Flowering Peyote

Recently I made a stencil of a flowering peyote cactus. It's actually three stencils that printed together create a reasonable resemblance of a peyote in flower.

I enlarged the peyote to three times its actual size. I was interested in making a bold, graphic statement. I stenciled every surface I could imagine. Clothes, artwork, clocks & mirrors all glistened with flowering pevote buttons..

In my studio I am surrounded by flowering peyote. It makes me nostalgic for the good old days at art school in Mexico. San Miguel de Allende where I had the good fortune to study painting and peyote.

Those days seem so wild and distant now, experimenting with altered states of consciousness & art. Peyote was the sweetest of all psychedelics. Even though the visionary experience was intense, one always felt protected and guided by pevote

I took peyote at night and painted in my studio. I would safely anchor myself in artmaking while my mind merged with the cosmos.

Peyote would take me from the center of the planet to the center of the galaxy. I would return from some fantastic journey to find myself painting away, as if transcribing the visions.

Peyote was a true religious sacrament, that revealed the beautiful light crystalline radiance that is the source of life.





A week before I left I had my last session with peyote. In my vision I returned to the high desert of Mexico. I became a peyote cactus nestled down in the earth. I looked out over the dry dusty desert and watched the sun rise above the mountains, like it had for eons. I felt home, safe, sanctified, one with the planet. I knew at that time that I was leaving part of me there. Part of my consciousness had taken root back in the high desert of San Luis Potosi.

Now when peyote flowers in the desert, it also flowers in me.

Bolinas-Stinson School Kindergarten Registration



To be eligible for Kindergarten enrollment for the 2014-15 school year, children must have reached his or her fifth birthday by September 1, 2014 and for Transitional Kindergarten children must have reached his or her birthday by December 1. 2014. Transitional Kindergarten is the first year of a two-year Kindergarten program that uses a modified Kindergarten curriculum that is age and developmentally appropriate. 
Our School: Moving to Zero Waste

During the past year and a half, the 4th grade 'Green Team' has been studying soil ecology, decomposition, and finding out what exactly the 5 Rs really mean (Reduce, Reuse, Recycle, Rot and Refuse (or Respect, or Rethink)). Why are they important? Because... "in nature, there is no waste". Or, as the kids would say... "we only have one earth! And it's best not to fill it with trash!" Back in December 2012, the Bolinas-Stinson School (the Edible Garden/Learning Lab Project) was awarded a generous grant from the Stinson Bolinas Community Fund in order to plant fruit trees and implement a vermicompost system on campus in order to recycle the school's food waste. The fruit trees were planted (4 total on both campuses) in early 2013 and the worm bin project has been an ongoing, project-based study (science, art, math, and wood shop, ecology) over the past 6 months.

These determined 4th graders have worked very hard on building a home for their new worms. Thanks to the parent and community volunteers (Ed Pohlman, Molli Milner, Kelly Onorato, Karen Buckenmeyer, Jennie Pfeiffer, John Glavis, Maud Zimmer, Ben Lowrance) who spent countless hours on auditing food scraps, constructing, creating, painting, advising, donating, and implementing a fabulous new worm bin system with these proud kids. Thanks to the awesome 4th grade teacher, Gretel Vargas, for supporting the kids in this journey as they feel empowered to make positive change in their school community. When you have time... please come take a look at their new "pets" (the worms). Some kids like to be called "slimy scientists" and others just love the worms so much that they tell all who will listen: "worms warm our hearts and are good for the earth".





VERMONT BOY IN THE GHETTO MY TRUE STORY!


