The Academy Awards remind me of this story

. . . from my lurid past in Bolinas.

I'll always remember the night I won the Emmy. I remember it well because the day leading up to it was a disaster.

Disillusioned with television I had pretty much dropped out of pursuing a career at KQED. Still they would occasionally offer me set design jobs in their big Studio A.

One job they offered me was with Duck's Breath Mystery Theater. The wacky comedy troupe had often appeared at the Community Center. They usually filled the house and then tore it down with laughter.

"Ask Dr. Science" was big on NPR at the time, and the television show was a dramatization of the radio parody. The "Ask Dr. Science National Science Quiz" was basically a bunch of skits centered around the mad basement laboratory of Dr. Science.

Coincidentally I had been working with an amazing scenic artist from Santa Rosa. Greg Duncan had worked at the Wax Museum at Fisherman's Wharf for years. He'd taught the History of Comics at Sonoma State. Greg was super industrious and skilled at weird sets and props. With Greg to assist I accepted the job at KQED.

"The Ask Dr. Science National Scenic Quiz" was a tremendous amount of work, and also a tremendous amount of fun. Working with the comedy troupe of Duck's Breath Mystery Theater was a laugh riot. We built Dr. Science's laboratory in KQED's cavernous Studio A. We scavenged Santa Rosa and San Francisco for weird junk. Greg had a lot of stuff from the Wax Museum. and that went into the mix.

It was stunning and exhausting work. We used all the tricks of the trade: chromakey inserts, stop motion animation, and tons of lighting effects.

We finished the production, and everyone went off to other jobs. "The Ask Dr. Science Nation Science Quiz" aired on KQED. I thought it was very funny, kind of an American answer to Monty Python. I also appreciated how much work went into each shot.

I forgot about it until my friend Ken gave me call to say that KQED was entering "Dr. Science" in the local Emmy competition sponsored by the Academy of Television Arts & Sciences. I was up for best set design.

But I was burned out on scenic design for television. It was way too demanding and unrewarding. I wanted to pursue my fine art career for a while and I forgot about "Dr. Science" and the Emmy awards.

Until my friend Ken began to bug me about going to the Hyatt Regency on Saturday night. for the Emmy awards.

Ken said it was black tie - no way. But I had my outfit together. I had a deep blue metallic tuxedo jacket. With a clean pair of Levis and a super ruffled tuxedo shirt I had the elegant bohemian look down.

My big problem with getting to the city on Saturday night, was that I was putting on a rock and roll event at Burnt Park on Saturday. I had three or four bands lined up including my trio featuring Hasci Horvath on bass guitar and Michael Sims on drums.

I was hoping to have my act together. Instead it felt like three different radio stations were playing in my head. Hasci immediately went into a trance groove. Michael Sims was a powerful drummer and he began to play the most furious drums I'd ever heard.

It was exactly what I was looking for: raw, creative power amplified a thousand times. But I longed for some kind of structure, musical or lyric wise. Instead there was a cyclonic vortex of sound.

I should have dug it, but I didn't. The chaotic nature of the performance infuriated me. We played for almost an hour and it never got any better. Different song, same cacophony. And forget about verse/chorus. Finally I just cranked up my amplifier and began to wail away.

I was one step away from getting it. But it was so unfamiliar and jarring to my sensibilities.

Those were the days that I was compounding my existential angst and career burnout with the use of LSD. I had a good source for pure liquid straight from the lab, and I began to use sub threshold doses of LSD to help with my blues.

75 micrograms is a good supplement, taken every three days or so. That amount of LSD makes colors and light effervescent. The brain seems higher, clearer, and there is no hallucinatory quality. I do not recommend this regimen for anyone. I believe that brain chemistry is better left to the wisdom of the body. But I was young and dumb.

I was planning to dose myself for the rock and roll. But the afternoon was such a struggle I didn't want to add to my burden.

I was pissed off and tired at the end of the afternoon. I remembered that I had promised Ken I would come to the city for the Emmy awards..

I didn't want to go, and I grumbled as I put on my metallic blue tuxedo jacket. I reached into the pocket and folt the small square of blotter acid

felt the small square of blotter acid.

"Can't get any worse." I said to myself and chewed up the little piece of blotter. I got in my Volvo and took off, still fuming over the disaster at Burnt Park. But I calmed down as I drove and I felt a lot better as I approached the Golden Gate Bridge.

The bridge looked beautiful in the twilight of evening. Suddenly I felt great swooping into the city for a date with destiny. A career in television seemed more promising.

I had a delicious buzz on by the time I got to the Hyatt. The room was filled with Bay Area television personalities, their significant others, and the many people who worked in the broadcast industry. I arrived at cocktail hour. Everyone was dressed up in gowns and tuxes. High on acid I felt as effervescent as the champagne.

I met up with Ken and Janis. We chatted for a while and then headed to the dining room. As I was sitting at the table I noticed a lighting tech with a light meter doing a light level check nearby. My suspicions were aroused and I wondered why they were checking levels near me. But I dismissed my paranoia, and returned to partying with my friends.

We had a nice dinner. I was too high to enjoy the food. I picked at my plate and ate what I could.

After dinner the awards ceremony began. The master of ceremonies announced the winner in each category. The Emmy statuette was brought to the winner's table by a woman in a slinky green gown. She also brought a microphone.

The categories were announced and awards were made. Finally we reached the category of Outstanding Set Design. For the first time I realized I might win.

What would I do? What would I say? Adrenaline coursed through my body and the room began to flash with color and pattern. I struggled to calm and composed as the ceremony began.

"The nominees for best set design are 'Bay Area AM' ("Bay Area AM" was a morning talk show, and the set was a nicely arranged collection of furniture and flats.)

"From KQED: the 'Ask Dr. Science National Science Quiz." There was a lot of laughter as the wacky basement laboratory of Dr. Science appeared on the screen. Each new picture of the production brought more laughs from the audience.

To me it was a no brainer. One set looked like Home Depot, The other looked like a wild Grateful Dead carnival..

"And the winner is Stuart Chapman, the 'Ask Dr. Science National Science Quiz"

"I know that guy," I thought for a moment. And then the camera lights switched on and I was blasted with light. I stood there transfixed, like a deer in headlights.

There is a peak experience on acid that is experienced as an explosion of light. I wondered at that moment if I might be having such an experience. Was that the Clear Light of the Void or the blinding glare of television lights?.

A beautiful woman in a shimmering green gown handed me the Emmy and then a microphone. I was at a complete loss for words.


I stood there dumbstruck, looking down at the microphone and the golden Emmy. The room got completely silent.

"I don't know what to say thank you." I finally blurted out. The audience burst out in laughter and applause. I stood there with my head bowed until the applause ended, the lights dimmed and the microphone moved on.

"I did it!" I thought to myself as the chaos subsided. "I won an Emmy on acid!"

"What a story to tell my friends back in Bolinas."





West Marin Fund Now Accepting Grant Proposals from Nonprofits Application Deadline is March 14

Point Reyes Station—The West Marin Fund (WMF), a foundation organized to serve the communities of coastal West Marin, is now accepting proposals for its third round of small grants. Grants will range from \$500 to \$5,000 out of a total pool of \$50,000.


Grant requests can cover a broad range of strategies or products, including staff and board training, computer hardware and software, improvements to communications tools, and more. Complete guidelines can be found at westmarinfund.org. Applications are due by March 14, 2014.

"We are responding to an informal survey of previous grantees which indicated local nonprofits have a wide variety of needs," said West Marin Fund Board Chair Harriet Moss. "We want to support them in getting their best work done by asking them what they need most to be effective. Priority will be given to proposals that result in an organization's improved capacity to provide service to West Marin."

The West Marin Fund is a foundation organized to serve the communities of coastal West Marin. The Fund carries out its mission by providing new funding and other assistance to existing nonprofits, expanding charitable giving and volunteer activity from residents and visitors, and supporting innovative endeavors that benefit the community but are beyond the scope of existing nonprofit groups. Incorporated in 2011, the Fund has previously awarded grants totaling more than \$108,000 for technology, fundraising, staff training, youth engagement, and more.

The West Marin Fund's service area extends from Muir Beach in the south to Dillon Beach in the north—and the contiguous ranch lands. The area includes the villages of Stinson Beach, Bolinas, Olema, Inverness, Point Reyes Station, Marshall, Nicasio, and Tomales. The Fund is a 501(c)(3) California public benefit nonprofit corporation.




PERLA BATALLA
