such wide appeal and the 1971 water meter moratorium that inhibits new building, the couple was prepared to wait. But, says Storm, "I grew up in a small town by the water where you could walk everywhere, and I wanted our children to have that experience, too. This is a dream come true."


