Expatriate Post: Dispatch to Boboland from a Small Town Near France – XIV

T.S. Eliot measured out his life in coffee spoons. In the future, I will most assuredly write that I measured my life out in airport connections (actually, I think my future self just wrote it).

My first intimate contact with a tarmac was at LAX at the age of six. That was back in the day when mothers still wore hats and gloves and smoked Bel Air cigarettes onboard. This particular memory is indelible (stapled to my brain, actually) due to the fact that my younger sibling pitched a fit, broke from our entourage at the foot of the stairs and took off at high speed down the runway like some kind of uncorked miniature dervish on Benzedrine. Emitting noises not unlike a banshee, she released bits of herself like flotsam and jetsam - patent leather shoes, a cardigan - and there they were, so oddly out of place in that no man's land (kid, for that matter) under the wheels and wings of aeronautic industry. My father ran after her. The policeman ran after him. It was riveting and I knew somehow that airports would figure in my future.

I will fly out of my way just to make a connection at an airport that offers a particular commodity: Brussels for its Weissbier (wheat beer) and those little crepe-like waffles filled with honey cream; London for Marks and Spencer, a down-right fantastic food shop, and the British Air Club which offers all kinds of Scottish shortbread and fancy finger sandwiches and a great hot shower; Prague for its seriously fantastic club with a totally open, serve-yourself bar, pickled peppers and sausage and flat screen TV's; Athens for the sheer Melpomene and Thalia (tragedy and comedy) of life – this is impromptu theater of the human condition at its finest and it can be observed while eating a very messy gyros pita; any airport in Italy with the exception of Milan (I won't say which one since they might be reading this).

Now, imagine arriving in Milan on the very first morning flight. We had a connection to Venice, but none of the counters were open, yet (we're talking wee pre-sun hours). In fact, nothing was open except a vending machine offering those donut-shaped, really delicious, Italian crackers made with olive oil. My friend's lips were moist with anticipation. I put my euro in, the metal coil began to crank with our snack and then it stopped - mid-crank. I smacked the glass, but to no avail.

Finally, the stiletto heels arrived; the gorgeous, coiffed, Italian check-in girls with painted lips furled in permanent derision. We were clearly the first and the only passengers standing before them at the Alitalia counter, but they continued to banter as though we were members of the Invisible Tribe from America. However, chiedere scusa, I speak Italian. Our new friends told us that the flight was over-booked, thus our personal seats were no longer existing.

What? Wait a minute, what did you do, take our personal seats out of the airplane? I know it might be a question of semantics, but those seats are still existing.

What you need to know just about now is that I have spent most of my life as a fighting cockerel in sheep's clothing. My poor children have witnessed me ingesting the heads of airport staff on countless accasions. The Milanesc were me exception

After I explained to them in no uncertain terms that our seats were booked six months in advance, that we were the only people standing in front of them at o'dark thirty and that if they couldn't squeeze us into the plane, or let us stand since our seats no longer existed, then they would have to get us on the next flight (there wasn't one), buy us train tickets (the train that would have gotten us to our ship in Venice on time had just left), or get us a driver! They got us a driver.

With victory stamped on a car voucher, I went over to tell my Sicilian-American friend (she doesn't speak Italian), who was standing by the cockamamie cracker machine. (I had to send her away from the ticket counter into general-vending-machine-area exile because smoke started coming out of her Sicilian-American ears when she heard the words over-booked.) I gave the cracker machine an exuberant smack and the crank began to work while actually grabbing a second bag of crackers which it sent, by way of an apology, down the chute with the first bag of well-deserved treats.

In preparation, we anticipated worst case, best case scenarios: My friend said that the driver would either look like Marcello Mastroianni or show up in a wife beater undershirt with spaghetti sauce stains driving a pint-sized Fiat. I said, "No. Worst case scenario – we end up in Italian jail."


I scurried to buy a picnic from the shops that had just opened. The drive to Venice would take about four hours. Our young, corpulent driver arrived wearing an olive green sharkskin suit which, by the way, was riding up his rear-end. Our coach was a brand new Mercedes van and Signor Chauffeur drove in the fast lane talking on his cell phone the entire way. We climbed way in the back, drank our bottle of wine and entered weird time zone traveler oblivion.



Should you find yourself at Heathrow airport in the middle of winter in the middle of the night waiting for a shuttle bus to your hotel...don't. But if you really must, be sure to change a little money first, maybe \$40.00, to get a paltry handful of British Pound Sterling. The bus driver does not take cards, checks or any other currency except the one with queenie's face on it. If you don't have any pounds, the driver sends you away and you immediately become the hapless traveler who falls victim to the unscrupulous money changers inside the airport. Consequently, you miss your bus and have to wait on the sidewalk for the next one with the old thermometer quivering on the threshold of zero degrees. In a situation like this, there is only one thing left to do: smoke make-believe steam cigarettes. I offered one to my friend. She was not amused. I said, "You may as well smoke one, we're going to die anyway." I presented her with my make-believe cigarette case.

"Maybe you'd prefer a cigarillo, or a cigar...I've even got Virginia Slims!"

After all is said and done, Heathrow is a nice airport if you speak the King's English, and even if you don't. Just as long as you are headed for the Hilton and a pint of ale with a bowl of Japanese crackers, a game of Scrabble and some real fish and chips with malt vinegar to take the sting out of your layover at London Heathrow Airport.

In my book, the best airport in the world, hands down, is on Naxos Island, Greece, but that is a story for another day.

The Symbolism of the Blue Bear

"Why the Blue Bear?" people ask me when they see the images I've made of the Blue Bear hugging Bolinas.

"Do you remember Measure G?" I ask.
"Well kind of." they admit, and I try to

refresh their memories:

"In Measure G, a ballot initiative written by Jane Blethen, which was passed by '76% of Bolinas voters in November of 2003...in Measure G, it specifically states that "Vote for Bolinas to be a socially acknowledged nature loving town because to like to drink the water out of the lakes to like to eat the blueberries to like the bears is not hatred to hotels and motorboats."

Somehow Measure G got interpreted to mean that the bears ate the blueberries and turned blue. I know that it's a far out concept, since neither bears nor blueberries frequent Bolinas. However on the metaphoric, artistic level the blue bear assumes a symbolic, protective role.

Around that time I had a dream in which I was watching a blue bear dance. I was convinced that there was a person I knew inside a bear suit doing a very convincing job of dancing like a bear,

I don't know if you've ever seen a bear dance. The words "monstrously graceful" come to mine. "Totally enchanting" might be another way of saying how wonderful a dancing bear is, especially a bear with beautiful blue fur.


Finally the dancing blue bear came over and gave me a big, slobbering lick on the face, and I woke up from the dream. At that moment I accepted the spirit of the blue bear and began to incorporate that image into my artwork.

WEST MARIN all day - peace reigned.

On May 10, 1863, Gregorio Briones died in Bolinas (possibly poisoned by a disgruntled servant). In 1846 the Mexican government had rewarded Briones for his military service with Rancho Las Baulines, a land grant that extended around Bolinas Lagoon and encompassed present-day Stinson Beach and Bolinas. With his gift came vast swathes of fir and redwood frees that tempted fast-growing San Francisco greatly — millions of feet of lumber were shipped from Bolinas during the Gold Rush. (Gregorio's daughter married a lumberjack). Gregorio's land also disappeared — over time most of it was sold off because of expenses incurred in his attempt to prove it was rightfully his.


